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THE THOUGHTS OF CHAIRMAN BERRY

After all, it's you who really make the convention. Aah, group-hug. No I was kidding get away from me.

JAINE FENN IS RATHER COOL

The first time I met her, she was elegantly dressed and posing with a pterodactyl. I was wrapped in aluminium foil. I was hot and sticky, and very impressed both by her poise and by the fact that she had managed to find a way to be quirky under hot lights without either indecency or heatstroke. But that is Jaine all over: rather cool. Over a succession of meetings at a succession of conventions, we bonded over a whole variety of things – motorbikes (where she was the coolest, riding her own, while I was a mere pillion), clothing (she can sew, I can't), roleplaying games (she is the Demon Queen of LARP refereeing), weird films, music, books, and, of course, writing.

We both belonged to that underground tribe of writers who, obedient to Heinlein's precepts, write in secret, wash our hands afterwards and seldom speak of it in public. I don't remember exactly when I first discovered that Jaine wrote, but by the early 90s we could and did spend whole afternoons discussing plot issues, world-building, neat ideas and new ways to really put characters through the wringer, while her husband Dave and my partner Phil watched manga, drank beer and (possibly) commiserated with each other about the perils of living with writers.

Because, have no doubt of it, writing is a perilous art, and writers brave souls who will risk their all for the sake of their books. Most of us draw the line at death-defying experiences, garnering information second-hand, but Jaine is made of sterner stuff. She's travelled almost to the roof of the world, thrown herself from high places, risked hypothermia and suffocation in seas of mud, been publicly hypnotised and come within seconds of drowning, all in search of a better, deeper, truer story.

And it shows. There is a hard edge, a grit to her writing,

and a keenness of insight into character that is seldom found in the kind of widescreen space opera in which she specialises. Her imagination - and she has plenty - dazzles, but it's counterpointed by a strong streak of realism. In her worlds, life hurts: it can be cold, it can be hungry, it can be short, and there are no easy escapes, no comforting ideologies, no space marines just over the hill (and if there are, they aren't on your side). She does not let us retreat to the safe, comforting vision of a Star Trek future, where pain and division are all easily erased with the wave of a magical technological wand. Rather, she makes us face ourselves: our human greed, our jealousies and hierarchies, our fears and divisions and prejudices and the costs those exact. Successes are hard to achieve, rewards take work, and victories can be pyrrhic. But they are worth all the more for that, in the end. Her books - her worlds - are strange and resonant, harsh and beautiful, rich and fulfilling and not always easy.

And, like their author, rather cool.



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Jaine Fenn: Changeling

Jaine Fenn was deposited on an unsuspecting human family in middle England during the latter half of the last century. Superbly adapted to purpose, her changeling nature has remained undetected ever since, her physiology kept in balance by the frequent intake of carefully calculated levels of ethanol and the occasional inhalation of nicotine fumes. 
Having remained dormant throughout childhood, Jaine's extra-terrestrial nature first stirred in her teens, while she was attending the University of Hertfordshire. Here she studied Linguistics and Astronomy and encountered many strange things – not least her future husband, David. But it was not until adulthood that her true psyche fully blossomed, prompting Jaine to enter the world of IT in order to determine the precise level of our technical knowledge and development.

Jaine's presence on Earth is no accident. She is a gift, provided to the human race in order to prime the minds of a privileged few for the Next Big Step. Jaine has been charged with the sacred task of preparing us for Uplift and the impending invite to join the Great Galactic Gestalt. To this end, Jaine has steadily released snippets of the Essential Knowledge required for the process into the public domain. These data parcels have been cleverly woven into the text of her Hidden Empire books: a series of 'science fiction' novels that started with Principle of Angels (2008) and has continued through five volumes including Queen of Nowhere (due in 2013), all published via the

alien clearing house known as Gollancz (which means 'Bringer of Truth' in Jaine's native language).

The beating heart of this lore, however, is contained within a series of short stories set in the same milieu as the Hidden Empire novels. These stories have been released sporadically in a number of selected venues. Read in isolation, each piece is innocuous, but when they are read in concert, Enlightened Knowledge seeps from the text into the subconscious via a process of intellectual osmosis. The four component stories have now been gathered under one cover for the very first time in Downside Girls (published by Monico). Included in the book is "The Three Temptations of Larnia Mier", which Jaine dared not share with us before now, as it contains the vital trigger text needed to complete the Uplift process.

By odd coincidence, the paperback edition of Downside Girls will be launched at this year's Novacon. So, the question you have to ask yourself is... Do you wish to be enlightened?




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THE BOOKS OF JAINE FENN: AN OVERVIEW

In 2008 Jaine Fenn metamorphosed from being a regular fan at many conventions to a fully fledged professional author. Her first novel, *Principles Of Angels*, introduced us to a highly imaginative SF world. Khesh is a floating city, one of several orbiting an inhospitable planet. Topside of the disc that forms




the ground level of the city is pleasant, clean and a magical place to live in or visit. Tourists are common. Like most cities, though, there is a darker underbelly. In this case literally. Hanging below are a network of walkways, nets and platforms that form the equivalent of a shanty town. It is a place that the privileged never see but where residents eke out a meagre existence. Taro is a Downsider, at home in the mazeways.

The Angels of the title are corporate assassins. It is their job to remove those that the government desires them to. It is legitimate; it is one of the things the tourists want to see. Nual is one of the City's Angels but her latest assignment is thwarted by a man that Taro recognises as the killer of Malia, another Angel and Taro's aunt. Elarn Reen is a singer, a visitor to Khesh City. She is also looking for Nual. The paths of these three become tangled together and as Taro discovers more about the universe he has been born in to so does the reader.

This series of books starts with a bang, firmly rooting it in the Science Fiction genre with an interestingly portrayed dichotomy of social mores with the focus being on the underclass. *Principles of Angels* brings together advanced technology and human failings; legends of long dead races' treachery. It can be read as a stand alone volume but there is enough in it for a reader to want to know what else in going on in this universe.

The second volume in the series, *Consorts Of Heaven* (Gollancz 2009) has a totally different feel to it. Although set



in the same universe for much of its length it reads like fantasy.

Kerin is a young widow who is tolerated in her village because of her skill with herbs. This is a village without modern amenities like electricity or plumbing. Her son, Damaru, gives all the appearances of being autistic but has a talent for telekinesis. Two factors are about to influence her life. The first is that Damaru finds a naked stranger in the marshes. This man, who Kerin names Sais, has lost all memory and in some

ways, appears to be more of a simpleton than her son. The other significant event is that Damaru is to be sent down onto the plains to, hopefully, serve the Skymothers. These are portrayed as goddesses, so his selection is an honour. She and Sais join the caravan that is to take them from her remote mountain village to the City of Light.

The connections with the previous novel are slight and do not become apparent until late in the story. It does not have the complexity of *Principles of Angels* but sets up trains of events that are returned to later. By the end of the volume it is possible to see hints of the bigger picture which start to unfold in the third volume.


Guardians Of Paradise (Gollancz 2010) brings us back to some of the characters of *Principles of Angels*. By the start of the

third novel we know that Nual is Sidhe. This race was thought to have been wiped out a long time ago, to the great relief of humanity as they are extremely manipulative and have the power to bend minds to their will. Nual is young, in Sidhe terms and was little more than a child when Jarek found her aboard a derelict Sidhe mother ship, the only sane survivor of some kind of disaster - she didn't know what. The Sidhe, however, want her either back in the fold or dead. They don't care which. They have already (in Principles of Angels) tried to use her friend and mentor as an assassin. Now they have sent a more blatant hit squad. Jarek, by coincidence, arrives just in time for the shoot out. Once they have escaped, Jarek tells Nual and Taro that he has discovered the source of the 'shift units' that take space craft between systems instantaneously. They are the rewired brains of boys with a kinetic talent, bred for that trait on Serenein, the

planet in Consorts of Heaven. Despite the fact that it might eventually lead to the end of faster than light space travel, the three team up to find where these boys are processed and put a stop to their torture. If it also wipes out the Sidhe once and for all, they decide it is a price worth paying. This third volume is a more traditional space opera with a different kind of action and intrigue.

In Bringer Of Light (Gollancz 2011) Jaine begins to bring together


keep their heads down.



GUARDIANS DE PARADISE

The plan is to persuade the male Sidhe to give them a beacon which they can set up near Serenein. This should connect the planet to the rest of civilisation and effectively bring a halt to the trade in psychically talented boys. Naturally, it isn't as easy as they anticipate especially as Khesh insists on sending an avatar with them to protect the location of the male Sidhe's domain. In the meantime, the people Jarek (they knew him as Sais) left running things on Serenein are having their own problems trying to keep the status quo long enough for Jarek to return.

The story does not stop here as these four books are the beginning of a proposed nine-book series. Jaine Fenn is excellent at developing convoluted plots with exciting action sequences. All her books so far have a different flavour which match the environment and situations that her characters find themselves in. A word of warning – to fully understand the nuances of the sequence it is better to start at the beginning and work outwards. Then you will appreciate the ride as a new universe filled with adventure and moral dilemmas opens before you.



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DOWNSIDE GIRLS Reviewed by Theresa Derwin

Downside Girls is a collection of four short stories from Fenn's world, and to quote Alastair Reynold's introduction, "These are dangerous little fables, sleek and sharp as an Angel's retractable blades, and just as likely to cut when you least expect them to."

In the first story 'Collateral Damage', Malia, the Angel from Fenn's debut novel Principles of Angels, is sitting in a bar when she meets Vanna Agriet, a Topsider who spills a drink on Malia before spilling out her story to the willing Angel. You see, Vanna has found a woman's earring under her bed and suspects her husband of cheating on her. A peculiar friendship between the Topsider and the Angel begins.

There is a brilliant ironic twist at the end of this tale and as usual, Fenn has a distinctive and strong authorial voice, as she narrates this story in the first person. The dialogue and 'lingo' Fenn uses demonstrates the class distinction prevalent in these stories and the books.

In 'Death on Elsewhere Street' we meet Geal, a downside girl coerced by Angel Thiera to be a witness for a removal, whilst in 'Angel Dust' Isha is sent on a mission by an injured Angel to deliver a box to the Minister, and in 'The Three Temptations of Larnia Mier' we meet older music teacher Mier, who on witnessing a removal is injured and may not be able to sing again.

Each story is tightly written with a strong female presence and a stronger narrative voice. Each ending is wholly satisfying and as a book, the stories blend well together as an accompanying piece to Fenn's Angel novels.

This is gritty, urban SF, which challenges the reader with every story. Simply an excellent collection.


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

GENERAL CERTIFICATE OF SCIENCE FICTION EDUCATION (AND DRAW)

On the next few pages you will find a GCSE Question Paper. You should also find a loose A4 size Answer Sheet and an A4 Rough Work sheet – if not please contact Registration.

This is a multiple choice quiz. Each question has been given several answers, only one of which is correct. They are often abbreviated because giving them in full would make the correct answer too obvious. You must match your answer to one of the given ones. It's a bit like being given specifications for making a key, together with five different locks. If the key is made correctly it will fit one of the locks, if it's not, it won't.

INSTRUCTIONS

1/ There are three Sections to the Paper – Section B is easy, Section A is medium and Section C has harder questions. You have to submit two Sections which must include Section A. If you submit Sections A&B you will obtain an Ordinary Level GCSE Certificate if you pass, if you submit Sections A&C you will gain an Advanced Level GCSE Certificate if you pass. Pass mark is 40% and each Certificate is graded.

2/ Read each question, decide on your answer and match it to a given answer. Mark the corresponding square on the Rough Work sheet. When you have answered as many questions as possible decide whether you will submit Sections A&B or Sections A&C. If both Levels are submitted by one person only the Ordinary Level paper will be marked. Please submit your answers under your own name, precociousness is one thing, giving a certificate or draw prize to an infant is another.

3/ Like the Rough Work sheet the Answer Paper has numbered and lettered squares that correspond to the questions and answers on the Question Paper, but only enough for one Level submission. Carefully BLOCK OUT with black or blue ink, ballpoint or felt tip the squares corresponding to your chosen answers. Do NOT circle, cross or otherwise mark the squares, or use pencil, because the marking system will be unable to cope with it and your paper will be rejected. If you make a mistake put a large X through the incorrect square.

4/ Similarly block out the squares corresponding to the LEVEL you are submitting ([O]* OR [A]*) AND the SECTION you have chosen ([O]* OR [A]*), otherwise they will be marked at "O" Level. PRINT your name and address legibly in the space provided – your answer paper will be returned to you with this part showing through the window of an envelope so the postal services must be able to read it if necessary.

2012 Nova Awards

STEVE GREEN

Back in 1973, a young Brum Group member called Gillon Field suggested Novacon create an award for the 'best' fanzine of the preceding twelve months (a distinction which would later be defined as "most pleasurable"). Initially, the winner was chosen by a panel of 'wise old fans' (as if), but voting was soon opened up to all qualifying Novacon members and 1981 saw the creation of new categories for fanzine writers and artists.

Sadly, Gillon is no longer with us to know how deeply her idea imbedded itself into the heart of Novacon. The Nova Awards have carried on pretty much unchanged during the past three decades, although eligibility has now extended to electronic fanzines and from last year all fans resident in the UK or Eire have been able to vote, provided they've read at least six of the eligible titles (most of which are available to peruse at *eFanzines.com*). Ballots can even be cast online in the run-up to Novacon, so there really is no excuse for failing to lodge your preference.

You'll find a ballot form in your membership pack; a 'longlist' of known eligible titles appears on the reverse. Just ensure you place it in the Nova Awards box at the registrations desk no later than 23:59 on Saturday. The winners will be announced on at the (non)closing ceremony on Sunday.

THE NOVA AWARDS RULES

The Nova Awards celebrate fanzines, fanzine writing and fanzine artwork produced by science fiction fans resident in the UK or Ireland, providing a friendly pat on the back to those whose efforts gave the greatest pleasure to Novacon members during the previous year. They have no vast cosmic significance. Should any difficulties arise in interpreting the rules governing the Nova Awards (henceforth referred to as the Novas), those concerned are urged to follow the course most in keeping with this spirit.

1. The Novas shall be announced at Novacon, the convention the Birmingham Science Fiction Group. organised annually by 2. The categories shall be "BestFanzine", "BestFan Writer" and "BestFan Artist". 3. A trophy shall be supplied in each category by the Novacon committee, presentation at the awards ceremony on Sunday afternoon. for 4. The trophies shall be presented by Novacon's guest(s) honour unavailable, committee of (or, if by the Novacon behalf chair), of the membership. on convention 5. In the event of a tie, the joint recipients shall be asked to share the trophy unless the Novacon committee is willing and able to fund a duplicate trophy. 6. As the Novas are awarded by popular vote, there is no mechanism for eligible editors, writers or artists to withdraw their work or themselves from consideration. A winner determined not to be honoured can always refuse to accept his or her award. 7. In the event that Novacon should not be held in any given year, the Birmingham Science Fiction Group shall be requested to underwrite a ballot in early October of the preceding Novacon's membership, using established criteria and deadlines. Winners shall be notified by e-mail and post, with the full results publicised through fanzines and electronic noticeboards. If the Birmingham Science Fiction Group is willing and able to fund trophies, these shall be presented at the next Eastercon or similarly major event. 8. Should Novacon be cancelled for a second year in succession, the Nova Award Administrator (henceforth referred to as the Administrator) shall meet with the committee of the Birmingham Science Fiction Group to decide as a matter of urgency whether to discontinue the Novas or allow another convention to take over Novacon's role. 9. For the purposes of the Novas, a fanzine shall be defined as an amateur publication concerned with science fiction and / or fantasy, fans of science fiction and / or fantasy, and / or related subjects, copies of which may be obtained in exchange for other such publications or in response to letters of comment. In the event that eligibility is unclear, the decision of the Administrator shall be final.

10. The "Best Fanzine" category shall be open to any fanzine published in the UK or Ireland, provided at least one issue has been published between 1 October of the preceding year and 30 September of the current year. In cases where a fanzine has two or more editors, at least one must be resident in the UK or Ireland. 11. Electronic fanzines ("e-zines") shall be eligible in the "Best Fanzine" category, provided each issue is a distinct entity and a printed copy is available if preferred. A file copy must also be lodged with the Administrator, whose decision on eligibility shall be final. 12. The "Best Fan Writer" category shall be open to anyone resident in the UK or Ireland who has contributed a piece of writing to an eligible fanzine published beween 1 October of the preceding year and 30 September of the current year. 13. The "Best Fan Artist" category shall be open to anyone resident in the UK or Ireland who has contributed a piece of artwork to an eligible fanzine published between 1 October of the preceding year and 30 September of the current year. 14. Voting shall be open to all Novacon members and to any UK / Irish resident, provided he or she has received at least six different fanzines published in the UK or Ireland between 1 October of the preceding year and 30 September of the current year (separate issues of an individual fanzine or various organs of a group / society shall not be considered as different fanzines for the purposes of this total).

15. Ballot forms shall be available on the Novacon website from 1 October each year, to facilitate voting by post or e-mail prior to Novacon. The deadline for postal and electronic votes shall be 23:59 GMT on the Saturday prior to Novacon; the deadline for voting in person shall be 23:59 GMT on the Saturday of Novacon. 16. Only one ballot form shall be accepted from each voter, and votes for themselves or their own fanzines will be disallowed (should a duplicate form be received, it should be clearly marked "Invalid" and exempt from the count). 17. Valid ballots should include the voter's name, address and telephone number, plus the titles of six different fanzines published in the UK or Ireland between 1 October of the preceding year and 30 September of the current year which the voter has received (see point 14). 18. Ballots sent by post or handed in at the convention should be signed. Those sent electronically should emanate from the voter's known e-mail address. 19. Production of ballot forms, organisation of the count and general promotion of the Novas shall be the responsibility of the Administrator, appointed by the preceding year's Novacon committee. The Administrator should have a good basic knowledge of British fanzines. 20. The Administrator shall in turn nominate up to two Novacon members to assist with the count on the Sunday of the convention; again, they should have a wide knowledge of fanzines. During the count, they shall also assist the Administrator with issues of eligibility and ballot validity. The decision of this group shall be final. 21. First-, second- and third-place votes shall be available in each category. First-place votes shall be allocated three points, second-place votes two points and third-place votes one point. 22. In the event of a tie on points, the Nova in that category shall be awarded to the nominee with most first-place votes. In the event of a tie on first-place votes, the award shall be made to the nominee with most second-place votes. Only in the case of identical voting patterns shall a formal tie be announced. 23. The identity and choices of individual voters, as well as any discussions during the count, shall remain confidential. A complete breakdown of nominees and points received shall be made available to the subsequent Novacon committee for publication in its next available progress report. 24. The Nova Awards ballot form shall comprise a short introduction to the aims of the award and appropriate footnotes on definitions and eligibility, plus space for the voter to identify themselves and indicate their receipt of at least six different fanzines published in the UK or Ireland between 1 October of the preceding year and 30 September of the current year (see point 14). 25. Further, the ballot form shall list the three categories, "Best Fanzine", "Best Fan Writer" and "Best Fan Artist"; in each case, space will be allotted for first-, second- and third-place votes. 26. Finally, if he or she wishes, the Administrator shall include shortlist of known eligible fanzines, making clear this is a aide memoire and is in no sense definitive. intended as an 27. Once the winners in all three categories have been decided, the ballot forms and any related notes shall be placed into an envelope and sealed, to be retained by the Administrator for at least three calendar months in the event the results are challenged. If no such query is raised during this period, the envelope and its contents shall be destroyed. Should the results be called into question, the envelope - still sealed - shall be handed over to the chair of the relevant Novacon committee for further investigation. 28. The rules shall be posted on the Novacon website and hardcopies made available for a reasonable fee (covering printing the Novacon and postage) upon request from committee. 29. Any amendments to the above rules shall be made by the current Administrator in conjunction with the committee of that year's Novacon.

My Friend Harry

ROG PEYTON

Harry has gone. How do I get my head around that? He's always been around since my early days in fandom.

Harry was Guest of Honour at Brumcon 2 – the 1965 British Eastercon – and I was a novice committee member at only my second convention. I was editing *Vector*, the BSFA's journal, at the time and had already corresponded with him and I'd read *Deathworld* and *The Stainless Steel Rat* in import editions. So when we met he was relatively easy to talk to. We got on well and spent a lot of time in the bar at that con.

We met up again a few months later at the 1965 Worldcon in London and I remember talking to him about his short story "The Streets of Ashkelon" which had been published here in *New Worlds* after being rejected by virtually every American magazine, and inevitably we talked about religion and atheism. I discovered we were both confirmed atheists. "The Streets of Ashkelon" remains one of my all-time favourite short stories.

After that, Harry was back to globetrotting living at various times in Denmark, Italy, America, the UK and Ireland and I don't remember our next meeting. However, after opening my bookshop, Andromeda, in 1971, Harry did several signings after which we'd go for a meal, usually Indian.

At the Brighton Worldcon in 1979, I'd travelled down on the Wednesday, one day early in order to prepare selling at our first Worldcon and in the evening discovered a great Indian restaurant which I told several people about the following day. In the evening I bumped into Harry and he invited me to the bar for a drink as he was meeting a friend there. The friend turned out to be Alfred Bester and after several drinks Harry suggested that the three of us went out for a meal. I told them about the meal I'd had the previous evening and Harry said something along the lines, "If Rog recommends it, it must be good." When we arrived at the restaurant, it was packed – mainly with fans from the convention. We were fortunate to get a table after only a short wait and we duly ordered our food. The waiter then returned to inform us that they'd run out of rice as they hadn't expected to be busy over a weekend that was usually very quiet. We had to change our order to naan breads and after every future signing he did at Andromeda and I suggested going for an Indian, Harry would say, with that wicked gleam in his eyes, "Do they do rice at this one, Rog?".


Harry was one of the most generous people I've ever met. Several times he invited Arline and I to stay with him over in Ireland which we had to decline because of being unable to leave our dogs. At one time he offered to loan me a large amount of money to help expand Andromeda but again I had to decline his offer as I've always believed that you don't borrow from friends. At his 80th birthday party, I'd travelled down to Brighton and Harry found me a good hotel to stay in after the party. I was very surprised to find that he'd actually paid my hotel bill in advance and he refused to accept anything from me.

A great author, a great friend and someone I will miss very, very much.

IMAGINE, IF YOU CAN, A YOUNG ... Steve Lawson

Imagine, if you can, a young, very young and skinny, me who had been reading science fiction for as long as I could remember. I knew nothing about fandom, the nearest I had been to it was taking my younger brother to the first Dr Who convention in 1977, a one day event in a church hall in London which was fun, however I was still completely unaware of "proper" conventions.

The next year I heard about the Windsor Science Fiction Festival. Some of you may have been there, if so please let me know as I have very little recollection of the event. However the main thing I do remember, probably because I have the photograph to prove it, was meeting Harry Harrison and John Sladek. They spent some time talking with me, explaining about Science Fiction



and so on. It was fascinating listening to Harry's stories and I remember him making me feel at ease and including me in the conversation and telling me how great fandom was.

It's entirely possible that this encouragement helped me decide to go to Leeds the next Easter for Yorcon 1 and thence to Seacon 79, the rest is history. As I met most of my friends to say nothing of my wife at conventions, I have a lot to thank Harry for.

DAVE COX

Helena Bowles

I knew Dave Cox for nearly thirty years. He was one of those members of fandom who always seemed to be around, even during the time when I was almost gafiated due to the demands of small children. Those children are now almost adults and Dave was a small but regular presence in their whole lives.

He was a big man when we first met with a great love of good food and drink so it was very difficult for him when he was diagnosed with diabetes in his early fifties. He took responsibility for his condition, lost a great deal of weight and controlled his diabetes with a rare discipline. It is one of life's ironies that despite this massive lifestyle change, his health continued to gradually deteriorate over the next twenty years.


Dave had two great loves in his life – SF and trains. He enjoyed cult TV and was a regular attender at the Portmeirion

conventions organised by Six of One. He possessed an encyclopaedic knowledge of minutiae which he would share with enthusiastic pedantry before being regularly shouted down. He was also one of the kindest, most generous men I knew who never bore a grudge if the shouting was sometimes a little harsh. The BSFG benefited from his membership for many years, as did the informal social group the MiSFiTs where he rarely missed a meeting.

Before his health took a final deterioration, Dave made one final big trip to indulge his other great love. Accompanied by a friend he bought an open rail ticket and travelled across North America by train. He returned delighted with a plethora of blurry photographs taken from train windows. He had a wonderful time and I am very glad he had that as his various physical infirmities began to seriously trouble him not long after his return.

Over his last several months travelling to socialise became very difficult for him and he missed some MiSFiTs meetings. I talked about taking the group to him and would have liked to do that. Sadly the demands of work and a lack of free weekends

meant I never managed it and now I never will and that makes me very sad. I hope he knows that we all valued his company even though we certainly let him know when he rambled on too much . Two days before the October meeting he emailed to say he had had another blackout and could not attend. He died after a further collapse the next day.



He wanted to leave his body to science and I am happy that it was

accepted. He would have been greatly satisfied by that.

The History of Novacon

The first Novacon was organised in 1971 as a one-off event by the Aston University Science Fiction Group, but its success led to the convention being adopted by the neighbouring Birmingham SF Group from 1972 onwards. For the first seven years, the choice of guest of honour alternated between pro authors and leading fans.

In the list below, the figure in brackets relates to membership numbers at the time each programme book went to press, rather than the final attendance. (Note: problems with the printing of Novacon 14's programme book meant an entire month's new members were effectively excluded.)
