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

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PROGRESS REPORT ONE

This is Progress Report 1 for Contrivance, the 1989 British Science Fiction Convention (Eastercon). The convention will be held in Jersey, at the Hotel de France, St Helier. Our Guests of Honour will be Anne McCaffrey and M. John Harrison.

Future publications will only be sent to members of Contrivance (this does not include Pre-supporters), so send your money now to keep in touch! See the Information Page for details.

The next Progress Report will come out around November 1987 and will include further information on guests, programme themes, travel and prices.

The Committee

First of all, just who are we? Well, we're a group of ten fans with varying amounts of con-running experience from incredibly active (Tim, Roger, Martin) to only second con-committee (Steve). Between us we cover a very wide spectrum of fandom and we think we will be able to find something for all kinds of interests.

At this early stage, not all the committee jobs have been allocated, but this is who we are and what we're doing so far:

<u>Tim Illingworth - Chairman and main liaison with the hotel. Tim was once involved</u> in at least 3 conventions simultaneously, and was a committee member of Beccon. Tim is also head of the Eastercon charter committee.

<u>Roger Perkins</u> - Treasurer. Roger has been treasurer for all four Beccons, so he's going to be able to provide practical experience in the economics of Eastercons.

<u>Steve Davies -</u> Site liaison and publications. Steve has been going to cons for 8 years, though this is only his second committee. He is a professional technical author and will be handling publications such as leaflets and Progress Reports, as well as being a contact with the hotel.

<u>John Dallman</u> - Secretary. John is going to be keeping our membership records, as well as taking the minutes and generally ensuring that we don't lose track of all the suggestions and offers of help we have received/hope to receive.

<u>Paul Dormer</u> - Travel. With our unique location, we are planning to organise travel specially. Paul got some experience of this when he was on the Seacon 84 Eurocon committee, so we're going to get him to do it again.

<u>Chris Cooper -</u> One of fandom's most noticeable fans, Chris is going to be keeping order and making sure that media fandom doesn't get overlooked.

<u>Peter Wareham</u> - Peter was shanghaied while he was attending a convention in the USA and couldn't argue back.

<u>Gwen Funnell</u> - Not just present to keep Peter under control, Gwen brings that essential touch of realism to committee meetings.

<u>Martin Hoare</u> - Quite apart from being a technical wizard, Martin has a lot of experience of con committees and is especially adept at handling hotels. We haven't needed to brow-beat the De France yet, but we can do it if we have to.

<u>Katie Hoare - Essential for brow-beating Martin, Katie is currently embroiled in</u> Conspiracy but will be getting more involved with Contrivance after August.

But enough of the Committee.....

What sort of Convention do we plan to run?

We plan to run a proper, well-rounded science fiction convention, in which written SF holds pride of place but doesn't squeeze out other interests. The Eastercon is no longer the only British convention, but it is still the showcase and the way in which a lot of people first meet Fandom. We want to offer prospective fans a taste of everything that's available, impress the outside world, and have a really good time while we're doing it.

We want to run a convention that will include as many people as possible. Not just mass quizzes with everyone being eliminated, but actually taking part in discussions and workshops. We want you to go away from Contrivance with the feeling that you've really contributed something to the convention, instead of just sat in one of our many bars and watched the world go by (unless of course you want just to sit in the bars).

Fannish activity will be emphasised in all its aspects, from fanzines to literary discussion groups, from conrunning to filking. To help with this, we Lilian Edwards and Christina Lake will be organising the fanroom for us.

We also feel that any true science fiction convention must have a predominance of serious programme items. Unfortunately, these are always the most difficult to organise and it is very tempting to take the easy option of filling up empty hours with silly games and quizzes. If you want to hear talks on specific subjects, or see something special, or if you want to have workshops on something unusual, best of all if you are prepared to run such an item, we want to hear from you. You've got nearly two years to prepare, why not give it a try?

We're also considering dropping some items which have become under-subscribed in recent years. For instance, although masquerades are still popular with audiences, there seem to be fewer and fewer entrants. Since Jersey is a long way to cart extra clothes and props, we may drop the masquerade unless there is a sufficient number of people interested. So, if you feel strongly that there should be a masquerade, or any other item, please let us know.

Obviously, with another Eastercon before 1989, we don't want to give away too many of our programme ideas. However, our themes will probably include subjects like "Islands in the Sky", "Music in SF", "The Baroque in Science Fantasy" and "Biology or Xenobiology?". Each theme will have several different items associated with it, including films, panels, talks and workshops. As 1989 draws nearer, we will be getting firmer commitments from our speakers and panelists and so we'll be able to expand on the programme in future Progress Reports.

Guests of Honour

Our two main guests of honour will, we believe, appeal to two totally different parts of Fandom:

Anne McCaffrey

is of course famous for her dragon series of stories. For this reason, we hope to concentrate more on some of her other works, especially those dealing with music in SF and Fantasy.

M. John Harrison

was closely involved with New Worlds magazine during the infamous New Wave period. He is also renowned for his baroque fantasies set in the decaying city of Viriconium.

We are planning to build programme streams and themes around both Anne McCaffrey and M. John Harrison, as well as getting them involved in the workshops.

There will of course be additional themes, some with special guests of their own, to be announced in future Progress Reports.

The Hotel

One of the most important things for making a convention go smoothly is the hotel. We believe that we have found a place that is ideally suited to being a con hotel. The De France was built in the last century as a luxury hotel and, except for an interlude when it was a Jesuit seminary, has continued that tradition ever since. It stands on a low ridge overlooking the town of St Helier (capital of Jersey) and can accommodate over 600 people. In the hotel's private grounds is a conference centre (the Lido de France) which we shall also be using. The Lido includes a disco, a health-club, several bars, a large hall and a cinema with 35mm projection facilities.

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Our major problem with the De France so far, has been that every time we ask them to provide something special for the con they tell us that they already do that as standard (and at a cheaper rate than most hotels after months of hard bargaining). The facilities are not only spacious, they are well-organised, which we have found to be a very rare virtue in modern hotels.

The number of function rooms is more than we anticipate needing, so we will be able to cope even if we have a sudden influx of people at the last moment. Furthermore, all the rooms are within the grounds of the hotel, so there will be no need to brave Jersey's (minimal) traffic when going from one item to another.

The overflow hotel (the Rosebank) is also within the grounds of the De France, and is owned by the same management so there should be no problems there. The Rosebank, incidentally, is being connected to the De France by a covered, well-lit walkway so you won't even have to expose yourselves to Jersey's sunny climate when you go to the programme.

If the overflow fills up, there are an incredible number of small hotels and cheap boarding houses very nearby. We have been told that there are 5000 beds inside 10 minutes walk from the hotel, and we could probably accommodate the whole convention within two hundred yards of the de France.

Rates

We have agreed a room rate for the Hotel de France of £20.50 per night per person in a twin. This is a firm rate for 1989 and not an estimate based on current prices. The room rate includes full English breakfast - and also serve yourself with rolls, cold meat, fruit, fruit juice etc. We sampled this breakfast when we were over there recently, and it makes the average hotel breakfast pale in comparison (the convention will be served the standard breakfast, not a cut-down version as some hotels do). The hotel has offered the facility of continental breakfast served in the rooms for those people in the De France. We have not yet decided whether to take them up on this.

What we are also offering, however, is a similar room rate (actually £21), for up to a week both before and after the con. So if you want to, you could have a twoweek holiday in the Channel Islands at discount rates and with a convention in the middle of it. What more could you possibly want?

Well, you might want to bring your (non-fannish) family so we are having a "relatives membership" at a nominal cost. This allows them to take advantage of the cheap rates and facilities under the convention's agreement with the hotel. Naturally, there are also cheap membership rates for children, soft toys, and other pets (there are no quarantine restrictions between the UK and Jersey).

Room rates for the Rosebank (the overflow hotel next door) are approx. £15 (75% of the De France rate) including full breakfast. The Rosebank isn't quite as stunning as the De France but it is a comfortable hotel and is a very short walk away.

The rooms in a boarding house next door to the overflow hotel were about fl0 this year, and should still be priced in that general area in 1989.

Alternatively, you could try self-catering accommodation, and some travel agents are offering package deals including travel and accommodation which is (entirely by co-incidence) no more than ten minutes walk from the De France. By arranging to travel in groups, you may get further discounts.

We should point out at this juncture that single rooms are (as everywhere) in very short supply. If you want a single in the De France or the Rosebank, it will probably be in a twin room, and the rate will reflect this. For those with large families, though, the De France does offer family rooms with three beds (one of which is a double).

Food and drink

Jersey has lots of cheap and wonderful food and cheap drink. The De France itself has two restaurants, one of which will seat everybody staying in the hotel (so there should be no need to queue for breakfast). The food in the De France is excellent, and very good value for money both in the restaurants and the bar snacks. Good food is extremely easy to find in Jersey. There is an annual good food festival which ensures that quality is kept up, not just in the top restaurants but also in the cheap fast food places as well.

As no doubt you realise by now, Jersey has no VAT and minimal excise duty. Therefore the price of alcoholic drinks is very much lower than on the mainland. Coupled with Jersey's proximity to France, you can see that you will have to be very careful not to over-indulge. Fortunately, Jersey counts as an overseas country and you can count on a generous duty-free allowance when going home (and going to the convention, come to that). The same naturally applies to petrol, tobacco and perfume - though we advise you not to drink too much of these.

The hotel is currently serving the local beer, Mary Ann, at a price of around 70p per pint. If you don't think that's cheap enough, we found a pub (called The Wellington!) with a bar price of 50p per pint. For the convention, the hotel will also be serving real ale.

Travel

This is of course the place where Contrivance appears to be slightly more expensive than the common Eastercon. However, we calculate that the average fan can probably save their extra fare out of the VAT/excise duty that they won't have to pay (especially if VAT goes up again).

There are two main options, ferry and plane. The ferry will cost about half the standard fare (though the Theatre and Concert Rail Club tell-us they may be able to beat that) and takes most of a night. The plane is a bit more expensive, though we are investigating the possibility of chartering an aircraft (which brings the price down considerably, but has the disadvantage of requiring people to turn up at the same time). Theatre & Concert apparently have a deal with British Airways, so there may be room for improvement here too. We are making plans to provide transport to and from a selection of planes and ferries.

Of course, if you try one of the standard travel agents' packages, you might manage to do it even cheaper. At least one current package deal costs £89 for seven nights accommodation with the return air fare included.

Basically, the overall cost for a London fan would probably be marginally less than attending a convention in the North. The break-even point is somewhere around Birmingham, with Scottish fans having to pay a bit more to get down south. We think it's worth it; and we hope you will too.
