


Food and Drink

Breakfast

Breakfast will be served in the restaurant on the 1st floor from 7.30am until 11.00am on Saturday and Sunday.

Convention Menu

This will be served in the 1st floor restaurant for every session (except Sunday 18.30-20.30 which will be served in the Warwick). Simply pay for your meal(s), collect your raffle ticket(s) and collect the meal(s) from the servery.

Hot Vegetarian and Hot Meat options will be available at each sitting, with a salad style option permanently available, along with a dessert. Each sitting will feature three of the following:

Sunday: 12.30-14.30 and 18.30-20.30 (the latter in the Warwick)

Filled Baguettes will be available from both bars throughout the weekend priced £1.50 each.

Drink

We will not be using Harvey's as a bar - the main convention bar is the Malvern and Malvern Bar on the 2nd floor (please note that the smaller section, the Malvern "Bar" is a no smoking area). In addition, this year we will be using the Warwick bar on the 9th floor. Opening times are as follows:

Malvern/Malvern Bar: Friday and Saturday 11am to 2am and Sunday 11am to 7pm.

Warwick Bar: Friday 6pm-2am, Saturday and Sunday 11am to 2am.

The Real Ale we have arranged for the Britannia to supply for the weekend has been changed to Holdens Bitter (3.8%) which will cost £1.70 per pint. John Smith's Smooth Pour and Foster's lager will be sold at £1.50 per pint. Beamish Black is also available at £2.10 per pint. Unfortunately the hotel cannot do draught cider, but will sell bottled cider, both sweet and dry.

For the convenience of members who prefer wine the hotel have agreed to sell bottles (and some half bottles) over the two bars at restaurant prices! A full wine list should be available at the bar, but the following should give you some idea (prices per bottle except where stated):

1. House Red, £7.50

Medium bodied (French) wine with a good depth of fruit

2. House White, £7.50 Light crisp and fruity with a good balance

(Several other French wines but we won't be buying them will we?)

German Selection

3. Liebfraumilch QbA, £8.95 A medium fruity wine with a pleasant floral bouquet

4. Neirsteiner Guites Domtal QbA, £9.25 (£4.40)

Flowery, scented bouquet with a crisp and fruity medium style

5. Piesporter Michelsburg QbA, £9.75 (half £4.65)
A light and elegant wine with a crisp and fruity medium style

Australian Selection

- Richmond Ridge White, £10.50
 Easy drinking Australian white wine, dry with a clean well balanced flavour
- 7. Richmond Ridge Red, £10.50
 Full flavoured red wine, good balance of fruit and character

Italian Selection

- Frascati DOC, £9.75
 Medium bodied Italian wine with the scent of sunshine and almonds
- 9. Chianti DOC, £9.75
 Classic Italian Red, soft fruit with a spicy finish

South African Selection

Rocheburg Chenin Blanc, £9.20
 Medium dry white wine with a good balance of fruit

Champagne and Sparkling wines also available

Wheelchair Access by Pat McMurray

As you will have noticed the main entrance to the Britannia comprises a revolving door, leading to a small landing at the top of three stairs down to the ground floor reception. There is also a fire exit which can be opened from the inside, which leads to the same small landing. It appears possible to get an ordinary manual or powered wheelchair through the fire exit onto the landing. The hotel have a ramp for the three steps which they will lay down for the weekend. The fire exits are alarmed, but we'll ask them to switch the alarm off for the weekend. In the nature of things they will almost certainly forget to do these things, and switch the alarms on and take the ramp up at every shift changeover, but we shall do our best.

If you have a scooter or large trolley which cannot get through the fire exit, the revolving door can be completely folded back to allow very good access. I have been shown how to do this, and intend to train every gopher and anyone else who's interested in it, how to do it. The hotel have shown every sign of being helpful and friendly, but best to be prepared. I would

expect that the ramp will be down and the doors open most of Friday afternoon as the dealers come in and out as well.

The hotel has 11 floors -- ground floor reception, Mezzanine bar area, which we probably won't use, 1st floor restaurant which we will use, 2nd floor main con bar, dealer's room, Ops and registration, 8th floor meeting rooms, 9th floor artshow, smaller bar and programme room. All other floors are bedrooms and there are bedrooms on the 2nd and 8th floors as well.

There are three lifts to each floor -- two public lifts and one staff lift. There are also fire escape stairs between all floors and public stairs between the ground, mezzanine and first floors. Both public lifts and all public rooms appear both wheelchair and scooter accessible. We've calculated that it will take ten minutes for the entire membership to travel by lift from the second to the ninth floor -- we have fifteen minute intervals between most programme items. The staff lift can be used by the membership, but appears very difficult for wheelchair access -- I'd stick to the public lifts.

All the public areas on each floor are flat, with no stairs. Many of the doors are on springs and may prove difficult to open without assistance. Most entrances to public rooms are double doored and will be left open where possible. The artshow and dealers room appear large enough that they should not be crowded and manoeuvring should be reasonable.

The hotel has certain bedrooms they provide to people with access difficulties. None of them are fully accessible. All the bedroom doors are standard width, but they can remove the bathroom doors, if requested. I would suggest contacting the hotel in advance to make doubly sure they are aware of any potential difficulties. I believe wheelchairs will be able to get into the rooms, but I don't think scooters will be able to. It should be possible to get the hotel to take care of a scooter and recharge it overnight.

General Information

Novacon Table

The Novacon Registration table will be open: Friday: 4pm-9pm for N29 Registrations ONLY.

Saturday: 10am-2pm and 3pm-7pm for all Novacon/BSFG business Sunday: 10am-2pm for all Novacon/BSFG business From Saturday morning onwards the table will be: selling a variety of Novacon merchandise and publications from previous Novacons; selling badges for the Beer Tasting (£4.50 per person or your 3 bottles of beer); selling memberships to Novacon 30 (just £23.00 at Novacon 29, rising to £28.00 after the con); raffle tickets in aid of the RNIB's Books for the Blind Project; taking money for the Birmingham SF Group's Beer & Skittles evening in December.

Dealers' Room

This is in the Chiltern on the 2nd floor and will be open from 10am until 6pm Saturday and 10am until 4pm on Sunday. It may be open at sometime on Friday. Times are subject to change.

The Art Show

This is in the Stafford on the 9th floor and will be open from 10am until 6pm on Saturday and on Sunday from 10am until the Art Auction starts at noon.

The International Beer Tasting

On Sunday night from 8pm we will be hosting the latest in a long series of Novacon Beer Tastings, using the ever-popular BYOB (bring your own beer) format. To get the ball rolling the convention hopes to have two local beers on draught, Enville White (OG 1042, ABV 4%) and Sarah Hughes Dark Ruby Mild (OG 1058, ABV 6%), as well as a few interesting bottles - the rest is up to you!

To take part, all you need to do is bring at least THREE bottles of your favourite British or foreign beer to the convention and check them in at the Novacon Registration desk when you arrive. In return you will receive a "BEER BADGE" which will entitle you to drink the beer at the Tasting on Sunday.

Alternatively, you can also take part in the Tasting by buying a BEER BADGE for £4.50 from Novacon Registration.

All Novacon members are welcome to attend the Tasting. The convention is supplying an assortment of exotic and/or unusual non-alcoholic drinks at the Tasting, which will be free to everyone, but only those with BEER BADGES will be entitled to drink the beer. For further information contact the Beer Tasting Organiser, Tony Berry, in the bar, or ask at the Novacon Registration Table.

[Please remember, although we have come to an arrangement with the Britannia regarding the Beer Tasting, this does not extend to you bringing in your own supplies of drink elsewhere during the con.

The Hotel can and will charge corkage to people smuggling food or drink into the hotel!]

Gophers

If you *have* volunteered to be a gopher or if you *wish* to volunteer please report to CHRIS MURPHY in the Ops Room (the Lichfield, behind the Novacon Registration Desk). If you *have* volunteered or *wish* to volunteer to help in the Book Room please report to NIGEL FURLONG in the Chiltern.

R.N.I.B. Raffle

If you wish to purchase tickets for the annual raffle in aid of RNIB's Books for the Blind Project, Anne Woodford will be selling them around the con, but tickets will also be available from the Novacon Registration table -- Saturday onwards. In a change from established tradition, prizes will not be given out as the draw is made at the Award Ceremony. Instead prizes will be available for collection from a table set up in the Warwick bar after the ceremony. Last year the raffle raised just over £360 (which we rounded-up to £400), but this year we would like to make that £500.

We have a wide variety of prizes which will be displayed near the Novacon registration table from Saturday onwards. These include videos of lan Stewart's Christmas Lectures (many thanks to lan) and a wide variety of books (thanks to Transworld and Colin Greenland).

Badges

As non-convention hotel guests will be using the restaurant - for the table d'hôte menu you MUST wear your convention badges at all times in the public and convention areas of the Britannia. If you do not you may be refused service in the bars and refused food from the Convention Menu. You WILL be challenged by our own security staff and prevented from entering the function spaces. The hotel will challenge anyone in the hotel who is not wearing a badge.

As usual the badges are colour coded. Full members are cream, Friday members grey, Saturday members blue, Sunday members cream, Tech Ops and Gophers green, committee orange, Guest of Honour rose, beer badges grey.

Operations

As we are sure most of you are aware Novacon, like most conventions in Britain, is run by volunteers and we can't have too many of them! So if you are willing to help out at the convention -- anything from moving chairs to

helping with tech ops or working on the programme, please contact me, Chris Murphy, in the Ops Room.

Registration and Operations will be in the same place as last year, first on the left as you come out of the second floor lifts. Unlike last year we shall be operating a fascist 'tidy' Ops Room policy, with designated areas for stuff to be stored and no non-essential furniture (or people). However, you will still be able to leave coats and bags in Ops on request and at your own risk.

No Smoking

We would appreciate it if you refrained from smoking in designated "No Smoking" areas such as: the Chiltern/Dealers' Room (apart from dealers), the Stafford/Art Show, the Malvern Bar, and the Gloucester/Main Programme.

Dire Warnings

Please remember that the Britannia Hotel is in the business of selling accommodation, drink and food for profit. Neither the management of the Britannia nor the Novacon committee will approve of people "crashing" in rooms they haven't paid for, and/or smuggling food/drink into the hotel. The Novacon committee will obviously support the hotel in any dispute with members of Novacon caught "crashing" and/or "smuggling".
