Many of those receiving this first Progress Report for the Britain in '87 Worldcon bid have already expressed their support by taking out a pre-supporting membership. For others it will be an introduction to our bid, and

an attempt to enlist support. In these pages we will attempt to show you why we think we have the facilities, the experience, the ideas and the enthusiasm to provide a memorable Worldcon.



WHY 1987?

Opinions differ on when the first science fiction convention took place. Sam Moskowitz says it was when a group of New York fans met a group of Philadelphia fans at one of the latter's home late in 1936. Everybody else agrees that it was on 3rd January 1937, when fans from all over England covered on the Theosophical Hall in Leeds; among the throng of twenty attendees were such names as Eric Frank Russell and a teenager called Arthur Clarke (wonder whatever happened to him?). In 1987, then, we will be celebrating the 50th anniversary of the first British convention, and the first real convention in world history! (Yet another first for Britain, the country which gave the world the industrial revolution, science fiction – courtesy of Mary Shelley and H. G. Wells – cricket, Duran Duran and football hooliganism.

We'll also be celebrating the 30th anniversary of the first British Worldcon, which was held in London in 1957. Other worldcons have been held in Europe in 1965 (London), 1970 (Heidelberg) and 1979 (Brighton). You'll see that on average the worldcon has come to Europe every seven or eight years. That's another reason why we think the time is ripe for a

fifth worldcon on this side of the Atlantic in 1987.

Anniversaries provide a good peg on which to hang a celebration, but of course they aren't absolutely central. The main reason why we want to bring the 1987 worldcon to Britain is that we have a committee bursting for the chance to work their fingers to the bone, and a fandom – in Britain and Europe – which has been deprived of the heady delights of the worldcon for too long already. □

A WORLDCON PHILOSOPHY?

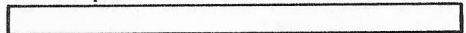
It sounds pretentious to talk about our philosophy of the Worldcon. This is because it is pretentious. Therefore we don't intend to use such a grandiose phrase. But we do have a strong general idea of what we are trying to achieve.

We are planning on the assumption that a 1987 Worldcon in Britain will attract 4,000–4,500 people, based on the 1979 attendance of 3,200 and the subsequent growth of British and European fandom. We are prepared to accommodate at least a thousand more than our higher estimate, if our prediction proves conservative.

That's a lot of people, from a lot of different countries (that 1979 crowd included attendees from 29 different countries; we certainly don't expect our convention to be any less cosmopolitan).

We aim to provide for those people the best entertainment we possibly can: a wide range of programming with an international flavour; interesting and unusual exhibits, including a truly spectacular art show; and a friendly and comfortable atmosphere.

Through a lucky geographical accident, Britain – if any country can claim the distinction – lies at the crossroads of world SF fandom. We can't take credit for that, but we can – and fully intend to – take advantage of it, and in the process aim to put on the best Worldcon ever.



BRIGHTON - OUR VENUE

Brighton is Britain's leading conference town, whose unrivalled facilities made it inevitable that, like our predecessors in 1979, we should choose it as our site.

Brighton is ideally suited for travellers from all over the world. London's second major airport, Gatwick, is only 25 miles away, with a fast rail connection running 24 hours a day. London itself is less than an hour away by rail. The cross-channel car ferry from Dieppe lands in Newhaven, only 9 miles away, and there are easy links with other cross channel ferry ports.

Brighton is one of Britain's most attractive seaside towns, famous for its Regency connections (of which the most famous legacy is the unique Royal Pavilion). Its compact centre is packed with restaurants, shops and interesting byways – all within easy strolling distance of the seafront and our convention hotels and facilities. □

SITE AND FACILITIES

Those of you who attended Seacon '79 – and there are 3,200 of you out there somewhere – will be familiar with some, but by no means all of the facilities we are planning to use in 1987.

We will once again be making full use of the Brighton Metropole's Exhibition Halls and Conference Rooms. Elsewhere in this Progress Report those of you who are so minded will find detailed floor plans and other data, but we will summarize the main points here.

There are nine Exhibition Halls,

offering a total of about 80,000 sq. ft. of floor space. The largest of the halls can seat up to 2,000 conference style. The others provide smaller meeting rooms (capacity 300-350) plus exhibit space which will comfortably accommodate the largest conceivable dealer's room, art show and other exhibits without the sense of being lost inside an aircraft hangar. Flexibility is the keynote.

The hotel itself offers a further 15,000 sq. ft. of meeting space in four halls (G, H, I and J on the plan). The largest of these can seat up to 850 for a banquet. There are also a further fifteen small meeting rooms, ideal for special interest groups, plus an array of bars, restaurants and lounges. (There will also be, by 1987, a swimming pool in what is presently the County Suite).

But that's not all. For the 1987 Worldcon we will be making use of Brighton's purpose-built municipal conference centre, a few yards down the seafront from the Metropole. Its main feature is an arena which can seat up to 5,000 people; it is here that major programme events will be held. Altogether the Brighton Centre offers a further 27,000 sq. ft. of meeting space, in addition to a restaurant, bars, and a spacious registration and information area. Opened in 1977, the Brighton Centre is an ultra-modern, highly-equipped conference facility.

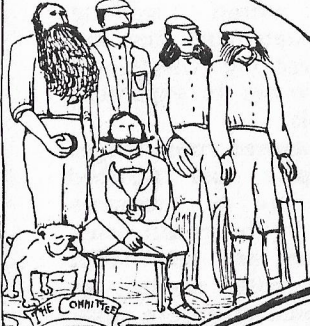
We think that between them the Brighton Centre and Metropole can offer all the function space we are likely to need. But if we should find we require more, our other main hotels – a stone's throw away along the seafront – each have an array of conference rooms which we can call upon if need be.

All the facilities of the Brighton Centre and the Metropole Hotel have been reserved for the 1987 worldcon, with prices agreed and guaranteed. □

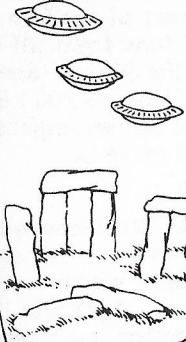

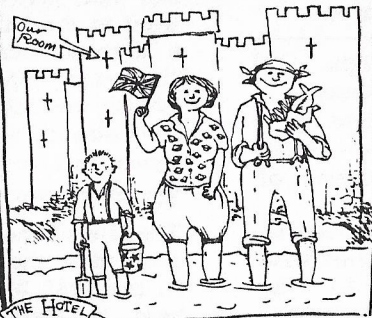

HOTELS

Our three main convention hotels will be the same ones used in 1979 – the Metropole, the Bedford and the Old Ship. Between them, these three hotels provide 1,200 beds, all with private bathroom, and all within a couple of minutes' walk of our conference facilities. There is a wide variety of additional overflow accommodation within walking distance of the Metropole and the Brighton Centre, ranging from cheap bed-&-breakfast houses to expensive and luxurious hotels.

We have already agreed room rates with the Metropole and Bedford Hotels, subject only to increases based on changes in the retail price index between now and late 1986. With inflation currently running at around 5% one should therefore allow for these prices to be approx. 10% higher by 1987. These rates are:-

Single room	£23.00 per night
Twin room	£16.50 per person per night

These prices are fully inclusive of breakfast, service and VAT.

These are extremely competitive rates, comparable in cash terms with those offered in 1979! At the exchange rate current in December 1984 (approx. \$1.25 = £1.00) they correspond to an American equivalent of \$29.00 for a single room and \$41.00 for a twin or double! Of course, exchange rates may alter considerably, one way or the other, between now and 1987. □

A NOTE ON THE GRAND HOTEL

Many of you will be aware that the Grand Hotel in Brighton has recently suffered severe damage and is closed. We would like to stress that the Grand was not one of our intended main convention hotels, so our plans have not been affected in any way by this.

It now seems certain that the Grand Hotel will re-open under new management early in 1986, and therefore will be available for anyone who should wish to stay in it (it is the grandest hotel in Brighton, but also the most expensive). □

WHY PRESUPPORT BRITAIN IN '87?

We need your money, that's why. Bidding for a Worldcon is an expensive business, with a lot of advertising and publicity required. Your £1.00 or \$2.00 will help us do what's needed – and is, in any case, deductible from your eventual membership cost if and when we win the bid. As a pre-supporting member you will receive this and future bidding publications, plus a nifty badge. Donations in excess of the pre-supporting figure are, of course, welcomed

But not just your money. We also want to show the rest of fandom that a large number of fans from all over the world support the idea of another British worldcon. Close on 700 people have already signed up: an impressive figure, but we need more □

TO WIN THE BID

The site of the 1987 Worldcon will be decided by the members of Aussiecon II, the 1985 Worldcon, which is to be held in Melbourne, Australia. All attending or supporting members of that convention are entitled to vote, but to do so must pay a voting fee (which will convert into supporting membership of our convention if – when! – we win).

Membership in Aussiecon II currently cost £32.50 attending and £19.50 supporting in the UK. The agent is:

It is obviously expensive to join Aussiecon II and vote, particularly if you are unable to go to Melbourne. However, if we are to win the convention for 1987 we do need as many as possible of our supporters to do so ... We are not running unopposed: there is at least one rival bid (from Phoenix, Arizona). Supporting membership in Aussiecon will also bring you all their publications, plus the chance to nominate and vote for the Hugo Awards. □

THE COMMITTEE

Our bidding committee has mutated somewhat since first formed, and has now expanded to eight people, all with experience of British national conventions (Eastercons), regional conventions, and in some cases experience on the committee of the 1979 Worldcon. They are as follows:

Malcolm Edwards (Chair). Director of Programming at Seacon '79 and Chair of the 1975 British Eastercon. Long active in all areas of fandom, and in real life of editor for Victor Gollancz, Britain's best known SF publisher.

John Steward (Treasurer). Treasurer of Seacon '79, auditor of accounts for the British Science Fiction Association and numerous conventions, John is a chartered accountant whose knowledge of convention and other fan finance cannot be bettered by anyone in British fandom.

Dave Langford (Publications). Nominated for umpteen Hugo Awards for himself (fan writer) and his fanzines (ANSIBLE, TWLL DDU), Co-

Chairman of the 1978 British Eastercon, provider of humorous talks sans pareil, Dave is also a full-time writer with two novels and an array of non-fiction titles to his credit.

Colin Fine (Secretary). European Secretary of the 1984 British Eastercon/Eurocon, Colin was also a committee member of the successful 1982 Fencon, and has worked on a number of American worldcons. He speaks more languages than most people know exist (probably more languages than do exist, since he invented some of them ...).

Linda Pickersgill (Fan Programme/Events). Living proof of the irresistible power of British Worldcons, Linda came from the US to Seacon '79, and has stayed ever since, one of at least four Americans to move to Britain and marry in the wake of that convention. She has subsequently co-founded Britain's first successful APA for years, served on the committee of the 1984 Mexican, and is Fan Guest of Honour at the 1985 British Eastercon.

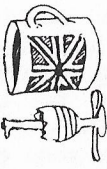
HELP NEEDED

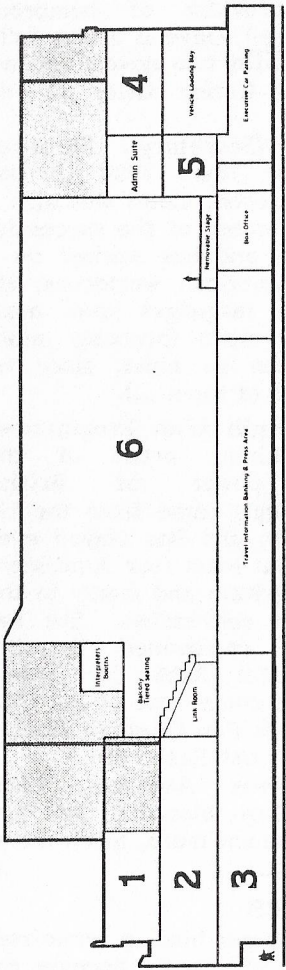

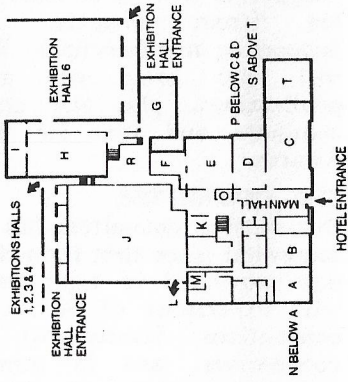

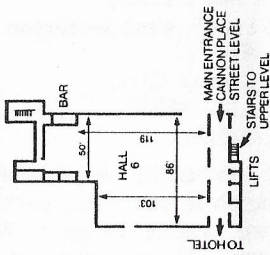
