FOOD ALONG BATH ROAD

Farah Mendlesohn posted some useful food suggestions to her Livejournal for those wanting to grab food outside of the Radisson Edwardian.

“What I've done is to start at the Heathrow Airport end, and end at the turn off to Hatton Cross. I have placed in bold the ones I think are the best value for money.

“**Three Magpies pub.** Food 11am to 9.30pm. Monday thru Saturday. Sunday food is served 12-9. Pub food £7 entree. Serves London pride and bombardier. Basic malts.

“Park Inn: in foyer bar salads, burgers, pasta and bar food (12-20) offers a veggie burger. Also French restaurant £16-30 but offers Sunday lunch for £9.95.

“Small Somerfield at Texaco Garage and then if you turn right there is a pizza place set back from the road, also **Sovereign Food and Wine shop** which makes sandwiches to order and sells take away curry and salads. (curries £6, sandwiches (£2.50). A nicer shop than it looks from outside.

“Marriott: Illy coffee bar which sells sandwiches; American grill (£13-20); Tuscan Ristorante (£17-25)

“Sheraton: Starbucks in the lobby; **sports bar (lunch on Sat and Sun only) has sandwiches and curries (£10-15)**; Al Dente lounge sandwiches and salads (£10-13); restaurant (lunch £15-20) dinner one course £17, 2=£22, 3=£26)

“Renaissance: entrees £16-24. Sandwiches and burgers £10-13.

“The next two are further up the road. I know nothing about the Holiday Inn but the Ibis has a rep for being cheaper than the others.”

For those looking for the nearest shops, if you tried the small Somerfield petrol station on Bath Road in vain this morning: the shop was just closed to the public this morning, due to repair work being carried out on the main entrance door. However, they assure us they'll be open again from 3pm and they're usually open 24 hours.

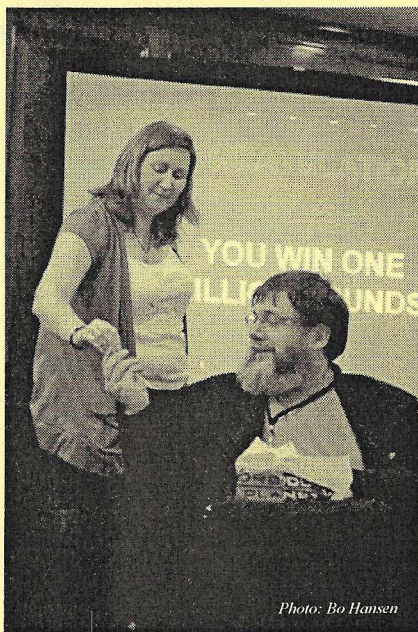

Sunday 4pm in room 41 is "What do we Mean when we say Mainstream: Iain Banks's black and white novels" Chris Hill, Abigail Nussbaum, Graham Sleight, Ruth O'Reilly, Farah Mendlesohn.

Sunday 9pm in Room 42 is a screening of Shark Attack! – a John Barrowman classic (???)

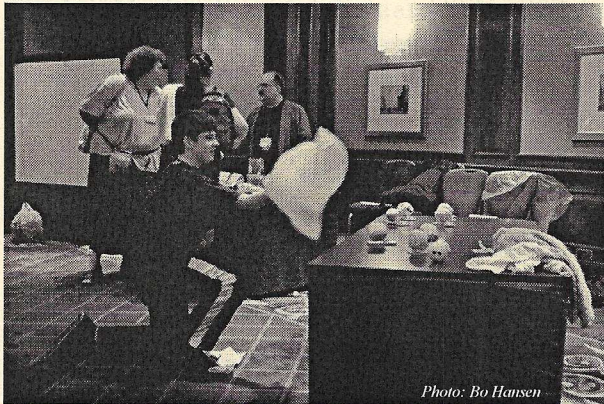

We're sure you went to even better panels, but you should have told us about them if you wanted to have them reviewed in *The Sentinel*, instead of waiting for us to pop by and spend our time on rather more random other sessions.

We can happily report there was much random chaos going on in the Hitchhiker Games at 4 pm today, where towel origami took off like a speedy jet, and the crew went out to get bags of extra towels from the hotel to satisfy popular demand by those who didn't bring their own DON'T PANIC towel. How can you even leave home without it?!

The well-advertised *Naming Pluto* showing was well-attended at 3 pm, in the small video room 42, aptly named, seeing the above paragraph! The TV screen was not formatted properly to the 16x9 format, which may be something for Tech to take a look at for the next showing on Sunday at 11 am. It's a short, sweet little programme that is well worth watching and at the 13 minute running time, it's well worth watching it at the right aspect ratio. If it doesn't clash with your fannish priorities, catching the second viewing is highly recommended by this reporter.

Earlier today attendees were still pouring into the building by the truckload, and the parking lot is overstuffed with fannish cars. We can't exactly see on the outside of the car that they are fannish, but it stands to reason that when prodded

Personally I'd love to see some Torino stripes or even a Confederate flag on the top of an orange car, but that's just the media fan in me. Things like that may just get a chuckle out of most of the serious SF attendees at best, or the shaking of the head, and moving on to the Animatronics—Artificial Intelligence panel, which was run at 12 pm.

On the subject of fringe things, there is definitely some random knitting going on at this convention, apparently a need that can't be suppressed, as witnessed by the Stitch'n'Bitch session in Henley's Drawing room on Sunday at 1 pm and the Sock Knitting workshop at 7 pm, also on Sunday. There are quite a few sessions involving knitting, including the early morning craft sessions every day, with a dead serious session on the knitted alien race, the Clangers on Monday at 3 pm! So if you didn't take knitting seriously now (or your friend who knits and you're baffled as to what s/he likes about it), that should drive the point home.

From rumours around the convention this reporter estimated the attendance at the *Doctor Who* Easter Special showing Saturday night will be over 90% of the convention. Let's hope the main hall can provide good seating and video for this mammoth event. Going by the murmurs in the hallways, there is already grumbling about *Doctor Who* clashing with the buffet dinner. The verdict on the empty stomach is unanimous: *Doctor Who* wins, hands down, so expect the buffet to be poorly attended until *Doctor Who* is over.

The Main Hall is looking good, still as oblong as it ever was, which chased media conventions away in the past (sorry, Radisson! History is fact, deal with it). Perhaps this superlative Eastercon can make the Main Hall work for its panels and showings. I talked to Tech and they say the sound, even in the far back of the auditorium, is as good as it gets. To my untrained, fannish ears, it sounds g-o-o-d! Much better than the media cons I attended. Those with poor eyesight might want to get in early and sit at the front, because the hall is very long. MEANWHILE, ELSEWHERE

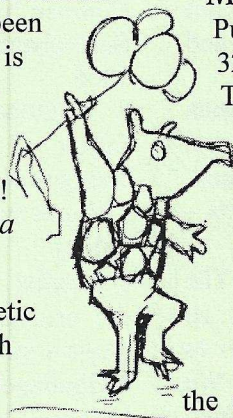
Punjabi Spice

320 Bath Road, Hounslow - 2.5 miles

This place is not on the Outside Readme list but is worth a short drive. The food is very good (the *murg saagwala* and basmati rice were excellent), there's nothing wrong with the service and the prices are reasonable; for two starters and two main courses plus two Pepsis and two Kingfisher lagers we paid £40, including a generous tip. The vegetarian menu is exceptionally long and the spiciness of main courses can be specified when you order. I didn't particularly enjoy the Bollywood soundtrack but you may, and it wasn't overbearing.

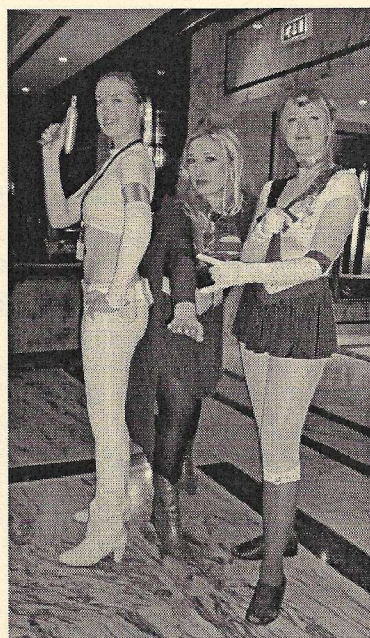
GEORGE HAY LECTURE

This year's George Hay lecture was on Geoengineering. Oliver Morton, a British science writer and editor, brought us an illustrated lecture, centering on the Sublime. The Sublime of what, you may ask? The Sublime of everything, of course.

The growth of technology has given us many options to control our climate. Most of the concepts before the 1960s seem to have involved controlled nuclear explosions. In the 1950s for instance they were trying to get more water available. They thought nothing of triggering a Nuclear Winter in order to affect the climate change they wanted.

Recently, blocking out the sun has been considered, to limit the green-house effect, but doing it with a destructive explosion is just not the way to go anymore. Nukes are out, artificially triggered clouds are in. I don't pretend to know how it's done, but the result is a lot more clouds, which block out the sun, so the oceans don't warm up as much. If the oceans remain at a lower temperature, less energy will escape from the Earth's surface. The last option is to use sulfur oxides, like a volcano spitting plumes, which blocks out the Sun very well. Talk to the people of Pompeii about that. The modern 21st century way of dispersing the sulfur would be to throw planes up high at the edge of the atmosphere, to reduce the amount of sunlight. That's the concept I walked away from the lecture with. Where the sublime came into this, just didn't come across.

Fusion Power and the Joint European Torus, a seminar on where the development of Fusion Power currently stands, half-filled Commonwealth with fusion enthusiasts. Anthony Webster talked about the new bigger, badder, faster, hotter, colder ITER reactor that is under construction at the moment, with an estimated startup of 2018. ITER is an almost full-sized development reactor, which will allow development of the materials and experience necessary for commercial applications of power generation. Anthony waxed lyrical about lots of cool facts like using the Lithium metal inside the reactor to generate the Tritium needed for the reaction with Deuterium, using the neutron emitted from the formation of Helium. For those not in the know: Helium is the end product of the fusion reaction, so that's pretty much what we were wanting from the ITER; oh, and lots of heat, which gets turned into lots of power. Yay, ITER!

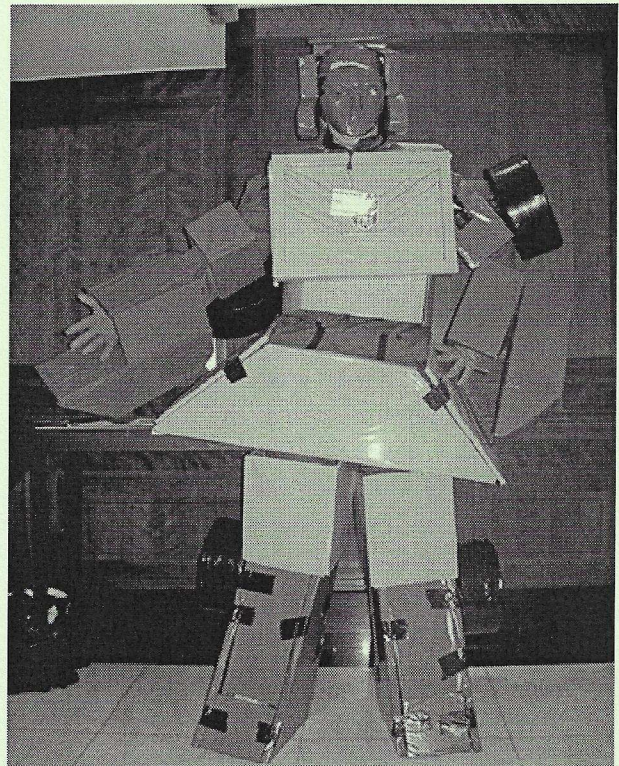

ASPIRATIONS

The BBC Writer's Room is the place for aspiring tv, film, radio and stage writers, so sayeth Piers Beckly. "We will read anything, so send us your unsolicited scripts!" he repeated a few times, and we believe him. They maintain a team of freelance writers to look at each and every script that comes in, barring a few exceptions, such as a script that's been sent in before, or anything over 130 pages.

We don't want to make their freelance readers cry. Actually these readers aren't just Joe Blogs trying to make a buck; these are script writers who have at least five years of experience.

Piers explained the methods, which can be found along with loads of other information at the BBC Writer's Room website. Their function is to help new writers get into the business. It sounds better and better, really! But don't be fooled, you first have to write your great script, then send in your great script. And while you wait for a response you should go on to write your next great script."

Do's. Active, compelling main characters, and a visceral reaction from the reader, are musts!

Don'ts. Don't rehash old concepts, such as dead cop comes back from the dead to set up his own CSI unit, unless you are absolutely amazingly different (*Life On Mars* as a spin on the old time-travel concept - granted it took 40 rewrites and 7 years to turn 'let's do a time-travel show' into 'Year 2000 cop wakes up in the 70s and he knows it!').

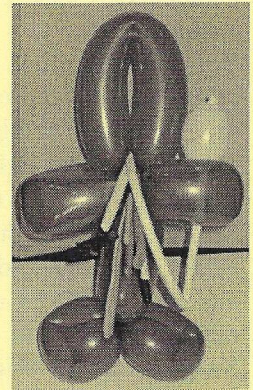

WRITING FOR AUDIO, ON SUNDAY EVENING.

Audio story telling is popular in the UK, as witnessed by the many radio plays routinely brought to the public, particularly by Radio 4 and Radio 7. Philip Palmer, TV and radio writer, says, "Radio 7 has a good reason for existing, as Radio 4 doesn't have time for SF, as it concentrates predominantly on mainstream, ignoring the sub-genres. BBC radio still have a public service ethos, they do it for the love of it. They are the good guys, but they could love radio more." The love would preferably be expressed by larger budgets, of course. "Audio is done on a shoestring budget and it is perfect for internet, but the BBC doesn't trust that yet. Ideally we would want all past audio plays available for download." Jack Bowman, of Wireless, an independent audio production company, comments, "If you put audio out on the net the right way, it really works. Don't forget, Radio is the bread and butter of the acting community here in the UK, and a great writing resource." So writers who want to get into audio drama should definitely get into the genre. Paul Cornell is involved with the Doctor Who audios, and James Swallow is involved with Big Finish. Big Finish produces tie-in audio, most notably Blake's 7, Stargate and Highlander.

"What you need for a good radio story is great visuals, great drama, and great pace," says James. "With the larger budget from Big Finish we can use cracking sound design, which can illustrate believably cool like planets exploding, London going up in smoke and the world being overrun by aliens. One could probably even do shagging very well on radio, if the actors give it a good go."

One question we all wanted to know was: are audio producing companies open to new writers and new scripts. "Wireless has an open scripts policy," says James. "We will consider anything, we support all new talent at Wireless." Philip informs us that the BBC is very receptive to new writers, even if their pitching process is so convoluted that Philip still doesn't know how it works, as he falls asleep any time it is explained to him. "SF writers and novellists generally are welcome in the medium."

James Bowman adds, "If you want to write for audio, tell a great story."

DESIGNING FANNISH CURRENCY

Despite a few technical hitches this talk by Fan Guest of Honour John Dowd was very informative. It was striking how almost all the examples of con money relied on trust. The only occasion any effort was made to stop the possibility of forgery was with the Worldcon. Another important point in creating desirable currency was its souvenir appeal, with many fans collecting their tokens as souvenir, an important consideration on the budgeting front.

ONE MINUTE PAST EIGHT: A SUNDAY ODYSSEY

This filmed version of the convention tribute to the Space Odyssey movies *2001* and *2010*, was produced by David Wake, who took the role of Bowman. I will avoid spoiling future con-goers' pleasure, as this movie is well worth bringing at future conventions.

The first hour was a broad scene-by-scene pastiche of *2001: A Space Odyssey*, so well-known that the laughs came easily and often. I especially liked the allusions to other Kubrick movies, e.g. the appearance of a droog from *A Clockwork Orange*.

At the moment when Leonard Rossiter was due on as a Russian, he came on as Reggie Perrin as well! Dr. Strangelove appeared later.

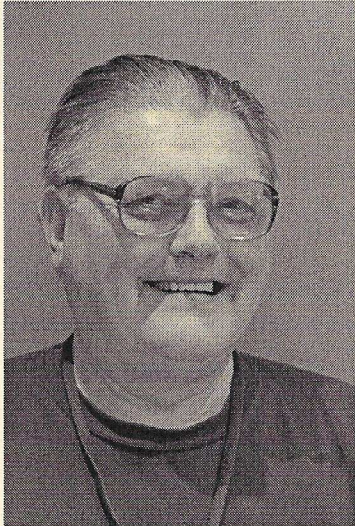
Congratulations to the Choir who sang a wordless chorale in the style of Ligeti, and to the CGI team who created the Ultimate Trip.

The author tackled a domestic dispute at Heywood Floyd's home in several dramatic styles, recalling Ionescu's Theatre of the Absurd and Brecht's alienation technique. At the climax, the choir performed *Thus Spake Zarathustra* very well. In both movies, characters in tubby costumes circulated as the sun and the planets - a great 'poor theatre' concept! The credits displayed an exceptionally large cast of fans, many still active in fandom today. Well done - this movie deserves to run and run.

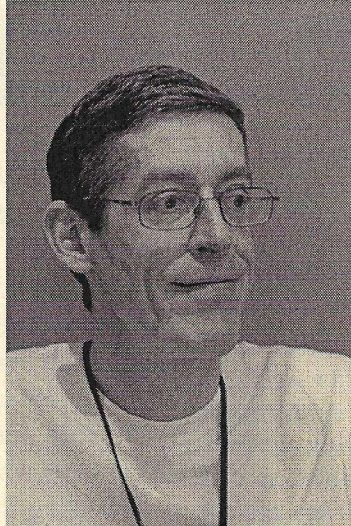
