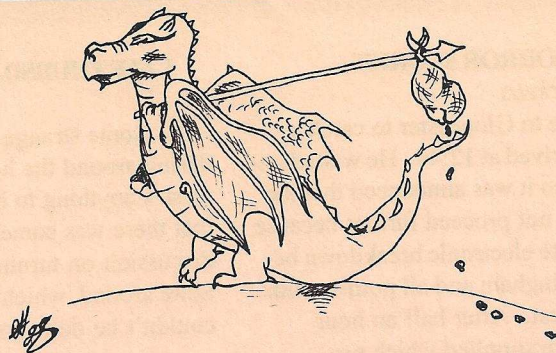

4pm Alice. Czech surrealist Jan Svankmejer's dark version of Alice's Adventures in Wonderland. Mostly done with animated objects (crawling meat, stuffed White Rabbit, stones, etc.) with a live action Alice. Reminiscent of Dave McKean's early Sandman covers. Highly recommended.

6pm Devil Doll. Cult director Tod (Freaks) Browning's early take on the shrinking people sub-genre.

7.0pm Fahrenheit 451: Francois Truffaut's version of Ray Bradbury's look at a society that bans books.

9.45pm: The Thing. John Carpenter's re-make of 50s vampire carrot movie. Shape-changing monster and claustrophobia in an Antarctic research station. Totally ripped off by an X-Files episode.

Saturday

10am: Beyond The Time Barrier. Test-pilot flung into the future and finding human's living underground after the 'cosmic nuclear plague of 1971'.

11.45am: The Navigator: A Medieval Odyssey. Odd, and well worth seeing, story of 14th century Cumbrians who burrow through the Earth and 600 years to avoid the plague. Director Vincent Ward was one the first people to write a script for Alien 3, apparently about a community of monks living on a wooden planet (?).

1.30pm: The War Game. Long banned BBC film about a nuclear strike on Britain.

3pm: The Blob. Amorphous alien (communist) blob goes on rampage.

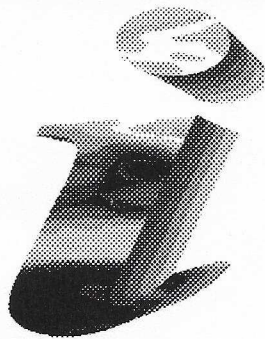

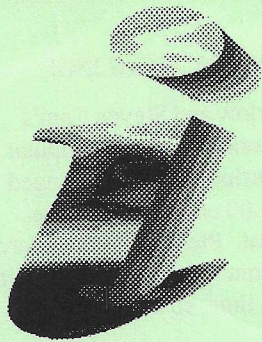

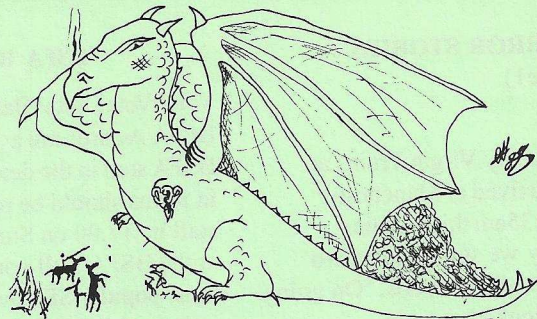

Tech ops have been complaining all day that it was too warm ... shall we tell them that they should go out now?

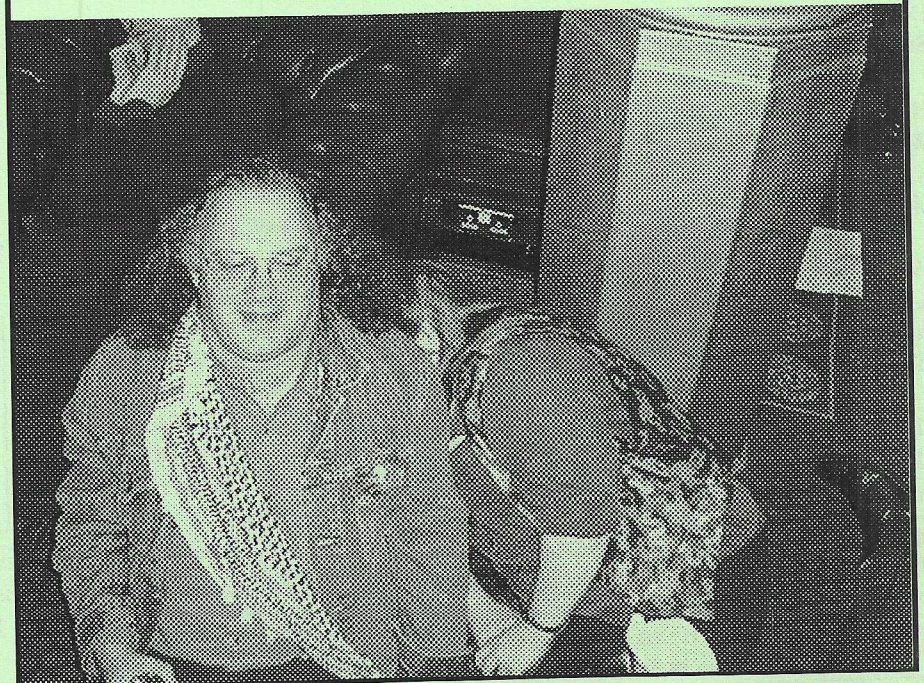

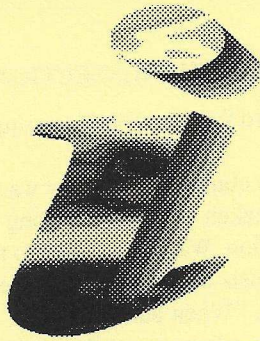

PHILIP K. DICK AWARD

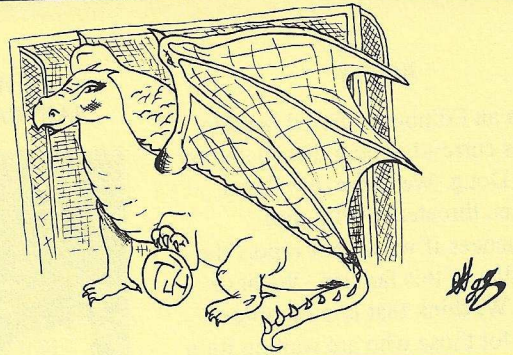

Sunday Morning

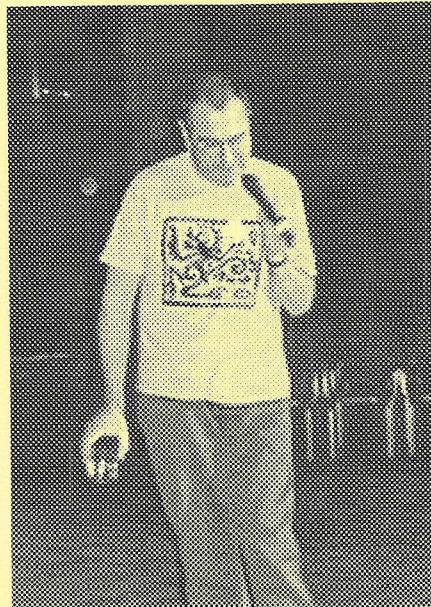

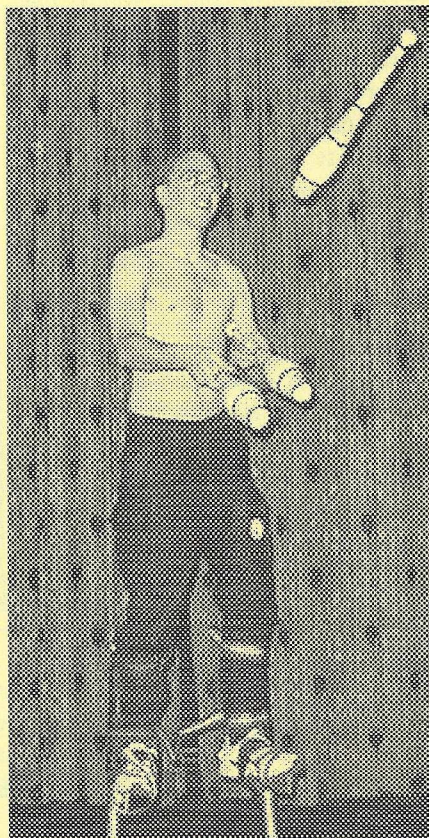
Dragon Building re-scheduled to *Sunday 20:00* in Workshop 1. (Organised by Andrew Longhammer)

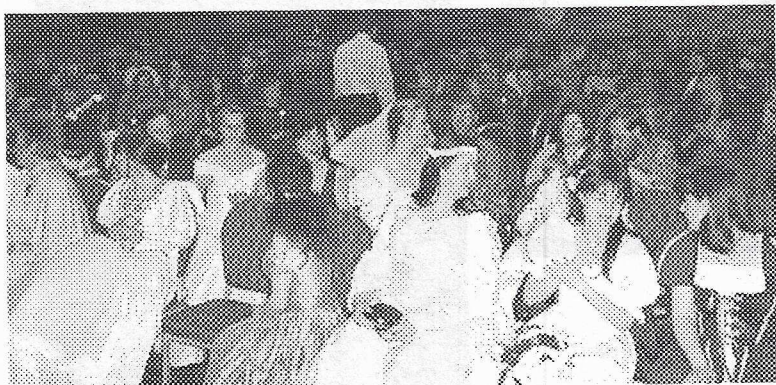

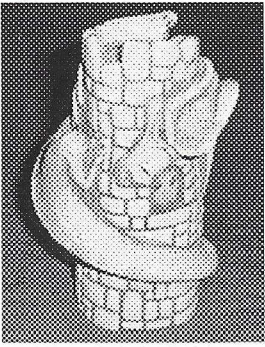

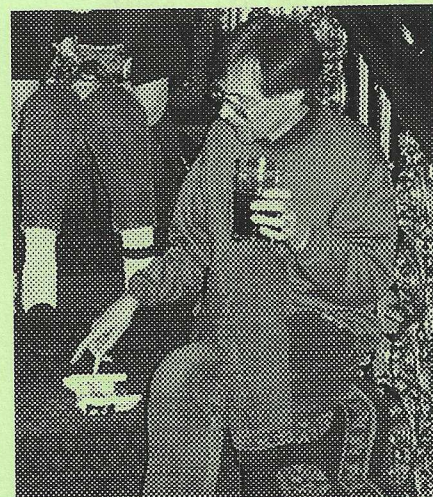
REVIEW
