Some Rules and Regulations...

Posters: Please note that it is hotel policy that no posters of any kind be attached to **any** hotel surface. This includes glass and mirrors. Please only use Illustrious notice boards distributed around the hotel.

Art Show: Please remember that food, drink, and all forms of photography are prohibited in the Art Show.

Artists can retrieve their work between 17:00 and 20:00 on Sunday, and between 09:00 and 12:00 on Monday. Buyers can pick up their purchases immediately after the auction.

Dealers' Room: All our dealers have kindly agreed to accept Groats in exchange for their wares. Please remember that food and drink are prohibited in the Dealers' Room, except for the dealers themselves.

Weapons: As has been at previous conventions for some time now, the weapons policy for Illustrious is that:

No weapon whether edged or projectile firing, or facsimiles thereof will be allowed to be carried at the convention. Light emitting pens or wands may be termed as weapons at the discretion of the Ops team.

A variance this year will be that anyone wishing to attend the Admiralty ball wearing edged side arms may do so as long as the object is peace bonded to the satisfaction of Ops rovers. Since we are near an airport / major conurbation / motorway nexus, and there will be non convention members at the hotel it is with regret that anything that does look like a modern firearm under the rules above will not be allowed.

LARP-safe swords will be allowed, in honour of St. George's Day.

Pole-arms will only be allowed in demonstration areas or as part of a Ball costume.

The Operations teams decision on any of these points is final.

Children: Illustrious has several child-oriented programme items. Please remember, however, that children are their parents' responsibility *at all times*.

The Doc Weir Award 2011

The Doc Weir Award is presented at Eastercon, and is voted on by the attending membership. It's not usual to campaign for the award, and the winner generally has no idea that he or she is up for consideration.

The Doc Weir Award was set up in 1963 in memory of fan Arthur Rose (Doc) Weir, who had died two years previously. Weir was a relative newcomer to fandom, he discovered it late in life - but in the short time of his involvement he was active in a number of fannish areas. In recognition of this, the Award is sometimes seen as the "Good Guy" Award; something for "The Unsung Heroes".

Fandom needs volunteers. Conventions, groups, fanzines, websites - they all require an extensive workforce, people who do "stuff" for no financial reward. Some people have a high-profile role but there are many who don't, whose involvement goes almost unnoticed and may even be taken for granted. In some respects, the ideal Doc Weir Award candidate is the sort of person who doesn't immediately spring to mind but makes perfect sense if somebody else suggests them - and would be absolutely stunned to be deemed worthy of any reward. The list of past winners below should give you an idea.

Vote for somebody who you believe has made some form of contribution to fandom that deserves a little public recognition. The winner receives a silver cup, which they get to keep for a year. They get their name engraved on it (although, with typical fannish efficiency, the winner has to pay to get this done).

Write the name of the person that you wish to nominate for the Award on the form provided, along with your name and convention membership number.

Please return it to the ballot box on Registration or in Ops before 18:00 on Sunday. The Award will be announced at the Closing Ceremony on Monday.

TAFF 2011: The Race To Reno

Among science fiction fandom's oldest institutions, the TransAtlantic Fan Fund was inspired by the 1952 campaign to send Irish űberfan Walt Willis to Chicon II. Conceived as a one-off, it proved such a hit that TAFF was formally set up the following year and. despite the very first winner being unable to make the voyage, westbound and eastbound trips between Europe and North America were successfully organised in 1955 and 1956 respectively. Further exchanges have been held virtually every year since.




At TAFF's heart is the building of bridges between the many and diverse fannish communities, and this year's trip will not only fly a European fan to Nevada for Renovation, the 69th World Science Fiction Convention, but underwrite visits to other fan groups across North America.
