BSFA Awards

As a member of Contemplation you are entitled to vote in the Novel, Short Fiction and Artwork categories of the British Science Fiction Association (BSFA) Awards. Voting will close at 6pm Saturday afternoon in time for the awards which will be presented in a ceremony at 21:00 on Saturday evening. Please leave your completed ballot forms in the box on Registration.

Doc Weir

You'll find a Doc Weir voting form in your membership pack, with the list of previous winners. This is your chance to say "thank you" to someone who works behind the scenes but whose contribution makes a difference to Fandom. The voting form also has a paragraph on who Doc Weir was, an essential part of your fannish history so even if you don't vote, take the time to read the first paragraph.

Fandom needs volunteers. Conventions, clubs, fanzines - they all require an extensive workforce, people who do "stuff" for no financial reward. Some people have a high-profile role but there are many who don't, whose involvement goes almost unnoticed and may even be taken for granted. In some respects, the ideal Doc Weir Award candidate is the sort of person who doesn't immediately spring to mind but makes perfect sense if somebody else suggests them.

The little book of contemplation: Waggle your ears. It's impossible to be unhappy whilst wagging your ears. If you can't do it, get someone else to do it for you!

LFF/JETS

The LFF is the League of Fan Funds, a group of people who co-ordinate fund raising to, in particular, financially assist fans to travel long distances and maintain personal contact with far-flung members of our fannish family. There are fan funds for sending people across the Atlantic (TAFF US/Canada->UK/Europe), down to or up from Australia (GUFF UK/Europe <-> Australia) plus other fan funds not co-ordinated by the LFF such as from the US/Canada to Australia (DUFF), and for sending Filkers to other countries/conventions (not a joke!) such as The Flying Filk Fund and Interfilk. This year there's a special fan fund (JETS) administered by the LFF to send a European fan to the Japanese Worldcon in Yokohama. Several of the candidates are at this convention and voting closes next week, so it's your last chance to help. The LFF will have an auction for the general fan funds on Sunday at 10pm but the best way to help the JETS candidates is to vote (a vote costs a minimum of £3 but you can donate more. If you vote more than once, only your last vote counts but all the money is put into the fund). Whoever wins gets the voting money (every penny of it, except for PayPal fees if you paid via PayPal) plus at least £1,000 from Interaction to help towards the cost of the Worldcon trip. Each nominee has posted a £20 bond and confirmed that if they win, they will go to Japan (emergencies excepted) and write a trip report about what they did and who they met etc. Just about all of them have said they'll do a live blog of their trip as well, isn't technology wonderful!

Completed forms can be handed to the LFF (who have a table somewhere around the con, probably in the Dealers Room; or after the LFF auction), handed to any candidate or posted to the address on the voting form.

There will be prizes, including vouchers from The Hat Company shop in Chester who are kindly sponsoring this event.

Hall Costume Day

Sunday is Hall Costume Day. You should have found three voting tokens in your membership pack. On Sunday, you can give one or more of your tokens to people whose costume you deem worthy of recognition, and there will be prizes for maximum numbers of tokens collected. So if you really like a costume, you can give all three tokens to that person, or you can divide them up between two or three people as you prefer. No need to register your costume or show up at a particular time, just wear it around the convention. Please observe the Weapons Policy, though. If you receive one or more Hall Costume tokens, write your name and membership number on them (so we know who to give the prize to!) and hand them in to Ops by noon Monday so we have time to count them before the closing ceremony.

The little book of contemplation: Make a date to argue. If you have a disagreement with someone, don't have it out there and then. Arrange to meet later to discuss it when you're both in a calmer frame of mind. Get there early and be waiting for them with a baseball bat.

X-Factor

Bring along the worst profession writing you can find (usually reserved for "turkey readings") and our panel of judges will listen to your rendition of it (from "render" meaning either to cover in plaster or to tear into pieces) and vote which ones should go through.

It's probably not too late to nip into town to one of the stationery or fabric shops and put together an entry for either the general or "adult-themes" Paper Doll Masquerade. There may be prizes! Don't forget you can dress up several dolls if you want to do, say, the entire Pirates of the Caribbean cast, or a paper version of Avenue Q!

The little book of contemplation: Who you really are is inside you, however who other people think you are is on the outside, so wear your badge or go outside

Monster Easter Egg Hunt Competition

Peter Harrow has produced a series of twelve monstrous eggs in celebration of EasterCon which are on display in the Artshow. Three have been donated to Contemplation for you lucky people to win, in an egg related competition.

Rules

Each of the twelve multiple choice questions will be on display in a public part of the Hotel, you have to find them and answer the questions on the form supplied and return the completed answer sheet to Registration before 12.00 pm on Sunday. Winners will be drawn from the correct (or most nearly correct) entries submitted by 6.00 pm on the Sunday.

The first place winner will have first pick of the twelve monstrous eggs to take home with them. The second place winner will have second pick of one of the remaining eleven, and the third place winner will have third pick of one of the remaining ten.

Weapons Policy

No food will be allowed in any of the function rooms. Drinks are allowed in all function rooms except the dealers room and art show. Only dealers are allowed to have food and drink in the dealers room.

Video Policy

You may video what you like, unless a programme participant objects. Please use your common sense, be considerate, and do not post your videos on the Internet for all the world to see unless you have permission from everybody in them. Press may only film individuals who grant their permission in advance, and they will have been required to obtain Press badges etc. from Registration. There will be some programme items where flash photography would be a

real pain for everybody else, like a play or a big-screen presentation. Again, please use your common sense.

The little book of contemplation: Property is theft, property is freedom, for lost property go to ops.

The little book of contemplation: Steal someone's pen. Rather than harbouring grudges or engaging in stressful confrontations, get back at annoying bosses or workmates by stealing something belonging to them or hiding rotting food in their desk.

Hotel No-Nos

Please don't let people crash in your room, or bring food or drink from outside into the hotel. If the hotel finds out you are doing these things, the committee will not support you.

If the hotel asks you to do something that seems silly, like putting shoes on, please don't argue with the staff. Tell us instead so we can establish if it's hotel policy and, if so, publish it in the newsletter. After a certain time in the evening, the hotel will close their cash tills and only guests will be allowed to purchase food and drink (but we're sure you'll find someone who is a guest who will go to the bar for you!)

The little book of contemplation: Eliminate the negative. As much as possible try and use positive words, such as 'Yes', 'Oui', 'Javoll', etc. Avoid negative words like 'No', 'Non', 'Nein', etc. If you absolutely have to use negative words, be vibrant and upbeat about them. Inveigle

David B Wake is a serious playwright. When designing the posters for his play 'Inveigle' to be performed at this year's Eastercon, instead of putting 'A Play By David Wake', Dave has been tempted to put on it 'A Serious Play By David Wake'. But there is one big problem – he suspects that no-one would believe him – rather like Bob Shaw promising a 'serious' scientific talk. That's why I'm writing this rather than him. On seeing in the programme a dramatic piece by Dave, no doubt people will be expecting can-can dancing monoliths, interactive video inserts, dangerous alien stilts, bad puns, more homage than Simon Pegg and a guest appearance by Captain Tartan.

Dave has been threatening to do a serious dramatic work for a convention since the euphoria and near nervous collapse that followed the performance of 'Captain Tartan Saves The World ...Again' back in 1999. The original thought was to perhaps do an adaptation of a short story or something starting from a point in literary SF (I recall the original idea was to perhaps dramatise one or more of Bob Shaw's slow glass stories).

Since then though, he and his 'Reconvene Rubber Tree Company' (Rubber Tree / Repertory geddit! - seriously, some regular cast members didn't get this until years later) have produced and performed 20:01 (a complete retelling of both 2001 and 2010 complete with aforementioned dancing monoliths), Tartan:Restrung (a comedic homage to the Matrix films/Blade Runner/Total Recall and Philip K Dick in general), as well as an audience participation Richard III (in honour of convention guest Jasper Fford). So no wonder there is a certain, shall we say, audience expectation.

Well I'm afraid that 'Inveigle' is a little different, and Dave has finally delivered on his promise of going serious. Nor is it an adaptation, it is a completely original piece. There is adult content – so parental guidance is strongly advised. There are no elaborate props, silly costumes, bad puns or homage to media SF. Dave Wake is a serious playwright. In the past, at least for convention audiences, this has meant seriously funny. Now it's time to explore what other emotions and reactions can be drawn from an audience – prepare to be Inveigled.

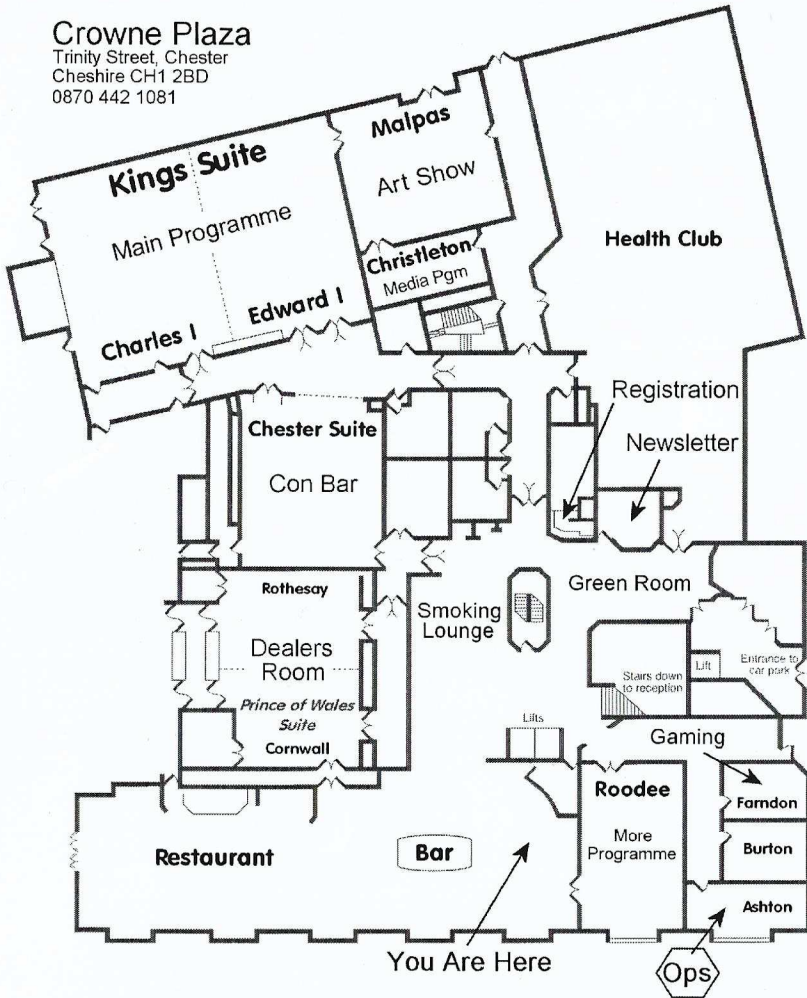
