Introduction

Hotels

Masquerade

Due to a lack of entries there will not be a masquerade at this year's Eastercon

If you intended to enter the masquerade but have failed to tell us contact the Information Desk on Friday. If there are sufficient entries by the end of Friday, we may arrange a masquerade.

Chaos Costuming will be open as usual and there will be a hall costume competition and a children's masquerade.

Those with hall costumes may use the changing rooms in the Arena suite.

Voodoo Board

The 'voodoo board' is a place where messages can be left for other convention members. It is located in the Spanish Hall Suite, along with instructions about how to use it. You can also use the board to leave general notices about ride sharing, meeting up for meals etc.

Badges

Please wear your badge at all times. It is your proof that you're a member of Concourse; without it, you're liable to be refused admission to the designated convention areas of the Winter Gardens.

There will be a £5 charge for replacement badges. The convention reserves the right to refuse to replace lost badges.

Paragon 2 will be hosting a feedback session on Monday but this is really an opportunity to make suggestions to the people running future Eastercons about matters of policy or problems which might also affect them.

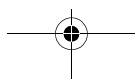
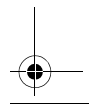
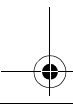
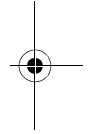
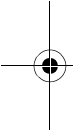
Could volunteer first aiders please contact the Information Desk as soon as possible and collect a first aid badge.

Awards

All members of Concourse are eligible to vote for the Doc Weir and BSFA Awards.

The Doc Weir Award was set up in 1963 in memory of fan Arthur Rose (Doc) Weir who had died two years previously. Weir was a relative newcomer to fandom, he discovered it late in life - but in the short time of his involvement he was active in a number of fannish areas. In recognition of this, the Award is sometimes seen as the "Good Guy" Award; something for "The Unsung Heroes".

Fandom needs volunteers. Conventions, clubs, fanzines—they all require an extensive workforce, people who do 'stuff' for no financial reward. Some people have a high-profile role but there are many who don't, whose involvement goes almost unnoticed and may even be taken for granted.

In some respects, the ideal Doc Weir Award candidate is the sort of person who doesn't immediately spring to mind but makes perfect sense if somebody else suggests them.

A Doc Weir ballot form should be in your registration package; if you can't find it, a further copy is available from registration. Completed ballots should be placed in the box provided at the Information Desk by 12 noon on Sunday.

BSFA Award ballots are available from the Cold Tonnage tables in the dealers' room and from the Information Desk. Completed ballots may be placed in the boxes provided at the Cold Tonnage tables (during dealers' room opening hours) or at the Information Desk, by the same time.

Posters and signs

Please bring any posters and signs you wish to have displayed to the Information Desk.

Video recording

Videoring programme items is not generally permitted; if for any reason you wish to do so, please obtain the explicit permission of the moderator of the item.

Weapons policy

No weapons or facsimiles thereof will be allowed to be carried at the convention. This includes edged weapons, projectile firing weapons, any replica or facsimile weapon, or any other object the committee deems to be dangerous. If an object looks dangerous enough to cause concern to other convention members, please keep it in your hotel room.

Smoking

There is no smoking in programme rooms, Dealers Room, Art Show or the Spanish Hall and the relevant sections of the Backstage Bistro and Coffee Shop.

You may smoke in the Floral hall, Bars and in relevant sections of the Coffee Shop and Backstage Bistro.

In addition, smoking will be permitted in the Arena during the Ceilidh on Friday night and the disco on Saturday night.

Winter Gardens food and drink

The Windsor Bar will be open between 10 am and 2 am. Food is available in the Spanish Hall Suite from 12 noon until 1 am. These are restricted to convention members.

The Coffee Shop, Backstage Bistro and Public Bar will also be open but are open to the public. The Ship Bar may be used as an overflow bar for the Opera House.

Childcare

Safehands Network Ltd will be operating the crèche which is located in the Opera House function room.

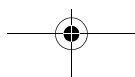
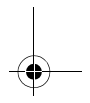
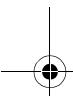
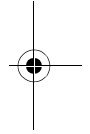
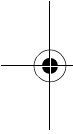
The operational hours are 10 am–4 pm on Friday, Saturday, Sunday and Monday.

There is a charge of £10 per day to assist in the running costs and children of all ages are welcome.

We have arranged enough staff based on the crèche booking forms received. If you did not send in a form, then it will be at the discretion of Safehands to decide whether they have room for additional children in any particular session.

The facilities available are: arts and crafts equipment, books, toys, televisions and videos, Sony Playstations, video games, dance mats, together with a soft play area which includes a ball pool.

In addition to the crèche, Safehands Network will be supplying the convention with childcare in hotels. A 4-hour minimum applies and the service costs £9 per hour (plus VAT). You can book this via your hotel, or direct with Safehands on 0870 844 6688.
