HOTEL BOOKING FORMS IN PREPARATION

SINCE THE LAST <u>Progress Report</u> was circulated in September there has been a steady trickle of new members for the 1971 Convention at the rate of one or two every day. The result is that a further 85 names have been added to our lists, the total standing at 260 at December 1st. This is <u>already</u> an all-time high for any British Easter Convention, with the previous record-holder being Oxford in 1969 and 200 members, if my memory is correct.

Size is not everything and I don't want to keep emphasising how big our Eastercon has become. At the same time it's exciting to realise that there are still four months to go, which makes it seem as if my original target of 300 memberships will be an underestimate. Since there should be at least two hundred people floating around during the Easter weekend and there are certain physical limitations on the size of the hotel, we are no longer soliciting registrations with quite the same strong—arm tactics used in the early days!

Now I suggest you look at the membership list inside; among the tremendous number of newcomers are some familiar names; Harry Harrison, Tom Schluck, Ken Cheslin, Eric Frank Russell, Rick Sneary (though Rick will not be present in the flesh), Keith Laumer, and Ray Bradbury. (The last-named is genuine enough, but "our" Ray lives in Birmingham!) A large number of Europeans have also registered, probably as a direct result of the Heidelberg WorldCon.

ETHEL LINDSAY BECOMES FAN GUEST-OF-HONOUR

A major development is that Ethel Lindsay has been asked and has agreed to be our Fan Guest-of-Honour. We thought it was time that British conventions recognised the enormous assistance rendered by fans throughout the years, and Ethel was the obvious choice. You all know Ethel already; she has just celebrated the 15th year of continuous publishing of Scottische; has helped to arrange many British Eastercons including also the 1965 WorldCon, and unfailingly offered her support and assistance to your present committee. HOTEL BOOKING FORMS IN PREPARATION

Booking forms for rooms in the main Convention hotel are now being prepared by the committee, and will be sent to all registered members on January 1st, 1971 (airmail to the USA). These forms should be completed and returned to us as soon as possible, and in any case by February 28th, latest. Your bookings will be confirmed direct by the hotel itself.

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We attempted to explain arrangements for booking hotel rooms in the last bulletin, but have since received one or two anxious letters from people who evidently didn't understand the procedure, or who wanted us to book rooms for them. It probably will not be possible to keep answering such queries in the busy months ahead, so we will try and explain the system from Ground Zero. This might be particularly useful to those who have never previously attended a convention;

Everything happens in the Giffard Hotel, Worcester, and we have arranged with the management to reserve all rooms in the committee's name for the 3-day period (Friday, Saturday and Sunday; 9,10 & 11 April). If you want to stay at the convention hotel itself (and this is strongly recommended, both because it is a luxury hotel and because it's a much more convenient arrangement) you must apply to us, on the official form which will be provided, to registered members only. This is one of the things you pay your 10/- for; usual rates at the Giffard are much higher and in any case the hotel will not accept individual bookings for this period.

There are two incentives for you to complete your booking form rapidly:-

- (1) If most rooms are taken by the end of February there will be no introduced guests in the hotel except for convention members.
- (2) If you don't you probably won't get a room since we have 260 members and 145 beds.

Don't worry about point (2) unduly, however, since arrangements have been made with up to five 'overflow' hotels to take guests, and no-one will actually have to sleep under a hedge!

Some people may prefer to make their own arrangements for accommodation elsewhere, either privately or in other hotels. This is entirely up to you, should you have a friend, a caravan, a tent or something else in mind. You will still have to pay full entrance fees (see below) at the convention itself, however.

Provision will be made on the official booking form in case you wish to stay at another hotel and prefer to let the committee do the work. Those with families of more than one very small child will probably have to order a room at one of the older, larger (in the sense of "more generously laid-out rooms") hotels, since the Giffard can only provide a single cot for small children. It will be necessary to offer latecomers accommodation in these overspill hotels.

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The Giffard hotel is a modern six-storey building, situated in High Street Worcester, and facing the Cathedral. All bedrooms have telephone, radio, etc, and their own private bathroom. A special reduced rate has been negotiated, which includes all service charges and price increases between now and Easter 1971.

Rates for single rooms, with bath & including breakfast, are £4 per person. Double and twin-bedded rooms are £3 per person. A special rate is also available which includes evening meal. This is £5 per person, single; and £4 per person double. The latter is definitely recommended. A number of twin-bedrooms will be available to those who will consider sharing, and thus enjoy a reduced cost.

Just a brief word of caution. The Giffard is a luxury hotel only 3 years old. Its manager and staff therefore are slightly more proud of their hotel than was the case at the Sci-Con, and will consequently look with less favour upon persons who treat their facilities with less than the usual degree of consideration. I'm sure this note is completely unnecessary - it was just a thought.

ENTRANCE FEES

Registration for the Convention is 10/-, either paid in advance or at Easter itself. Entrance fee to the convention will be the usual additional 15/- each, to be paid at the door. This year, however, we have managed to give you slightly increased value since this sum also includes the cost of the special riverboat cruise which will be held on the Monday morning. A steamer has been booked, and Easter Monday notwithstanding there will be a 2-hour cruise on the River Severn

BANQUET

A banquet will be held on the Sunday evening of the convention, during which there will be presentation of various Awards. The banquet will cost 30/- per person (those staying at the Giffard on evening-meal terms pay an extra 10/- only) Banquet tickets can be ordered on the booking form. Numbers will be restricted

Our programme of films will be shown with facilities for CinemaScope. Films ordered include CHARLY; TENTH VICTIM; ALPHAVILLE and a number of other long & short items for all tastes. Other visual attractions will include films from NASA; Delta Group 'home-movies'; Philip Strick and a selection from the archives of the British Film Institute; and a slide programme. (If you have slides of past conventions, please bring them along)

We hope as many people as possible will take part in the fancy-dress party on the Saturday night. This year there will be slightly more organisation than usual (or such is the intention) and some really attractive prizes will be presented to winners in various categories for the best costumes. (Would you believe bottles of Scotch and like that?)

Doreen Parker is arranging for the Fashion Parade of Future to go with a swing, and this will be something new at British conventions. This is the opportunity of the year for the girls to dress up (or down) in something spectacular and again win a prize plus a full-plate photograph of the parade. AUCTION MATERIAL

We are now actively soliciting auction material for the convention. We therefore would very much appreciate receiving books, paperbacks, magazines, fanzines, artwork, or other items of interest. If enough top-rate material is received in advance a special postale auction list will be issued.

Please send auction material to Vernon Brown (Room 623, Pharmacy, University of Aston, Birmingham) or give it to him on his regular trips to the Globe. Other items can be brought along to the convention itself for auction.

ARTSHOW

An Artshow will be held, arranged by Bob Rickard. Free display space will be available to all artists, and prizes given for best work submitted. Should any artist wish to sell his work he may do so with the blessing of the committee at no charge (no commission levied) providing he makes his own arrangements for the sale and care of paintings. (Artwork— see also the Ken McIntyre Award.)

BOOKSELLERS

The book display room will be available for general use, but tables or equivalent space will be charged for at the rate of £1 per table.

COMMEMORATIVE COVERS

It has been decided to produce a souvenir commemorative cover to mark the convention, A special GPO Box and frank will be used at the hotel with an attractive printed envelope. Details will be announced later, and order forms, etc. Cost will be a few shillings each, and a limited supply printed.

DOC WEIR AWARD

The 'Doc' Weir Award, named in memory of the late Dr Arthur Weir of the former Cheltenham Circle, is presented every year at the annual British SF Convention.

For the 1971 Award the voting is being spread a little wider than previously. All members of the British Science Fiction Association will be entitled to vote; also, all those (whether members of the Association or not) who attend EASTERCON 22. Nomination—and—voting forms will be distributed to convention—goers at the convention, and by post to BSFA members. (But only one vote per person is allowed) The vote—counting and presentation will take place at the Convention.

THE KEN MCINTYRE AWARD

Ken McIntyre was an artist whose work appeared regularly in the British SF magazines during the 1950's. He was a keen science fiction fan and had been a regular attendee at Conventions since the very early days. He was always willing to give advice and more than eager to do work free of charge for the many fanzines. Ken died from a heart-attack in 1968 and he will be missed by his many friends.

Three people suggested independently that some form of memorial was needed for Ken and after discussion it was felt that an award for artists would help give encouragement to young artists in the field, as well as giving recognition to established artists — and so the Ken McIntyre Memorial Award fund was started at the 1969 Easter Convention.

At the time of writing the actual form of the Award has yet to be finalised but it will be an award for the winner to keep for all time rather than an award that is passed on from year to year. It is intended to make a presentation every year as long as the fund lasts.

RULES FOR ENTRY OF ARTWORK for the KEN McINTYRE MEMORIAL AWARD:

1 The Award will be presented annually to the artist who, in the opinion of the judges, submits the most deserving piece of artwork.

2 The artist must be resident in the U.K.

3 The work must have appeared in an amateur publication during the 12 months
January to December preceding the Easter at which the Award is made. (Cont/d)

4 The artwork must be accompanied by a copy of the publication in which it appear-5 The subject matter of the artwork must, in the opinion of the judges, be fantasy or science fiction.

6 Each panel of judges may alter these rules for the following year; these rules

shall be published and once published shall not be altered in that year.

7 The judges shall be:

Jim Marshall Controllers of cash & publicity. Rog Peyton

Chairman of the Convention Committee (changing each year) Representative of the BSFA Ltd (nominated by BSFA Council)

Representative of St Fanthony

8 Entries must be presented to Jim Marshall or Rog Peyton on the first day of the Convention. If not possible entrants must give notification in advance so that alternative arrangements can be made.

THE NATIONAL BOOK LEAGUE is also sponsoring an exhibition of SF titles from all over the World, to be shown at NBL Headquarters in London from May 17 until the end of the month. This has been arranged by George Hay, with the Science Fiction Foundation. Afterward, the exhibition will tour the rest of the country, with first stop being the SPECULATION II conference in Birmingham.

IN 1972 the British National Convention will be held in the North of England by the Manchester Group, details to be announced.

THE NEXT BRITISH WORLD CONVENTION — a special discussion session will be held at Eastercon 22 so that firm plans can be made.
