Friday

19:30: Opening Ceremony

Sunday Evening Beer Tasting and Food

As in previous years, Novacon is hosting a beer-tasting event and a meal. We are providing some beer, but we rely on members to bring more interesting stuff. Bring three bottles of interesting beer to registration, and we will give you a beer badge which gives you access to the beer tasting. Alternatively you can buy a beer badge at registration for £5.

Beer tasting starts at 19:00 in the Churchill Room (the former dealer's room). The meal is served at 19:30 in the same room, and at the request of our GoH will feature Mediterranean food. Access to food is by ticket only; food tickets are available from registration.

Assorted soft drinks will be available free to everyone during the meal.

Dealers' Room

The dealers' room is in the Churchill Room, through the glass doors on your left as you head from the main bar towards reception. It will be open Friday 16:00-19:00, Saturday 10:00-14:45 and 16:15-18:00, and Sunday 10:00-16:00. No food or drink in the dealers' room, please, unless you're a dealer.

Downstairs

All the off-piste items on page are in the downstairs bar; in addition the Art Show, Dave Lally's programme and the secure ops store are downstairs.

Art Show

The art show is in meeting room two. It is open Saturday 10:00-18:00 and Sunday 10:00-11:30. No food or drink in the art show room please.

Dave Lally's Programme

In addition to the events highlighted on the preceding pages, the Dave Lally Programme will run from Friday afternoon through to Sunday afternoon. Head down the stairs and look for a second flipchart, and the entrance to the Lally programme will be nearby.

Left Luggage

This can be left in the secure Ops store downstairs – ask a committee member.

Novacon Registration

The registration desk is just outside the business office in the main foyer, and will be open at the following times:

Operations

We can usually be found in or around the business centre in main reception, just behind the registration desk. There is a secure ops store in meeting room 6 which will be used to store any books you have for the auction, Sunday evening beer, coats and bags (at the owner's risk) and various other stuff. If you want to leave anything here, speak to the Duty Committee Member. If you have volunteered to be a GOPHER, come and find any committee member and we'll sort you out. There are rewards!

Duty Committee Member

Throughout the convention, one committee member will be acting as Duty Committee Member, and will be identified as such by their shiny gold waistcoat. If for any reason there is something that the convention Needs To Sort Out, then your first port of call is the Duty Committee Member.

Badges

The hotel bar and leisure club are open to the public. Your convention badge grants you access to the convention-only areas of the hotel – programme spaces, art show, dealer's room – and the special rates for food that the convention has negotiated. Be sure to wear your badge at all times, or you may find your access to these spaces and prices restricted.

Leisure facilities

We have full use of the leisure club which has a pool, sauna and gym. Access for disabled guests is through the main club entrance outside, reached from the bar. The leisure club is privately-run. Please note: the pool runs some adults-only swim sessions, check times with hotel reception.

DIRE WARINGS

The Park Inn is in the business of selling accommodation, food and drink.

Neither the hotel nor the Novacon committee approve of members crashing in rooms or bringing in their own supplies, so don't do it.

Food

All convention food will be served in the main bar area on the ground floor. Food orders placed at the bar are cooked to order, so there may be a wait. Please remain in the bar until you've got your food.

Friday and Saturday 18:30-22:00, Saturday and Sunday 12:30-14:30

There will be a selection of bar food such as pizza, burgers, chilli, jacket potatoes and baguettes. Prices start at £2.00.

The standard menu will also be available but this costs considerably more. If you want a sit-down meal in the restaurant using the regular hotel menu on Saturday, you'll want to reserve a table as it can get busy.

Friday evening only a fixed-price carvery, meat or vegetarian options.

Friday / Saturday / Sunday late night butties

Bacon butty, sausage butty, chip butty will be available.

Crisps, nuts, chocolate bars, baguettes available from the bar 10:00-23:00.

Drink

The main bar on the ground floor is open from 10:00 until we're all tired. There will be plenty of Black Sheep and house wine. The downstairs bar will be open from 19:00 to midnight on Friday, and late Saturday evening. It is available as lounge space at other times, and is used for off-piste items. The lifts in reception serve the downstairs bar.

Outside

Across the main road outside the hotel you'll find a cashpoint, assorted shops including a newsagent and a supermarket with basic medicines. For an actual pharmacy ask reception for directions to Boots half a mile away.

We'd like you to do all your eating and drinking inside the hotel, because we've told them that you'll be eating and drinking lots. But other pubs are available, including a very old one in the caves under Nottingham castle. And there are other restaurants in Nottingham – the Internet is your friend – but really, eat in the hotel. It's good for our reputation.
