SOUTH BY SOUTH WEST

So what we doing for are programming? This is the question on everybody's lips, and has been ever since someone expected a fully designed and agreed programme at the bidding session. Back in the real world, a little over a year out from the convention, we have a good deal of flesh on the skeleton of our original designs, and are well on target for calling Dr Frankenstein in next Easter.

Of course, I can still only talk in broad terms about what's on the programme. Apart from anything else, we have a lot of surprises in store that I don't want to spoil! Broadly speaking, then, the main themes of the con are Travel and Change, in all their various forms. What has happened to the American and Russian space programmes, for example? Why are skiffy futurological projections so rarely accurate? What bizarre travel films can the projectionists find? These and other questions may or may not be answered or even considered in the usual hodge-podge of talks, panels, films, videos and drinking sessions in the bar.

What we are at work on here is a traditional Eastercon programme for a traditional Eastercon hotel; friendly, comfortable and not too demanding on the audience. This is what people seem to want from an Eastercon -- please feel free to contradict me if you think otherwise -- and this is what we are quite happy to give you. However, at least one

controversial thing will be happening, or rather not happening, at Sou'Wester. Let me put it in a paragraph all of its own, just to stir things up.

There will be no Fan Room.

This doesn't mean that I intend to ignore the sort of programme that would traditionally appear in the fan room, in either its fanzine or its light entertainment guise. On contrary, both will be featuring strongly in the main and alternative programmes. No. the reason for dropping the Fan Room is that in the Adelphi, there is absolutely no point in having it. Friends old and new can meet, drink and talk perfectly comfortably in the Lounge, fanzine and fanart displays could quite happily co-habit with the Art Show or simlar displays, and nobody but nobody needs a ghetto anyway.

Yes, I said ghetto. In general, all that dedicated special interest rooms seem to do in fandom is to create a hideyhole for people to disappear into and never be seen again. This is not what fandom is all about. I want to get people out of their ghettos and meeting each other, and in that context the fan room is not just an irrelevance but a positive distraction. I don't want people to sit and vegetate in the fan room, the film show, the video room, the filk sessions, the games room, and so on and so forth, and if this means that everyone ends up in the bar rather than in the programme then at least I will have succeeded in making people socialise.

Enough talking about what isn't there. What sort of things will be on programme at Sou'Wester? Well, there will be full film and video programmes (grumble, grumble... but watch out for the film and video related items in the main and alternate programme rooms) and a games room (ditto). Our Guests of Honour will be doing their stuff (and with this lot I hesitate to say anything so predictable as "speeches"), as will a number of other well-known fans and pros. There will be talks. discussions, inter views, games, quizzes and all the usual stuff. They will be liberally mixed together, with a dash of manic energy for added fizz, and served up around the hotel in such a way that you can find what you want, miss what you don't want. and meet all these other weird people.

One thing that does deserve a little more notice in these pages is what we've got labelled as "The Rant Stream." This is a series of short talks by different people about things that particularly irritate them. Of course, such a stream is only going to work if there are enough fans with pet peeves to make it work, so if there's anything that you would like to be incisive, witty and very, very sarcastic about, be it the state of the economy or the patronising programming chiefs, please let me know. We will arrange the soapbox and the captive audience, you just have to book them in advance. Please. Otherwise I will have to froth and gibber about apathy, and I can't really be bothered to do that.

This, then, is what will be on offer. Nothing too demanding, nothing too unusual, nothing that will force you in any particular direction, just something pleasurable to enhance a pleasant weekend with a lot of likeminded people. Which is, after all, what the Eastercon is all about.

That's quite enough of me. We now return you to your regularly scheduled Progress Report...

WHO WATCHES THE WATCHERS?

In which Harry Payne and Dave Row tell you about the video programme, and what you could do to help.

First, we want to kill a rumour we've heard stone dead. WE ARE NOT GOING TO SHOW WALL TO WALL ROBOTS. Or even floor-to-ceiling robots. Did you hear that at the back?

Right, back to the video programme. Yes, we have one and it's going to be as varied as we can make it. No, we can't tell you what's going to be in it, for the same reason that Tim and Co. can't tell you what films they're going to show. Generally, you can get into an awful lot of trouble if you advertise a con on the basis of what your film/video programme is going to be. Besides, an Eastercon isn't a film fest; dare we say there will be other things to do during Sou'Wester than sit in a dark room looking at a screen? Like sitting in a dark room

looking at a screen and drinking real ale...

We've divided the programme into six major categories: Mainstream Media, Other Media, Films, Animation, Documentaries and Miscellaneous. This list is not exclusive; if you, the con-goers, feel we've left some vital category out, let us know.

Our aim is to allow 20% maximum of allotted time for any one category; this will prevent any category or categories from dominating the programme. As for allotted time, there probably won't be a round-theclock programme. We are all too human, and have to eat and sleep occasionally. What we will aim for is to present interesting items in as high quality a format as possible generation super-long-play (fifth NTSC conversions are a no-no!). Any foreign material will be either dubbed or subtitled, except for American stuff, where you are strictly on your own.

As con-goers come in all ages, we'll try to cater for them. To this end, the first part of the day's programme will be suitable for children. Of all ages. There'll be a general range of items until the late evening, after which the more "adult" stuff will be shown. Every item will be shown to all congoers except where marked "A", where children will be let in provided accompanied by are thev responsible adult, and "X" where nobody under 18 will be admitted. Times will vary, but on the whole we expect to keep to the schedule. If you have any doubts about something, ask one of us and we'll give you a breakdown on what it's all about.

Finally, although we have ideas, there's just the two of us. You number in the hundreds, and we're sure you've got at least that many ideas on what should be shown. So why not let us know about them? We can't guarantee that we'll take them up, but the more of them we get, the better the chance of us coming up with a programme you want to watch. Be hearing from you...

MEMBERSHIP, THE HOTEL AND SECURITY

A boring repetition, for all newcomers, of the warning given in Progress Report One.

We are not going to be encouraging on-the-day memberships of Sou'Wester. because of the problems with sneak-thieves which have been experienced by previous Eastercons at the Adelphi. following procedure is a bore and a pain and a drag, but if it keeps the Dealers' Room free from theft, and the handbags in the bar safe, then it's worth it.

If for whatever reason someone is unable to join the convention before April 1994, even as a supporting member, then they will be asked at the convention reception desk to produce some form of official proof of identity and address - we know that many people don't carry driving licences, bank statements, or whatever else in their pockets as a

general rule, but we are trying to make sure over the coming year that everyone knows they'll need to bring something of this sort with them if they want to get in on the day.

If someone cannot produce proof of identity, and is not personally known to any member of the committee or to some other fan known personally to the committee, in other words if they cannot produce a reliable "sponsor" on the spot, then we shall have to decline (very reluctantly) to take their money or to accept them for membership.

If anyone is unable to decide before April 1994 whether or not to come to Sou'Wester, it would save a certain amount of potential hassle and embarrassment if they could at least let us know in advance about their existence, by writing to Chris Bell at the convention address and telling her that they may be coming.

We shall be very grateful if everyone can publicise this paranoid attitude of ours; we certainly don't want to turn away any bona fide fans simply because we don't happen to know them. If you do know anyone who might be planning to turn up out of the blue, or if you live locally and are encouraging friends to come and sample fandom, please could you warn them about our policy?


