

One thing I will not miss is writing these pieces. I warned you all at the beginning that I cannot (or should not) write. Oops did I say that out loud.


In this PR

We have the all important travel instructions and latest hotel information. We do have rooms for multiple occupancy, doubles, twins and triples, left in the main Hotel. So if you haven't booked book now.

Programme, accessibility and fanroom information are there to help you plan your Paragon especially Friday night. Note the requests for your participation that needs planning in advance.

As I write, foot and mouth outbreaks have reached double figures and are rising daily. There are outbreaks in Leicestershire. We have been advised that the motorway, roads and the hotel will not be affected by travel restrictions but most of the countryside attractions nearby are already closed as are footpaths near the hotel. Fortunately we have a good hotel and a good programme. We may have to stay in the bar.

How to get there



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The Hanover International Hotel is located on the A5 about 300yds south of junction 1 on the M69 on the left.

From North (M1 southbound)

Leave M1 at junction 21 onto M69. Exit M69 at junction 1. Turn left onto A5 (signposted London and Milton Keynes).

From North (M6 southbound)

Leave M6 at junction 2 onto M69. Exit M69 at junction 1. Turn right onto A5 (signposted London and Milton Keynes).

By Air

East Midlands and Birmingham airports are a similar distance from the Hotel. Several local taxi firms have expressed a willingness to collect people from either for a fare of between £21 and £30 pounds. They have all said that a booking should be made with flight times and numbers. It should be possible to get a taxi on spec at the airport. Link Cars (01332814225) at East Midlands quote a fare of £32 and say that a taxi may be booked but are usually available on request.

Bus Travel

National coaches do not go to Hinckley. Only one local bus comes within a half mile of the Hotel. This does not run on Sundays or Bank Holidays. It does not run early mornings or evenings. We cannot recommend even thinking about buses.

From South (M40 northbound) recommended by members of our committee coming from west London

Leave M40 at junction 15 onto A46 for 19 miles. Turn onto the A45 for 2 miles. Turn back onto the A46 for a further 7 miles. Join the M69 at Junction on the M6. Exit M69 at junction 1. Turn right onto A5 (signposted London and Milton Keynes).

From South (M5 northbound)

Leave M5 at junction 4a onto M42. Exit M42 at junction 7 onto M6 (southbound). Exit M6 at junction 2 onto M69. Exit M69 at junction 1. Turn right onto A5 (signposted London and Milton Keynes).

From South (M1 northbound)

Leave M1 at junction 21 onto M6. Exit M6 at junction 2 onto M69. Exit M69 at junction 1. Turn right onto A5 (signposted London and Milton Keynes).

By Rail

Hinckley Railway station is about 2 miles from the hotel. Direct trains run from Birmingham, Coventry and Nottingham.

Frequency is approximately half hourly in the morning and evening peak periods

and hourly at other times. Not all trains stop at Hinckley. Services may be reduced for the Bank Holidays and engineering work over the Easter weekend and train times and availability should be confirmed with the railway companies booking systems. Nuneaton station is a little further away but has a more frequent rail service. It seems that Virgin intercity from London via Nuneaton is cheaper than Midland mainline via Leicester.

Taxis at Hinckley may be obtained from the taxi hut (the unmarked brick building on the left of the station drive just beyond the parking area) or from a freephone in the Somerfield supermarket next to the station.

Taxi Fare from Nuneaton station is £9, From Hinckley £4.

Hotel Acessibility

First, this place has my total thumbs up for accessibility, design, comfort in both bedrooms, con areas and public areas - and my favourite, the pool and jacuzzi! They are also, I was told by the hotel liaison lady who escorted me round, used to running many Special Needs conferences for schools so are well aware of the needs of the disabled.

It is all built on the flat with slight slope up or down to new levels but these are hardly noticeable. Corridors in public areas are decently wide too which is nice.

My only warning is there is a fair bit of walking from the main restaurant to the conventions rooms and bedrooms, so if you have walking problems, really do consider hiring a wheelchair from the Red Cross as there are not chairs or seating along the route.

The hotel itself is an interesting building, a mix of part park with associated glass hot houses - you think - and exterior exotic pool/lake, a fountain, and a smooth tiled approach to the main entrance and glassed area. Was a short "walk" in my chair to the entrance - disabled spaces could be nearer but the hotel can do something I am sure. Certainly there is a drop off area for those not driving their own cars like me.

Once inside, I was stunned by the enormous and lovely reception lounge, complete with resident Greek God. Why they chose Poseidon to hold up the ceiling rather than Atlas or a Titan is strange, but he's certainly imposing. This is also a lounging area for afternoon teas with small tables. Off it is a fully glass sided area they plan to use as an overflow breakfast area I believe - again beautiful.

The restaurant is off this area and again very pleasant by any comparisons with previous venues, and easily accessible for the disabled in a wheelchair like me.

Access to all the main con areas is down a long corridor with small fake shop windows set in it called Main Street. I felt this was much more an American Conference centre than a British hotel. That's a positive comment by the way, having seen a few US centres and many British hotels by now. :)

There is a shop in the hotel for essentials, and buying the gifts on display in the fake windows. The pool is gorgeous and semitropical, I believe part of their Health Centre which also operates separately from the hotel side.

The Rotunda will be the main gathering area and doesn't have the homely comfort of the reception area but it is very well lit from natural light and the white walls, plenty of soft seating and is one of those areas everyone at some time has to go through so is ideal for the main con lounge. Central to it is a spiral staircase up to the rooms plus just off it are the lifts.

I was shown a couple of the ground floor bedrooms and they are very nice and roomy no shoe boxes here! The normal twin/ doubles had more than enough room for me to have my wheel chair in overnight and for 2 folk to move around.

Convention rooms are ramped too, whether by design or the hotel's own mobile ramps, with good access doors. Rooms are good sizes and pleasant to be in from what I remember.

Yes there are two smaller function rooms up a steep flight of stairs, but as the con will not use them for anything essential to members, that in itself is no problem. No hotel can be perfect, but this one is really lovely. To be honest, I liked it as much as the Adelphi in Liverpool from a Con-goers view point for the great central lounge where you can see most people passing through at some point, corridors not too narrow, access good for all public areas we are using etc.

Last word, The Snooty Fox bar is very small and cosy. Please be aware of disabled fans in wheelchairs and let them in too. It's easy to not even notice us when in our chairs we only reach up to waist level on you tall lads.

APPEARANCES ARE DECEPTIVE - A Profile of Lisanne Norman

Imagine a fragile-looking elfin woman with long blonde hair, nervously arriving at a Coventry hotel. She wants to be a writer and has been told to go there by Ken Slater and make friends with a few. Her first encounters are with Anne McCaffrey and Andrew Stephenson before fleeing to find her room. She doesn't recognise either of them. She doesn't recognise Chris Priest, either. This doesn't sound like the Lisanne Norman I know.

This was in 1977 and it was Lisanne's first convention. I was the chairman. An encounter in a lift with Ken Bulmer turned the waif into an Amazon. He commented that a pretty girl like her ought to be in the masquerade. The next year, she was and at the World Con in Brighton in 1979 she was one of the three Amazons of Darkover (attacked by two baddies) who took the award for Best Dramatic Action. She still has the sword that helped her slash her way to recognition, though it took six years before she could afford to buy it. Lisanne Norman is a dangerous lady.

Away from conventions, Lisanne honed her battle skills. For eighteen years, from Easter to October she fought on battle fields up and down the country at Viking shows. She can handle swords a long dane axe and a bow and arrows with proficiency and lead her own unit, rising to Jarl in the Viking Society. Her most recent appearance on the field was at the Battle of Hastings in October 2000 - as a Saxon archer (she would have much preferred to fighting for the Normans at the bottom of the hill; and they only won because they cheated).

Lisanne Norman is a Saxon! Not really - she is a Scot. Born in Glasgow in 1951 she comes from an artistic family - her brother creates wonderful pictures, and studied jewellery design at

the Glasgow School of Art before heading south. She used to make silver jewellery, and sew her own costumes, done leather carving and painting (she has sold a few paintings at convention art shows). In the hallway of her home are the murals she has created based on a Cretan theme.

So she is an artist. Yes - but she prefers to draw pictures with words. At the age of eight Lisanne was writing stories because she had run out of the kind of things she liked to read but her career didn't really start until 1978. She was writing short stories and it was Andrew Stephenson (remember him from Coventry in 1977) who told her her latest effort was a cliché - it was from the viewpoint of a kitten and why didn't she make it an alien. And so her felinoid Sholans were born.

And Lisanne Norman became a successful writer. Not yet. She created something more important first. She became the mother of a highly intelligent young man called Kai.

The first novel, **Turning Point**, wasn't finished until 1987. The following year, the manuscript went on a long journey. It crossed the Atlantic in the luggage of Marsha Jones. Marsha gave it to her sister, Sheila Gilbert. Sheila is an editor for DAW books. DAW have now published all six of Lisanne's novels and only one of her short stories has been published in the UK.

Then Lisanne Norman is the American Guest of Honour at Paragon? Not exactly. She lives in Norwich with Kai, two Sholans cats, a large friendly dog and an apparent degree of chaos. You will find her at most Eastercons and Novacons. At some point, usually towards the smaller hours of the night, you will find her wreathed in smoke brainstorming a concept, an idea, a landscape or an alien with a group of

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Mike Scott Rohan

Describing himself as a Breton-Scot, Mike Scott Rohan descends from the French via a father born on Mauritius and the Scots through a line of border farmers and cattle raiders.

After getting his MA in 1973 he escaped the law to join an international publishing firm. There he spent the next five years editing encyclopaedias and other reference books. He joined the Pieria writer's

From an early age he read voraciously, everything from Dan Dare to the Larousse Mythology, Conan Doyle, C S Lewis (Out of the Silent Planet, not Narnia), Tolkien and his older sister's copy of Lady Chatterley. He was educated at the Edinburgh Academy and St Edmund Hall, Oxford, where after entering in English he made the great mistake of studying law, but was sensible enough to join the SF group. There he met its president Allan Scott, who (along with terminal boredom) started him writing for the group's semi-pro magazine SFinx alongside such luminaries as Rob Holdstock, Ian Watson, Dave Langford and Andrew Stephenson. He also seized on an innocent young American called Deborah, a Philadelphia-born Stanford postgrad, who wandered into the group, and they began finding excuses not to get married.

group established by Stephenson and Holdstock, with SFinx authors and others including Garry Kilworth and Chris Morgan. Several of his short stories got published in British and US anthologies. Meanwhile, in 1977, he and Deborah ran out of excuses.

In 1978 he took voluntary redundancy and began writing his first non-fiction book, The Hammer And The Cross, and his first novel, Run to the Stars.

In 1988 he was guest of honour at Picocon 6. Also guesting were Dave Langford and Terry Pratchett. John Dowd was also present (see photo).

Mike's fantasy writing has shown an originality that breaks with the sterile rehashing of old themes common in some writers' work. The mythos of the winter of the world series blends a sophisticated yet primitive technology with a coherent st of supernatural phenomena that owes nothing to Tolkien. The Spiral series fits wierdness into our world in a manner that is frighteningly plausible. His work is highly recommended.

Costume at Paragon

Chaos Costume

There will be chaos. Costume, that is. We are hoping the usual suspects will rally round to make this happen. A room with level access has been set aside for chaos costume. It is near to toilets and also near to where the masquerade will be held, so we hope to use it as the masquerade staging area.

Masquerade

The hall for the masquerade should seat about 350 people and the hotel is looking into possibly having the show on cctv so people can watch from another location as well. The hall is about 46 feet wide and 93 feet long, and just over nine feet high. Costumers will need to fit through double doors and I think they are normal height only. It has level access via a carpeted corridor and will be near to chaos costume and toilets.

It will be held on Saturday evening at about the usual time and run by the usual people: Tim Broadribb and Richard Rampant on tech, Sue Mason as MC and me backstage. I'd be grateful for any volunteers helping, and I will have a table in the dealer's room where I can be contacted.

We will organise a photo shoot, probably while the judges are judging, in the hall itself. Entrants will walk through again with the lights up and people can move nearer the front to take pictures at this time. It will also be a good opportunity to see costumes again in more detail.

There will be a disco later that evening and people in costume will be especially welcome there.

Hall Costume

We hope to see lots of people in hall costume on Sunday. There will be a prize for hall costume, and the hotel has several picturesque nooks and crannies for photos, e.g., the statue of Neptune and the hansom cab shown in PR2. Although it is a modern building, parts of the hotel are decorated as pseudo-Victorian streets and there is a sort of jungle hut setting around the pool. It also has very nice landscaped gardens, something we haven't had at an Eastercon for a while now, so those with cameras will have lots of good opportunities for pictures.

The Fan Room

The Fanroom, including the Fan Programme of which more later, is a convention within a convention. running parallel to and in association with its giant parent (or offspring, depending on how you view the evolution of conventions. Once upon a time the Fanroom would have been the entire CONVENTION, remember!). It provides an environment and schedule of events, programming and services not specifically catered for elsewhere in the Eastercon, and it offers up a quite distinct experience available to all the convention's attendees, who are all, of course by definition Fans.

The Fanroom is managed by Greg Pickersgill and Catherine McAulay, with Sandra Bond, to showcase the interests of Paragon's Fan Guests of Honour, Claire Brialey and Mark Plummer. It has an excellent location, and is provided with a bar, plenty of seating and display space, and a contiguous programme area. It's designed to be a place to BE, as well as attend the Fan Programme or browse the sales and give-away tables. There is disabled access and the Fanroom staff are ready to assist you should you need assistance.

Among the material available in the Fan Room will be a large selection of British, American, European and Australasian fanzines. Many are from the Memory Hole recycling bins and are, essentially, free (although we do request a small donation which will go to the United Fan Funds), and many current fanzines that you can buy for a small charge, 10% of which goes to the United Fan Funds, the remainder to the publisher. So if you currently produce a fanzine, bring along copies and we'll sell them for you.

And if you've ever wanted to read fanzines but never knew where to start, this is the place for you. And we aren't just selling fanzines, we're also happy to sell other fannish publications, convention merchandise, any kind of fannish materials (use your imagination here and if in doubt ask us in advance) - all on the same '10% to UFF' terms. In addition to the traditional fan fund auction, we can sell books, fanzines, anything else through our novel (sort of...) daily 'Manual E-bay' auction system.

We're also looking for display material of all kinds. This could include old photographs of conventions and other fannish events, photocopies of short pieces of fan writing and fan art, convention memorabilia, indeed anything which can be stuck on a wall and which somebody might find interesting. You can send items to us in advance or bring stuff along on the day (although one way and another, it'd help if we had a rough idea what to expect).

The Fanroom will also be a place to find out about other fannish events, groups and other projects: so if you're already planning to scatter flyers around the hotel to advertise a convention, club, magazine or event in the hope that someone will take them away and read them before they're all turned into paper aeroplanes in the Rotunda, bring some along to the Fanroom too - and take the opportunity to take some others away.

And while you're thinking about what to bring, why not swap the convention something for your membership pack? Give us a Bag of Stuff in return for the bag of stuff you'll get at registration anything you think is worth bringing along, including the stuff you've acquired at other cons, club meetings and auctions and feel that your home can now live without. And once you've cleared the space, you'll be able to take more books, fanzines, art and other stuff home with you... The Fan Programme will run throughout the convention. The Fan Guests of Honour item by Brialey and Plummer will be a highlight of this programme, and there will also be fifteen items which will cover other many facets of the SF fan experience: the unifying thread of which will be a series of discussion items under the banner WHAT'S THE POINT OF, which seek to deconstruct and examine several of the essential 'givens' of fan activity. Other than that the whole Fan Programme was developed very much with Mark and Claire's interests and enthusiasms in mind, and will reflect what they feel is important and consequential about science fiction fandom.

The Fanroom programme will of course be included in the programme grid in the Read Me; but also look out for the separate Fanroom programme leaflet at the convention. In particular, check the QUIZ GUNFIGHT item on Saturday, which needs, frankly, YOU...

And just one more thing If you've ever wanted to present a short programme item on a fannish or SF subject of great importance to you, we are looking for speakers to do 5 to 15 minute guerrilla programme pieces between the scheduled programme items. If you are interested make contact with the Fanroom either before or during the convention.

We hope this has been enough to spark your interest, and we all look forward to welcoming you to the Paragon Fanroom. Programming will start from 4:30 on Friday, right after the main opening ceremony, posing the key question



Hotel information

ATTENTION. ROOMS TO LET

As I type this we still have some double/twins left in the main hotel. Get your orders in now... Single rooms are now being booked into the Sketchley Grange Hotel. Your booking form will need to be with us by 7th of April at the very latest although the main hotel is likely to be full by then. The sooner we get the form the more likely we can get you into the main hotel

PARKING

There is car parking for 600 cars with disabled parking near the hotel entrance. This is controlled by a barrier system, which will issue you with a ticket. These tickets will need to be validated each time you leave the hotel by car (going out for meals etc.). There is a standard charge of £1 per night per car. This will be added to your bill automatically. Please check your bill carefully as the system has been known to add the charge to people who do not have a car in the carpark.

DISABLED ACCESS

There are disabled parking places near the entrance of the hotel. All the disabled access bedrooms are on the ground floor as well as all the main parts of the convention. This includes main and secondary programme, art show dealers room and so on. A small number of programme items will be on the first floor. There is no lift to this floor so it will not be accessible to anyone who cannot manage stairs. There will still be a lot of choice for everyone. We are planning to have wheelchairs on this floor so that if people can manage the stairs they will be able to use a chair

on this floor. We will also have an 'evac chair' for getting people with limited mobility out of these rooms quickly and safely if needed.

KEYS

The hotel will issue as many keys as there are people booked in the room. They will also issue key cards that will have to be shown at breakfast and when charging anything to your room. The hotel has advised us that key cards will be needed to buy drinks from the bar outside normal pub licensing hours. This does not require you to charge to your room. You can still use cash.

CORKAGE

For anyone planning a party you need to be aware that in common with most hotels the Hanover International Hotel will charge corkage for drinks not purchased from the hotel, for example, £8 per bottle of wine. For anyone planning an expensive party corkage for champagne is £15. (An invite would be nice)

BREAKFAST

To facilitate a better service at breakfast we have agreed with the hotel that they suspend their normal room service for the mornings of the convention, except in cases of real difficulty.


