

THE NORRINGTON ROOM

Denied the possibility of expanding vertically or horizontally we adopted the expedient of going underground, and now, reminiscent of Xanadu, we have a room of 10,000 square feet distinguished by varied floor levels, galleries and bays, displaying on the shelves and counters 160,000 volumes. This great room is in fact underneath the new quadrangle of our traditional friend and neighbour, Trinity College, and is named, after its President, The Norrington Room.

The purpose of this development is twofold: to enable us to maintain a larger stock from which to supply mail orders more readily, and to create the quiet atmosphere of a library in which customers may feel at ease, explore the shelves $(2\frac{1}{2}$ miles of them, made of English wild cherry wood) and consult the staff without disturbance by the operations of the mail-order business. Ingenious lighting and ventilation eliminate any sense of subterranean exploration.

The North end is dedicated to Theology, Philosophy and Education, the South end to Medicine, Science and Technology; between them, East and West, are Sociology, Politics and Economics on the one hand, and Orientalia on the other. The removal of these subjects from the old shop affords scope for the expansion of other sections, and especially of English literature.

The Norrington Room was designed by Robert Maguire and Keith Murray.



Judith Merril Guest of Honour

If you ask a non sf reader to name someone connected with the sf field, you are likely to get three answers; - Isaac Asimov, Ray Bradbury - and Judith Merril. Her many anthologies have gained a reputation that far transcends the narrow limits of their genre, and they have been probably one of the main factors in gaining sf not only a generation of new readers, but also the respectability it so urgently requires. This, I think, is because she has always been aware of the standards towards which all literature, should aspire - unlike many other people within the field who have gained great respect.

It is painful - as a writer or an editor to judge one's work or the work of others by these standards. One gradually becomes aware of the weaknessess in one's own work and, if one is trying to compile an anthology one can often see how far even the best that one can choose from is so lacking in important qualities. But that 'important', often qualifying the last sentence, would not have been there a few years ago. The situation is happily changing, because of people like Judy. Now the best work of the sf field may be compared with the best work of literature.


Judy has always been able to distinguish work which has measured itself against the best, even if it's not been intrisically successful. She has also spent a lot of her time and a great deal of her energy in the encouraging of young writers and has that rare gift, the perspicacity that enables her to swiftly point out the hidden flaws in a story's construction. In short her essential qualities are an eye for a good story, and an enormous amount of energy.

Judy probably sounds incredibly formidable, but let me set your minds at rest; as a person her most obvious quality is that of warmth, a quality which one responds to as soon as one meets her. I've discovered that she is lively. generous, and a good conversationalist, able to argue at length and with passion. She is also much more emotional than herforthright exterior would have us believe. I shall awways remember how surprised I was after seeing Fellini's Juliette of the Spirits with her, to see this hard-living, stubborn woman, whose hand-shake is as firm as her convictions, emerging from the cinema in tears. But this is a clue I should have picked up from her writings. She can be emotional and she can be objective and disiplined: where the two are combined the result is impressive.

She also has a peculiar gift; the strange ability to organise people, but it seems to be coupled with a compensatory inability to control events. As far as she is concerned a trip down the street to post a letter is likely to turn, at the drop of a hat, into a safari. I have come to believe that she is, as far as travel is concerned, possibly the most unreliable person in the world. When she returned to the States she was supposed to be back here within six months. Three times that period's passed by as I write this, yet despite streams of letters announcing her impending arrival she is not here yet.

But when she does arrive it will have been worth the wait. Charming, witty, feminine;able to be serious or riotous she will make an ideal Guest of Honour.

WHO WAS 'DOC' WEIR?

Arthur kose Weir, D.Sc., used to teach science at a girls' boarding school in Gloucestershire. He also used to translate scientific articles from Czech into English having taken his degree at Prague University and married a Czech girl. He was addicted to both 'hard science fiction' and to outright fantasy, and could be erudite in either field without being patronising. He contacted sf fandom late in life(via the former Cheltenham SF Circle) and took to it right away - and it to him. He was even secretary of the BSFA for a few months before ill-health forced him to curtail his activities. During the two or three years before his death he made many friend both through personal contact and a wide correspondence and fanzine activity.

WHAT IS THE 'DOC' WEIR AWARD?

When 'Doc' Weir died, it was suggested that his collection of sf might be purchased from his widow and added to the BSFA library. To this end money was collected. For various reasons the idea proved impracticable and it was agreed at the 1962 convention - by popular vote - that the money should be used to institute an annual Award to be given to a person 'who was thought to deserve the 'Doc Weir Award'. The Award itself is a silver goblet on a stand; the stand being engraved with the names of the various winners. It is awarded each year at the Easter convention and is retained by the winner for the ensuing year. Each winner also receives a certificate to keep. Anyone may be nominated to stand for the Award and the voting is done only by those attending the convention.

BSFA The BRITISH SCIENCE FICTION ASSOCIATION was

formed in 1958 at the Easter convention held at the George Hotel in Kettering. It was designed to fill the need for an organisation which had the double objective of both catering to the requirements of its membership and of working to enhance the entire field of speculative fiction.

LTD.

Although for the first two years of its existence it had neither chairman nor president the association published a fine sequence OÍ VECTOR, its official organ, and rapidly gained 8 large membership together with the serious acceptance of publishers etc. One of its earliest activities, originally run in close collaboration with the Cheltenham S.F. Circle. was the institution of a postal lending library.

In 1960 both a chairman and a president were elected. In November, 1967, the association registered as a limited company under the was name of the BRITISH SCIENCE FICTION ASSOCIATION LIMITED, and shortly afterwards assilimated the assets of the old association.

The services offered by the B.S.F.A. to its members at present include regular issues of both VECTOR and the Writers Bulletin which aids aspiring authors; - a full use of the library which now contains several thousand books and rare magazines; - a contact bureau; -an advisory service and close affiliations with the International Contact Bureau.

Membership, apart from the initial entrance fee of 5/-, is currently 30/- a year.







The Grand Master of the Most Noble and Illustrious Order of St. Fantony regrets to announce that there will be no ceremony of initiation during the term of this convention despite the close association the blessed St. Fantony has with the ancient and honourable city of Oxford.

However, should it be that the Most Noble and Illustrious Order of St. Fantony are moved to throw their customary party, then let it be known that all will be most welcome. The Most Noble and Illustrious Order of St. Fantony originated in the Cheltenham SF. Circle with Bob Richardson and Eric Jones being the main instigators. The Order was originally formed to bestow honour, not on any individual but on the entire Liverpool Group - plus the secondary intention to supply a dash of colour and gaiety to the 1956 Kettering convention. The ceremony of initiation - and the ensuing party proved so popular that another ceremony was held at the 1957 World Convention held in London.

In 1963 Bob Richardson died and the Order was almost disbanded in respect to his memory. However, within a year, the inew' Order arose this time with slightly more formalised aims which are: -

To bring ceremony and colour to conventions.



tourney rules

All bouts are fought within a delineated area and are overseered by judges and a marshal who has the final word in any appeal or decision.

You WIN a bout by;

Shattering your opponent's shield, Disarming him, Knocking off his helmet, Forcing him beyond the marked area, Making him cry 'Yield'!

You LOSE a bout by;

Having your shield shattered. Losing or breaking your weapon. Having your helmet knocked off. Being forced beyond the marked area. Crying 'Yield'! Striking your opponent below the hips.

Should a contestant wish to fight with two weapons instead of a shield, the breaking or loss of one weapon will count as victory to his opponent.

The championship is determined by a system of eliminations; - the Knock-out.Contestants with the highest score of victories are set against each other-the final winner being the champion.

Contestants are permitted to use their own gear as long as, in the opinion of the marshal, it offers a sufficiant measure of protection and a limited means of offense; - ie, steel swords, iron maces, lead-weighed axes, etc., will not be permitted unless opposed by similar weapons and appropriate armour. It should perhaps be explained that the London Circle is not so much a geographical location as an attitude of mind. Therefore there are Lords and Ladies of the Circle scattered right around the Globe.

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
Founded before WWII, the group managed to






