Restaurant Reviews

Dragon

311 - 313 Hope St (tel 0141 332 7728) Four of us ate there on Thursday evening and it was wonderful. Best described as Chinese-Malaysian-Thai fusion. Excellent prices: about £106 before tip for four of us, including a bottle of the very presentable Australian dry white wine and portions were generous.

My starter was fresh mango and mozzarella wrapped in sliced chicken breast with mango sauce for £4.90. as a main course. I had the beautifully presented crispy duck platter for a main course, £13.90. It had almost, but not quite, more crispy duck than I could eat and, yes, there were enough pancakes.) Copies of the menu are lying around on the tables outside the real ale bar; please peruse and leave for others to look at. They are open every day over Easter (including Good Friday) and I'd recommend booking because they are opposite a theatre so will probably fill up with the pre- and post- performance crowds.

Café Andaluz

2 Cresswell Lane (tel.0141 339 1111) Tapas bar, ideal for large parties, Order ahead and ask for the set menu. They'll ask you how many vegetarians in the part and adapt accordingly. Not suitable for vegans.

Cafe Mao

84 Brunswick Street (tel. 0141 564 5161) Asian fusion food, Excellent food, ok for vegetarians. Accoustics a problem. They have an upstairs section so could probably handle a large group.

kokuryo

1138 Argyle St (tel. 0141 334 5566) info@kokuryo.co.uk

Amazing Korean food. Not expensive but don't let the waiter bully you into ordering more food than you want (in the nicest possible way). This restaurant is tiny, with seating for maybe 20. Book ahead and keep parties to four. (to get there, walk over the covered foot bridge and turn left into Argyle St).

Chukoku

292 Sauchiehall St (tel. 0141 332 8120) Oriental "All you can eat" (actually, much better it says "all you care to eat"!) buffet, including Chinese, sushi, teppanyaki, fruit, ice cream, jelly, cheese cake etc. for under £10 per person.

India Quay (tel:01412211616)
India Quay is near by and good quality curry. (just past the Rotunda and City Inn). Main meal with rice 9 to 12 pounds, with Nan breads big enough to defeat most fans. No starters or poppadums needed unless you are REALLY hungry. Opens 17:00 Saturday and Sunday.

Greens Health and Fitness (on the road that leads up to the City Inn as you come to the SECC)
If you are in search of a cheap breakfast on the way into the convention, Greens Health and Fitness serve everything from full cooked to beans on toast, for around £3.

For gym bunnies who find the Crowne Plaza gym inadequate, Greens seem willing to negotiate access. If you are staying in the City Inn, they have an arrangement with Greens already.

There are many restaurants that offer "Eat as much as you like" menus. One, in Glasgow's Charing Cross district offers this service at the highest quality level in the Indian style. Go to the Kohi-noor Restaurant at 235 North Street to have a full filling evening.

KoolBa, Merchant Square, Candleriggs. Glasgow G1 1RB, 0141 552 2777 A fine Persian restaurant in a strange location, Merchant Square. It's like a sort of indoor piazza with restaurants around the edges and a dealers' room in the middle! Dealers selling handmade jewellery, art work etc. from trestle tables throughout the evening. Six of us ate there, including starters and main courses, plus a few beers, some soft drinks and a bottle of rioja for £150. The menu swings between fine Greek/Turkish style meze and kebab to excellent Indian food, and the naan bread is stunning (so very light and cooked on the inside of a traditional big clay oven. And the peshwari naan is incredibly thin and has a delicate taste of aniseed.

Roger also mentioned that it was a nice coincidence that the book was originally conceived during a conversation between Gary and John Clute and was launched at a BSFA meeting.

Richard Evans award

Richard Evans was a much loved and respected editorial director at Gollancz who died, tragically young, ten years ago. In his memory, his friends and colleagues established an award to be given each year to a "highly worthy but insufficiently recognized author". This year the Richard Evans award is presented to Pat Cadigan. She was unable to attend but will be receiving the award, which is presented in a form dear to the heart of all authors, a cheque for £1,500.

Doc Weir Award

The Doc Weir Award is given to those "unsung" heroes of fandom who make a difference. The award started in 1963, and has been presented nearly every year since. This is the 40th award and it goes to **Steve Lawson**.



In the absence of the 2005 Doc Weir winner, Dave Lally (at the Eurocon), the award was presented by Mark Plummer



(who won it in 1996). Around 15 previous winners of the Doc Weir award are attending Concussion (though only about four were in the room, as the rest were either busy working on the convention, out for a meal or in the bar!).





Now, in some senses, this is his third Adventure, after the 'teaser' mini-episode and

Space, but they (For all their
quality and Canonical

'fingerfood' to whet our
appetites for this second
season, in much the same
way some Very Old people
remember the Second Dr's
adventures after he'd been
tried by the Time Lords, and
before he was abducted by
Scarecrows (TV Comic)
So: The Dr changes and, as




Dr: Recursion. . Dying companion and Dr: New Dr: Godawful Slugbirth.
Whogivesashit: New Dr: Whogivesashit and so on... This one did it better.
For the first time in Dr Who TNG, we actually see another planet (Though it might just as well be just 'The Future') and the 'Hospital' theme gives a fine excuse for 'Dr' jokes and thrilling Cat Nurse-Nuns. The return of an Old Enemy (Continuity y'see, and plausible too!) and the morbid bodyhorror of clinging to the Old Flesh is saved by the New Flesh of the Dr.

Unquestionably, Mr Tennant is as instantly likeable as any of the Dr's and wears his all-too-contemporary clothes with dash. The No Sex Please We're Gallifreyans rules are now stretched to a point where they may be safely termed 'Outdated canon'.

He spent the previous season effectively nicking someone else's bird because of his flash transport and snogging her on the dodgy premise that it 'transfers energy from the Tardis' (A thing he never seemed necessary with, say, his Other Selves). This season, he's acceptably dishy, whilst he and Rose spend every third sentence telling each other how much they love... something, whilst looking lovingly at each other. In any reasonable sense, they've Scored and their relationship is now more like that of Steed and Emma or Mulder and Scully who 'fancy each other like mad and *might* be shagging each other rotten but we've never

seen them do it'. Unlike Steed and Emma, our
Transtemporal lovers have
RT Davies Plot devices that allow them to snog 'without it meaning anything' (Again) and a commentary of just how much they fancy each other, along with a solid gold plot opportunity for our Dr to camp it up in a way Pertwee was never offered.
A ripping good story with weird creatures aplenty, hugely sympathetic zombies,



wizzo tek, witty lines (Personal fave: 'God, I'm a Chav') and a cool 'ooooo!' inversion of the 'Ark In Space' Bio-Cryogenic Units. All this with truly 'Doctorish' values of the Sanctity of Life, a Magic Plothole and a truly original and emotionally affecting time travel twist at the end (Though requiring Damascenely improbable character development) wherein Change is Accepted. Little wonder that the following 'Trip of a Lifetime' game show on BBC1 began with the sort of 'Tardis' joke so loved by Family Entertainment programs of the 1970's... Change, but strangely familiar. 
Young Opinions





Is There a Past for Science Fiction?

The panel on Scholarship of the Fan community concluded that fandom, as an oral community, would loose all it had just talked of. Here, then is a record of what otherwise would be lost, by a partial and prejudiced archaeologist.

A wide-ranging panel discussion began by discussing the terms 'professional' and 'academic', and later introduced the term 'independent scholar'. We quickly diverted to talk of the insanity of bibliographic referencing by edition date without mentioning the date of original publication. We discussed the different interests and expertises of those who write about science fiction for love, and those who are paid for writing about science fiction, alongside an overwhelming workload which is devoted to other things. And the joys and productivity of collaborative working - most evident in fan-to-scholar personages (e.g. Tom Shippey) and certain conferences (e.g. the Liverpool Conferences).

We concluded with talk of the history of fandom. The value of fanzines and oral testimony were discussed, and skirted briefly around the issue of whether the history of fandom was of interest to scholars outside of fandom.

I left before suggesting that we write a bid to the Heritage Lottery Fund. But if bought enough White Russians, I'll agree to do anything.

To Gripe Or Not To Gripe

Feedback on Concussion was generally positive. Actually that's not true. The feedback was mainly negative but about relatively small irritations such as signage and programme changes. This counts as positive at 10:00 on a Monday.

As usual, part of the reason given for a lack of nice-to-haves such as better signs was a lack of volunteers — in the month or so before the convention as well as on the day. Last year's UK Worldcon (unlike '95 and '87) does not seem to have generated a great deal of interest in volunteering - perhaps because it ran quite smoothly itself.

One big issue for Concussion has been childcare facilities. Scottish law is much stricter than English law about using qualified childcare and the number of parents who have arrived and asked for childcare was about three times the number who indicated they would even be attending. In other words, the childcare facility was overwhelmed by the number of toddle-in memberships sold.

There was virtually no discussion of the programme, which probably counts as positive feedback too. The only comment was that it was good to have programme starting early and finishing late. Thanks to the late breakfasts available at the weekend it was actually possible for people staying in the main hotel to get to a programme item before breakfast – or two on Saturday if they were really dedicated.
