



Garry Kilworth


One afternoon during a visit to Garry Kilworth's house, I remember Rob Holdstock and I walking with him across an Essex field. We were all talking animatedly about something or other when Garry gradually fell silent. A distant yet intense look appeared in his eyes. Rob and I turned to one another, scowling, both recognising the phenomenon. We muttered words to the effect that "The bugger's writing another story, isn't he?"

Tell Garry that you're editing a new anthology, and he has a story in the post before you've even finished your sentence. He's a very productive writer, which makes me feel positively jealous. Rob and I have just bought a new Kilworth story for Other Rdens 2, and it's one of his best, which is saying a lot. Since he won the 1975 Gollancz/Sunday Times SF short story competition with "Let's Go To Golgotha", Garry has produced an enviable variety of high-quality fiction. Those of us who know his work can pick our favourite stories and novels, but I would point uninitiated readers to the first Other Edens anthology for a recent example of his range. "Triptych" comprises three stories which share a common concern - in this case death, a very Kilworthian preoccupation - but which are otherwise utterly different in style, content, mood, you name it. They also have an admirable concision which is increasingly rare in these days of dekalogies and 500-page blockbusters which would have been better at half the length.

Another benefit of reading Garry's work is that you travel vicariously all over the world. His stories often take the reader to remote or exotic corners of the Earth, where some strangeness lurks, ready to entrap his unsuspecting protagonists. Entrapment is a central theme, his characters frequently escaping from one dilemma into another that's worse. In the world of the global village, you still can't hide from yourself.

Garry remains undervalued in the SF field, and I think this is largely because he's a modest and unassuming bloke. Lesser writers who have a flair for self-promotion are better known, but over the years Garry has continued to build up an increasingly impressive body of work which is gradually finding more and more appreciative readers. If you haven't read his stuff, give yourself a treat and pick up a copy of Witchwater Country or Spiral Winds or The Songbirds of Pain. And there's plenty more where they came from.

The Nova Awards

The NOVA is an award for fanzines produced by Science Fiction Fandom in the British Isles. Created in 1973 by the late Gillon Field and presented anually at Novacon, the NOVA was, until 1981, awarded to the editor of the fanzine voted 'Best of the Year'. Since then there have been two additional NOVA's awarded each year to the fanwriter and fanartist voted 'Best of the Year'. At Novacon 17 the winners were:

Best Fanzine - LIP edited by HAZEL ASHWORTH. Best Fanwriter - D. WEST.

Best Fanartist - D. WEST.

For a fanzine to qualify at Novacon 18 ONE or more issues must have appeared between October 1st 1987 and September 30th 1988. For fanwriters and fanartists to qualify, a piece of writing or artwork by the person concerned must have been published in a fanzine for the first time between October 1st 1987 and September 30th 1988. For the purposes of this award a 'fanzine' is defined as an amateur publication which is concerned with Science Fiction, Fantasy, Science Fiction and Fantasy fans and/or related subjects, and copies of which may be generally obtained in exchange for other amateur publications or in response to letters of comment.

The fundamental idea of the NOVA awards is that they should be awarded by informed vote. Informed votes come from informed voters, which for the purposes of the awards are defined as any member of Novacon 18, provided he or she has been active in fanzines in the British Isles during the year terminating on September 30th 1988. 'Active in fanzines' is a bit harder to define, but the NOVA committee has decided that 'to be active in fanzines' means to have received SIX or more fanzines during the course of the relevant year. Fanzines in this instance means different publications, and NOT different issues of the same fanzine. The various official organs of a group or society will not be treated as different fanzines for the purposes of this rule.


NOVA AWARDS ADMINISTRATOR.
