



Welcome to Orbital 2008...

...the 59th British National Science Fiction Convention (Eastercon) at the Radisson Edwardian, Heathrow. This Read Me and Programme Guide contains all the vital information you will need for the con.

There is a separate booklet containing the programme grid and hotel maps.

The information in this booklet was correct when we went to press, but as usual, there are bound to be last minute alterations. Watch the notice boards around the convention and the newsletter for changes.

Please note: The hotel appears to use "Ground Floor" and "1st floor" interchangeably. To keep consistent, this Read-Me refers to the entrance level as the ground floor.

Ops

For those of you new to conventions, the Operations Room is the main convention office. If you have any problems or questions or you need to get in touch with someone running the convention, please go to Ops who will try to help you out. The Ops Room is in the Windsor Suite on the 3rd floor.

Badges

It is essential that you wear your badge at all times. You may be challenged by convention staff if you do not. If you lose your badge, please go to Ops as soon as possible. If you find a badge around the con, please hand it in to Ops.

The Justice Department

This is Orbital's own Security Service. We are here to make sure you, and everyone else, has fun while observing all the rules and policies. We are happy to answer questions whilst we are "on the beat"; however, we will deliver swift, fair but ruthless justice when needed. No, seriously now, if you would like to join us and help around the convention, we will be running a few departmental briefings over the first part of the weekend to give you information, or you can pop by The Justice Department Armoury (OK, Ops).

Groats:

If you work for the convention you may be given groats as a "thank you". Groats have a value of £1 and may be used to pay for food and drink in the hotel. Some dealers have agreed to accept groats as well.

Read Me Replacement

If you lose this Read Me please come to Ops for a replacement. The Justice Department will impose a Community Service Order on you. You will be asked to sign up for a one hour work shift for the convention.

Feedback Sessions

If you have any problems at the con, please come to Ops. In addition we have arranged a short feedback session on Saturday and Sunday mornings at 9:30 in the Wentworth, when a member of the committee will be available to take questions and sort out any issues.

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Hotel

Food

Breakfast: served daily in the Brasserie (and overflow into the Newbury suites) between 8am and 10:30am daily.

Lunch/Afternoon: sandwiches, baps, etc. will be served in the Newbury 1 and the Atrium between 11am and 5:30pm daily. Prices will vary between £2 and £6. There are also hot options e.g. Jacket Potatoes and a Salad Bar available in Newbury 1 only. Vegetarian / Vegan choices are also available.

Dinner: a convention buffet will be served in the Brasserie and Newbury between 5:30pm and 7:30pm, with a special rate of £8 for a main course and a dessert. Tickets need to be bought in advance at reception for this meal. After 7:30pm the Brasserie will be open serving the hotel's regular menu.

NB. On **Friday** there will be limited seating for the buffet as there is an event in the Newbury 1. We will be using Newbury 2 instead but as this is not wheelchair accessible so wheelchair users should go to the Brasserie for the con food. We strongly recommend that you arrive early.

Evening: sandwiches, Baps etc. will be available in the Atrium from 8pm to 10pm.

Late night: hot snacks will be available between 11pm and 1am in the Atrium which will include bacon rolls, sausage / veggie sausage in a bun etc. for £2 each.

Outside the Hotel: a list of a few local restaurants is included in your registration pack.

Con Bars:

There are three Con Bars serving drinks at special con prices. There are: The Edwardian Lounge (Real Ale Bar), Newbury 1 and The Atrium. **NB. Henley's Bar, next to reception, and the Polo Bar will NOT be serving at con prices.**

Bar Times: 11am-2am. After 2am, if there is demand, the bar may stay open and will continue to accept cash but only from residents.

Gym and Pegasus Spa

Once you have spent all your groats, have eaten far too much, have drunk yourself into the ground, and broken every government recommendation, you may have a spark of conscience and decide a fitness regime is called for.

The hotel fitness centre is available to all residents for free. Opening times are 7am-8pm. Spa treatments are available but you are advised to book in advance.

Shop

The hotel shop will be open 9am-8pm Friday to Monday and it sells a wide range of products including aspirin, indigestion tablets, condoms, toothbrushes, feminine sanitary products, herbal sleeping tablets, chocolates (both things like mars bars and boxes of Guylian), mints, chewing gum, cans of drink, London souvenirs, tobacco products and a wide range of other things including underwear!

Television

Please note, Sky One is not available in the Hotel bedrooms.

Checkout

All guests staying in the Radisson must check out by 11am on the day of departure.

Car Parking

We have negotiated a discounted parking rate at the Radisson Edwardian of £5 for a 24 hour period for all convention attendees. Parking periods end when you leave the car park. (Therefore, if you leave the car park and return, please be aware that you will start a new 24 hour period on returning, regardless of whether you are still in a previously paid for 24 hour period.)

Buses

The Radisson Edwardian is within the Heathrow free travel zone. To travel to and from the Airport Central Bus Station you can catch buses 105, 111, 140 or 285 and the 555, 556 and 557.

A taxi to the airport can be called via reception. The Hotel Hoppa bus service (H3) runs from the hotel (and the overflows) to the airport for £4 per person.

Childcare

We are providing free, professional, child care run by Rainbow (courtesy of pass-along funds from Contemplation) on the ground floor in the Ascot room.

If there are more children than places, then priority will be given to those who told us their child care requirements before the convention.

Rainbow may be able to organise baby-sitting. If you wish to use this, then give them as much advance warning as possible.

Disabled Facilities

Orbital wishes to thank Electrical Eggs for their help in preparing for this convention.



The North lifts, near the North Entrance to the hotel, are large enough to take a standard sized scooter; the lifts in the West wing of the hotel are not but may take an ordinary wheelchair.

Orbital has arranged for access to be installed in the Atrium and in the lower part of the Newbury 1. There is no access to the upper tiers of the Newbury 1 or Newbury 2. There very few programme items in these areas and the few that are (like Author signings) will have alternative sessions arranged for people with mobility problems. We will reserve areas in the main programme rooms for wheelchairs but please turn up in plenty of time for the most popular items.

There is an induction loop in the Commonwealth Suite. This encloses around 20 seats which are reserved for people with hearing problems and their friends. Please speak to Tech for more information.

The Orbital disability officer is Marcia Illingworth and she will have a desk in the Dealers' Room to provide assistance and answer any questions you may have. If you have requested any special assistance prior to the con, please visit the desk to sort out you requirements.

Newsletter

The newsletter will be situated in the Shakespeare Room in the Business Centre on the 3rd floor. Please take items for publication there. Photos may be submitted to a member of the team. Newsletter staff will wear a Newsletter badge and will be around the convention on their laptops and in the Newsletter office. They will welcome any contributions.

Mobile Phones

Please turn off or silence mobile phones when you attend or participate in a programme item.

Orbital Martian War

You may have noticed that your badge has either a blue, green or red colour on it. This shows whether or not you are in the Blue, Green or Red Martian team for the weekend. There are various activities in which you can take part, including most of the games and competitions, that will earn you points for your team. These should be given to your team leaders, who will be introduced at the opening ceremony, and will be wearing an appropriately coloured sash for most of the convention.

There are few rules in this competition. Cheating, for example, while not specifically allowed, is not actually banned either. In fact, if any cheating is particularly innovative, it might even earn extra points. Reporting people for cheating, however, is considered bad form and could lead to a deduction of points.

There may be other rules but you will find these out when you break them

Smoking

It is illegal to smoke in public enclosed areas such as restaurants, bars and hotels in the UK. No smoking in any enclosed areas of the hotel including bars, hallways and function rooms. Designated hotel bedrooms are exempt.

Green Room

Please arrive at the Green Room approximately 15 minutes before your programme item is due to start. This will enable you to meet your fellow participants and order any refreshments.

The green room will close at 10pm each night, so if you are on a programme item later than that please go to the green room before that to claim your drink then or a goat to purchase it later.

Weapons Policy

No weapons, replicas, facsimiles of weapons or items that could be perceived to be a weapon by a member of the public, will be allowed to be carried at Orbital; nor will any other object the committee deems to be dangerous. **Hall costumes are not exempt.**

The committee has the final say as to what constitutes a weapon and reserves the right to revoke the membership of anyone who refuses to comply with this policy. Items that are obviously toys (brightly coloured plastics and foam rubber etc), and do not shoot projectiles, are not included in these restrictions. If in any doubt, check with Ops.

The only exceptions will be for members intending to use a weapon (or a facsimile) as part of the Masquerade or an **approved** programme item. No guns or operational lasers will be allowed under any circumstances. Please check with the Masquerade organiser. If a weapon is required in any other programme item you should have cleared it with the Head of Programme **BEFORE** the convention. It should be taken to Ops to be logged on arrival. Weapons for programme items should be carefully wrapped when carrying between a hotel room and the item.

Please also be aware of the very high level of security at UK airports and the surrounding areas and take extra precautions when carrying anything that may **look** like a weapon to or from your car, from another hotel, on public transport (in fact, best advice for public transport may be *don't*) or around the public areas of the hotel. Weapons may be left in Secure Store for your convenience but at your own risk.



Photo/video/recording Policy

We ask everyone to be considerate of others. Unless otherwise requested, flash photography is allowed for the first five minutes of an item so that photos may be taken for the Souvenir Book.

Around the convention:

1. Do not use a flash without asking, as it can leave someone 'flash-blind'.
2. Do not make a video without getting permission
3. Please do not put video or pictures of individuals on the internet without express agreement.
4. Group shots are OK, but it's polite to ask individuals before taking their pictures.
5. You may take non-flash photos of programme items unless it is specifically mentioned otherwise at the start of the item. Disable any electronic camera noises if possible.
6. Flash photography is *explicitly restricted* during the Masquerade, as flash-blindness is a particular risk while members are wearing costumes that might reduce their vision or mobility. There will be a separate photo-call at the end of the Masquerade, when you can take pictures.

Posters Policy

This policy applies to any posters, signs, or anything that's attached. Note that some of this is imposed upon us by our contract with the hotel.

1. No posters are allowed in the public areas of the hotel.
2. You can only put posters onto hard surfaces - not wallpaper.
3. Use white-tac to attach things, not glue, tape, staples, nails, egg-white, etc.
4. No stickers.
5. Posters must be restrained/tasteful, look professional, and *not* be hand-written.
6. Do not obscure hotel or Orbital signs.

Voting

BSFA Awards at Orbital

The British Science Fiction Association's awards are traditionally presented at the Eastercon, and Eastercon members as well as members of the BSFA itself are entitled to vote for the awards. (But you only get one vote even if you're a member of both!)

This year the awards will be presented on Saturday at 6 pm in the Royal Suite; come along to see what will be voted the best novel, best short fiction, and best artwork of 2007 – and which book wins the BSFA's special fiftieth anniversary award for the best novel of 1958. As usual, the shortlists for all the awards were formed from nominations made by BSFA members.

There's still time to vote at the convention if you haven't sent in a ballot in advance. Votes will be accepted until 3 pm on Saturday, and you should find a ballot box and voting forms at the BSFA table in the dealers' room and at registration. Full details about how to vote are on the form; remember to include your name (not badge name) and Orbital membership number.

Doc Weir

A ballot form for the Doc Weir Award should be found in your registration pack. Please submit your form to the box at Registration by midday on Monday.

All-Weekend Events

Apart from the Martian War (see page 5) the following items will be running all weekend. Please see notices on the Fan Boards outside the Edwardian Lounge (and/or in the Games Room if appropriate) for further details.

Weekend Sci-Fi Quiz The E21 weekend sci-fi quiz. Fifty questions on the wall outside the Edwardian room. Answer sheets there too. Study the questions and write down your answers, then return the answer sheet by Sunday evening for marking. Prize for the person or team with highest scores. Using the internet to find the answers is banned!

Second Life - The plan is to try broadcasting a few of the major ceremonies and events of the con in video format, so international fen can watch the proceedings in Second Life.

Easter Eggs in Orbit There are hollow coloured Easter eggs hidden all over the hotel. Each egg contains a gift. If you find an egg, the gift is yours, but you must replace it with something interesting and put the egg back - a gift for the next person who finds it. There's a list on the wall outside the Edwardian room which should build into a list of the strangest things discovered in the Easter eggs.

The Masquerade is where you get to show off your fantastic costumes, and it's followed by the Cabaret where you can entertain your fellow fans with your skills at, well, whatever you do that's entertaining. If you're planning on entering either (or both), please come along to one of the sign-up sessions (Friday 6pm, Hampstead and Saturday 11am, Harlington), so Tech can slot you into the running order and prepare the music and lighting etc.

Don't forget the rehearsal from 5pm on Saturday in the Commonwealth.

Chaos Costume Workshop

If you wish to enter the Masquerade and do not have a costume, or you wish to refine the costume you have, please visit the Chaos Costume workshop in the Kempton Suite on the ground floor. Here there will be materials, and volunteers happy to help you.

Hall Costumes

Saturday is "Hall Costume Day". If you see someone with a costume you admire, you can give them one (or more) of the Hall Costume tokens that came in your con pack. Costumers should hand in their tokens (with name and badge number on the back) to Ops by 12 noon on Sunday. The winner will be announced at the closing ceremony.

Adult Programming

Some items are adults only. No member under 18 will be admitted to these events. The Silver Clay workshop has age restrictions as it requires the use of firing torches. Also due to the equipment in use, there are certain restrictions in the Chaos Robotics Workshop.

We'll be looking at various techniques, including at least one purely decorative tie from the Japanese 'shibari' tradition. Each workshop will be independent and you do not have to attend all of them. Rope will be available to buy. No removal of clothing, no children and no photography.

Chaos Robotics Workshop

Beyond Cyberdrome needs your help to build a scale model of the City of the Future from Lego, K'Nex, and recycled packaging. You can find us in the Cheltenham room all through the con. Kids welcome as long as they are accompanied by a responsible adult. The finished diorama will be shown at the Great Crystal Cyberdrome Exhibition on Monday afternoon.

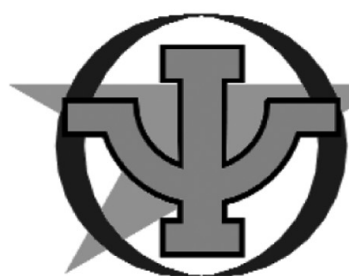
