




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WELCOME TO ALBACON 96, SCOTLAND'S PREMIER SCIENCE FICTION & FANTASY CONVENTION.




DAVID GERROLD

David Gerrold is notorious as the man who invented the cottage cheese burrito, the most heinous crime against dieters since the invention of the melba toast!

When not engaged in nefarious culinary pursuits, Gerrold writes novels and the

occasional script for television. He has published over thirty books, and written far too many televisions scripts. The six-book trilogy entitled, **THE WAR AGAINST CHTORR**, is the most ambitious of his works and the first three books established the series as a major work in the science fiction cannon.

His SF television credits include: Star Trek, Tales from the Darkside, Logan's Run, The Real Ghostbusters and more recently, Babylon 5



although not all his involvement has been strictly as a script writer.

Gerrold also teaches screenwriting a Pepperdine University (aka Malibu High), and his students call him "the teacher from the Black Lagoon." As well as writing articles and columns for magazines, including *STARLOG*, his most recent tenure has been as a contributing editor for *PC-TECHNIQUES*, a publication catering exclusively to obsessive-compulsive computer programmers!

I knew the name of David Gerrold long before I knew the man, primarily for his



legendary contribution to Star Trek: he was the student who wrote the most popular episode while studying for his degree, becoming the youngest member of the Screenwriters Guild of America. [He has also contributed to other episodes of the series and written about his experiences of the Trek phenomena in a number of books including THE TROUBLE WITH TRIBBLES (1973), which gives a detailed insight to the conception & development of one of the show's most endearing beasties!]

And then one day I picked up a copy of 'When Harlie Was One', simply because I knew the name from Star Trek, and before I'd finished page one I felt that thrill you get when you know you've just discovered someone who is going to be a favourite author. I couldn't wait to find his other books and after I'd met him, I pestered the poor man for preview copies and computer printouts because I couldn't wait for them to hit the book shops. Once, I even cornered him in his hotel room and he very generously allowed me to read the draft version of a new book on his portable. (Of course, I always bought a copy later!) I was just so delighted to find a writer whose books were consistently imaginative, intelligent and exciting. My favourite? Well, 'When Harlie Was One' because it was the first one I found, although the rewrite, Version 2, is even better; the War with Chtorr series; the Starwolf books; and I couldn't leave out 'The Man Who Folded Himself' and ...

Actually, they're all favourites for one reason or another so when I needed a guest for a Star Trek convention I was running in 1984, David Gerrold was a natural choice. A few months later, he wrote about his impressions of his first visit to a British convention in his regular column in STARLOG magazine, describing it as 'like being at the worlds best party'. He was so bowled over by his reception that he more or less invited the entire convention to a room party which didn't break up until the next morning! (There is no truth in the rumour that it took that long for David to reach the punch-line of his first joke!) We were equally bowled over by him. David took his responsibilities as a convention guest as seriously as he takes his writing: when Rog Peyton (Andromeda Books) took him to a local pub and made him late, David was mortified. He was never late again in the 10 years he attended our cons. UFP Con never ran without David Gerrold as a special guest. I used to

complain we couldn't get rid of him; he used to retort it was my own fault for sending him the plane tickets. But the truth is, we couldn't imagine a con without him.

And David the man? I think the single word I would use to describe him is passionate. He is passionate about his writing. He is passionate about the causes dear to his heart - AIDS, hunger, the environment - and now, he is committed to bringing up his son the best way he knows how. I don't see him or talk to him very often, but we have one of those friendships where we can pick up after two years as easily as others pick up after two days. I'm very glad I can call David my friend. As a person, as a writer, as a convention guest: David is special.

I know you'll enjoy his company.

TERRY PRATCHETT

Terry Pratchett is one of the UK's best selling authors, inside or outside of the fantasy field. Since 1988 he has had twenty books in the main best sellers list, seven of them reaching Number 1, and his titles regularly feature in the Top 100 sellers for the year; he has several times been described as "the best English humorist since PG Wodehouse." A recent survey suggested he sells 1% of all the fiction sold in the UK.

He was born in Bucks, England in 1948, and had what he describes as: "an idyllic



childhood, except for school, which I hated. But it was entirely the wrong childhood for an author. No-one beat me up or forced me to go to church and my parents got along fine with one another, so I had to start out as a writer without all those hang-ups you're supposed to have and had to invent them for myself."

He began his writing career at the age of 13, earning enough with his first short story to buy himself a typewriter; his first novel for children, The Carpet People was published when he was 20

(copies now exchange hands for up to £250 – it has been estimated that a UK first edition copy of **The Light Fantastic**, the second Discworld book, would fetch £750 if it ever came on the market).

He worked full-time as a provincial journalist until getting a job as Press Officer for the Central Electricity Generating Board, which until recently was the main electricity company for England and Wales. He began writing the Discworld series of humourous fantasy books as light relief from looking after the local PR interests of four nuclear power stations.

They were immediately successful, and he was able to leave the warm glow of nuclear public relations in 1987 when his fourth Discworld book, **Mort**, surprised everyone but especially him by suddenly climbing up the best seller lists.

The **Truckers** trilogy for children, begun in 1989, was equally successful. The three books - **Truckers**, **Diggers** and **Wings** - attracted so many adult readers that they all made it into the main top ten, besides occupying the top three places in the Young Adult top ten. A more recent YA title - **Johnny and the Dead** - has been a children's best seller in the UK for two years and won the Writer's Guild Children's Book of the year Award (but has not been published in the US because it is, in the words of one publisher, 'too difficult for American children'.)

Terry lives in Wiltshire with his wife Lynn and 19-year-old daughter Rhianna - and hardly ever gives out further biographical details, except when it comes to choice of alcoholic drink.





DAVID A. HARDY

From his schooldays, David Hardy's interest was divided between Art and Science He worked in a laboratory, then in 1954, at the age of 18, illustrated his first book for Patrick Moore. After National Service in the RAF he spent nine years in Cadbury's Design Office, near his home in Bournville, where he obtained a thorough grounding in commercial art. He continued to illustrate books and magazines, produced book jackets, graphics for TV, films for London stage productions, etc., until in 1965 he



went freelance. Up to the time when Man firs walked on the Moon (and fiction became fact) Hardy's work was almost entirely factual. Today he is well-known internationally both for fac and fiction.

From 1970 his work began to appear first or the US Magazine of Fantasy and Science Fiction and then on British paperbacks and hardcovers. His covers have appeared on all classic US magazines; Galaxy, If, Amazing as well as F&SF (for which he has now done over 40 covers more than any US artist), and many of his covers for Analog since 1981 have appeared in the top three of its annual Readers' Poll - sometimes at

1st and 2nd. In 1979 David was nominated for a Hugo - SF's equivalent to an Oscar - and in 1984 he was voted 'Best European SF Graphic Artist', while in 1990 his work was nominated for the British Science Fiction Association Award and the US 'Lensman' Award. He is European Vice-President of the International Association for Astronomical Arts (IAAA), and has travelled to Iceland, Hawaii and the US Southwest, sketching analogues of planetary geology with US and Soviet artists.

The first Hardy exhibition was held at the London Planetarium in 1968, and led to the publication of his first art print, STELLAR RAIDANCE - a planet of a red supergiant star - reached No. 6 in the Top Ten Prints list of 1970. He has done many 360°

panoramas for both London and Stuttgart Planetarium, where a major exhibition was held in 1980; other exhibitions have been held In the UK, USA, Germany, France and Holland, including Space '86 in Utrecht. In 1982, he worked in Munich on production art for the film THE NEVERENDING STORY, and has since done other film work. He is the only British artist to have work included on a CD-ROM which travelled on the Mars '94 space probe.

CHALLENGE OF THE STARS (1972), the major Hardy/Moore collaboration, was checked and commended by NASA, and revised for reprint in 1978. David began his own writing career in 1974: the most important one of note is ATLAS OF THE SOLAR SYSTEM (1982) which was updated and reprinted in 1986. Dragon's World published VISIONS OF SPACE (1974), which was written, compiled and designed by Hardy, in which he collected the work of over 70 international space artists in a 176-page, full colour hard cover book (soft cover 1990), now accepted as the definitive work on the subject.

He produced all the illustrations for his book THE FIRES WITHIN: VOLCANOES ON EARTH AND OTHER PLANETS, with text provided by Dr. John Murray (1991). Also in 1989 the prestigious US-based magazine Step-by-Step Graphics featured his work and techniques.

David is also an experienced photographer and has recently turned his hand to computer graphics and he uses an Apple Power PC. The move to this format has not diminished his work and he admits that the advantage to using computer graphics is the scope of techniques at your disposal. However, as he recently stated in an article published by ARTISTS & ILLUSTRATORS (Issue 118), there are disadvantages: "You can do all this stuff on your own screen at home, but you still have to get it into some kind of visual form that

you can show to people outside - say in the pub."



.ALBACON'S CHARITY WORK

ALBACON has always supported the RNIB Talking Books Service by donating profits to sponsor SF & Fantasy titles for their expanding library. It costs £500 to sponsor a book and following ALBACON 94, £1000 was presented to the RNIB towards two new books. The titles selected were:

The Oxford Book of Science Fiction Stories, edited by Tom Shippey and,

Orpheus: Myths of the World, edited by Padraic Colum.

The former was dedicated to Glasgow fan Ann McDonald, who died shortly before the 1994 convention. Both the book used for the production and the RNIB certificate were presented to her brother, Bruce McDonald, who currently lives in Ayr and has always been a supporter of Glasgow conventions.

Orpheus is a beautifully illustrated book containing a diverse range of world myths. The book and the RNIB certificate will be auctioned on Sunday.

Also in 1994, £1000 was donated to the Children's Hospice Appeal Scotland. This campaign has successfully reached its goal: to build a purpose built facility to cater for terminally ill children and their families. Rachel House opened its doors earlier this year. It is situated on the banks of Loch Leven in Kinross and has a range of facilities for the comfort and pleasure of the children. There are family rooms so that parents can remain close to the children and each of the eight rooms open out onto landscaped gardens. The most impressive feature of the hospice is the "snoezzlen" room which boasts a water bed floor with moving lights, bubble tubes and soft music.

ALBACON is delighted it could contribute in some way to improving the quality of life for these children and their family and would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone who attended in 1994, for their support.



VIRTUOSITY (Friday 9pm)


Denzel Washington chases a computer generated psychopath who is running riot in the real world. Original storyline with a superb "screaming" concerto! Violent!







SECURITY MEASURES DURING THE CONVENTION

Although thefts at Glasgow conventions are a rarity, the committee would like to advise all members to take extra care with their property. Handbags, cameras & other personal belongings should not be left unattended. Neither the hotel nor the



convention committee can be held accountable for items lost or stolen.

Convention badges must be worn at all times in all convention areas and should be worn where they can be clearly seen.

Convention Staff & Security personnel reserve the right to challenge anyone who is present in a convention area without visible identification of being a member. Non-compliance with the Badge Policy could result in a charity fine and anyone

attempting to gain entry to convention areas without proper identification will be refused. Bar Staff can also refuse to serve anyone in the con bar who is not wearing a badge.


Lost badges should be reported to REGISTRATION (during opening times) or OPS (after 6pm) immediately, in case they have been handed in. Replacements will be charged at £2, which is refundable if the original badge is found and surrendered. Recurrent loss of your badge will be notified to Security.

All members are asked to be vigilant. If you see anyone acting suspiciously, please inform a member of Convention Security or contact OPS immediately.

WEAPONS POLICY

The Weapons Policy will be enforced in all areas of the hotel, particularly public

areas such as reception, the Entresol corridor, stairwells and lifts. Weapons must be registered on arrival and a permit will be issued for the duration of the convention. Convention Staff & Security Personnel reserve the right to ask for your permit at any time. The policy will be waived for Masquerade Competitors who require to use their weapon(s) during their presentation but a permit is still required!



Permits will cost £1 for the first registered weapon and 50p for subsequent weapons to the maximum of £5. A fining system for breaches of the policy, at 50p per offence, will be imposed at the discretion of Security Personnel. All money raised from the Weapon Permit system will be donated to the convention charities.

BLADED WEAPONS must be sheathed and peace bonded at all times.

REPLICA WEAPONS & WATER PISTOLS may not be loaded at any time.

NO WEAPON should be pointed, waved about in any area of the hotel or worn in public streets.

ALL WEAPONS must be registered with Security and Permits should be carried at all times when the registered weapon is in use or being worn.

The Policy is simple and will be strictly enforced. Security have authorisation to stop anyone they suspect of carrying an unregistered weapon and can fine you immediately. Their decision is final and will be fully supported by the convention committee.

Any member who blatantly ignores this policy or fails to produce a Weapon Permit will face heavy fining. Persistent offenders will be discharged from the convention.

DISABLED ACCESS SERVICE


The ELECTRICAL EGGS (UK)TM Disabled Access Service is being implemented at ALBACON 96. Seating areas will be designated for Access users only and are signposted. Anyone wearing the Access Button (and the Helper Button) is entitled to use these seats and convention members are asked to keep these seats clear. One of the hotel lifts will be designated for Access Users, giving them priority usage during peak times. The Access Button will allow the wearer to gain first entry into a programme area and go to the top of any queues.

There is also a Medical Alert Service in operation for first aid purposes. If you have a medical condition, taking medication or have any allergies, it is recommended that you should register immediately. This information will be kept confidential and only Cuddles will have access to the details. In the event of an emergency, Cuddles will only make this information to the person giving first aid, if it is requested, medical staff or paramedics.

TAKING THE MASK OFF COSTUMING

The Masquerade is always one of the highlights of ALBACON and Cuddles will be Mistress of Ceremonies for the event, which is on Saturday night.

Proficient sewing machine skills and a knowledge of dress making are not always essential to be a winning contestant. In 1988, one of the winners entered as a giant Mars bar which was basically a black bin bag, gold & red paint and a obviously took a lot of patience! Entrants who have asked a family member or friend to help them construct their costume will not be penalised but Cuddles would hope that any credit will be noted! There are some basic rules which always apply to the Masquerade:



Costumes which have been hired or professionally made, cannot be worn.

Any weaponry displayed or used during the presentation must have been checked & registered with Security before the competition.

Flash photography will not be permitted during the competition for health & safety reasons and this will be enforced by Security, who have permission to confiscate equipment until the end of the event. There will an opportunity for photographs once the main portion of the competition is over.

Inspiration comes from the muses! Costumes can be reproductions, such as those based on outfits in popular TV shows or movies; costumes can be inspired by a comic, a book or a picture; costumes can be inspired by a game or they can be totally original.

Originality, creativity and presentation will be the three main factors which the

judges will take into consideration to select a winner. Prizes will be awarded at the closing ceremony on Monday afternoon and Certificates will be made for all participants, which will be posted out after the convention.
