Made by Russian (then Soviet) producer & special effects wizard Pavel Klushantsev, it starts in documentary style with the life of Konstantin Tsiolkovsky, and goes on to dramatise early rocket experiments including Sputnik (1957, remember). The film ends with an imaginative section showing man expanding into space, building space stations and going on to the Moon. Never available in English but Dave Hardy has obtained a German print, replacing the soundtrack with captions and specially written music by The Light Dreams (Alex Storer, who will be at his first Novacon!).

# Sunday Evening Beer Tasting and Food

We continue the tradition of having a winding-down event in the shape of the famous beer-tasting and meal. We will be providing some beer, but rely on you to bring the more interesting stuff. A minimum of 3 bottles will get you a place at the bar, or buy a badge from registration for £5. The beer tasting starts at 19.00 in the Churchill Suite. At 20.00 the food will be served, this year with a Thai theme as chosen by our GoH. The food is by ticket only. These are on sale from registration and cost £11.50. YOU MUST BUY YOUR FOOD TICKET BY 11.00 SUNDAY MORNING.

A selection of soft drinks will be available free to everyone.

#### Dealers' Room

This is in the Churchill Suite, which is next to the main bar. It will be open from 16.00 - 18.30 Friday, 10.00 - 14.45 and 16.15 - 18.00 Saturday and 10.00 - 16.00 Sunday. No food or drink in the room please (unless you're a dealer!)

#### **Meeting Rooms**

All the small meeting rooms are located together downstairs. These will house the Artshow, Dave Lally's programme, secure ops store and a room for smaller programme items. There is lift access to these rooms from hotel reception.

#### **Art Show**

This is in Meeting Room 2. It is open from 10.00 - 18.00 Saturday and 10.00 - 11.30 Sunday. No food or drink in the room please.

# **Operations**

We'll probably be hanging out around the business centre in main reception, but there will be a secure ops store in meeting room 6 which will be used to keep any books you have for the auction, Sunday evening beer, coats and bags (at the owner's risk) and various other stuff. If you want to leave anything here, speak to the convention Duty Manager (who will be wearing a subtle red waistcoat). If you have volunteered to be a GOPHER, come and find any committee member and we'll sort you out. There are rewards!

#### Leisure Facilities

We have full use of the leisure club which has a pool, sauna and gym. Access for disabled guests is through the main club entrance outside, reached from the bar. The leisure club is privately-run.

Please note: the pool runs some adults-only swim sessions, check times with hotel reception.

# **Badges**

The hotel bar and leisure club are open to the public and so there may be non-convention people in the hotel. Please wear your badge at all times, or you will be refused entry to the artshow and dealers' room, as well as being turned away from the con food. This is also a matter of security - we want to know who's who! Don't make us unleash the attack-gerbils.

#### **DIRE WARNINGS**

The Park Inn is in the business of selling accommodation, food and drink. Neither the hotel nor the Novacon committee approve of members crashing in rooms or bringing in their own supplies, so don't do it.

#### Left Luggage

This can be left in the secure Ops store downstairs. Find a committee member to let you in.

As usual we will be running a raffle throughout the convention, with proceeds going to the RNIB Talking Books for the Blind. Someone will wave a book of tickets at you at some point.

# Food and Drink

#### INSIDE

All convention food will be served in the main bar area on the ground floor. As last year the food orders will be taken over the bar and cooked to order. This will mean you wait a bit longer but it's worth it! It may be obvious, but please remain in the bar until you've got your food.

The DOWNSTAIRS BAR will be open as a bar again this year, so please make use of it. Opening times for the sale of drinks are 7pm - 12 midnight Friday and Saturday only, but it will be available as lounge space at other times. It has direct lift access from reception.

Dinner 18.30 - 22.00. Selection of hot and cold food, such as baguettes (£2.50), pizza (£6.00), burger and chips (£6.50), baked potato (£5.50), vegetarian options, also new things like paninis.

Friday evening ONLY in the restaurant: fixed-price carvery with meat or vegetarian options. £16.95 for 3 courses.

Late night: bacon/sausage/chip butties £2.50

Saturday:

Breakfast 7.30 - 10.30 served in the restaurant.

Lunch: 12.30 - 14.30. Selection of hot and cold food as

Breakfast 7.30 - 10.30 Lunch: 12.30 - 14.30 Late night: Butties The regular bar menu will also be available throughout the weekend. If you want a sit-down meal in the restaurant using the regular hotel menu, can you please reserve a table for Saturday evening as it can get busy.

Snacks such as crisps, nuts, chocolate and baguettes (£2.50) will be available from the bar 10.00 - 23.00.

The Main Bar is the Savoy on the ground floor and is open from 10.00 until we're all tired.

The Downstairs Bar is available for use as lounge area and will also be selling drinks, though not for the extended hours upstairs. You can take food down there once you've got it from the main bar.

#### **OUTSIDE**

If you venture outside the hotel (which you won't of course, because the convention is just too much fun) there is pretty well all you could need nearby. The big pub over the road is an illusion. So is the food and real ale it serves. Honest. Keep on that side of the road and there is a bank with a cashpoint, various shops, newsagent and supermarket with basic medicines. If you need an actual pharmacy there is a Boots about half a mile away - ask reception.

If you want to do the tourist bit then apparently there's a local legend about some bloke in green tights; sounds dodgy to me. Besides that there is the famous Olde Trip To Jerusalem Inn, which is the oldest boozer in England, dating back to 1189AD. Yes it is and I don't care what anyone else says. Been there many times, but not since they refurbished it and opened up more long-buried parts. Worth a visit as it's partially built into the cliffs beneath the castle, but it is very popular and can get crowded.

#### Restaurants

There are, of course, plenty of restaurants in Nottingham but gone are the days when we would painstakingly list a load. Now you all have access to the interweb and can look at a dozen sites rating eateries, so we'll leave it to you to do the work. Or you could just go downtown and wander; I'm sure you'll find somewhere!
