The Art Show will be in the Sedgley and Brierley Rooms (straight down the corridor past Hotel reception, second and third syndicate rooms on your left after the stairs). Next door, in the Netherton, you will find our CD ROM art show, which will feature the work of Meraylah Allwood, David A. Hardy, Colin Langeveld, Dave Carson and Martin McKenna.

They will be open from 4pm-6.45pm on Friday, 10am until 6pm on Saturday and on Sunday from 10am until noon, closing for the Art Auction.

We invited artists to write briefly about the work they have supplied on CD-ROM:

COLIN LANGEVELD: Following my recent acquisition of CARRARA STUDIO I have been experimenting with the varied effects created by the rendering of volume visible light. This can produce interesting and realistic images when applied to light streaming through foliage seen in forests when the sun sits low on the horizon, or catches dust motes as it enters a darkened room via a single window. It can also be quite spectacular if the window happens to be of the leaded, coloured type. Whether dust motes can be seen in outer space is questionable, nevertheless, I find the use of volume visible light in this setting adds an ambience that enhances the genre.

One of the main disadvantages of the rendered image can be seen in rock and terrain – the sharp definition and harsh angles that separate the varied shapes in rocks or the manner in which terrain meets water. Thanks to my wife and the gift of a graphics pad, I have, to a certain degree, overcome this. Add to this latest bit of kit, PHOTOSHOP 7 and 3D STUDIO VIZ, I am at present on a new and exciting learning curve. The possibilities are endless.

Up to quite recently, the textures applied to my 3D models have been somewhat haphazard, and at times, difficult to lay on as I attempt to project the most realistic image possible. Fortunately, a useful little programme acquired via the net enables me to produce a two dimensional image of my model. This texture is then applied to the image and then rendered on to my model. I still have a lot to learn, but hopefully, I'm slowly getting there.

MERAYLAH ALLWOOD I have spent most of my life living in the countryside, or seeking the wild places where the veil between the worlds of spirit, or faery, is thinner. I have always painted using nature as my inspiration. I try to combine the dynamic worlds of folklore and mythology with the ecology and natural history of the subjects I illustrate. I love the connection between past mythologies and folklore and the present, the way those old stories have an uncanny way of weaving themselves into daily life, until they are somehow transformed once more and reborn as new tales each generation.

We can surely only marvel at the complexity and intricacies of the natural world, the web of life to which we ourselves owe our very existence. I feel that we have all lost so much with our modern mechanistic materialistic focus, so many of us living with our backs to nature, away from the knowledge of the Earth who bore us, and away from the magic that can inspire our imaginations to grow and seek out changes. I hope that in however small a way my paintings can be part of those inspirations.

DAVID A. HARDY This year I have tried to include images which were not on last year's CD-ROM (though there are a couple). I tried to include a good mixture: there are paintings and illustrations from years ago, like 'Proxima's Planet v.1' from *Challenge of the Stars* (with Patrick Moore, 1972). The later version is in *Visions of Space* (Dragon's World, 1989/1990 - of which, incidentally, I have managed to get hold of a few copies, brand new. If you missed it first time round, do have a word with me!)

Then there are recent paintings (ie. brushes, canvas and stuff), like 'Eruption on Io' and the three circular Earth/Moon/Mars paintings which form the jacket and endpapers of my new Paper Tiger book, *Hardyware* - and (shameless plug) I have included that jacket illo too. Several of the images on this CD are also in the book, but a lot are not, because they are too new or there just wasn't room for them. And there are several digital pieces, too. The most recent is the discovery of another new Jupiter-like planet of another star, which was announced to the media on 15 October 2001. It is digital - but the landscape may seem familiar to Tony Berry, as it was originally in a painting he commissioned, of the Pleiades. There are SF covers for *Analog* and books, space art, movie production art, diagrams, private commissions. . . a bit of everything, and hopefully something for everyone. And you may find some of them in the 'real' (as opposed to virtual) Art Show too!

DAVE CARSON has been working on & off as a professional fantasy illustrator for over 20 years and has five British Fantasy Awards to his name. Best known for his black & white Lovecraftian pen & ink work he has more recently experimented with various media such as sculpture and digital imagery which bring new depth and dimension to his twisted dark imagination. No wonder Brain Lumley has called him "the Master of tentacular pustularity". Long time buddy Robert Rankin has regularly used Dave as a character throughout his books and has called Dave "one of our most accomplished and original illustrators".

MARTIN MCKENNA is best known for his fantasy, horror and science fiction work as well as his long association with the games industry. Having cut his teeth with Games Workshop and the Fighting Fantasy books, Martin linked up with Eidos Interactive (home of Lara Croft) as a development team artist. He is currently working freelance on a number of projects. Martin has a British Fantasy Award as Best Artist to his name and an unhealthy interest in Dr Who.

The City in the Hedge of Whenever.

In honour of this year's **James White Award** being hosted by Novacon, *Graham Andrews* remembers the man himself.

I would have liked to pen a scholarly monograph about the very first Novacon (1971) and its guest-of-honour, James White. After all, I was there, with the Northern Ireland contingent (Jim & Peggy White, Bob &

Sadie Shaw and Seamus Lavery). But my every attempt ended up something like this:

Jim bought a round of drinks. I bought a round of drinks. Ditto Seamus and everybody else within hypno-ray range. Bob Shaw bought out the bar. Not so much name-dropping, then, as pint-downing – especially at Bob's Hum-and-Sway Party. I should, perhaps, mention the John Brunner Self –Sustaining Ego Award ceremony. (You'll just have to guess the winner's name.) And did Phillip really narrate all of Heinlein's *I Will Fear No Evil*, as an Alternative Program?

Who Knows . . . but I'm not even sure if the Good Gallifrayan Doctor was an Attending Member that year. If indeed present, he didn't stand us a round of drinks. "Everybody loves a Time Lord" –Hah! I can, however, hazily recall the pre-Novacon deliberations of The Belfast Science Fiction Group in Whites Cross-Time Tavern. (I might have made the middle bit up.)

HISTORICAL INTERLUDE

The Belfast Science Fiction Group of which I speak represented Second Irish Fandom, which followed seamlessly on from the First Irish Fandom founded by Walter Willis and James White in 1947.

SIF – or SUF, to distinguish Ulster from the 'Irish' Irish SF group that had sprung up in the meantime – began circa 1969. A "FANS WANTED" card was placed in the SF section of Harry Hall's second-hand bookshop (Smithfield Market, downtown Belfast—nostalgic sigh!) attracted new members. These new-blooders included Frank McKeever, Ed Dilworth, Tony Moran, Seamus Lavery, and Your Faithful chronicler. Today's TUF (Third Ulster Fandom) dates from 1981, when Jim gave some writing classes at the Belfast Workers Educational Association night school.

Anyhoo, we were all safely ensconced in the 'old' White's Tavern, which had not yet been blown up and later turned into the 'new' White's Tavern. The Group's motto was – and probably still is – "Don't tell us your Troubles." One unfortunate SUF member was questioned by a British Army Sergeant turned-out at Roadblock deployment. SUF member: "I'm just a science-fiction fan." BASTARD: "Yes, Yes but are you a Protestant science-fiction fan or a Catholic science-fiction fan?"

To His credit, Jim never told jokes like that. He Told Jokes like this instead:

The Medical Officer with a Good Irish Name aboard a coldsleep starship must take frequent times-out to monitor the health of his

popsicled colleagues and other livestock. Everyone and –thing is revived at Trip's End to find the M.O. has got himself sentient company. "I was lonely." He explains, "so I thought I'd thaw a pussy cat." *The Dream Millennium*, in embryonic form.

Bob Shaw threw up his hands in disgust at that one, which surprised even him, because he hadn't swallowed them in the first place. You can't beat the old ones, mush as you'd like to at times. Jim and Bob were then both employed by Short Brothers, the Belfast Aerospace company, where they kept up the same punishing schedule.

The Novacon invasion plan was finally settled, down to the last insignificant detail (the Bar-bill took that a little longer). A nervous traveller, Jim had to be convinced by All and Sundry (I'd forgotten to mention them) that Birmingham would be there when the Imperial Airways passenger plane arrived over the appropriate real estate. As he almost wrote (in *Tomorrow is Too Far*): "Air travel involves no major temporal displacement. It's just that everything in creation is moving in several directions at once."

The tides of time rolled on. We left White's Tavern at the legally correct but morally imbecilic time of 10.00 PM. (Well the last buses did leave Belfast city centre at eleven o'clock – sharp. After that came the *I am Legend Stuff*.) We duly wended our not-merry-enough way to what was then Copper Griddle restaurant/hamburger joint. When Bob Shaw espied Francis Curley, Ltd., the natty gent's tailoring establishment, an unholy gleam appeared in his eye. The right eye, I think. No—the left.

"If Short Brothers merged with Francis Curley," he said into the dark night of our souls, "would the new firm be called Short and Curley's?"

The ensuing collective "Groan!" was eerily reminiscent of a dyspeptic banshee – and we all know what *that's* like. Jim, however, maintained a dignified silence. Until we reached the Copper Griddle, when ... but the swirling mists of Bushmills – I mean – chaos – are fast Closing in.

This latest in a long series of Novacon Beer Tastings will again be using the ever-popular BYOB (bring your own beer) format. To get the ball rolling, as mentioned above, Interaction, the 2005 World SF Convention, have donated a large amount of Scottish beer, in addition to this the convention will supply a few interesting bottles - the rest is up to you!

To partake of the *beer*, all you need to do is bring at least *three* bottles of your favourite British or foreign beer to the convention and check them in at the Novacon Registration Hatch when you arrive. Operations will be in the Hatherton Room, like last year we shall be operating a fascist 'tidy' Ops Room policy, with designated areas for stuff to be stored and no non-essential furniture (or people). However, you will still be able to leave coats and bags in Ops on request and at **your own risk**.

No Smoking

Please refrain from smoking in the Programme & Dealers Rooms, Art Show, and in other designated areas. Please note that the *smoking* area of the Bar is to the left of the Main Entrance, facing Reception.

Dire Warnings

Please remember that the Quality Hotel is in the business of selling accommodation, drink and food for profit. Neither the management of the Quality Hotel nor the Novacon committee will approve of people "crashing" in rooms they haven't paid for, and/or smuggling food/drink into the hotel. The Novacon committee will obviously support the hotel in any dispute with members of Novacon caught "crashing" and/or "smuggling".

Badges

As we have (again) failed to fill the hotel there will be non-convention guests in the Hotel. It is therefore essential that you wear your con badge AT ALL TIMES! If you do not you may be refused service in the con bars and food from the con menu. You WILL be challenged by our own security staff and prevented from entering function spaces and Hotel Staff may challenge anyone not wearing a badge.

Duplicate Room Keys

We have made arrangements with the Hotel so that if you are sharing a room and require a key each you should be able to get one this year. (Unfortunately if you are in one of the 30 executive suites you cannot have a key each as they have a different locks to the other rooms in the Hotel.)

However, if you require a key each you should have notified the Hotel of this on arrival. You may not be able to change your mind later because the Hotel will have programmed 100 rooms to accept duplicate key sets before we arrive. This is a time-consuming process and there are a limited number of these duplicate key sets available – the Hotel does not normally use them and is buying them in especially for Novacon.

If you do have a key each please don't lose them! If you lose your key two new keys will be need to be issued immediately as your sharer's key won't work after you've used your new key! As there are limited quantities of these duplicate keys available you may find that if you've lost your key the Hotel will be forced to reprogram the lock on your room to take their standard single key system again.

If you do not have a key each you can still easily gain access to your room by either tracking down your sharer or by asking Hotel Reception to let you in with a master, but please don't get them doing this all the time. The hotel will require you to produce your keycard as proof that it is your room, so please ensure you carry it.

Crèche

The Crèche is situated in the Ashmore Room (down the corridor past Hotel receptions, all the way past the Art Show Rooms, on the corner). Please address all queries to Richard Standage or Helena Bowles.

Check-in time is from 2pm and check-out by 11am on the day of departure. (Bedrooms will be cleaned between 1pm and 3pm).

Left Luggage

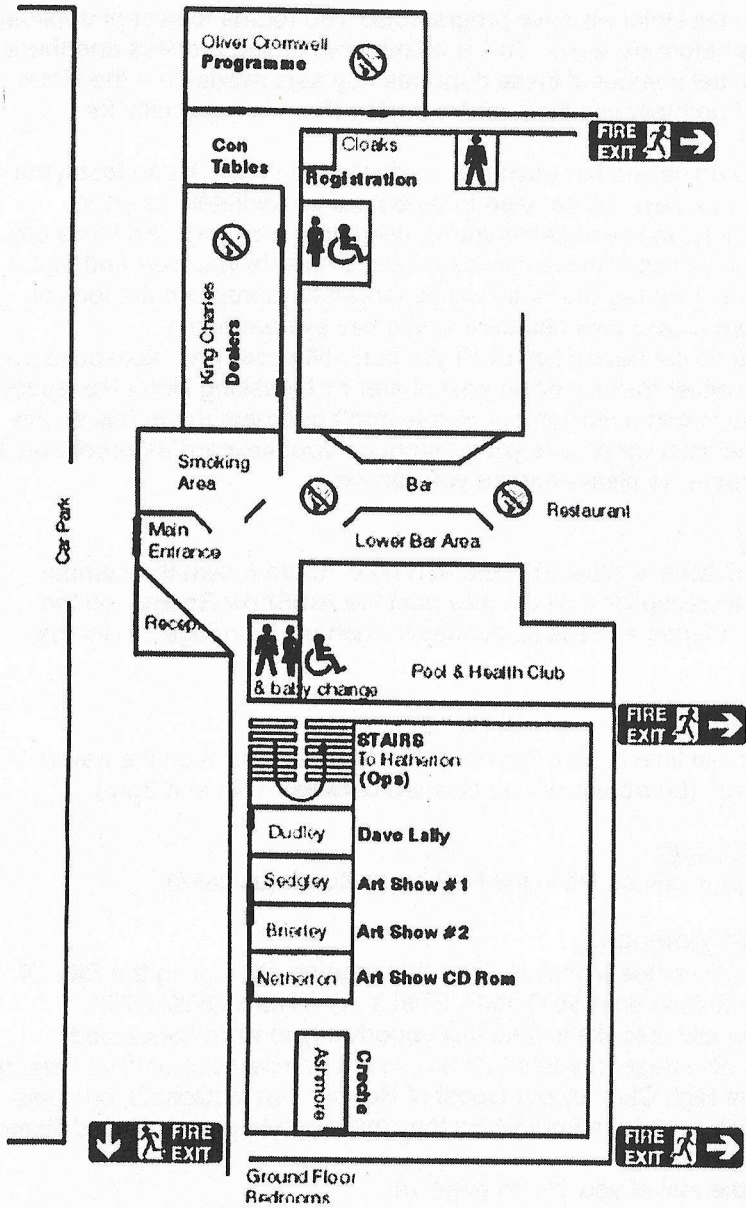
Luggage can be left in the Hatherton Room (upstairs).
