

From the individuals who took part in the initial hotel search to the mighty efforts of one woman in contacting every hotel in the UK that had a function room and some bedrooms, heroes all. The team of techies who each dug into their spare rooms and garages and found (or personally bought) far more tech than we'd ever be able to use: the newsletter team, the green room team, ops, publications, membership, finance, artshow, media programme, the play, the guided tours, the programme team, the website, the dealers room and every other part of the con ... together we produced a fantastic convention, thanks to the generosity of spirit and willingness to step in when needed of all of you lot.

These were voted on by members of the BSFA and Contemplation, and presented on Saturday night.



Doc Weir

This award is given by popular acclamation at Eastercons. It was set up in 1963 in memory of fan Doc Weir. Weir was a relative newcomer to fandom, he discovered it late in life - but in the short time of his involvement he was active in a number of fannish areas, including being secretary of the recently formed BSFA, and working on conventions. In recognition of this, the Award is sometimes seen as the "Good Guy" Award; something for "The Unsung Heroes"

Fandom needs volunteers. Conventions, clubs, fanzines - they all require an extensive workforce, people who do "stuff" for no financial reward. Some people have a highprofile role but there are many who don't, whose involvement goes almost unnoticed and may even be taken for granted. In some respects, the ideal Doc Weir Award candidate is the sort of person who doesn't immediately spring to mind but makes perfect sense if somebody else suggests them.



This year's winner is Sue Edwards, who was presented with the trophy by last year's winner, Steve Lawson.

Ideas are thoughts are words are little voices in your head. They wait until the time is right. They demand to be realised. They have a life of their own.


There are two types of voices: those in your head and those of other people.

"You were trying to force someone to think

back burner, and I switched to comedy with the Tartan Trilogy. Puppets walked, computers took over and, without a hint of realised irony, spaceships crashed. And, despite the intervals lasted two and three years, people came back from the bar for more.

Meanwhile, Colin Fine dragged me screaming into the mainstream (or at least to the Edinburgh Fringe): "I'll do your lights, if you come to the fringe," he promised and I've been back every year, alien war wounds permitting.

So, in the Real World, I've been writing and entering one-act plays in festivals with some success. (My first



play won the Rose Bowl. I was sitting in the curry house afterwards, drinking ale out of this enormous piece of silverware, when I thought, "I like this.") We took two of these 'other plays' to the Edinburgh Fringe and we did, well, OK, three stars. We beat the fringe average audience despite a difficult pitch: picture the scene, it's a nice day, the sun is shining and it's lunchtime - you don't want to go to the pub for a tasty meal and a relaxing pint, you want to come and see a play about paedophilia.

But what would be a good idea? Idea, yes, of course.

spoilt by fandom. I am well by the Reconvene particularly Rubber Tree Company. (we rebranded to avoid people thinking "Inveigle" was another comedy, but it's the same crowd.) They are far better and more professional that some professional companies and they go that extra mile. Having done full length plays with casts and crew of over fifty with only six rehearsals gives you a confidence to do anything in theatre, and a terrible frustration when people can't achieve the impossible. I do get a "can't be done" in professional theatre. Er... in Edinburgh we do nine shows a shift, re-jugging the lights, and in SF fandom I've done full length shows (without interval - grrr) with only six rehearsals for a cast and crew of fifty. No, not 15, fifty, 50, five-zero.

Most professionals are fine, of course. Kaz and Phil, for example, helped us during our rehearsals, so, to return the favour, they're touring "Meeting Disorder" in September and October 2007. It's a comedy written by some bloke, anyway more info on his website: www.davidwake.com.

So my hat off to those who did the

play: "Inveigle" is definitely a difficult play. When writing it, I didn't compromise for actors or audience. You all rose to the challenge admirably – thank you.

Contemplation had a wonderful zeitgeist. The George Hay Lecture, delivered by Dr. Guillaume, "The Braintrix", talked about thought processes, and later the same evening, "Doctor Who" was all about Shakespeare, plays and the power of words. I was worried our thunder would be stolen, but everything added to the convention's synergy.

Plays are judged critically, artistically, and by the number of bums on seats. We had a good audience, so much so that a chair reserved for the chorus was 'borrowed'. Artistically, well, I loved it and I'm the director, so there. And, I've never seen such a positive response from an audience. I was collared numerous times by people needing to tell me what the play was about.

In a panel the next day, I was compared to Shakespeare (I shall ignore the "in jest" part.) by Peter and Gwen, who were originally responsible for green lighting the Tartan play. I only wish that, when "Author, author" was shouted, I had



Four Days in the Life of a Gopher Mother



I blame it on my really *not* being a morning person. How else to explain letting my guard slip so much as to wander in to Ops at about nine on the Friday morning and say, "So who's running gophering, then?" Oops. It was the ungodly hour (before noon!) and the lack of caffeine, honest guv, otherwise I really would have known better. Anyway, that is how I came to be, before I really knew it and without having even considered the possibility of the job title, Gopher Mum. (I baulked at Gopher Mom. Rightpondian, after all...) First thing to do was find out who needed gophers, and for what; the second thing to do was find some gophers. That might sound like cart before the horse, but I knew that finding these shy, retiring creatures and encouraging them to volunteer would be an ongoing activity. I wandered around the con space, talking to people running specific things (Art Show, Dealers' Room) about their requirements. The good thing about the convention space for Contemplation was that it was quite compact, so a lot of the gophering requirements would be quite light. The main exception to that would be the Art Show auction.

Finding gophers was the next stalwarts who challenge. Some always volunteer for a little light gophering were easy to find, but we would need more. A little gentle encouragement of likely-looking prospects among the fen I knew (or was prepared to claim I knew) was in order. Some certainly seemed to find a large, hairy Gopher Mum (Glasgow Voice: "Hello, I'm Gopher Mum...") looming over them in the bar something of an incentive to volunteer their services for the good of the con. Admittedly, in one or two cases (well, mainly Smurf), it took two or three days before the repeated looming took full effect, but on the whole we covered the spots which needed covering.

So what does a gopher do?

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Well, as the name suggests, a gopher may have to go for stuff, lugging things around, but probably the biggest part of gophering for most of the con is, effectively, stewarding. Ideally, each entrance to the Dealers' Room, for example, would have a gopher on it at all times to ensure that everyone who enters is a member of the convention. This involves sitting in a chair and looking at badges, so you don't have to be young and bursting with energy to be a gopher.

One of the odd things about the hotel is that it has two ground floors (and, by the way, Reception is on neither), with two entrances. I had not realised when I strolled around the con space that the door next to the Art Show room was actually one of the main entrances to the hotel (I had thought it an emergency exit). The problem this produced was that next to the Art Show was the Christleton room, where the video programme was running. With AV equipment in there and members of the general public going in and out to the health suite, that would need stewarding whenever the room was in use, unless there was one of the people running the video stream there. The video stream ran from first thing in the morning until late at night...

Having got things sorted on Friday so that I knew what I had covered and what I needed to cover, I found myself after dinner with a bit of a gap before one of my non-Gopher Mum commitments came up, a panel of relentless speculation on Life On Mars. Someone had fingered me as a likely participant in that, possibly because I kept talking about what a great programme it was. I wandered through the con bar, wondering if I should indulge in a pint before the panel. At that point, the delightful barmaid looked up at me and asked if I drank draught Bass. I wondered if this were a trick question, but, no: because of the great distance between the bar and the cellar, they had a lot of difficulty getting new barrels on line, and she had two pints there going free. Would I like them...? I went to my panel with the warm glow which only comes from free beer being safely installed in the belly.

By mid-Saturday, the con was in full swing and things were ticking over nicely from my perspective. Some people were tickled pink at my being Gopher Mum (I began to be greeted by one of my brood with the song, "When you're good to Momma...", and the call of, "Oh, *mother*....?" was not infrequent); others found a strange dichotomy between the title and my undeniably large, hairy, masculine reality.

It was worth being Gopher Mum just to see John Harold shudder when he sought me out to talk about the requirements for the Art Auction. ("Oh, this is very disturbing!" he said. My work here is done...) There are many good reasons why a con member should give gophering a try. It's obviously a good thing for fans to help run a fan-run con (and helping run it is exactly what gophers are doing), but as well as that it is a great way to meet other fans and make new friends. As well as that, you get groats. Groats are not *payment* for being a gopher, they are given to volunteers as a thank you for contributing to the running of the con. There is no denying that it is pleasant to drink a pint paid for by groats at the end of a long, tiring day of good, hard fun. One of my gophers at Contemplation caught up with me in the Dealers' Room after she had finished her stint for the day, and I tried to remember in which of my many pockets I had secreted the groats. "Come on, then," she said, "show us what you've got in your groatum!" The term stuck; for the rest of the con. groatum it was.

There is also the sport to be had when a gopher on door duty refuses admittance to a really quite wellknown fan (not to the gopher, though) because said fan has forgotten to wear their con badge. "But I'm [NAME DELETED TO PROTECT THE GUILTY]!" expostulated the BNF in question. "Sorry, I never heard of you," said my good and diligent gopher. Slipped her an extra groat for that, purely on the grounds of entertainment value.

Saturday evening, having made sure the necessary coverage was provided (i.e. someone on Christleton while the video programme was running), Gopher Mum headed out into the wilds of Chester with some friends to find food. (We forage, you know...) That was when we encountered clear evidence that the general public has penetrated fans' cunning disguises of con T-shirts and multi-pocketed waistcoats. Heading up Northgate, a passing and perceptive mundane yelled after us, "I see *Doctor Who*'s finished, then?"

Sunday morning, had to make sure the gophers were in place at Christleton (yes, one or two people did overhear me wandering around muttering, "Bloody Christleton!" at different points in the con) for the Kids' TV stuff... Kids? Didn't see one head without grey hair... Then I was off to my second panel item (as participant, I mean), one on local SF fan groups. During the course of this, I managed to forget which day in the month Trout (the Glasgow group people keep telling me I run) meets. I blame the pressures of being Gopher Mum, the constant worry about covering Christleton and the Dealers' Room, over whether we would have enough hands for the Art Auction. It was nothing to do with late nights in the con bar, or any alcohol you might have imagined you saw me imbibing. (I mean, drink? Me?)

By dint of much looming and growling, I scared up enough gophers

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to assist the Art Auction in running smoothly. They very nearly got an extra lot of groats, because I was prepared to groat them up (another term coined by one of my happy crew) but they received ample from the Art Show's supply. The honest gophers that they are, they said so straight away. Mummy was proud (and getting worryingly used to being called "Mummy").

impression of lasting Mv Contemplation, which was an excellent Eastercon if no one else has said that already, was of a continual whirl of activity. As usually happens at Eastercons, I remember it less as four separate days and more as the beginning, getting stuff moving and getting into the swing of things, and the tailing off part, when things are moving in a relaxed manner to their conclusion. There's no clear point at which it tips from one to the other, but the closest to it is the Art Auction. It was an easy coast downhill all the way after that. Apart from making sure that Christleton (Grrrr....) was manned all the time, things were going very smoothly, though no more big names got turned away from the Dealers' Room, unfortunately. Little moments of impromptu theatre like that do liven the day up a bit.

It's easy to overlook the contribution of gophers to the smooth running of the con, not least for the gophers themselves who often don't realise how essential the part they play is. ("I was only doing a bit of gophering," many say.) I was uncomfortably aware when Chris & Fran thanked me at the closing ceremony (and the friend to my side hissed, "Stand up, then!") that I was taking the thanks when most of the actual work had been done by the twenty or so gophers whom I shanghaied... I happily and who mean. spontaneously volunteered to help out. Thanks to all of you, every last one.

My intention when rolling up at Ops on the Friday morning had been to do some stints in Ops, nothing so strenuous as being Gopher Mum, but I had a whale of a time for all that I was on the go almost the whole time. Or, perhaps, *because* I was on the go...?

Always remember, "When you're good to Momma, Momma's good to you…"

The Elephants And Woozels In Our Fannish Living Room

There is a difference between doing the right thing and doing something right. Sometimes we get blinded by what we think we have to do, rather than what we give some thought to actually doing when it comes to convention programming. We don't really have any elephants, but we do have some woozels.

Fran and Chris along with their team always had the advantage of surprise attack. In the smoky chaos of the demise of the Liverpool convention, whomever charged through would not only be victorious, as is the case when heroic acts of stupidity or bravery occur, but venerated for whatever the likely shape of victory would take.

Nice words, but they do not replace the hard work that goes into running and preparing a programme for a science fiction convention. Fran and Chris were lucky though: a lot of things fell their way, as it deserved, from the variety of authors who showed up, to the excellent discussions that arose. What with a limiting amount of space a number of peripheral yet pertinent programme activities, which some would see as traditional were unfortunately required to be postponed or deterred.

This allowed a certain focus in my opinion onto the core activities of these SF conventions, discussions about books and science fiction.



We sometimes have no idea how lucky we are, how professional those who run these conventions actually try to be. I was at a convention only a short time ago, where 400 people turned up and they had a masquerade with over 25 entries, most of which were excellent. Unfortunately, despite an eminent team of judges, the event organisers forgot to award prizes as promised.

Could you imagine that happening at an Eastercon? Like no Delorean, excusable sure, but a con com would get gutted for forgetting about little ones like that.

Eastercons have a different problem, it's about utilising resources and gaining a critical level of participation that justifies effort and spend. This is key in going forward. As much as the challenge may be to keep as many people happy as possible, it's also about looking at what the committee is enabled to do and not to do.

I often feel that Eastercon committees are enabled in such a

fantastic way. Many may think I refer to the democratic nature of Eastercon. That convention committees stand up and state what they intend to do and if there are rival bids, which is infrequent, but is possible, there is the ultimate choice of voting. Yes, but no.

This is not as important in my mind as the pure faith that occurs as a person hands over their hard earned cash. From the wage packet to the convention is something I often ponder. This fiscal commitment is very important and bestows considerable responsibility upon a committee. This is the true enabler. Money pays for things to happen, whether it be guest's expenses, kites, groats for volunteers or the hire charge of the venue. Money is one of many greasers of the wheels of a convention. Not the most important, but an example of belief coalesced into hard reality.

Eastercons continue apace. It's interesting that no matter what people discuss or say, it is almost impossible to impose upon a committee of the future anything that the people of now would like. This is not a bad thing. If something is a good idea, future committees may take these on. If, and this is something I and my committee are quite open about, there is a feeling something is jaded, perhaps surplus to requirement or perhaps needs updating or a break for a while, then it should occur naturally.

Fran spoke to me about how she had to what I called 'cull' of a number of usual items, on the list was the likes of the costume workshop, Masquerade and the Cyberdrome and of course there were no guests.

It's hard. No-one wants to pee on anyone else's parade. I want to talk about and discuss science fiction literature. I want to talk about sequential literary art and the skills involved and would be upset if someone came along and decided that these aspects are not going to occur.

Yet, I attend many conventions where the discussion of the actual subject can be far from the core. Which can be good.

So despite the situation where there was no Cyberdrome this year, this does not in fact make it any easier for a committee to decide that this event won't occur in 2009. The concept is indeed a good one, and I expect to utilise some of the central ideas of the whole concept, but not where I have to leave three or so people in a room continuously for three days. The same goes for the costume workshop and even more so for the Masquerade.

If we don't have participants who say they will be dressing up, then we won't have a Masquerade. No matter who protests on the day, we need a certain amount of commitment from participants to gain our own commitment in return.

It's important to look at these various aspects that, well, are at the periphery of the convention, at times ignored by many or of no interest and

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at other moments, when it suits, a sudden spectacle that a huge percentage want to take in. It's also good to try and look at new ideas and of course cross media integration, so if we do have a workshop item, it should tie in neatly with other aspects and not be lost on its own.

This is not permanent and of course, I expect that whatever committee follows the one I am on will disown or disagree with what we set out to do, this is OK, and part of what happens as the conventions progress.

If anyone looks at the programme of an Eastercon thirty years ago, they would be surprised by the similarities and many differences. What type of woozels are brought into the convention in the future is in the realm of true speculation, but in my mind there are a number of elephants that we will always thread carefully around.

Even I am not armed with an elephant gun.

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
Paper Doll Masquerade

Intersection. the 1995 After Worldcon, I was on the committee of wind-down convention called a DiSection. Our aim was to parody the best events from Glasgow, on a scale that would fit into a small hotel in Sheffield. For the Masquerade, we supplied a paper cutout doll, and some basic crafty stuff, encouraged people to let their imaginations run riot, and gave them programme time to parade their work. Kate Solomon won, I recall, although she refused to accept her prize of a Barbie In Space video.

When it became clear that there wouldn't be space, time, or any other kind of continuum which would allow a chaos costuming workshop or masquerade at Contemplation, Τ remembered how much fun people had had with the dolls, and we decided to do it again. We couldn't provide anywhere for people to work on them, so we circulated the template in advance (it's still up on the website if you want to have http:// go, at: another contemplation.conventions.org.uk/ dolla4.pdf).

You could do anything: colour it in, stick stuff on it, cut it out and play with it, make group scenes ...

Initially I was a bit worried about it, there were people who obviously didn't get it and thought we were taking the piss, but rumours began circulating of groups that had redesigned the template ... and Deirdre



Counihan got in touch and said not only did she collect such things, but supplied items to museum exhibitions, wrote academic theses on paper ephemera, and would like to write up the whole Contemplation Masquerade idea for the UK Paper Doll Journal. Which we had no idea existed.

But apparently we'd hit another zeitgeist.

Flick says:

"When I saw that Contemplation was planning a Paper Doll Masquerade, I was really pleased. I was a bit bemused when I found out I was judging it, but then I realised that it would involve paper. And glue. And sparkly things!

I really enjoyed being involved with it. There were loads of entries, some made at the con in kids' bedrooms,

some made in Ops and some prepared in advance.

Deirdre Counihan's entry was absolutely fantastic, and incredibly detailed, but all of the entries were great. The people organising Year of the Teledu, in particular, realised it could be a great PR opportunity and entered several times, in both categories.

Everyone involved enjoyed themselves and had fun making the dolls, so I'm very glad that I was able to steal the idea from Contemplation!"




It's traditional in an Eastercon programme book to publish the finalised accounts of the Eastercon two years ago. John Dowd, Treasurer for Paragon2 has issued this Balance Sheet and Treasurer's Report.

The finance of an Eastercon is a continuous race between a limited income, kept low because it is a membership based volunteer organization, and the rush to spend money driven by enthusiastic committee members with new and often expensive ideas. The treasurer's role is to balance these forces and ensure that all the bills can be paid.

The bulk of the income comes from memberships. 579 of you paid an average of £32.81 each. Thank you. Some paid more by joining later, others paid less by joining early or by being very young. The remaining income comes from passalong from other conventions, and from money raised at the convention. Expenditure is more involved. Significant amounts of expenditure have to be committed fairly early in the process. Others can be left until much later and can be dependant upon the amount of income that comes in later in the run up to the convention. A feature of finance in recent years has been a tendency of the hotel to demand a commitment from the convention. Hinckley had us occupancy room а agree to commitment. If we failed to fill the hotel we would have a sliding scale payment to make which could be as much as £5000. This needed to be included in the budget. Fortunately fandom came through and by the convention it was clear that we would not have to pay for function space. To give some breathing space we decided to produce the souvenir book after the convention. This gave us the cash to pay the hotel if necessary but money for a first rate souvenir book if we met the commitment.

The Expenditure in the balance sheet below shows the expenditure in the department headings as stored in the

main accounts. I have broken down the expenditure under headings related more to the experience of a member of the convention, and this is shown in the pie chart above.

One percent of our average member's membership fee would be 33p. So the posting of four Progress Reports and a souvenir book will have cost £1.65. The cost of any of the other areas can be as easily calculated.

Guest costs include accommodation for guests, travel, food, drink and other out of pocket expenses.

Tech covers lighting, public address systems and other expenses needed to make them work.

Printing includes PRs, the atcon publications, flyers, membership forms and the souvenir book.

Groats and Green Room covers refreshments given to programme participants and volunteers. Many people are needed for a wide range of jobs at the convention and these small tokens of appreciation help to make the convention run smoothly **Membership Services** is a posh name for the costs associated with getting you to the convention with a badge and a programme pack.

Programme is what you come the other all for and expenditure might be put under but have heading. T this included here all the items that directly support it and do not obviously fall elsewhere. It includes the dance floor in the rotunda, the bouncy castle, the

zombie paint, the evening entertainments and much much more. If you have a Paragon2 souvenir book, much of this expenditure is visible in the photos.

Other includes all the things I've not mentioned above: insurance, a room for the crèche, bank charges (credit card payments cost us nearly 4% of the payment) and other smallish amounts. It also includes money that we passed along to Contemplation; helping out at an early point with postage costs for a mailout to the members of other Eastercons to help with the rescue bid. I know that the Contemplation treasurer was grateful for the money at that time.

Our programme team are brimming with ideas and would love to hear from you if there's an item you'd like to run.

My favourite moment at Contemplation?

Hmm. I'm spoilt between my memory of the lovely singing at Sunday morning's 'Songs of Praise', and the stunningly excellent panel on 'Politics and Ethics in Ankh-Morpork' where the panel demonstrated both knowledge and considered thought, and made the audience feel fascinated rather than patronised.

I wish I could do it all over again.


