

Novacon 33: The Vital Statistics

Novacon 33 will be held on 7-9 November, 2003, at the Quality Hotel, Walsall, located immediately off Junction 10 of the M6. Our guest of honour is the British science fiction novelist Jon Courtenay Grimwood, author of the "Arabesk" cycle.

The main programme opens early Friday evening and continues until early Sunday evening. It's followed by Novacon's traditional "dead dog party" (we strongly recommend that members stay until the Monday morning if they can).

Attending membership costs £40.00 by post or on the door (late joiners cannot be guaranteed a copy of the limited-edition souvenir booklet). Day memberships are available: Friday, £10.00; Saturday, £20.00; Sunday, £15.00. Under-10s can attend without charge, but do not receive convention publications.

From the Chair

Only a few weeks to go as I write this and most of the programme has been finalised (for further details, see Dave Hicks' piece on the following page). Of particular interest to me is "The Illustrated Fan", Friday's panel discussion exploring what fanzine artists want from editors and what fanzine editors want from artists. The idea emerged from a conversation between myself and the late Dave Mooring at the last Scottish worldcon, in 1995.

As a contributor of illustrations to innumerable fanzines, Dave held strong opinions about fan art, feeling that fanzine editors took artists for granted, hating the gratuitous use of "fillos". As editor of the fanzine *Empties*, I tried to encourage artists to supply illustrations rather than "fillos", by sending articles to artists in advance and commissioning specific artwork. Our original idea was for a jointly written article, to be published in *Critical Wave*, but the years came and went and it never got written. Eventually, we agreed it would have to be a convention programme item, but then Dave stopped attending Novacons, I stopped going to Eastercons, and it never happened.

So, in addition to our visual tribute to Dave Mooring in the Art Show (details elsewhere), we will be dedicating "The Illustrated Fan", to Dave.

The dilettante or part-time fan might have some idea about going to their room to shower and change after an arduous journey on British Rail or across the motorway system, but the true fan finds nothing offensive in natural human musk. superlatively talented Guest of Honour, Jon Courtenay Grimwood, will be introduced and parents warned about the 'racy' bit in the Special Booklet for the second year in succession (and wasn't it also D West who once proposed that many people were actually attracted to sf because they thought it was a bit naughty?).

After opening the convention, the chairman and committee will make way for Crime. Well, Crime and Science Fiction actually. Have you noticed how many fans read as many mysteries and crime novels as sf? Is there a case for saying modern sf owes as much to Raymond Chandler as Philip K Dick? It's all just somehow more interesting when the story's told from the perspective of outsiders. Jon Courtenay Grimwood and a lively panel will offer us their thoughts.

At 9.00pm, there's "The Illustrated Fan" (see Martin Tudor's comments on page three), then, when you've all been thrilled and enlightened to capacity, your brains reeling, we unleash Steve Green! Reprising his excellent chat show from last year, you can once again expect someone less camp than Graham Norton, less tactful than Jerry Springer and more hirsute than Clive Anderson.

All the above are available upon request for return postage, your own fanzine in trade (a copy for each editor is customary, unless they share an address) or a promise to respond with a substantial letter of comment; in certain quarters, this is known as "the Usual". Electronic fanzines are only eligible if hardcopies are avail-able for those without internet access.

Ballot forms are enclosed with this mailing for those who wish to vote by mail. The deadline at the convention is 00:01, Sunday.

Those interested in slightly older fanzines are reminded that Greg Pickersgill's long-running Memory Hole project offers an astoundingly cheap introduction to the field. As Greg himself points out, "This is a great opportunity to find out which are the good fanzines - the old-fashioned way, by reading through a goddamned lot of them and making your own mind up."

Pull Out & Keep Section

Accommodation

The Quality Hotel has about 150 twin/double rooms. There are no singles as such, and we have now used our entire allocation of rooms which could be used as singles. Please note that the Quality Hotel held all available rooms for us until 20 October, but is now taking non-Novacon bookings.

If you *insist* on a single room, you have two choices: you can pay the full twin/double rate of £64.00 per night (noting on your booking form that you wish to pay the difference), or you can contact the Travel Inn at Bentley Green (10-15 minutes' walk from the Quality Hotel) on 08701 977 258.

How to Get There

By Car

The Quality Hotel is situated beside Junction 10 of the M6, so access by road couldn't be easier. (See the map on page 19.)

From the North: come off at J10 and turn right towards Wolverhampton, but stay in the right-hand lane and take the second exit signposted "Buses and Hotel" (the road surface is also marked "Hotel"). Follow what appears to be a service road, through a barrier and into the car park (you'll need a token from the reception desk when you want to leave).

From the South: come off at J10, keep to the right as you go up the sliproad to the traffic lights, then follow the directions above.

By Train via Wolverhampton

The nearest Intercity station is Wolverhampton. If you exit onto Railway Drive, you can get a taxi to the Quality Hotel for about £9.00, a journey of about 10 minutes. If there are no taxis on the rank, you can call Associated Taxis on 01902-425591.

By Bus (from Walsall)

If you prefer to save your money, you can catch a 529 bus to the Hotel for £1.00 at either peak or off peak times. These run every six minutes throughout the day and every 20 minutes during

the evening.

Walk past the taxi rank on Railway Drive, then turn left at the clock into the bus station; the 529 leaves from Stand F. The journey takes 20-25 minutes, and you should alight at the stop after the Lane Arms pub. Walk towards the motorway junction, bearing left down Wolverhampton Road West.

By Coach (via Wolverhampton)

The coach station is in Littles Lane / Great Western Street. Head toward St Patrick's Street and Railway Drive, then follow instructions for taxis or buses above.

By Coach (via Walsall)

Most coaches stop on either St Paul's Street or Hatherton Road. From St Paul's Street, walk downhill to the "flying saucer", St. Paul's Bus Station, and catch the 529 at Stand M.

From Hatherton Road, walk towards the Jobcentre facing the "flying saucer", St Paul's Bus Station, and similarly catch the 529.

You'll need 85p exact change and the journey lasts about five minutes. Alight at the first stop after Junction 10 and cross Wolverhampton Road West, then walk back towards the motorway and bear left down the access road to the hotel.

By Train (via Walsall)

Exit the station, following signs to the taxi rank on Station Street; the fare should be around £6.00 for a journey of less than five minutes.

Alternatively, walk down Station Street, past the side of Marks & Spencers into Park Street, then cut through Butler's Passage (the alleyway near Littlewoods) to St Paul's Bus Station and the 529 bus on Stand F (see above for further directions).

By Bus (from Birmingham)

Catch the 51 bus from Carrs Lane (facing the side of the Marks & Spencers building, opposite Moor Street BR Station) to St. Paul's Bus Station, Walsall. The 51 are scheduled every seven minutes through the day and every 20 minutes in the evening; fares are £1.00 off-peak (9.30am-3.30pm, after 6pm) or £1.30 during peak times, for a journey of about 40-45 minutes. Then catch the 529 on Stand F (see above).

By Bus (from Sutton Coldfield)

Catch the 366 from Lower Parade, disembarking at St Paul's Bus Station, Walsall; fares are £1.00 off-peak and £1.30 during peak times, for a journey of 35-40 minutes. Then catch the 529 on Stand F (see above).

On arrival at the Quality Hotel..

As you enter the hotel, try to resist the temptation to go straight to the bar. Instead, please collect your room key and key card (see below for rules on duplicate keys). Ensure you keep both

with you at all times.

Having unpacked your luggage, go back past the bar (yes, past the bar) and along the corridor towards the Oliver Cromwell Suite. Our registration desk is immediately outside (this is also where we'll be selling raffle / beer tasting / food tickets, as well as taking membership monies for Novacon 34). As soon as you've picked up your membership pack, pin on your badge - you won't be served at the bar or allowed into programme items without it.

Duplicate Room Keys

We've arranged with the Quality Hotel for members sharing a room to each be issued keys if they require them. Unfortunately, the 30 suites use a different key and duplicates will not be available (still, there is the compensation of a larger room).

Please note that you must notify the hotel staff upon arrival if you require two keys, as only 100 rooms can be programmed to accept duplicates (the hotel is buying them in especially for Novacon). And if you get a pair, take care of them - if one is lost, the other is automatically void; if all 100 duplicate sets have been allocated, the room will have to be reprogrammed for a single key.

Those with just the one key can still access their room by tracking down their sharer (not too difficult at the Quality) or by showing their keycard to the reception staff (but please don't get them doing this all the time).

Cash

Please note that the nearest cashpoint is in the 24-hour Spar, about 15 minutes' walk from the Quality Hotel. However, there are lots of cashpoints in Walsall, a five-minute bus ride away.

The Arabesk Experience / Novacon Beer Tasting

In tribute to Jon Courtenay Grimwood's "Arabesk" trilogy, we are offering you the chance to sample the culinary delights of North Africa from 7.30pm on Sunday. Tickets cost just £6.00 per head and will be available from the Novacon registration desk (in the lobby outside the main programme) until 6pm that evening.

As is traditional, this will run in conjunction with the infamous Novacon Beer Tasting, featuring an extraordinary variety of draught and bottled ales - though just how varied is up to you. Entrance is by badge, available to anyone who hands over at least three bottles of your favourite British or import beer (or you could pay £5.00, but that's not nearly as much fun).

Please note that the Quality Hotel has generously agreed to waive corkage on all alcohol brought onto the premises for this event (but only for this event). In addition, a late night snackbar opens at 11pm, selling bacon/sausage rolls at £1.20 each to help soak up the beer!

Once again, we strongly recommend that anyone able to stay over on Sunday does so.

Child care facilities at Novacon 33 will once again be run by

myself and Richard Standage.

For those many who don't know us, Richard is a registered children's nurse and I am a registered nurse. We both have the requisite police checks, as well as experience of our own children (eight and six years old) and experience working with children in play groups, nursery and hospital settings. We have run an informal children's room at the last couple of Novacons, but we plan to adopt a more formal approach this year, in order to comply as fully as possible with national guidelines and local authority regulations.

The plan is for two sessions per day, the first probably starting fifteen minutes before the main programme stream. This will probably run for two to three hours, followed by an afternoon

session of approximately two to three hours.

In order to comply with regulations regarding the number of adults per child for each session, one of each child's parents *must* volunteer for one shift at a time, booked in advance and hopefully at a time convenient to him/her. He or she will not definitely have to work this session, but must be available to do so should we need extra hands on deck to deal with the number of children. Richard will technically be manager and I will be deputy manager; one of us at least will be present with volunteers at every session.

To ensure children's safety, we will have a sign-in / sign-out policy, accompanied by digital photography of each adult. This means only the person who drops the child off can collect them.

On the first session attended by each child, there will be a short form to complete regarding likes/dislikes, fears, illnesses, allergies, etc. We must also have either a mobile phone number or a good idea of where you will be so the Duty Committee Member can locate you if necessary. In addition, there will be a booklet for parents, listing our room / mobile number, plus details of our emergency procedures for illness / fire alarms, etc.

To avoid anyone becoming overburdened with work, we still require volunteers! We would also like to know in advance the number and ages of those children likely to be attending, so we can plan structured activities appropriate to each likely age group.


