Home Sweet Home does what only can be described as "American Comfort Food", playing with sweet/savoury combinations. Chicken and Waffles was a wonderful combo of chicken, bacon, waffles and pepper sauce with maple syrup, while the fish tacos were light but not skimpy. The kids menu offered interesting things for a fiver and we left stuffed but impressed at a cost of around £45 for three. Not what we would call allergy friendly. Fans leery of vegetables will be in heaven.

Chinatown is about 15 minutes walk from the hotel and it's full of interesting restaurants. The Hunan was superb, but this isn't your common or garden Cantonese. They'll cook standard restaurant food if you insist, but this is a place where you'll want to eat a la carte. Don't go for the banquet or the Cantonese section. They specialise in the Xiang food of Hunan province. This has a lot of chili in it, vegetarian dishes, smoked bacon and tofu. garlic and hot pots. The restaurant is very friendly and was happy to make dishes with less chili for those of us with a low tolerance. We can recommend: mixed preserved duck egg & beancurd, stir fried aubergine with string beans. If you really want to go off-piste, they have a vast array of offal dishes including more sorts of spicy tripe than you would think possible. Chinese food will never be the same again.

The full adult attending membership is £55, in a special introductory offer that will be short-lived. Lower rates are available for children, young adults and the unemployed. Hotel room rates are £100 for a twin/ double room including breakfast and VAT. You can ioin at their desk on the ground floor, where Mancunicon registration was. The website is not yet operational, but will be at www.eastercon2017.uk.

The 2018 Eastercon will be Follycon from 30 March to 2 April 2018, chaired by Alison Scott. It will be held in the Majestic Hotel in Harrogate. Guests of Honour are Kieron Gillen, Christina Lake, Nnedi Okorafor and Kim Stanley Robinson. Full adult attending membership is £60 until at least 30 November this year, with lower rates for children, young adults and those unwaged for whom paying £60 would be difficult.

Hotel room rates are £115 for a twin/double room, including breakfast and VAT. They also have a desk on the ground floor, but the preferred way of joining is on their website at www.follycon.org.uk. Come to the desk if you want to pay with cash or a cheque.

Pasgon members can obtain cheques refunding their membership from the Pasgon desk in the fan table area until 4pm today.
