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# THE HOTEL

After taking note of what many people said during Novacon 16, and in particular what was said at the "Future of Novacon" meeting on the Sunday afternoon, we decided to take Novacon back to the Royal Angus in Birmingham.

The Angus, as those of you who attended Fifteencon will know, has had extensive refurbishment. Our usual function room, the Wroxton, is now open again, and the main bar has been extended to twice its original size. So, despite comments by Tony in the Novacon 16 programme Book it is still feasible to hold a Novacon at the Angus. We still have the problem of numbers, to a lesser degree than we had thought, but a problem all the same. We have decided to take the unpopular step of LIMITING NUMBERS. The limit isn't as stringent as we first thought, but to those who always join late, or always "walk in" we must give the advice JOIN EARLY. Memberships will be accepted on a FIRST COME-FIRST SERVED basis. The limit decided upon is 350.

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# MORE DIRE WARNINGS

It is not my intention to reiterate chapter and verse the dire warnings given at previous conventions. It will be sufficient to say that the warnings which were published at Mexicon 2, Fifteencon, and the particularly strongly worded one at Novacon 16, whilst they may have been unpopular, did the trick. If you all follow the same standards of behaviour at Novacon 17 the Hotel Management and the Committee will be more than pleased. For new Convention goers the gist of it is, very briefly, do not vandalise anything in any part of the hotel, remember that the hotel is selling food, drink, and beds, so do not bring your own, or at least be discreet. In the case of drink the hotel is entitled to charge corkage, VERY EXPENSIVE, in the case of food and beds they are entitled to throw you out. In the event of any trouble with the hotel regarding any of the above the committee will not stand by you.

(I hate this bit, but it is very neccessary- have a good time)


# FOOD AND DRINK

The hotel restaurant will be open in the usual way for those who enjoy, and can afford to pay for, the excellent cuisine provided there. Of course you can't eat there all the time, (can you), so there will also be the usual convention food provided cheaply, and almost continuously. The details have not yet been finalised with the hotel, but we can promise both hot & cold snacks, and also a reasonable vegetarian choice. To avoid previous problems with poor choice for vegetarians, The question has been included on your convention booking form in addition to the hotel booking form. This will ensure that the catering staff will be made aware that the question relates to ALL attendees, not just hotel residents.

There will be three bars open. The main bar, which will be a REAL ALE bar, the small bar at the back of the Wroxton which will be closed during programme items so that those who want to attend can do so in peace and quiet, and a portable bar in the Ariel, see "Fan Room".

Breakfast will be served each morning from 7.30 to 10.00. On Saturday and Sunday you will need your breakfast tickets. Any-one staying in the hotel on Thursday, Sunday & Monday will of course have the following morning's breakfast included in the price of the room, but breakfast tickets will not be issued for those days.

Breakfast tickets will be issued on your arrival, which can be exchanged in the food bar, but not the restaurant, for the convenience of those who do not eat breakfast. Each ticket will only be valid on the day for which it is issued, so you can't save Saturday's to add to Sunday's, nor can you use them on a previous day.




### GUEST OF HONOUR

Actually my first reaction was 'Oh Christ' but, having taken a handful of Doc Martens (they're like Bob Martins only not as easy to swallow), I felt enthused and ready to bring my full critical faculties to bear on a man who has at various times been called 'Iain', 'Banksy' and 'Bonko'. My God, how his works have sent ripples of unease through the literary establishment. He is a worthy Guest of Honour for Novacon. By the way, Banksy, it's your round.


### THE PROGRAMME

In the event of overbooking we shall either reduce the space allowed where more tables than average have been requested, to make room for some of the smaller booksellers, or we shall accept bookings on a "First come - first served" basis, whichever we find to be fairer at the time. # THE NOVA AWARDS

The NOVA is an award for fanzines produced by Science Fiction Fandom in the British Isles, created in 1973 by the late Gillon Field, and presented annually at the Birmingham Science Fiction Group's Novacon. The NOVA was, until 1981, given to the editor of the fanzine voted "Best of the Year". From 1973 to 1976 the NOVA winner was decided by a select panel of judges chosen for their knowledge of fandom.

In 1977, whilst the Novacon committee persuaded the ultra-select NOVA committee that a more democratic system would be more appropriate, an inebriated Stan Eling persuaded an even more inebriated Dave Langford to draw up a set of rules to govern the new democratic system. The result of all this was, in Kev Smith's words, "the three volume presentation set of NOVA award rules with the seven appendices". These rules provide for an Administrator (responsible for printing and distributing the ballot forms) and a committee (who are responsible for assessing the eligibility of votes cast and counting them).

The next major change to the NOVA came in 1981, again by request oof the Novacon committee, when it was decided to extend the NOVA to include two additional categories — "best Fanwriter" and "best Fanartist".

The fundamental idea of the Nova as it's been run since 1977 is that it should be awarded by informed vote. Informed votes come from informed voters, defined as Novacon members who have been active in fanzines sometime in the year or two preceding the relevant Novacon. "Active in fanzines" is a bit harder to define, but for the sake of clarity the NOVA Award Rules state that this meanshaving produced one or more fanzines, or having contributed articles/artwork to two or more fanzines, or having had letters of comment printed in three or more different fanzines. The most important point to remember about these criteria is that they were not designed to be prohibitive. So, even if you are in doubt about your eligibility, vote anyway!

For a fanzine to qualify ONE or more issues must have appeared between 1/10/86 and 30/9/87. For fanwriters and fanartists to qualify a piece of writing or artwork by the person concerned must have been published for the first time between 1/10/86 and 30/9/87, in a fanzine. For the purposes of this award a fanzine shal be defined as an amateur publication which is concerned with science fiction, fantasy, science fiction and fantasy fans, and/or related subjects, and copies of which may be obtained in exchange for other amateur publications or in response to letters of comment.

Perhaps the most vital point to remember from the preceeding paragraph is that this year, for the first time, "ONE-OFF" fanzines are eligible - that is fanzines which have had only one issue published in the year in question. This ammendment to the previous NOVA rules has been made after extensive discussions throughout the bars of Britain (as tradition demands), and after consultation with the current NOVA committee.
