FILM NOTES

All too often, 'Science Fiction', especially in films, is defined as technological science: space, computers, warfare, artificial intelligence. Medicine, genetics and biology are all sciences, too. Just because a film describes a biological possibility rather than a technical one, it does not make it any less SF.

In *The Fly*, David Cronenberg has directed a top-notch film based on an old movie classic in which a man and a fly are accidentally genetically fused in the man's developing invention, a matter transporter. The film may be graphic for some, but for my money it's a great movie and one of the most romantic love stories I've seen for some time.

It's Alive, directed by Larry Cohen, and It Lives Again are not original in idea: pregnant women on new drug give birth to mutated babies with peculiar habits. They are, however, well conceived and carried out. Keep an eye on what emerges from the NOVACON creche after you've watched these two!

Terminator is the exception here. Not particularly biological but it is a good fast-paced action film about an assassin from the future returning to our time to kill the woman who will become the mother of the rebel leader. There are some good little scenes from the future world and the only nude shot of Arnold Schwarzeneggar I've ever seen. Besides, it's our chairman's favourite film and we need to keep him happy.
