You will find your hotel booking form with this PR. The Hotel de France has been extensively refurbished since Helicon in 1993. It is considered to be one of the best hotels in Jersey. All the rooms are of a very high standard. Please try to book early. The amount of function space available to us depends on the number of bedrooms the convention uses. For those on a smaller budget, there are a number of other hotels and guest houses with prices from as little as £17 per person per night. There are also inclusive packages. A seven night break at the Rosslyn guest house costs £218 per person including flights from Gatwick. All UK envelopes will contain a Jersey Tourism brochure giving a list of hotels and guest houses.

The convention is coming along well. I am looking forward to welcoming our guests: Brian Stableford, Harry Turtledove and Peter Weston to Jersey. John Richards is continuing to expand the programme. We hope to have one of the strongest Eastercon programmes of recent years. We are also hoping to have the customary Jersey Banquet. If there is sufficient interest we will publish details in PR3.

# Brian Stableford

Multi-talented people are usually Renaissance Men in media-speak (while Renaissance Women do not exist; instead there are Superwomen). Brian is not really a Renaissance Man. He couldn't fresco the ceiling of a chapel to save his life, or improvise a sonnet in Tuscan dialect. Give him a lute, and he would smile politely and hand it back. If you were lucky. Mind you, like that first science-fiction artist Leonardo da Vinci, he has invented a few machines, that may or may not get built in the next five hundred years. And there is no doubt that he is multi-talented. He can play cricket; he can bet on race-horses and win, mostly; and he used to find poker quite profitable too. And he has all kinds of arcane expertise. If you ask him (and, sometimes, even if you don't) he will tell you far more than any sane person ought to want to know about Goth music, or about late nineteenth-century French decadents.

Don't ask him about Goth music in his living room, or he will start putting CDs on. Exit the living room quickly, turn right past the corridor of pre-War fantasy and sf, L to R, turn left into the corridor of pre-War fantasy and sf, R to Z, and go into the dining room. There, on the left hand wall, soon to *fill* the left hand wall, is the monument to the main Stableford talents. Shelf upon shelf of books that he has written, or edited, or written for.

There's no need to list them; and no space either. The highlights can be found in the Encyclopedias of Science Fiction and Fantasy. His first professional sale was when he was 17, in 1965. He wrote novels while a biology student at York, and continued as a DPhil student in the Biology Department and then (leaving all his flour beetles to die) as a DPhil student in Sociology. He became a sociologist at Reading University, until he realized he would have more fun (though not necessarily more money) as a full-time writer. Now he still does some university teaching (at King Alfred's, Winchester), but he is

more of a full-time writer than most full-time writers. I remember spending one New Year's Eve with him as he moaned about failing to reach his target of a million published words that year.

He has been writing superb science fiction for thirty years now; some excellent fantasy; and some of the most interesting science fiction and fantasy criticism too (two monographs, several volumes of collected essays, endless encyclopedia contributions, countless reviews). With some writers, one might be recommending books they published twenty years ago, but Brian is writing better than ever. Try some of the short stories and novellas he has published in the last few years, mostly in *Asimov's* or *Interzone*, at least one of which seems to end up in every Best of the Year collection from Gardner Dozois. Or read the excellent series that he has just finished, four books out so far, which started with *Inherit the Earth*. It's some of the best new British sf around, but it is not published in Britain, so no Arthur C. Clarke Award for him. When you meet him in Jersey, don't ask him about Goths, ask him about the state of British sf publishing...

# P rogramme

Six months out and the programme should now be taking on definite shape. Well, at least we now know the physical limitations we are faced with.

The Hotel De France offers one excellent room. The Main Auditorium in the Lido seats 600 theatre style and comes with a full set of lights and PA. This will obviously be our grand set and will hold the Opening and Closing ceremonies, Guest of Honour solo spots and Masquerade. We can also plan on putting other items in there, providing that we don't get hit on for technical charges, fitting round requirements for set up and strike. In the main building we have one 120 seat room, The Golden Bar, one 80 seat room, The Giffard, one 40 seat room with a large TV, the Verclut, and one without, the Sorrel. We also have a room for Gaming and another for Chaos Costuming. Hey ho! At least fixing the boundaries mean that we can start finding our way to a solution.

So we are looking at a stream comprising of Grand Events with gaps for rehearsals etc. which means that one needn't constrain ones self to the hour long slot. A second stream of, necessarily, more intimate discussion items and room for one or two more informal items spaced and running at random. (Well not at random on the day. On the day we'll have worked out when we want them to start and where they are going to be. I just meant that we can give them two or three hours and let them run. Whoever would think I meant at random on the day...) Unfortunately we don't have the space to dedicate to a 24 hour video programme. Nor for my radio stream. Still we can still play one or two items over night. How about running the Journey Into Space serials from Midnight to Breakfast?

We're running an Eastercon so there are certain things we have to do. Not because they are written in stone or in any charter. There is no Eastercon charter so theoretically we could do whatever we liked. However if we missed off certain things the possibilities of our getting off Jersey alive could be seriously reduced.

We have to have the Masquerade, the Art Auction, the Book Auction and the Bidding session. The Art Auction has to be on Sunday in order to keep the Art Show open for as long as possible while still giving the folks in charge a chance to get the finances sorted out before the end of the Convention. The only similar constraint on the Book Auction that I am currently aware of is that it must not be on at the same time as the Art Auction so we can move that to Saturday. (At least if we can't no one has yet told me. Let's hope that the idea that no one ever reads these things is a myth. If there is a good reason I want to hear about it before it's too late.) The Masquerade has traditionally been on Saturday but I've been told by people in the Costume Workshop that an extra day would give them a chance to do all sorts of extra wonderful things so let's move it to Sunday this year. The Banquet can go on Saturday – this isn't really a Programming matter but we still have to take into account that it may prove difficult to get people to do items against it. Transport problems mean that we can't do a firework display however if anyone can come up with ideas for a spectacular item that we can put on we still have space.

Our guests also add shape. Harry Turtledove's presence naturally leads to thoughts of history, discussions on the American Civil War and the First World War (I've already got volunteers to put an opposing case to his ideas on that.) Brian Stableford makes one consider the sociological impact of science, building consistent and cohesive societies with

politics that seem real without being overly familiar. Peter Weston, of course, brings a mass of information on fandom, who we are, why we are here and in the end does it matter that ‘fings ain’t what they used to be. (Query: were they worse better or just different?) He also knows more silly games and traditions than anyone else I can think of.

Then we have the programming sub-committee and all the bees currently buzzing in our bonnets. We want to start off with the Big Bang and end with the Heat Death Of The Universe or the nearest equivalents we can manage. We want to run a short film appreciation work shop and a pub crawl of Jersey. We want to discuss the motion that scientific progress has been advanced more by poverty than by riches. We want to involve historians, scientists and people who can tell “just so” stories. I want another opportunity to be really rude about Star Trek in front of an audience again (but can probably restrain myself). And we want to run another election to decide who rules the Universe. The current ruler still lives on one of the speaker stacks at Peter and Anne Wright’s house but his batteries are running down and cries of “Yak fat! Yak fat!” still haunt my dreams. (It all makes sense if you were there last time.)
