It was one of the strangest bids presented in some time: 'One Convention, Two Sites' was the slogan, with either the Radisson Hotel near Heathrow or the Winter Gardens in Blackpool to choose from.

Now there are just a few weeks to go before we will be packing our bags—together with our buckets and spades—as we find ourselves returning to the seaside town that hosted Illumination over Easter 1992. But this time we will have the Winter Gardens Convention Centre as our venue, the first non-hotel venue to host the Eastercon for over twenty years.

The idea of holding the Eastercon in a convention centre will therefore be a new one for many attendees, and we recognise that there are bound to be some things that may not go exactly according to plan. To help combat this we will be holding daily feedback sessions (as Eastercons have being doing for some years) so that you can tell us any issues concerning you—although we would prefer you to report any problems to the Ops room straight away, to give us the best chance to put things right as soon as possible. To state the obvious, if we don't know about a problem we will be unable to address it.

The use of the Winter Gardens as our venue would not have been possible without the generous support of Blackpool Borough Council, and we wish to thank Margaret Roffey of Blackpool's Conference Bureau for all her help in providing for our return to Blackpool this year.

Finally, on a more personal note, Sharon Lewis and I would like to invite you all to attend a little party on the Saturday night of the convention where Rev Lionel Fanthorpe has kindly agreed to bless our marriage. Enjoy this PR; and we look forward to seeing you in April.*

spending Easter 2004 at the New Zealand national convention, ConTour, in Rotorua instead of in Blackpool. Nominations have also been invited for the next Trans-Atlantic Fan Fund (TAFF) trip, to send a fan from Europe to North America in the summer, including a visit to the Worldcon (Noreascon Four) in Boston. Voting should continue up to Easter; more information can be obtained from European TAFF Administrator Tobes Valois at 20 Bakers Lane, Peterborough PE2 9QW.

Thanks once again to all contributors to these progress reports. We hope you've enjoyed reading the articles as well as finding them useful as sources of information about Concourse.*

How To Get To Blackpool

Blackpool is in the North West of England and has good road connections to the rest of the country, with a range of travel options including car, train or coach. There are rail connections via Preston from many other parts of Britain, including London. There is also a direct rail link to Manchester airport; and Blackpool has its own airport with direct flights by RyanAir from Stansted and Dublin.

Road travel

Car

Blackpool is easily accessible from all parts of Great Britain, with the M55 linking the town with the M6 and the country's motorway network. Blackpool enjoys the distinction of having a motorway link direct to the heart of the resort culminating in one of the largest car parks in Britain!

Bus

There are regular services to all parts of Blackpool and the surrounding area. Bus information is available from Blackpool Transport Services Ltd (Rigby Road, Blackpool); you can phone 01253 473000 or visit the website: www.blackpooltransport.com

Coach

Travel is available from National Express Coach Services, who operate to and from Blackpool throughout the year. Further details are available from any National Express Agent or you can telephone the Enquiry Centre on 08705 808080 or check the website: www.nationalexpress.com

Rail travel

Blackpool is connected through the railway network to most destinations. Virgin Rail (www.virgintrains.co.uk) operates a daily direct service from London to Blackpool. Other inter-city trains to Preston connect with the local shuttle service, giving a speedy service to Blackpool.

The best value rail tickets are available if you are able to book in advance (in general, the further in advance you can book, the better the value and the choice available); indeed, tickets bought on the day of travel are often considerably more expensive and if you intend to travel for any distance by train and can commit to specific times we would strongly recommend booking in advance. The number of cheaper fares is often limited in availability, and bank holidays such as Easter are obviously popular times to travel—more reasons to book early if you can.

Service from London (via Preston) Frequency: 10–12 trains per day. Journey time: 3½ –4 hours.

Service from Preston

Frequency: About every 30 minutes.

Journey time: 30 minutes.

Service from Manchester (including Manchester Airport)

Frequency: About 35 trains per day. Journey time: 1 hour 15 minutes.

Situated only 2½ miles from the town centre, Blackpool Airport now has a new terminal building capable of handling 350,000 passengers per year. Scheduled services include daily operation to the Isle of Man, Dublin and Belfast with charter services to Jersey, Tenerife, Majorca and Alicante. Other awards featured at Concourse

The BSFA awards will be presented at Concourse on Sunday 11 April. The awards ceremony will also include the presentation of the James White Award—which will be given to the short story which the JWA panel of judges consider to be the best original story submitted—and the Doc Weir Award.

The Doc Weir is traditionally given to 'unsung heroes' of fandom: the sort of people who do lots of work behind the scenes but who may not be recognised by winning other awards or fan fund races or being invited to be guests of honour at conventions and so on. All members of the Eastercon have the opportunity to vote for the Doc Weir Award, and any sort of fannish activity can be recognised, whether it's in connection with conventions, clubs, fanzines, web sites or other fannish resources, or any other ways you think someone has put in some worthwhile effort on behalf of SF fandom.*



Arthur C Clarke Award

The Arthur C Clarke Award—which will be given to the novel which the ACCA panel of judges consider to be the best science fiction novel first published in the UK in 2003—will *not* be presented at the Eastercon; the award ceremony will be held later in the year. But Concourse will feature the traditional panel 'Not the Clarke Award' in which a group of former judges will argue the merits of this year's short list and try to predict the eventual verdict. 
