## **HOTEL LIAISON REPORT by Carol Morton**

This is the last PR before the con, thus my last opportunity to harangue you.

I have had a concession from the hotel on the room bookings. As the deadline will have passed by the time you read this Progress Report, the Britannia have said that they will be selling rooms to the public from 1 November but will of course give priority to our membership. So if you have yet to book a room - THEN DO SO REAL SOON NOW.

As to the food prices, we think we have a very good deal from the hotel. The Convention Menu that will be available and sold in the restaurant and other areas as notified in the "Read Me Inside", will be priced between £1.50 and £3.50. The menus for the weekend will also be printed in the "Read Me Inside".

In addition the hotel has an excellent table d'hôte menu of which Birmingham-resident gourmet Rog Peyton said "I don't think I will be going out of the hotel to eat if that is an example of the menu", and it is reasonably priced at £14.50 for three courses. I can tell you the meals are excellent having eaten there twice. (The table d'hôte menu will be available 19.00-21.30 on Friday and Saturday. You should find booking forms detailing the menu in your convention pack on arrival. If not ask at either the Hotel Reception or at the Novacon Registration Table.)

Of more importance to many of our members is the beer prices. We have again negotiated a great deal. John Smith's Smooth Pour and Foster's lager will be sold at £1.50 per pint. The real ale we have arranged for the Britannia to supply for the weekend is Bombardier Premium Bitter and that will sell at £1.85 per pint. Beamish Black is also available at £2.10 per pint. Unfortunately the hotel cannot do draught cider, but will sell bottled cider, both sweet and dry, at £1.00 per bottle - sorry to the cider drinkers but we did try our best for you. As an added bonus the bars will be selling chocolate, Cadbury's as it is local but this will include Bournville for real chocolate lovers.

One last point. Badges. Although the hotel will be selling the bedrooms we are not using to the general public we have an agreement from them that any drinks for non-convention guests will have to be room service thus they won't be using "our" bars. However, as non-convention hotel guests will be using the restaurant - for the table d'hôte menu you MUST, MUST wear your convention badges at all times in the public and convention areas of the Britannia. If you do not you may be refused service in the bars and refused food from the Convention Menu. You WILL be challenged by our own security staff and prevented from entering the function spaces. I have given the hotel permission to challenge anyone in the hotel who is not wearing a badge, as to whether they are a member of the convention or not. Be warned and wear your badge.

Well that's about all I need to say, other than:

1. Get your hotel forms in NOW,
2. I am looking forward to seeing you all at the con,
3. When you get there - ENJOY YOURSELVES.

## **PRESENTATION SKILLS WORKSHOP**

A presentation skills workshop sounds very formal and business like, but nothing could be further from our intentions. Communication is a very important part of fandom, and at conventions presentation and speaking skills are the core parts of public interaction. Such skills include being able to speak in a mike and be heard clearly, speaking without a mike, asking a question from the floor, leading a debate or chairing a panel, being able to present on your own and with support from others or from tools such as overhead projectors, flip charts and other visual aids.

John D Rickett (known to all as JDR) has a lot of experience in using such skills in both formal and informal situations. Those who had the pleasure to hear his Guest of Honour speech at Corflu UK this year will know he's a very good public speaker. He's also a regular and reliable moderator and an interesting panellist.

He hopes to lead a small group, no more than ten, in exploring such aspects of these skills as the group chooses, over the timescale that the group chooses. Starting with an initial get together in the main programme room (the Gloucester) at 10:00 on Saturday, the group will decide what to approach and when and where to do it over the weekend.

It will be an informal, small, friendly group. JDR is looking forward to spending some time on this. Whether your presentation skills are very great or barely beginning you should get a lot of benefit and fun out of this. We have no idea how much interest there will be in this workshop, and there are only ten places available, so perhaps best to contact us at the convention address to book a place in advance if you're interested.

## **FAIRYLAND by Paul J McAuley**

### **Reviewed by Martin Tudor**

FAIRYLAND features the main protagonist Alex. Alex is no mere gene hacker; he creates, splices, designs infective units of psychoactive viruses - but he gets in too deep with some nasty people and finds himself on the run with Milena, a twelve year-old girl who has been manufactured by a super-national company for reasons of their own.... *No, that doesn't cover it, er...*

FAIRYLAND is part of a sequence of near-future stories that includes "Prison Dreams", "Dr Luther's Assistant", "Children of the Revolution" and "Slaves"; and itself is comprised of three sections with dramatically different flavours "Edge Gliding", "Love Bombing" and "The Library of Dreams". All of them feature the artificially created creatures known as Dolls (or when they escape into the wild Fairies) *No, that isn't it either, too dry, er...*

FAIRYLAND is set in a chilling near-future world it opens with "Edge Gliding" as the western civilisation as we know it is falling apart, and by "Love Bombing" Alex is chasing after Milena through a western world which is virtually unrecognisable:

"In the Europe of the First World, most people enjoy a universal unearned wage and unlimited leisure in booming economies driven by new technologies that are making techniques of mass production, hardly changed since the days of Henry Ford, finally obsolete. They live at the edge of the old conurbations in ribbon arcologies, vast conglomerations of apartment complexes, leisure parks and shopping centres that are part built, part grown. More than fifty per cent of the population of First World Europe is over eighty, the baby boomer generation of the last century come into a post-Millennial paradise. Nanotechnology and gene therapy promises that at least half of them will live into their second century.

"But there's also the Europe of the Fourth World, the Europe of the dispossed, the people of the fringe. Half the population of the old Communist Bloc countries have been displaced by civil wars, and their numbers are swollen by refugees from the economic and ecological disasters in Africa, migrants who flock through Italy into the heart of Europe like swallows. They are uncountable, although tag and recapture methods used by UN relief estimate that refugees are roughly equal in number to the official population of Europe. Sometimes, especially in summer, it seems that all of Europe is on the move, a giantess restlessly but never quite waking, displacing and distorting the maps which cover her."

In "The Library of Dreams" Alex is hot on Milena's trail but all hell has broken loose as someone has created Fairyland - the Fairies themselves or someone else? War has broken out... *That's closer but...*

Nope. I'm afraid you're just going to have to read this one yourself!

## **ANCIENTS OF DAYS by Paul J McAuley**

ANCIENTS OF DAYS is the second volume of a trilogy, the first volume CHILD OF THE RIVER was reviewed in Progress Report #3 and the final volume SHRINE OF STARS is scheduled to be published in September next year. The setting is the artificial world of Confluence which orbits an obscure star beyond the edge of the Galaxy. It is home to 10,000 races, shaped and raised to intelligence by the Preservers, god-like descendants of humanity who have abandoned Confluence and retreated from the Universe itself.

The hero of both volumes is Yamamanama, known as Yama, who was found as a baby on the breast of a dead woman in a white boat floating on the Great River. Yama's lineage is unknown - his race seems to have disappeared from Confluence - and so he sets out to find all he can of his forbears and to see if any of his race still survive.

In ANCIENTS OF DAYS many of the questions posed in CHILD OF THE RIVER are answered but, as you might expect, even more interesting questions are raised....

This is a strange, exotic novel - the atmosphere reminiscent, at times, of Joseph Conrad's claustrophobic works set in humid climes amongst strange peoples. But with the introduction of Angel, and the revelations of her incredible past, the novel's viewpoint changes to an incredible mind-bogglingly view of ten millin years of human history.

I eagerly await SHRINE OF STARS - not least so that I can settle down and read this whole magnificent work at a sitting.

## ***NOT THE CRECHE: A BABY SITTING & CHILD MINDING SERVICE* by Helena Bowles**

Richard Standage, registered nurse working at the highly prestigious Birmingham Children's Hospital, and Helena Bowles, registered nurse at the totally non-prestigious Birmingham Heartlands hospital, will both be attending Novacon with their four-year-old son and one-year-old daughter.

Whilst government legislation decrees that they cannot provide a creche, both are willing to provide baby sitting/child minding on a privately arranged basis. This requires parents to contact them in advance on 0121-558-7591 (or in writing to 116 Shireland Road, Smethwick, Warley, West Midlands, B66 4QJ). They will be caring for their own, and any other children with whose parents a private arrangement has been reached, in an allocated suite in the hotel which will have a bed, a cot and a kettle. They recommend all children be supplied with a selection of carefully labelled favourite toys/books. Babies will require nappies and changing equipment in a carefully labelled bag. Recently potty trained children will require a change of underclothing and trousers or skirt.

Richard and Helena will be happy to feed babies/young children if milk and baby food is supplied. Baby milk/food must be in pre-packaged bottles, as refrigeration facilities may not be available.

As there is no charge made for this service, extra pairs of hands on a voluntary basis will be greatly appreciated.

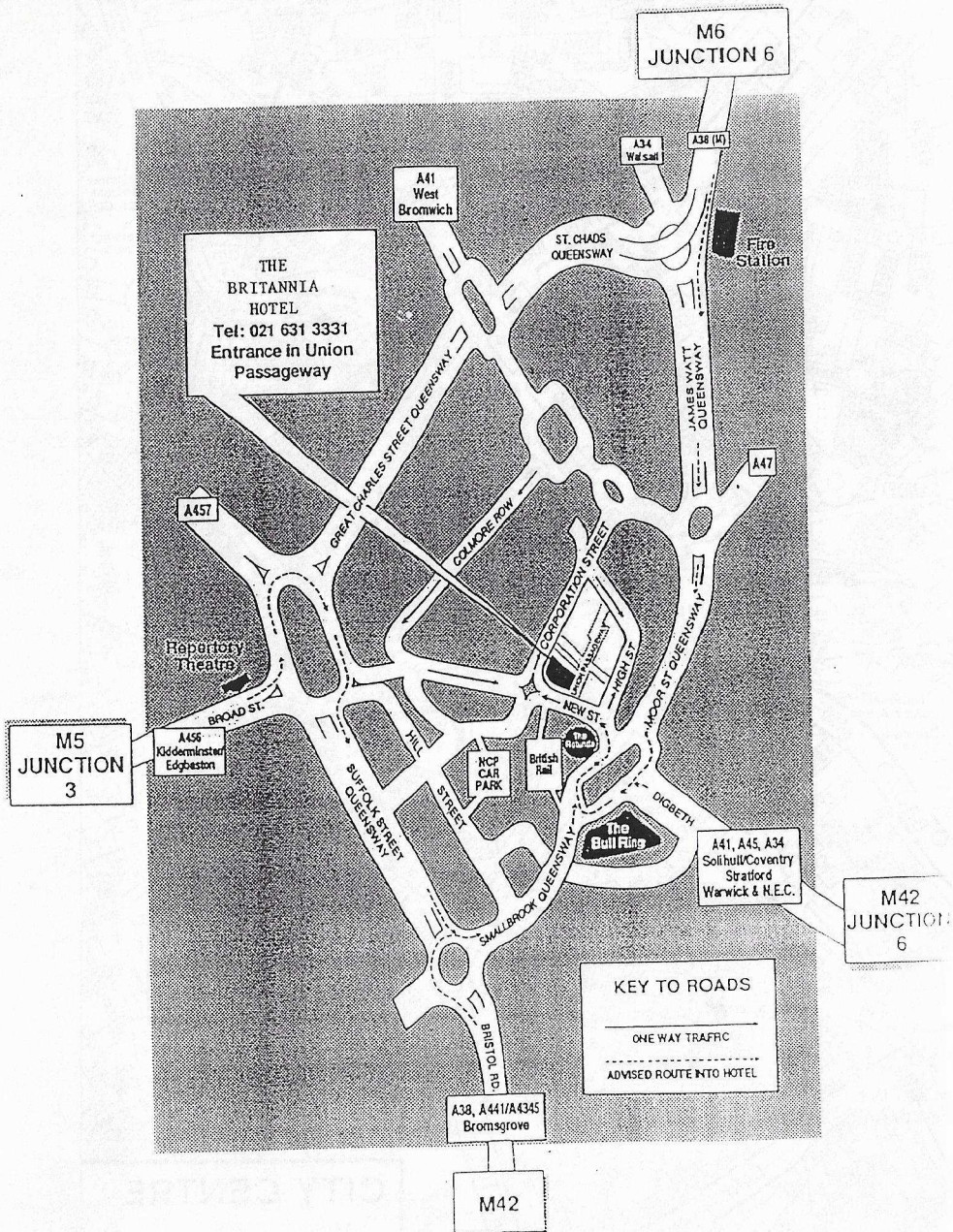

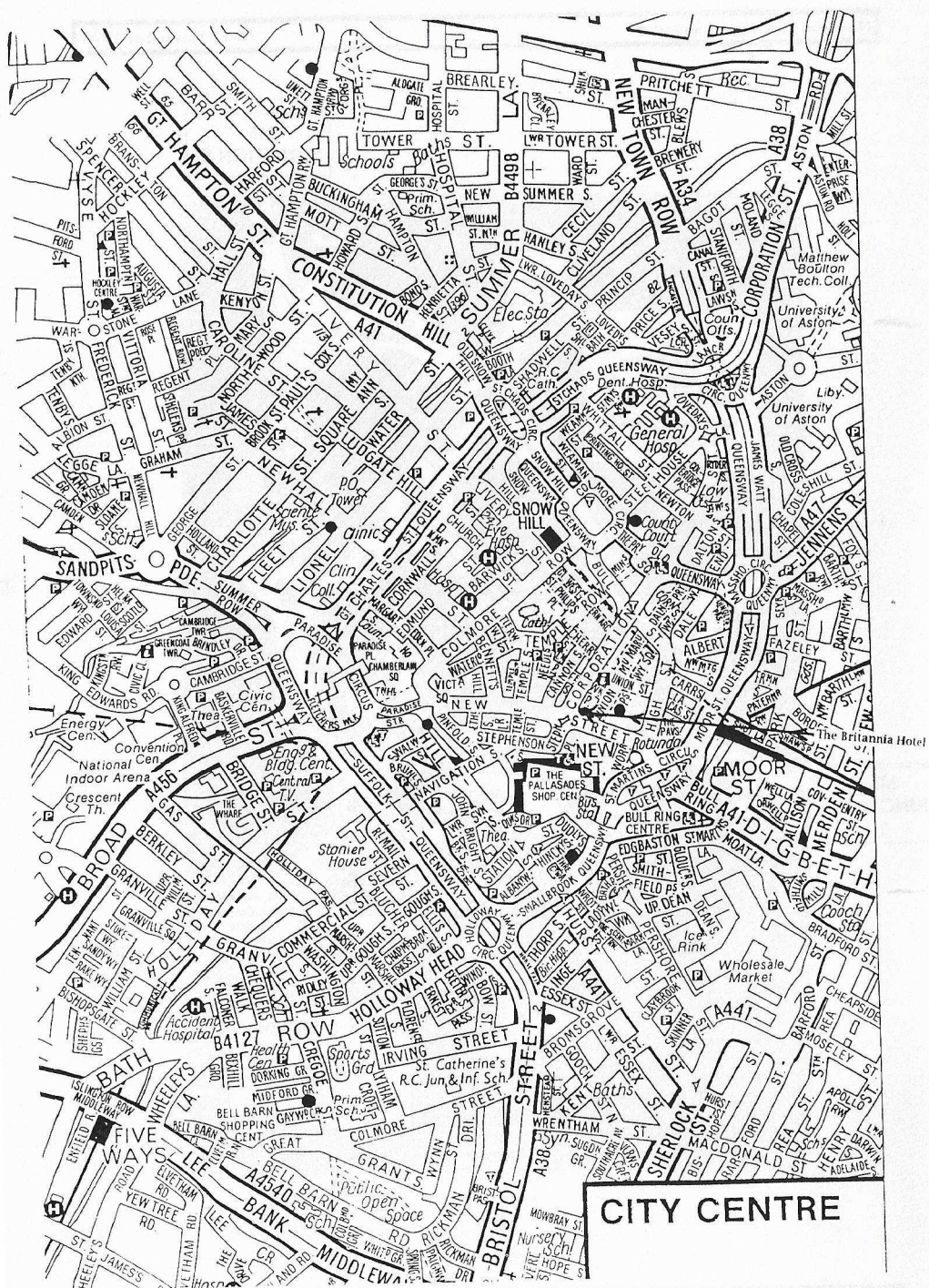
## THE NOVA AWARDS

## **HOW TO GET THERE BY CAR**

From the M6: Get off at J6 and follow the A38(M) (Aston Expressway) towards Birmingham city centre. Eventually, you'll go down an underpass and then see a bit of daylight before going down a second longer underpass which bears round to the left. On resurfacing, exit left off the main drag and go down to Holloway Circus. (You'll pass the new Andromeda). Turn left into Smallbrook Queensway. Take the first left again into Hill Street. About 100 yards along you'll see the main entrance to the Pallasades car park on your right. (£9.00 for 24 hours.) If you're feeling brave you could try for the top entrance, which may get you a little nearer to New Street. Continue along Hill Street and go right at the lights into Navigation Street. You then have to bear left up Pinfold Street and round to the right back down to Navigation Street. The car park entrance is in front of you. Careful how you cross the traffic.

From the M5: Probably best to leave at J3 and follow the A456 towards Birmingham. This brings you on to the Hagley Road which you then follow all the way to Five Ways (Edgbaston Shopping Centre and the Swallow Hotel on your right). Go down the underpass onto Broad Street and along past the I.C.C. Go right round Paradise Circus and along Suffolk Street (A38) then directions as above.

*(Please note that if you wish to unload at the Hotel before parking your car you can do so using one of the two Britannia Hotel parking bays on New Street beside Boots/Union Passage. For further details see Pat McMurray's piece on WHEELCHAIR ACCESS below.)*

## **HOW TO GET THERE BY TRAIN OR COACH**

By Train: First ensure that you book your ticket to Birmingham New Street and not Birmingham International Station.

Leave New Street Station via the escalators, which are facing you as you enter the main concourse from the platforms. These escalators will take you up into the Pallasades Shopping Centre. At the top turn left and make your way out of the Shopping Centre. Walk down the ramp past McDonalds to the bottom

where the Midland Bank is on your right. At the Midland Bank look across the street and to your right, across the road, you will see the Britannia Hotel.

Cross over New Street and walk down towards Boots, the main entrance to the Britannia is in a small alleyway called Union Passage.

By Coach: You will arrive at Digbeth Coach Station, leave the station on to the road called Digbeth and turn left. Walk up the hill to the Bull Ring Centre, continue through the Market and turn right, walking up the ramp, towards New Street (and the Rotunda). Walk through the short subway to the steps leading to New Street, at the top of these steps the Rotunda Branch of Lloyds Bank will be on your left. Turn right and cross at the lights, then go left up New Street past BHS and Boots to the alleyway called Union Passage turn right and you'll be facing the main entrance to the Britannia.

## **WHEELCHAIR ACCESS**

From St Martins Circus, Queensway, you will see an exit to the High Street sign-posted "New St Hotels Loading Area". Take this road, and turn immediately left into New Street. (You cannot continue up the High Street, as it's a pedestrianised area).

The Britannia Hotel is on your right, at first floor level above Etams. Look for the blue Britannia flags. The disabled parking bay is immediately on your right as you enter New Street, about 150 metres before the hotel. As far as we can find out, there is no time limit on the disabled bays, providing you have a disabled sticker. This disabled bay has space for four cars.

There are loading bays closer to the hotel, in front of Etams and Boots. You can park there to unload, but even a disabled sticker may not save you from the wrath of Birmingham's Traffic Wardens. A 30 minute stay while you unload should be fine. The hotel recommend that you ask one of their porters to keep an eye on your car while you unload. However there should be dealers etc., unloading there for most of Friday afternoon.

If you would prefer to leave your car in covered parking once you've unloaded, or if the disabled bays are full, we've arranged parking for £9.00 per day in the Pallasades carpark. See directions above for getting to there.

The entrance to the hotel is up an alleyway called Union Passage, underneath the Britannia sign. The alleyway slopes at about one to twenty.

The main entrance comprises a revolving door, leading to a small landing at the top of three stairs down to the ground floor reception. There is also a fire exit which can be opened from the inside, which leads to the same small landing. It appears possible to get an ordinary manual or powered wheelchair through the fire exit onto the landing. The hotel have a ramp for the three steps which they will lay down for the weekend. The fire exits are alarmed, but we'll ask them to switch the alarm off for the weekend. In the nature of things they will almost certainly forget to do these things, and switch the alarms on and take the ramp up at every shift changeover, but we shall do our best.

If you have a scooter or large trolley which cannot get through the fire exit, the revolving door can be completely folded back to allow very good access. I have been shown how to do this, and intend to train every gopher and anyone else who's interested in it, how to do it. The hotel have shown every sign of being helpful and friendly, but best to be prepared. I would expect that the ramp will be down and the doors open most of Friday afternoon as the dealers come in and out as well.

The hotel has 11 floors - ground floor reception, Mezzanine bar area, which we probably won't use, first floor restaurant which we will use, second floor main con bar, dealer's room, OPs and registration, eighth floor workshops, ninth floor arishow, smaller bar and programme room. All other floors are bedrooms and there are bedrooms on the second and eighth floor as well.

There are three lifts to each floor - two public lifts and one staff lift. There are also fire escape stairs between all floors and public stairs between the ground, mezzanine and first floors. Both public lifts and all public rooms appear both wheelchair and scooter accessible. We've calculated that it will take ten minutes for the entire membership to travel by lift from the second to the ninth floor - we have fifteen minute intervals between most programme items. The staff lift can be used by the membership, but appears very difficult for wheelchair access - I'd stick to the public lifts.

All the public areas on each floor are flat, with no stairs. Many of the doors are on springs and may prove difficult to open without assistance. Most entrances to public rooms are double doored and will be left open where possible. The artshow and dealers room appear large enough that they should not be crowded and manoeuvring should be reasonable.

The hotel has certain bedrooms they provide to people with access difficulties. None of them are fully accessible. All the bedroom doors are standard width, but they can remove the bathroom doors, if requested. I would suggest contacting the hotel in advance to make doubly sure they are aware of any potential difficulties. I believe wheelchairs will be able to get into the rooms, but I don't think scooters will be able to. It should be possible to get the hotel to take care of a scooter and recharge it overnight.
