

PROGRESS REPORT ONE

Introduction

Albacon II is the 34th Annual UK Science-fiction Convention. It will be held in Glasgow's Central Station Hotel over the Easter weekend of 1983, and will attract up to 1,000 Members.

We will offer a full Main Programme, Alternative Programme, Video Programme, and Fan Programme, as well as Art Show, Computer Room, Wargaming Room and, last but not least, a Dealers Room. Add to these attractions good Bar facilities and a friendly Hotel and we reckon that we've got an Eastercon that will offer something to everybody.

Guests

Guest of Honour at Albacon II is James White. He is familiar both as a fan and an author, and his tall presence has been noted at nearly all the Cons held

in Glasgow to date. Author of the Sector General stories (many of which have recently seen reissue in US editions) and of many other novels and short stories, he remains affable and readily approachable (so long as you're of a height not below six feet!). Accompanying James White will be his wife, Peggy; both come from Belfast.


Special Guest is Fantasy writer *Tanith Lee*. Author of many short stories and novels, she remains less known in this country than in the US. She isn't a regular attendee of Eastercons, but hopefully will be after coming to Albacon II.

Joint Fan Guests of Honour will be the winners of the latest TAFF and GUFF bids. More details of both these fannish good causes will be found in PR2, as will further information about our two main guests.

The Central Hotel

Site of Albacon II is the Central Station Hotel. It offers ample space for Albacon's many Programmes and a wide selection of types of bedroom accommodation. The Hotel function rooms are located on two adjacent floors linked by a broad staircase, and after just over a hundred years of life the building is unlikely to collapse around even the most enjoyable of room parties!

The Central hosts Glasgow's Faircon in July this year and so by the time of Albacon in April 1983 the Hotel Staff and Management should be well used to the activities of SF Fans!



Function Rooms vary in size from the Banqueting Hall (site of the *Main Programme*) which seats 600 down to the rather more intimate confines of the Douglas Room, seating 50. A list of Function-Rooms is given below, and a map of the Hotel showing their relative locations and proposed use will be published in a later Progress Report.

Bedroom accommodation varies in terms of price and quality, with a Single Room with Bathroom costing more than a share of a Triple without Bathroom. A full listing of Bedroom rates and facilities is also given below. All prices include Full Breakfast, Service and VAT; there are no hidden 'extras'. The Central has 211 Bedrooms with 303 beds, and overflow accommodation in the nearby North British Hotel is available at the same rates as in the Central. Further negotiations subsequent to winning the Bid for Eastercon in 1983 have in fact reduced the cost of staying in the Central. If you stay in a Twin with Bathroom on an additional bed you will be charged *only* the cost of Breakfast -£4.00 - in the morning! Triple rooms

normally have no bathrooms, so in effect a Triple with Bathroom is being offered at £29.00 for three people. Remember, however, that there are only limited numbers of these rooms so BOOK EARLY!

Hotel Booking forms have been included with this Progress Report and should be returned at once to the hotel, NOT to Albacon II's address. Rooms will be allocated on a strictly first come, first served basis.

Food and Drink

As well as the formal Banquet we have arranged for the Central to provide snack-type food at various times of the day and evening. These times will be shown in prominent positions at Albacon, and the choice will be generally similar (and at similar prices) to that on offer at Faircon '82. Faircon's snacks are shown in the box below, and are typical of the selection and prices that you should expect.

More formal meals may be had within the Hotel at the Malmaison Restaurant, where a fine selection of good food may be had at moderate prices.

Outside the Central lies the centre of Glasgow, and as might be expected there is a wide choice of eating establishments. Locally, there are a number of Chinese Restaurants, Wimpy Bars, and pubs selling snacks. Slightly further away are an even

wider selection of restaurants. If you enjoy curries then Gibson Street's Shish Mahal is highly thought of, and there are other fine restaurants in other parts of the city. A listing of some of these will be published in either PR3 or at Albacon itself.

If you really dislike food then you can always try the BR Buffet in Central Station....

The Central offers a selection of Bars to Albacon Members. As well as the permanent American Bar (located outside the Main Con Hall) there will be two other Bars. One will be adjacent to the Alternative Programme area and will be the main Con Bar; the other will be outside the Fan Room. The latter Bar will offer a slightly smaller stock than the main Bar.

Drink prices cannot be guaranteed in the present economic climate; the current tariff shows prices of 62p per pint of McEwans Heavy, and 66p per pint of Lager. Whisky costs 72p per fifth gill measure, and Coke 30p per bottle. There will be real ale at one of the Bars.

Bar opening hours will be from 11 am through to 4 am each day, subject to breaks for clearing up etc as required. The Hotel have been warned of the amount of trade to expect, and hopefully will believe us this time!

Membership Rates

Several forms of Membership exist. These are: Pre-Supporting Membership, Supporting Membership, Full Attending Membership, and Day Membership. Only Supporting and Full Attending Membership are available at present.

Pre-Supporting Members are those who paid us £1.00 prior to the successful Albacon II Bid at Channelcon. Their payments financed our mailings, Bid Reports, and posters etc. Pre-Supporting Members may reduce their payment to convert to Supporting or Full Attending Membership by the sum that they paid us prior to the Bid being won. Luckless Metrocon supporters may likewise take credit for the amount they paid to the Metrocon Bid Committee.

Pre-Supporting Members will have this mailing and no more sent to them unless they either Support or take out Full Attending Membership.

Supporting Membership entitles the Member to have sent to him all current Albacon publications. It also freezes his eventual cost of conversion to Full Attending Membership at the rate current when he Supported.

Full Attending Membership is required if you propose to actually come to Albacon II. You can pay the balance between Supporting and Full at any time, even at the door, and - of course - you can also take out Full Attending Membership at any time. Full Attending Members are sent all current publications prior to Albacon, and pick up a package at the door containing the Programme Books etc.

Children under five gain free access to Albacon II; over that age they must pay the full adult rate. Dealers must pay Memberships for their staff.

Balance to Full Attending from Supporting Membership is always £4.00. Day Memberships will only be available at Albacon itself. Postal applications for Membership will NOT be accepted after 20th March 1983; after that date all Memberships will be at the at-the-door rate of £5.00 per day or £10.00 per weekend.

Membership Records

Both Faircon 82 and Albacon II are making use of a computer to keep track of Memberships and addresses. In addition, the computer is being used to print out the mailing labels and envelopes used for distribution of the Progress Reports.

The computer - an Apple II - will be at the Convention, and you'll be able to personally confirm your details if you so desire. We realise that some individuals may wish to have their addresses etc kept private, and so if you specifically desire that the record we keep is deleted then we'll do so.

It is the normal practice to give the following Eastercon the full listing of names and addresses in order that they may send out their first Progress Report; if you delete your name then you won't be sent anything. Naturally, we expect very few deletions!

We won't provide copies of our listing to any commercial organisation or to any 'fringe' groups so if the AA, Reader's Digest, and the Church of Scientology start to bother you then don't blame us!

If your name is spelt wrongly, or your address is incorrect, then write to us and we'll change things. Surprising as it may seem, telepathy is not an attribute of our Membership Secretary, and, regretfully, nor is the ability to read terrible handwriting. Please therefore type or print any change of address details that you send him.

Several individuals on this first published listing of Albacon II Members may be the victims of duplication. Some Metrocon Pre-Supporters subsequently took out Albacon II Membership without telling us that they were also on the Metrocon list, and some went so far as to Pre-Support Albacon II as well! If you are numbered among such enthusiastic supporters of Eastercon then please tell us if you find multiple entries on our listing.

Wargaming

A room will be set aside for wargaming in, and D&D will be played by a crack team of handpicked adventurers. Novice games and a display (thanks to the Scottish Wargames Club) will be mounted. The Programme

Our Programme will take place in a number of different locations throughout the Central Hotel. We will have a Main Programme, Alternative Programme, Fan Programme, and Video Programme.

The Main Programme takes place in the 600-seat Banqueting Hall on the Hotel's first floor. It will feature major talks, panels, and films, as well as formal set pieces such as the Fancy Dress Show and so forth. We'll try to keep all the really popular items for the Main Programme, and in any case we will arrange our Programme so that there are always a number of alternatives open to you.

On the same floor will be found the Alternative Programme and Video Programme, as well as the Main Con Bar and Dealers Room. Both the Alternative Programme and the Video Programme rooms can seat 225 people in comfort. The Alternative Programme will feature minority interest talks, panels, and films, and will be the location of the Banquet. The Video Programme will provide more-or-less non stop video on large screen TVs.

The Fan Programme takes place one flight up from the other Programmes, and can cope with up to 100. A Bar will be set up beside the Fan Room. On the same level as the Fan Room are a number of smaller rooms where various smaller attractions will be located. Among these will be the Computer Room, Wargaming Room, and Art Show.

If the Central's somewhat old TV system permits, then we'll also show video and perhaps even the Programme through all the bedroom TVs. We'd like to offer a channel of continuous teletext details of the Programme etc, although this ambitious notion (called CORACLE by Martin Hoare - Convention ORACLE!) may be too much for the Hotel to cope with!

Computer Room

There will be a Computer Room at Albacon II. In common with various other Conventions, we've discovered that there is a considerable interest in such machines among SF enthusiasts. We'll have as wide a range of computers as possible, and as many good programs as we can get. If you want to loan us machines, programs, or your time, then get in touch with *Doug McCallume* (o Albacon as soon as possible. Albacon will carry insurance for computers loaned to us. Past experience shows that the Computer Room is very popular, and we'll do our best to regulate use of the most

sought-after machines and programs.

Dealers Room

Dealers are invited to attend Albacon II. The Dealers Room measures a very comfortable 50' x 28' (1400 ft²) and will provide ample space for the number of dealers expected to turn up. We carry basic insurance on the Dealers Room which will cover most normal goods; if you have particularly valuable goods then let us know and we'll arrange extra insurance cover. The Dealers Room is fully secure at night, and is located in a good position during the day: next to the Main Con Bar!

Tables cost £12.00 each or three for £27.00, and will require to be paid for at Albacon II or preferably - in advance. Receipts will be provided for all tables, Memberships etc as required. As is our usual policy, assistance in loading and unloading will be provided. Car parking for unloading only is possible for a very brief period outside the Hotel; let us know when you arrive and we'll get your goods indoors as soon as possible.

Travel

Assuming there remains a railway system by next Easter, we will arrange a cheap fares deal and distribute details in Progress Report 2. Typical reductions available are of the order of 30%, and it may be that special deals from your home areas will equal or better this offer. Main line trains from the south terminate at Central Station, while eastern trains come to the nearby Queen Street Station (site of one overflow Hotel, The North British Hotel). A regular and cheap bus link connects both railway stations.

Road travel to Glasgow is reasonably simple, with Motorway access right into the city centre. Parking is almost non-existent at the Central although it should be remembered that the holiday weekend will afford ample opportunity to park in nearby streets. NCP car parks abound, and parking (albeit expensive) is possible in Central Station. Most office blocks in nearby Waterloo Street also have car parks behind them.

Glasgow has an airport located outside the city which handles domestic and European flights; in addition, Prestwick Airport in Ayrshire is a major intercontinental airport. Buses and taxis offer quick access to Glasgow from either airport.

Transport within Glasgow is reasonably easy to obtain. Taxis abound, and even buses are sometimes seen. Visitors should make every effort to sample Glasgow's new Underground system, which goes round, and round, and round....

Two main Bus Stations are to be found within easy walking distance of the Central, and both of these are the destinations of both local and distant bus services. Bus travel from the south is generally cheaper than rail.

Car Sharing

If you want passengers or a place in a car then write in and, if demand justifies it, we'll either put people directly in touch with each other or publish a listing in a later PR. See the Membership form for more details.

Safety

Albacon II will adopt a strict policy towards safety. We are aware of the general difficulties associated with hundreds of slightly inebriated fans liberally mixed with darkness, trailing cables, and false fire alarms. Firm efforts will be made to make Albacon II a safe Convention, and we Il take pains to make clear to you fire exits etc. If you see anything dangerous (except for *Brian Burgessy* pork pies) then tell the Committee or the Hotel

staff as soon as you can.

We will be particularly careful with regard to weapons enthusiasts. The recent proliferation of individuals carrying swords and battleaxes and so forth is not looked on favourably by the Committee, and such persons will be required to accept our rules as to their behaviour or else depart. More details about this and other aspects of safety will be given in a later Progress Report.

Creche

If you are interested in bringing children to Albacon II then you may be interested in a creche. We need organisers and children, and we need firm ideas as to requirements as soon as possible. It has to be said that any previous attempts to organise a creche at Glasgow Conshave been total failures, as no-one has made any gesture of interest towards the idea. If you're interested, then get in touch. Again, see the Membership form for details. Naturally, should the response be as poor as usual then we'll allocate rooms and funds to other uses and so if you turn up at the door expecting a creche and haven't contacted us then you'll be disappointed....

The Business Meeting

As well as a Bidding Session for the 1984 Eastercon we will hold an Albacon II Business Meeting. We'd like to hear your comments and complaints, and any suggestions that you have about future Con organising. Business Meetings can be a great success - Faircon '8I saw our Main Programme packed with an attentive audience even on the Monday afternoon, and the Albacon II Committee picked up a number of interesting points at the Channelcon Business Meeting this year. If you have a particular point that you want to make, then come along.

Glasgow's sixth SF Convention will be held in the Central over the weekend of 23 rd to 26th July this year, and will be very much a 'trial run' for Albacon II. We hope to iron out as many difficulties as possible before our Eastercon, and at the same time run an enjoyable and worthwhile Con.


BRAN PUNT!
