A CONVENTION FOR ALL SEASONS

Joseph Nicholas dumped a pile of Advertising Copy into my hands as I tried desparately to finish my pint of bitter. "For Yorcon Frog. Book" he says, melting back into the darker recesses of the infamous One Tun. It was at that very point, just three weeks ago, that I realised how close Yorcon was. No longer could we afford to approach the organisation of events with our usual "Hell, it's months away yet"...no longer could we hope last minute items for the Programme would turn up...and, most importantly, no longer could any of us properly relax.

Of course we all knew what we were letting ourselves in for. Most of us had travelled the same steps before; then the con was an intriguing prospect on the horizon. You didn't feel too hassled because it was a new thing, but now...here it was again, only bigger, better and a higher standard to maintain. The regular committee meetings in Leeds at the Dragonara had an air of determination not seen last time. We've got to make it a great convention...not simply an average one. Sixty percent of any con is the suitability of the venue. Another ten percent depends upon those attending; twenty percent on the programme, nine percent on the publicity and perhaps one percent on the committee' I'm not taking us in vain, but once the con's set up, the people there and the bar open, I'm sure the whole conglommeration could adequately survive the four days with the committee sitting in a back room playing poker.

It <u>is</u> a hive of activity now; 200 people more at this stage than for Yorcon I in 1979 - and the programme all sorted out. I'm sure you'll agree that mastermini Dave Pringle has collected together a fascinating roll-call of events. There might not be as many movies as at Albacon, but then we're an SF convention. Where else can you get a panel displaying the diverse talents of Tom Disch, Ian Watson and Lisa Tuttle? Where else can you get a special film presentation of the Polish movie "Golem" followed on the same day by "Thief from Bagdad"? From the delights of another Bob Shaw "Scientific Discourse" to the designs of the Art Show, from Guest of Honour speeches to Doctors Strangelove and Phibes. And that's just the main programme. We've the Fan Programme, ably and eagerly collected together by John Collick; Mike Ford has been wheeled in to run the Alternate Programme, and, of course, there are those centres of intensive discussion, the bars. We've more space this year, too. Cheaper beer, snack stalls, parties, disco, fancy dress and banquet. Most certainly, something for everyone - and I'm absolutely positive that you'll all enjoy yourselves.

Hotel booking confirmation should accompany this PR. There is still some space left, but all singles in the Dragonara have gone and there are only a few twins and soubles. Accommodation in the Queen's is also moving quickly, so any latecomers out there, take the appropriate action now. Contact Graham James (Leeds 721478) for a booking form, or send your attending membership fee (£6) together with your hotel deposit (£10 per person) to Graham at: 12 Fearnville Terrace, Gakwood, Leeds, LS8 JOU. Don't forget to state the nights you want and the type of room required. You'd be surprised at the number of strange and wonderful booking forms we've received! Once the Dragonara is full, all new attendees needing rooms will be allocated to the Queen's, which is only a couple minutes away. Either way, you can be assured of fine service and quality. Well, there's not much more to say in this introduction. Elsewhere in the PR you'll find all the final details - Programme, times, Alternate events, Book Room, Maps, Guids, Travel arrangements, Members, TAFF Auction, Ken McIntyre Award, Art Show, Fancy Dress, Fan Room, Writing Competition, Doc Weir Award and the Welcommittee - oh, and the letter column. And so as Mike Dickinson said two years ago, "You've paid your money, and with three weeks to go, I think you'll get a bargain."

THE PROGRAMME

As usual, to keep the final plans for the Programme as fluid as possible (in such things, flexibility is a vital asset) the definitive schedule will appear in the Convention and Programme Book. However, due to a number of requests and suggestions, we're listing the principal activities likely to take place on each day. Timings are only very approximate at this stage - but at least we're not trying to include all those tiresome "Tea and Coffee" breaks you used to see on Programme shorts! (Those were the days!)

Friday April 17th The first day proper, and we kick off at Midday. Films include The Abominable Dr. Phibes (Vincent Frice and jazz playing mannequins) and the Russian extravaganza, <u>Solaris</u>. The committee and quests are introduced, we've Mike Dickinson chairing a panel which will discuss movements, groups and generalities of SF writers (featuring as panellists Tom Disch, Ian Watson and Lisa Tuttle) and for those wanting real excitement, the British SF Association's Annual General Meeting.

Saturday April 18th The first Big Day. Commencing at 10:30 we've a book auction, Bob shaw's "Serious Scientific Talk" (at midday), lan watson's Quest of Honour speech (at 2:30), a guiz panel ("Just A Minute", with Bob shaw, Rob Holdstock and Joseph Nicholas), Fancy Dress Farade, Disco and Dance and a live Rock band - and for films, <u>The rarallax View</u> and <u>Time After Time</u>. And when you've recovered from all that, there are some interesting things going on during the day in the fan room.

Sunday April 19th Not so much a Day of Hest as a Day of Action, Adventure. We start again at 10:30 with the Eastercon Business meeting, then the Art Auction - and at 2:30, Tom Disch's Guest of Honour Speech. This then powers into a panel on "Should SF Support Causes" (featuring John Brunner, Chris Priest and John Sladek). Our special guest from Poland, Wiktor Bukato presents "Golem" at 5pm, and we then move into the banquet (toastmaster Mike Dickinson), after dinner speeches, awards and then <u>Thief from</u> Bagdad.

Monday April 20th Off again at 10:30 with the controversial BBC film The wargame, final book auctions, a last panel or two, <u>Dr. Strangelove</u> and an official "close" at 5pm (although of course the bars stay open!)

So there you have it - and we've still a few more events to slot in. I hope that's whetted your appetite, and again, any last minute improvements to the programme will be prominently displayed on the day-to-day board in Heception - and complemented by announcements on the FA system.

MOTEL INFORMATION AND FACILITIES

Following our experiences last time, full details of the hotel's facilities will be available on arrival at the convention. A sandwich and snack bar will be running on each of the four main convention days. Timings and menus will vary according to demand, but we expect a range of snacks at a standard price of £1 being provided on the reception level. This bar will open between 12 and 2pm, 5 and 7pm and 11pm to midnight. For those arriving on Thursday 16th, the Fot Fourri restaurant on the ground floor will be open (providing a range of hamburgers, salads, soups and grille) as an alternative. It'll also be available throughout the rest of the convention, as will the Rosewood Restaurant which has one of the most exclusive cuisines in Leeds.


Numerous other eating places can be found within a few minutes walk of the convention and these will be detailed in the various handouts available when you register. These vary from traditional Yorkshire fish and chips through Pizzas, Burgers, English, Greek, Italian, Spanish and French establishments. Many of the local pubs also provide adequate pub snacks - especially The west Riding on Wellington Street.

The Dragonara bars (two on the main floor, and one on the Book and Fan room floor) will remain open until the small hours providing there are still people requesting drinks. After about 2a.m., the hotel's 24 hour room service will be available. However, in the interest of security (and you, the paid-up members) <u>no drinks</u> will be served unless you are wearing your convention badge. Tiresome though this is, we're sure

Any artists wishing to display work are invited to write to us at the address given below indicating the approximate number/size of works they wish to display. Space is limited so it may be necessary to limit the number of works latecomers can display. Artwork may be offered for sale at Yorcon II, however, convention funds will claim a meagre 10% of the sale price as commission.

KEN MCINTYRE AWARD

Keith Freeman is the administrator of this often neglected Award. This convention provides you with the opportunity to remedy this situation. It is presented to the best piece of fanzine art over the twelve months since Albacon, and commemorates the great fan artist Ken McIntyre who sadly died of a heart attack a number of years ago. To enter, editors (or the artists) must provide Keith with a copy of the publication in which the piece appeared, together with the original artwork. You may enter as many times as you li ke, provided the piece appeared in the last convention year. The copy should either be sent to Keith at 269 wykeham Road, Realing, Berks, HG6 IPL (to arrive well before the con pleaset), or brought to the convention and handed to Faul & Jan Matthews for display in the Artshow.

So editors and artists, get searching, and you never know, you could be the winner of this year's award, to be presented at the banquet on Sunday April 19th.

DOC WEIR AWARD

This award is given to any fan, who in the opinion of the voters (you, the convention members) deserves to be recognised for his/her efforts and achievements in fandom. The administrator is Peter Mabey, and ballot forms will be available at the convention where voting will take place for a presentation at the banquet. Generally, it's given to someone who hasn't been honoured before, but the final decision is with the voters.

A list of past winners will be provided in our programme book, but at least you can be thinking of worthy candidates in the meanwhile.

BRITISH SCIENCE FICTION ASSOCIATION AWARDS

At one time voted on solely by the members of the BSFA, these awards were thrown open to the members of Albacon too in 1980. This was a great success, and is being repeated for this year. The awards cover the period January to December 1980 and cover the following categories:

Best Novel, Best Short Work, Best Artist and Best Media Presentation

All attending members (and BSFA members) can vote on the nomination sheets available at the convention. The votes will be counted on Sunday morning for announcement at the Banquet. The Awards themselves will take th form of presentation shields, which will later be engraved with the winner's name and work.

FANCY DRESS PARADE

This will take place on the Saturday night and will be organised by Anne Fage. Hotel & Travel Information

Hotel confirmation forms are being sent out with this mailing and should list all your requirements. Any problems, and it is essential that you contact Graham James as soon as possible.

Details regarding the Ladbroke/British Hail cheap fare facility were sent out with PR 3, but again, if you haven't heard from us by the receipt of your PR, it might be advisable just to check with Graham. In any event, British Rail may take up to 28 days to send you the Concessionary tickets, so please don't beseige us with just a few days to go.

As a centre, Leeds is very conveniently placed for travel. Petails of rail services are listed below, and most major towns have National Express coach links with Leeds, Wellington Street Coach Station. This station is just five minutes from the hotel, and it might be worth checking to see if there are standby fares from your local terminal. For example, London to Leeds standby is only £4 each way, a considerable saving over the BR fare of £21 (Weekend return).


> (These are Inter-City services, those from London and Edinburgh are HST 125 trains on which crwoding is quite common. It might be advisable to book your seats - only 50p)

A map of Leeds with Centre is shown opposite with the Dragonara clearly indicated. The Queens Hotel forms part of Leeds with Station complex. Those travelling by car would do well to remember that Leeds has a very large and bewildering one-way traffic system. When leaving the M1 or M621 from the south and West, simply follow the road-signs for Leeds City centre and the route will take you past the hotel which will be on your left-hand side just before the railway station. The hotel car-park is free to patrons provided on leaving you remember to collect a token from reception to operate the barrier. Should the car-park be full (It holds 100 plus cars), there is a National Car Park directly opposite.

On arrival at the hotel, proceed via the lifts to the Reception Level where you must first register with the hotel (if staying) and then with YORCON at the registration desk, which will be open until 10 pm on Friday, April 17th. At all other times, it will be open from 9am to 6pm, unless demand warrants otherwise.

It is the responsibility of each convention member staying at the hotel to pay his/her own bill. Please do so promptly; this will not only assist us, but also the hard-pressed hotel staff and future conventions.

Please note, the (asino next door is <u>not</u> part of the hotel and gaming can only be carried out by bona-fide members.



THE FAN ROOM

The Fan Room at Yorcon II will be situated in the Rosewood Bar. For those of you who came to Yorcon I, that's the bar next to the restaurant, to the right as you come out of the lifts on the Reception level. To those of you who didn't (wretched sinners all:) this is a place of lucious splendour complete with innumerable items of upholstered furniture to sprawl over and of course, its own bar. Certainly the Yorcon II Fan Room will rank among the most luxurious of the last few years and it'll definitely provide a fitting place for relaxation after the rigours of the main programme.

Now, as to the Fan Frogramme, this is practically complete and I can promise you, it's going to be quite an unrelenting weekend. David Langford, our Fan Guest of Honour, will be appearing to enlighten you on various "Facts and Fallacies" (dealing with a few of the more spectacularly incorrect prophesies of the last few thousand years) and narrate the further adventures of Mac Malsenn, Cosmic Agent Extraordinaire ("very ordinary"). There'll be a film which, although it isn't exactly SF, gives a fairly accurate account of the life and times of a typical SF fan. The BSFA will be available to answer all the questions and criticisms you've been saving up and, as Sunday is the day of Worship the Astral Leauge will be there on the l9th to entertain you and (hopefully) convert you to the One True Way.

So, to business. Following on from my last piece in PR2; now is the time to send in the information on any Clubs or Societies in your area. I'll be using this to construct a large wall chart showing the shape of SF fandom in England. I want to make it as comprehensive and entertaining as possible, as well as informative, and so I need your help in the shape of details concerning meeting places, dates and times etc... As I pointed out before, you can design your own advert for the club if you want, but remember it musn't be any larger than A⁴, we've only got a limited amount of display space.

Secondly, don't forget the fanzines for the Fanzine Review Panel. If you're planning on publishing an issue for Yorcon II (or just before), and you'd like to see it reviewed by a number of critics, send it to me as soon as possible (at least a fortnight before the convention). I'll select four from the selection I receive and then I'll notify the editors and the critics. I want to compile as wide a group as possible so I'm not only interested in the "Fannish" fanzines. Any fanzine, whether it's full of fiction, in praise of Star Trek or obsessed with Gossip, will be welcome.

The Yorcon II Fan Room will be open all the time, over the weekend. It is intended as an informal watering hole for all Convention members, not just a few so-called "elite, so come along and 1. promise that at least you will be entertained, if not enlightened. I'll be on hand as often as possible to answer questions and critisms, and accept the old drink if anyone takes pity. I may have been awarded the dubious honour of organising the thing, but remember, it's up to you to make the Fan Room a success.

TAFF AUCTION


One of the most important auctions at Yorcon II is that on behalf of TAFF. The Trans-Atlantic Fan Fund. The fund itself was created in 1953 to help well-known fans to travel across the Atlantic in order to attend conventions and meet foreign fans. Several candidates are nominated for each trip and a winner is selected by the votes of interested fans in Europe and America. This year's American winner is Stu Shiffman, who'll be attending Yorcon II. Dave Langford, last year's winner and the current European administrator, has written a piece on Stu for the Convention and Programme Book.

TAFF is entirely supported by SF fandom and relies for much of its income on auctions held at conventions over here and in America. Needless to say, we'd appreciate material for the auction at Yorcon II. Just about anything can be sold - books, fanzines, manuscripts, magazines, fannish oddments and ephemera, propellor beannies, bottles of booze, posters, Harry Harrison cigar butts - anything you can think of that can help TAFF.
