

GUEST OF HONOUR

Although we have proroduced a comprehensive bibliography of HENRY KENNETH BULMER we feel that a few extra notes are the least we can do.

Bulmer was born at an early age (that's enough of the old jokes! Ken Ed.) in 1921 and entered Fandom before the 2nd World War. At this time he was one of the members of London fandom who met at the White Horse. Other frequenters of this hostelry at the time included John Wyndham and Arthur Clarke, to drop just two names. He published his first 'zine in 1941 and his fannish activities have continued ever since with two noticeable high points. The first of these was the formation in 1954 of OMPA (The Offtrail Magazine Publishers Association) - which still exists. In setting up this organisation, which promotes the publication and distribution of fanzines by the members, Ken was assisted by Vince Clarke and Chuck Harris. The second high point came a year later when Ken became the TAFF delegate, and as such attended the Worlcon in Cleveland. He had already been involved for some years in the organisation of conventions including the 1951 Eastercon, and has been an attendee ot many cons since, including being GOH a number of times.

As well as BECCON 83 his previos starring roles have included Thirdmancon in 1968, and Hatfield in 1979.

Vince Clarke, who has already been mentioned above, helped Ken write his first two novels in 1952, and since that time Ken has produced a . VERY substantial body of work, all of which is detailed in the bibliography.

CHAIR CIRCLES

Revelations on the existence of a new life form

As you read this you are at the mercy of a new life form, which only now is emerging from the dark phantasms of the collective unconciousness of the Beccon Committee.

Where are you now ? Wherever it may be you are likely to be sitting in a chair . Around you in a tribal group are to be found other chairs which together exhibit all the characteristics of a composite organism.

Watch and observe them over time - do they not gather together in groups for companionship and social intercourse, do they not need nourishment and do they not reproduce by throwing out a psuedopod which then fissions off to form a new group? In your observation of chair circles you will rapidly observe one of their most prominant features, which is their dominating relationship with man. They use mankind for mobility, for cleaning and as a personal slave in every aspect of their daily lives.

Our role in life, and at SF cons in particular, is nothing but the facilitating of the social life of chair circles. As legs are to humans so SF fans are to chair circles.

Let us consider an evening in the life of a chair circle. It may start as a cosy little square established within reasonable distance of the bar, but as a successful circle it will steadly grow and become more irregular in shape. However, it will maintain a clear path to its source of nourishment - the bar. Typically the cosy square will become a rectangle and then pinch in the middle before splitting itself into two. The split typically takes place once the group has increased to between ten and fifteen chairs.

This typical shape may be affected by a particularily powerful part of a chair circle. This power may arise from situation, as in a con hall where large rectangular blocks of chairs occur, or informally outside where a single charismatic chairperson can distort a normal group. This will increase the maximum number that a group can grow to and may lead to a general facing towards a particular direction.

CHAIR CIRCLES (CONT)

An important part of chair circles is their need, like all living things, for a continuous source of energy. This is typically provided by the bar and the overriding need in the development of a chair circle is to keep this life-line free at all costs. In a similar vein chair circles must keep an open route for the removal of waste products such as dead beer glasses.

The chair groups to be found at cons are but one of a large number of varieties of such creatures. Consider the sea shore where constant exposure to sun, sand and sea has lead to long thin chair groups all facing in the same direction. Indeed the very chairs themselves have mutated in this unnatural environment, and have become frail and thin with a disconcerting ability to snap shut at any moment, imprisoning within themselves some unsuspecting anthropoid wearing only a damp pair of swimming trunks and a spare tire around its waist.

The most well travelled chair groups are to be found on aeroplanes and trains, where the constant travelling has lead to paralysis and sterility. Fixed chair groups can be found in any car, but these form even larger scale groups in car parks and so have a social life all their own.

Just remember as you move around this con - beware the chair circles!

SUNDAY 31 JULY.


1100- Bed Debate. A version of the 'Balloon Debate', where four eminent personages will argue as to who should have the last bed in the Hotel.

Director, Charles Brabin. Date, 1932. Actors, Boris Karloff, Lewis Stone, Myrna Loy, Charles Starrett. Basis, novel by Sax Rohmer. Story, Fu Manchu, complete with baroque torture chamber, attempts to take possession of Genghis Khan's sword and mask.

Director, Kenji Fukasaku. Date, 1968. Actors, Robert Horton, Luciana Paluzzi, Richard Jaeckel. "Story", little green men, stoical American astronauts, meteor on collision course with Earth, etc, etc.

Director, Al Bradley. Date, approx 1978. Actors, John Richardson (the only one who would admit it). FRED FU MANCHU & LURGI STRIKES BRITAIN


Two of the highly popular (especially at BECCON 81) Telegoon series. Sellers, Milligna etc, etc do the voices.







- 10. Lifts to hotel rooms.






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HEATSHIELD STICKERS
