The postal strike conspired to add to the difficulties faced by your committee, but we are delighted (and relieved!) to announce that Anne McCaffrey has consented to step into Brian's place.

Now living in Eire, Anne is well-known for her award-winning DRAGONRIDER and for her stories of Helva, 'the Ship who Sang'. She will bring children Todd & Georgeanne to the Convention, and we look forward to seeing her then.

Hence who better than genial Phil Rogers, veteran of innumerable BSFA meetings, to take charge of toasting, announcements and other general bullying and chivvying duties! We are very pleased Phil has agreed to take on the job; you will recall that in the last Report we announced Ethel Lindsay as Fan Guest-of-Honour.

HOTEL ACCOMODATION

Registrations for the Convention have soared to a staggering 330, despite the postal strike. Similarly, hotel bookings were received at a tremendously rapid rate, so that the Giffard was completely filled within a week or so of forms being sent out. (Would you believe 70 rooms booked by return of post?). Some trusting souls still continue to send in their forms asking for a room at the main hotel even at this late date, but unfortunately that is just not possible.

Instead, we have been in contact with four other, 'overspill' hotels, all of which are within a few minutes walk of the Giffard and are quite comfortable. Between them we have found beds for 65 people already, but at the time of writing some accomodation is still available (though mostly twin & double rooms).

* 1. Programme begins on Friday 9th April at 2.00 p.m. - it would be useful *
* to arrive before this time; registration desk opens at 10.00 a.m. *

* 2. By rail, arrive at Foregate Street station and head South for all five *
* hotels (see map). The Old Talbot, not marked, is situated next to a *
* multi-storey carpark, adjacent to the Giffard itself. All of the other *
* hotels have their own parking facilities. *

* 3. Find your hotel, check in, leave your belongings. *

* 4. Look for the convention registration desk, on the ground floor at the *
* Giffard hotel. Those who have paid 10/- in advance must pay a further *
* 15/- (oops, 75 np) entrance fee; all others pay the full 25/-. *

* 5. You will then collect your Programme Book, badge, and other odds and *
* ends including your free ticket for the riverboat cruise on Monday *
* morning. If you have reserved a ticket for the Banquet, you should *
* also collect it at the desk. Now you're on your own - enjoy yourself! *

BANQUET TICKETS

As previously stated, only some 140 tickets are available for the Banquet, and a large proportion of this total have already been reserved. If some are available at Easter they will be sold at the registration desk. Tickets which have been reserved must be collected as early as possible at the convention.

If staying on dinner-inclusive terms at the Giffard, your ticket will cost 50 np for a 4-course meal, including wine. Otherwise tickets are £1.50 np. The Banquet will be held in the Convention hall; ordinary dinners will be obtainable in the hotel restaurant, and people will be admitted to the hall after the meal, should they wish to hear speeches and see presentation of Awards.

COMMEMORATIVE COVERS

REGISTRATION DESK

Previously-mentioned facility at the Giffard will be open on both Friday and Saturday from 10.00 a.m. to early evening. Registration outside those hours will either have to wait, or can be carried out at a special 'nerve-centre' office which will be maintained on the first-floor of the hotel. Please note; you must register -- we need the money. Those not wearing badges will be challenged.

VOLUNTEERS WANTED

We still need more volunteers to man the afore-said registration desk for one hour periods (unless you are so keen you want more!). Should there not be time to write, please do turn up on the day and ask if you can help; we shall be very grateful for any assistance. There will be a 'briefing' of those volunteers who are present on the Thursday night before the convention begins.

ARTSHOW

Bob Rickard is running the Artshow at the Convention. Please bring along your paintings and other art for display; free exhibition space is available in a special lockable room. You may attempt to sell your artwork if you wish, and prizes will in any case be awarded for the 'best' in various categories.

BOOKSELLERS

A number of tables (6' x 2½') have been let at £1 each, and more are available if required. Cash with order, please. The art and book room will be combined in the basement 'Cobham' Suite at the Giffard.

PROGRAMME BOOKLET

After epic battles against the postal strike, most of the 40-odd pages of advertisements ordered were finally received and this booklet has now gone to press. It will be quite a thing; extra copies are available, autographed by the Guests of Honour and Committee, at 50 np (\$1.50) per copy.

PROGRAMME

All other details aside, what are we going to be doing at Worcester? Well for a start you can drink -- the lounge bar has agreed to stay open for as long as there are customers to be served! (We warned them). On top of that there are rumours of at least two open parties beside the planned programme. And don't forget; this year the convention doesn't end on the Sunday -- on Monday morning we have a cruise on the River Severn (with bar) for two hours, all fares paid by the convention committee

As for the programme; well, we don't want to announce everything here, but a complete 3-day timetable has been drawn up which looks as if it should be great fun. The film programme includes two ½-hour NASA films, in colour, of the Apollo and Gemini programmes, and beside that we have feature films such as ALPHAVILLE, TENTH VICTIM, CHARLY, etc.

STAR TREK

Gerald Bishop will arrange a novelty item, an episode of Star Trek never before seen in this country and specially produced for the Convention from first-print daily original transparencies.

The Enterprise finds itself cut off by the enemy forces, and has been given orders to rejoin the Federation Fleet, but before it can it has to rescue survivors from destroyed Federation outposts, cause havoc behind Klingon lines, and ferry Federation Ambassadors to an important conference."

"THE BOUNDARIES OF SCIENCE FICTION"

James Blish will chair a panel to discuss the proposition - "In recent years many 'outside' authors have been adopting science-fiction ideas and approaches. Some of them, such as John Barth and Kurt Vonnegut, have been recognised as bona-fide SF authors within our field; some, like Thomas Pynchon and Vladimir Nabakov have been virtually ignored; others, like Ira Levin, have been actively resented, at least in some quarters. The question before the panel is; Where and why do we draw the line? And should such a line be drawn at all?"

FASHION PARADE OF THE FUTURE - LADIES PLEASE NOTE!

AND IN 1972...

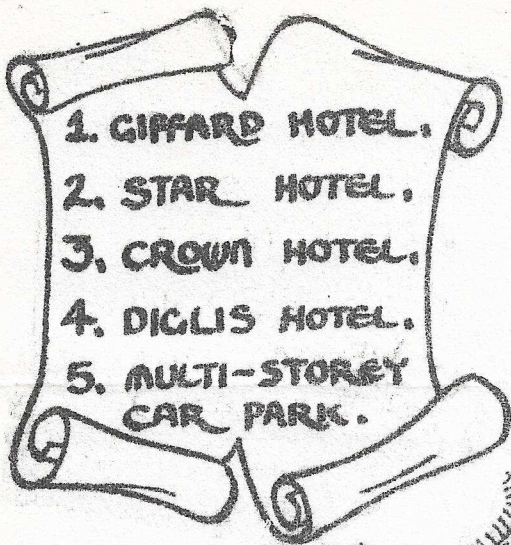

There will be a special session, open to all, on Sunday 11th April to discuss future British, European and World SF Conventions.

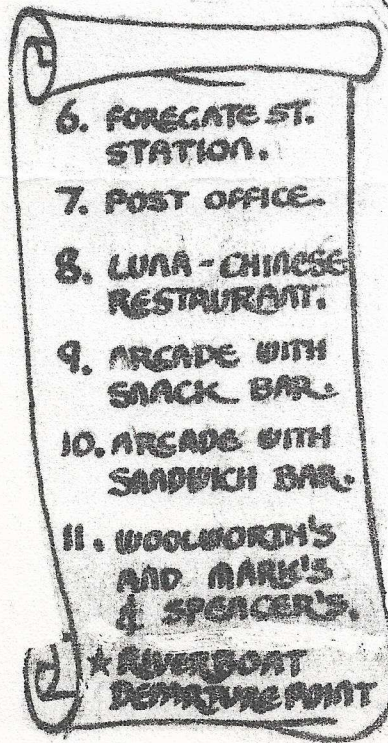

ANNUAL SCIENCE FICTION ACHIEVEMENTS AWARDS
ANNUAL SCIENCE FICTION ACHIEVEMENT AWARDS

Rules of Eligibility:

NOMINATIONS AND VOTING: Nominating is limited to members of either Heicon or Noreascon. Only one item may be nominated in each category. Either Heicon or Noreascon membership number must appear on each ballot. A person must be a member of Noreascon to vote on the final ballot.

BEST NOVEL: A science fiction or fantasy story of 40,000 words or more, which has appeared for the first time in 1970. Appearance in a year prior to 1970 disqualifies a story - a story may thus be eligible only once. Publication date or cover date in the case of a dated magazine, takes precedence over a copyright date. The date of the last installment of a magazine serial determines its year of eligibility. Individual stories appearing as a series are eligible only as individual stories, and are not eligible taken together under the title of the series. The convention committee may move a story into a more appropriate category if it feels it necessary, providing the story is within 5000 words of the category limits.

BEST NOVELLA: Same rules as novel, with length between 17,500 and 40,000 words.

BEST SHORT STORY: Same rules as novel, with length under 17,500 words.

BEST DRAMATIC PRESENTATION: Any production, directly related to science fiction or fantasy, in the fields of radio, television, stage or screen, which has been publicly presented for the first time in its present form during 1970. Series are not eligible but individual episodes in the series are eligible and must be identified by title.

BEST PROFESSIONAL ARTIST: A professional artist whose work was presented in some form in the science fiction or fantasy field in 1970.

BEST PROFESSIONAL MAGAZINE: Any magazine devoted primarily to science fiction or fantasy which has published four or more issues, at least one of which appeared in 1970.

BEST AMATEUR MAGAZINE: Any generally-available non-professional magazine devoted to science fiction, fantasy, or related subjects, which has published four or more issues, at least one of which appeared in 1970.

BEST FAN WRITER: A writer whose works appeared in fanzines in 1970.

BEST FAN ARTIST: An artist or cartoonist whose works appeared in fanzines in 1970.

ALL AWARDS will be the standardised rocket ship, designated Science Fiction Achievement Awards or HUGOS, and will be presented at the Awards Banquet, at Noreascon.

TO BRITISH READERS: This 'Hugo' nomination form is distributed with SPECULATION magazine. To nominate for Awards, you must be a member of Noreascon or Heicon, as stated above. This form can however be completed and returned to the committee enclosing \$4.00 (£1.13.0) in cheque, money order or cash, which entitles you to membership in Noreascon, and all literature.
