

BECCON: 17TH to 20TH APRIL 1987 - THE EASTERCON

Hello, again!

The time since Albacon has passed in a flash, we're almost half way to the convention, and here we are with BECCON Progress Report Number 2. This is an important one: it announces our Fan Guests of Honour, contains the rest of Part 1 and all of Part 2 of the Quiz, and tells you some more about the various aspects of the convention. It also contains The Form, with which you book rooms, volunteer to gopher, tell us you're a vegetarian or an alien from Arcturus, and pay us membership money if you haven't already done so. Don't forget that the rates all rise by £1 on the 31st October 1986. THIS MEANS THE RATES ARE HIGHER AT NOVACON. YOU HAVE BEEN WARNED.

BECCON is pleased to announce that Malcolm Edwards and Chris Atkinson have accepted our invitation to be joint Fan Guests of Honour. Those of you who were at the Albacon bidding session will recall our promise to incorporate the Contraception programme into BECCON, so we made a good start by borrowing their Fan Guest of Honour - Chris Atkinson. She happens to be married to Malcolm Edwards, who is chairman of Conspiracy '87... You can find out the rest of the reasons why we asked them both from Chris Donaldson and Dave Langford elsewhere in this PR.

The Programme for the convention is beginning to take shape, with the overall framework decided and some individual events already in place. On Thursday evening the convention bar (in the Library suite) will be open for early birds, and one bar or another will be open twenty-four hours a day from then on, until the last drinker gives up on Tuesday morning. The Programme will start at 10.00 a.m. on Friday morning, and will run past midnight each day, and well into Monday evening. Most of the time there will be several things happening at once: two programme streams (in the Queen's and King's halls); films and certain film-related events in the Cinema; various events in the Fan Room (yes, Virginia, there will be things happening in the Fan Room!); workshops on several topics - for example, conrunning, fanzines and costuming; and of course the fireworks.

All of this is not going to be happening at random. There will be many 'one-off' items - the fancy dress, the eating event, the disco - but some events within and across the various programme streams will be linked by themes. For example, one theme will be based around the works of our Guest of Honour, Keith Roberts. The events within a theme will be various, sometimes treated seriously and sometimes not: they may include a talk, a panel discussion, a film, a workshop, and a round in a quiz!

However, the Programme is not going to appear out of nowhere for your entertainment - putting on a convention needs lots of work from lots of people, and we need help from everyone who's willing. Some people have already volunteered, or been co-opted (you will find some of their names in this PR), but if you would like to contribute we would be delighted. The enclosed all-singing, all-dancing Form can be used to offer your services or ideas, or you can write to the all-purpose BECCON address:

If you know Chris, there's no real need to read this - you already know that she's easy to talk to, great fun to be with and full of silly ideas for fun. But if you don't know her you may think at first that she looks a little daunting, particularly as she seems to know everyone and everything. But talk to her, and you'll be in for a surprise. Ask her what she finds most interesting. If you expect her to say, "science fiction", "fandom", or even "conventions" you may very well be disappointed. The answer changes with her mercurial interests, but what you'll get at the moment is very likely to be "flying", or perhaps "aeroplanes", or maybe even "Tango Tango" (the call sign, or 'name' of her favourite aeroplane).

If you ask her the same question when she's drunk, she may well give a slightly different answer, but don't be fooled. If she answers, "Sex and aeroplanes", she means exactly what she says. She's the only person I've ever met who fantasises about having sex with rather than  $\underline{\text{in}}$  an aeroplane. Mention Tango Tango to her then, and her eyes cloud with emotion. (I'll leave it to Chris to define what the emotion is!)

But what about science fiction, you may wonder? Well, what about it? She reads Ballard, and that's surely enough for fannish credibility. She's currently one of the Conspiracy Cabal, (having been one of the bidding team previously) and responsible for so many areas that even she finds it hard to remember what they all are. She's been attending conventions since the 60's, but tells me she was very young at the time! She's won two Novas for best fanwriter. She's to be found at every major British Con, selling books during the day and drinking in the bar in the evening, never in the programme room. A huge number of her friends are fans. Her fannish credentials are impeccable.

Perhaps the fact that she claims to be on the point of giving it all up (and has been saying so ever since I first met her, some five years ago) is also part of these credentials. Think of other real fans you know. How many of us are always on the point of giving it all up? And how many of us ever do?? Chris is part of the fannish tradition - we may hate it at times, but it's the best we've been able to find so far.

But to say that she's a typical fan would be to underestimate her considerably. How many of the rest of us can poke fun at ourselves the way Chris can? And, if it comes to it, how many of us dream of making love with an aeroplane?

#### EDWARDS PRO AND CON

Malcolm Edwards: man or myth? Friend or foe? Half-drunk or half-sober? Is there no end to his talents? (Answer withheld on legal advice.) Is he the ruthless SF/fannish empire-builder he sometimes pretends to be... or the builder of ruthless fannish/SF empires which other people call him? All will be revealed, though not here.

I was a mere tot reading Asimov when Malcolm emerged from the fiery melting-pot of the Cambridge University SF Society with an unusual social problem. Imagine coming into fandom only to learn you were a pseudonym of someone like Robert P. Holdstock. The once-famous Peter Weston had been in the habit of writing fanzine columns as "Malcolm Edwards", and...

Undeterred, our hero did various things which I mercifully forget. One was to publish <u>Quicksilver</u>, a serious SF fanzine which his mates still swear was way above average, even as they hide the remaining extant copies from my mocking gaze. With one mighty bound he became editor of the British SF Association's <u>Vector</u>, producing some of its all-time best issues (having as he did the totally unfair advantage of being able to write and review as well as any of the huge name contributors).

The BSFA ended this by inconsiderately though temporarily dying after Vector 67/68. By then Malcolm had bashed out a personal fanzine, Magic Pudding (late 1973, to remind you how cobweb-ridden all this now seems), wherein he confessed "I'm in the middle of an empire-building period right now," and gave a first tentative push to what became the juggernaut of Britain's third Worldcon: Seacon '79. Yes, he was on the committee of that one; and ditto the successful Eastercon, Seacon '75; and moles report that he has some involvement with our fourth Worldcon, Conspiracy '87. Then there was his stint as editor of the very serious Foundation (issues 14-19) and his part in the founding of frivolous, light-hearted Interzone... When does he find time to read SF?


Presumably he must, since with hideous professional efficiency he's done portions of the <u>SF Encyclopedia</u>, half the <u>SF Book of Lists</u> (great SF stories about planetary tilt), and several blockbuster nonfiction collaborations with Rob Holdstock (you know the sort of thing, <u>Twenty Really Triffic Bits Of SF Art Tenuously Linked By A Few Words</u>), meanwhile moving from the lofty rank of publisher's reader (the lucky guy who gets to read Piers Anthony novels that even Grafton won't print) to the ignominy of being SF director at Gollancz (the wicked beast who rejects all your favourite authors like L. Ron Hubbard).

Behind that owlish gaze, do professional and fannish impulses occasionally clash? Malcolm has always been quiet, and sometimes this internal crosstalk makes him even quieter. At other times (separated from "sometimes" by mere pints of lager) he loosens up to make deeply scabrous remarks: no sooner had I jotted down his tasteless one-liner about Heinlein than Malcolm nervously asked me to cross it out again, because "I've just remembered he's one of our authors."

These days he's too circumspect even to publish his erstwhile scandal-sheet Drunkard's Talk, featuring the "Complete Naff Guide to Fandom" and quoting embarassingly awful passages from rejected N\*rm\*n Sp\*nr\*d novels. Or maybe that bit was in the tastefully named Tappen, which printed ace stuff by live-in contributor Chris Atkinson and won awards. (Its fifth issue foundered in 1982 under the weight of "Performance", D. West's epoch-making 36-page exploration of the myriad interconnecting ramifications of D. West.)

Shy, retiring, modest, unaffected - maybe not, but I like Malcolm just the same. (He published a quarter of a book by me once: interest declared.) You'll find him in the bar... as the level of the Carlsberg Special goes down, so does the tone of his anecdotes, maliciously ripping the lid off the seething cans of radioactive wormoids otherwise known as SF publishing and SF fandom.

As a Fan GoH, his professional qualifications are impeccable. And when you want to make him writhe, ask him when he's going to do another fanzine.



CONSPIRACY 87 is the name of the 45th World Science Fiction Convention. It will take place in Brighton from August 27th to September 1st, 1987. Conspiracy '87 will be the biggest SF event ever held in Britain and will use all the facilities of the Brighton Centre and the Metropole Hotel & Exhibition Centre. During the convention there will be almost every kind of science fiction related event or activity imaginable. There will be films, talks by famous writers, scientists and personalities, theatrical events, art shows and, on the Sunday evening, the presentation of the Hugo Awards.

Conspiracy has guests coming from all over the world. From the USA we have Alfred Bester. From the USSR not one, but two Strugatskys: Boris and Arkady. British guests include writers Doris Lessing, Brian Aldiss, David Langford, film effects man Ray Harryhausen, artist Jim Burns, and fans Ken and Joyce Slater. And there will be writers, artists and fans from every continent (except possibly Antarctica, though we expect to have a few Penguins in the massive dealers' room where there will be an immense range of books, magazines and memorabilia).

Attending Conspiracy '87 means you may nominate and vote for the Hugo Awards of 1987. Membership costs only £25 (Children 7 or under in August 87 get in free with an adult member; children 8-14 may attend at half the adult rate.) # The Easter Egg Race

Chris has been involved in the organisation of several cons in the past, including Novacons of a far greater vintage than he cares to remember; he also served on the committee of BECCON '81. He has been involved in fandom for more years than I can state without serious risk to my health and knows several of the major dealers personally, as they know NIE BANK BATAME him. He is, in other words, very well placed to make the most of the excellent facilities offered by the Birmingham Metropole and to ensure that the dealers' room is both an attractive part of the convention for attendees and a pleasant place for the dealers to use. Ros, on the other hand, has no previous experience of anything like conrunning, being better known as a scribbler and apahack. She does, however, know what it is like to be an artist attempting to exhibit at a con and finding that display space and materials supplied for mounting artwork are unsuitable or inadequate and it is with this kind of thought in mind that she will organise the layout and equipment of the artroom.

The committee will pass the message on to us and you will then be contacted further about your requirements. We hope in this way to provide as individual a service as possible — and we will hope to be in touch with as many of you as possible over the next six months or so.
