### RED DUST by Paul J McAuley Reviewed by Steve Lawson

We all remember the proliferation of Mars books a few years ago, this is Paul's contribution, and it's a welcome change from the way that the plot concentrates on the high tech terraforming sequences in most of the other books. Terraforming is integral to the plot however, but here the emphasis is on the Mars many years in the future, after the terraforming has begun to fail.

That's not to say that high tech is lacking, it's not, but here the tech is almost taken for granted, virtual reality is a fact of life, many people have moved onto what is seen as a higher level of existence. Following the "Golden Path" to what is perceived to be a better life after death in information space, is becoming more and more common, with people using memory enhancers to "fix" memory and experiences the better to "take" the information with them to "heaven".

Fullerene viruses re-wire people's nervous systems, converting them into improved versions of themselves, or even into totally different versions of themselves, nanotechnology is widespread and used in all levels of society.

Elvis Presley is alive (sort of) and well; on Jupiter and broadcasting rock and roll system wide. It seems that alien abductions were not complete fiction, but it was memories and experiences that were abducted not people.

The Chinese way of life has survived better than any other on Mars and we follow the adventures of Wei Lee through a roller coaster ride of discovery, which propels our unlikely hero through many levels of "reality" and ranging far across a strange new Mars in an attempt to save the world before it reverts to the Mars we know today.

I enjoyed reading this book. I tend to judge a book by how many times I put it down before I finish it. These days I don't have the time to read a book all the way through in one sitting, but this book held my attention and interest all the way through, so it was only put aside three or four times before I finished it, compared to some, which have taken many more sessions, that is very good going.

## CHILD OF THE RIVER by Paul J McAuley Reviewed by Pat McMurray

CHILD OF THE RIVER is the first volume of a trilogy set on a remote artificial world, which has been inhabited by hundreds of different alien races for thousands of years. There's a mixture of technologies, guns and swords, horses and floater discs. Yama is discovered as a child floating on the river, grows up in the care of a minor bureaucrat and begins a journey towards some understanding of himself and his place in this strange world.

Yama's unusual in several ways, his early rescue as a baby from the river, his unidentifiable species, his affinity with the machines which control this world, but ignore the other species.

It's difficult to review the first volume of a trilogy in isolation. We have all read the first volumes of trilogies which turned out to be rubbish as a set, but read well as a first volume. On the other hand we've also read books such as Kim Stanley Robinson's RED MARS or Gene Wolfe's THE SHADOW OF THE TORTURER, which are incomplete in themselves, but turned out to be the first volumes of masterpieces.

Is this novel incomplete? Yes. Is it the first volume of a masterpiece? Maybe, only time will tell. The background is of interest, the story grips, the characters are sympathetic. I shall be reading the next volume.

## NOT THE CRECHE: A BABY SITTING & CHILD MINDING SERVICE by Helena Bowles

Richard Standage, registered nurse working at the highly prestigious Birmingham Children's Hospital, and Helena Bowles, registered nurse at the totally non-prestigious Birmingham Heartlands hospital, will both be attending Novacon with their four-year-old son and one-year-old daughter.

Whilst government legislation decrees that they cannot provide a creche, both are willing to provide baby sitting/child minding on a privately arranged basis. This requires parents to contact them in advance on 0121-558-7591 (or in writing to 116 Shireland Road, Smethwick, Warley, West Midlands, B66 4QJ). They will be caring for their own, and any other children with whose parents a private arrangement has been reached, in an allocated suite in the hotel which will have a bed, a cot and a kettle. They recommend all children be supplied with a selection of carefully labelled favourite toys/books. Babies will require nappies and changing equipment in a carefully labelled bag. Recently potty trained children will require a change of underclothing and trousers or skirt.

Richard and Helena will be happy to feed babies/young children if milk and baby food is supplied. Baby milk/food must be in pre-packaged bottles, as refrigeration facilities may not be available.

As there is no charge made for this service, extra pairs of hands on a voluntary basis will be greatly appreciated.
