

ROGER ZELAZNY

Roger Zelazny is a very successful American writer with an impressive record. He has a whole host of awards from the SF community, including six Hugos, three Nebulas, two Balrogs and a Locus award. He has published approximately 40 novels, over 150 short stories and articles, as well as some volumes of poetry, variously translated into 17 different languages, including Braille. He has taught at eight different writers' workshops, is the subject of five books and numerous critical articles and theses. What of his work? Roger writes mainly fantasy fiction through which he weaves many strands and develops common features. He usually has a sole protagonist (not hero), often immortal or superhuman. His mainly male protagonists will have a girlfriend, who is linked to the enemy somehow, an enemy that may really be on his side. Confusing? The central character thought everything was fine in the 20th century until he realised he wasn't a normal man. He is strong and confident, can wield a sword but has a university education. Is he a God? We might share his thoughts as he unravels the mystery of himself and his heritage.

Roger lives with his wife and three children in New Mexico.

Mike is a local author of mostly fantasy novels, with the odd science fiction and non-fiction book thrown in. He has also written in conjunction with Allan Scott.

He is most famous for *The Winter of the Worlds* trilogy, where ice meets metal in a contention of the 'Powers' that wield them. He is also known for *Chase the Morning* and its recent sequel *The Gates of Noon*, in which he develops his idea of 'Powers' and the way that they meddle in the world of humans. This is in a maritime setting straight out of history, but which also exists in a hidden corner of the present.

THE PROGRAMME

Leeds University SF society have taken part in numerous cabarets over the last couple of years, providing many amusing sketches (some even had original jokes in them) including the now infamous 'Flashing Light Sabre' sequences. I can't reveal what the new Light Sabre will include (mainly because we haven't started recording it yet) however there will be a new version, tentatively titled 'The All New Flashing Light Sabre'.


