If you want to be in the EXCELSIOR, our CONVENTION HOTEL, rather than the WHEATSHEAF, our OVERFLOW HOTEL, you'd better do this IMMEDIATELY!

Unfortunately, as predicted in the previous two PRs, there are no single rooms left in the Excelsior, so if you want to stay in the main hotel I'm afraid it will have to be in a twin or double room. However, the overflow hotel is only a five minute drive away at Sheldon (see map on centre pages) or a 25 minute walk away. But please note that single rooms at the overflow hotel will cost £30 per night - which is £5.00 per night more than at the Excelsior. If demand justifies it, we may organise a minibus service to the Wheatsheaf, but on present figures this looks unlikely.

If you are in doubt about whether or not you have booked a room, contact Bernie on 021-707 6606 during the evening. If you booked early (i.e. by 30th June as requested) you will already have received your confirmation from the hotel. If you didn't, the second batch of confirmations will be sent out by Bernie Evans late October/early November.

Eastcon, the 1990 British National Science Fiction Convention has moved to the Adelphi Hotel, Liverpool. The Adelphi was the venue of the successful 1988 British National SF Convention, Follycon.

The Eastcon committee chose the Adelphi after difficulties with the Clarendon Suite forced a change from the original site. After consideration no available Birmingham site was judged to be satisfactory.

Guests are: Iain M. Banks, Nigel Kneale, Ken Campbell, artist SMS and fan Anne Page.

Room rates remain: Single £25 per night, Double/Twin/Triple £22.50 per person per night. Book 4 nights together and get £10 off the total (i.e. single £90 for 4 nights, double/twin/triple £80 for 4 nights).

Membership rates remain at £20 attending, £9 supporting until the 1st December 1989. Conversion is at the current difference in rates. Pre-supports get £1 off the above rates. More information will be going out to members shortly. If you are a member, and have not received PRs 1 or 2, please write and let us know.

The Programme

Here we are then, the bit you've all been waiting for. What delights will we, the NOVACON Committee, stage to entertain you as you sup your chosen beverage? Actually, we don't think this is quite the attitude. We want your participation to spark off discussion. All the panels have been arranged with audience participation in mind: this means you.

Nearly all the programme items fall into the three elements of the overall theme of the convention, 'The Music, the Science and the Fiction of the Sixties', as do the chosen films. The centrepiece of the programme is to be an original dramatic presentation written by our Guest of Honour, GEOFF RYMAN. This is based upon the Sumerian legend, the Epic of Gilgamesh. Geoff himself will be performing the piece, aided by an Indian dancer and traditional music.

On the music side, we will also be featuring PAM'S SIXTIES POP QUIZ, with questions by fandom's encyclopaedia of music, JIMMY ROBERTSON. This will be chaired by NOVACON's own PAM WELLS, and will pit BERNIE EVANS AND THE NOVACON COMMITTEE against MICK EVANS AND THE REST OF THE CON.

For the film programme, after discussion we have chosen to show items on large screen video rather than the traditional 16mm film, as this gave us a far wider selection of material to choose from. We kick off on Friday afternoon with something to get you in the spirit of the convention: 'WOODSTOCK', and nobody can tell me that isn't a science fiction or fantasy film! On a more serious side, we plan to be showing the Oscar winning film 'CHARLY', which was taken from Daniel Keyes' Nebula winning novel 'FLOWERS FOR ALGERNON', which in turn came from the Hugo winning short story of the same name. We will also be running 'NIC FAREY'S ALL NIGHT VIDEO PROGRAMME', showing a variety of episodes from 60s TV series and related material. Plus a couple of surprises we're still working on....

The 60s was an era of massive development in all areas, especially rocketry, and we have PAT COLLINS talking about just that. JACK COHEN will explore the 'softer' areas of biology and genetic science for us. Not ignoring the cultural aspect of the decade, LUCY IN THE SKY WITH DICK will be a panel chaired by GREG PICKERSGILL, with CHRIS STOCKS and DAVE PACKWOOD, amongst others, taking part in a discussion about the relationship and influence of writers such as Dick on the emergence of the so-called 'permissive society'. Was there any relationship, and if so, who influenced who? Come along and give us your views....

Did the social revolution touch fandom, then? We talk to fans including BOB SHAW and JAMES WHITE, who were around and active at the time, to find out what really happened.... And what about the effect of the 60s on those people writing today? In BORN IN THE SIXTIES, BRED IN THE SIXTIES, BIG IN THE SIXTIES we'll be talking to STORM CONSTANTINE, IAIN BANKS and one other writer about their perceptions of the 60s and what influence, if any, the decade had on them.

So why not stop and give your ideas, but remember it was the era of peace and love, etc., so let's keep the debates friendly....

Geoff is also a very caring person. During the above mentioned winter during which we were rehearsing at Geoff's "Country Manor", there was one particularly bad snowfall on the Friday night and because I was not on the 'phone Geoff came all the way out to my place in east London (before the crack of dawn) just to make sure that I wasn't trying to get out to Oxford. This astounded me because I had already been out once that morning and had judged the roads to be impassable. (Maybe he is descended from a US Mailman ...neither sleet nor snow, etc.)

I know lots of anecdotes involving Geoff, there's the one about looking for a bar in Newcastle...lots of dressing room tales, but no one would ever tell those if they wished to live. The best way to get to know Geoff is to talk to him. NOVACON 19: How to Get There

By Rail

Get off at Birmingham International Station (NOT New Street). Get a taxi to the hotel. OR catch the 900 bus to Birmingham from outside the station and ask for the Excelsior hotel. OR, if you're feeling energetic, turn left out of the station, walk up to the A45 island, turn right and keep going for about a mile. The hotel is on the right at the entrance to the Freeport.

By Car

From the M6, leave at Junction 4 and head south on the M42. Leave at Junction 3 and take the A45 towards the NEC and station, and carry on a short distance until you get to a set of traffic lights. You will see the Excelsior (Airport Hotel) on your right. Turn right at the lights (signposted to Freeport and Hotel) and you're there.

Parking

The hotel has $\underline{\text{free}}$ parking space for approximately 200 cars, or if you prefer to pay, there $\underline{\text{is a}}$ large NCP just past the hotel on the way to the Freeport.

By Bus from Birmingham

Catch the 900 to Coventry from Stephenson Street behind the Midland Hotel. This stops close to the Excelsior and runs every 20 minutes during the day and every 30 minutes in the evening and on Sunday.

By Coach

National coaches will go to Digbeth coach station, which is on the Coventry Road. Go out of the station, cross the road and look for the bus stop for the 900 going to Coventry. Get off by the Excelsior hotel.


By Air

Really easy. Get a plane which goes to Birmingham. Get off the plane and into a taxi and ask for the Excelsior. Then buy the committee a drink, because we don't earn as much as you.

Getting to the Wheatsheaf Hotel

This is the overflow hotel, and is situated on the A45. Go past the Excelsior and carry on for about one mile towards Birmingham city centre. You will come to a crossroads with overhead traffic lights, and the hotel is on the left opposite corner (Hobs Moat Road). The 900 bus also stops by the hotel in both directions.

The NOVACON Quiz by Vernon Brown

Several years ago the then editor of the Programme Book asked me to provide him with an article or puzzle or something to help fill it out. In the event he got the "or something", because:

- a) I had a lot of questions available from a quiz that I used to do for the BSFG.
- b) For some time I had been intending to design a multiple choice answer sheet for my job.
- c) The first GCSE examinations were to be held in the near future.

Putting all these together produced the first NOVACON General Certificate in Science-fiction Education, a multiple choice quiz that could be marked on the Saturday evening, thus permitting entrants to collect their GCSE pass certificates during the following day. As an extra incentive, entrants were also entered into a free draw for a number of prizes.

Requests over the following years have kept the Quiz going, and it could well become a NOVACON tradition; although this, of course, will depend on the annual response, as it is an active rather than a passive event.

Over the years the format has changed slightly - nowadays entrants can choose the questions/answers they submit and there is a "set book", but the basic layout remains the same: a number of questions each given with several answers, the correct one of which you have to select, a Certificate for all who pass, and a Prize Draw. The "set book" is a known book on which a number of questions will be set - this year it is 'LORD KALVAN OF OTTERWHEN', AKA 'GUNPOWDER GOD' by H Beam Piper, an excellent alternative world novel.

Full details will be given in the Programme Book - please check these when you receive it, as completed answer papers must be handed in by late Saturday afternoon.

So read the set book, bring a black or blue pen, biro or writing felt-tip to the con, and fill in those odd moments by filling in the answer sheet.
