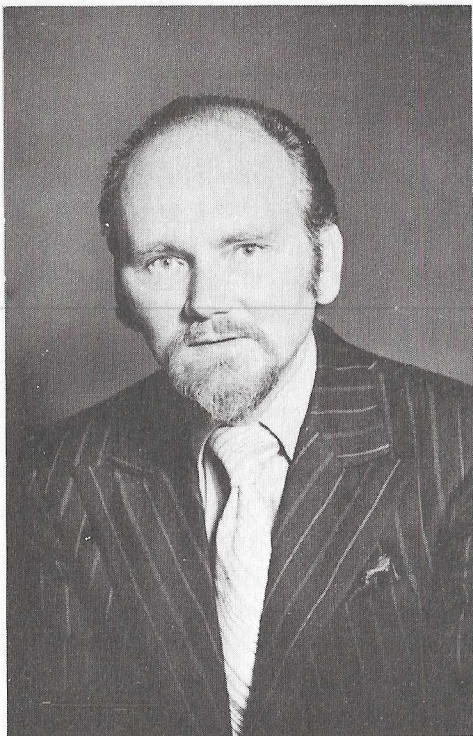

Having been partly responsible for bringing Dan back into fandom, no-one was more pleased than I when it was announced that he was to be the Guest of Honour at NOVACON 5. I think my comment was "And about time too!"

Dan started writing SF in his teens and if you are fortunate enough to have early copies of NEW WORLDS you will see his first attempts which showed a maturity far beyond his years. I remember reading THE UNINHIBITED when serialised by John Carnell in NEW WORLDS - I read and enjoyed this not knowing that Dan lived ten miles up the road from me. Discovering this and armed with an introduction from Tom boardman, I presented myself to Dan (and to show the stuff he's made of, he never even flinched when I bore down on him like a galleon in full sail). I found that he'd just started writing again after a break of about 10 years - an extremely funny novel called THE RICHEST CORPSE IN SHOW BUSINESS which had me chuckling and imagining Norman Wisdom as the protagonist in a film version! In fact, an option for filming was taken but never used.

I've been fortunate in being in at the birth of Dan's 'Mind' novels (and others) having read them in manuscript form and enjoying them all immensely. Dan collaborated on the 'Venturer 12' series with the late John Hynem ('Kippax') - many pleasant evenings have been spent when I've sat and been involved with them discussing ideas.

Dan writes original, well-constructed stories - not for him the sloppiness or unreadability of the so-called avante-garde. Often his stories are slightly downbeat - life is these days - but there is always hope around the corner. To my mind the best novel he has written is yet to be published (Publishers take note!) and I've promised not to reveal anything about it until after it is published. Trish and I fought so much over the original manuscript that we had to patch it up before returning it!

Dan is not only an excellent writer - he is a well-read and cultured man, kind, thoughtful and a good raconteur - if I called for an hour or so, I would not leave Spalding until the early hours of the next morning!

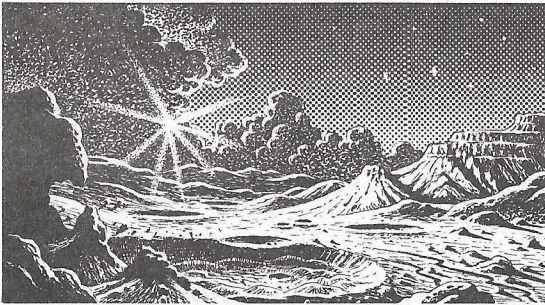

Welcome to NOVACON 5.

One thing you will no doubt notice about this year's convention is that there's a lot more people around than last year. At Easter in Coventry there were also 'a lot more people around than last year'. The same thing was said at last year's NOVACON, and at Newcastle.

The increase in popularity of science fiction may be witnessed by the number of new publishers entering the SF market, by the number of them wishing to support conventions through advertising in the programme booklets and by the number of attendees at conventions.

Have you looked through recent programme booklets and noted the number of registrations listed therein? The last few year's figures for Easter conventions have been: 233 (1972), 303 (1973), 332 (1974), 416 (1975) with similar increases at NOVACONS - 144 (1972), 146 (1973), 211 (1974) and as at the time of writing we have just over 270 for this convention. Add to these figures, the late registrations and people who attend for one day only and the figures increase dramatically - I believe we had well over 300 at NOVACON 4 and the figure almost touched 600 at Easter. A far cry from the conventions of the fifties where registration was 7/6 (free to females!) and 100 attendees were a dream of the future! Possibly someone ought to correlate all the figures, plot a graph and find out just how many we can expect for the World Con in '79 (providing we win the bid of course).

But let's quit worrying about the past and the future - let's think of the present - NOVACON 5. We hope that we've put together a programme in which everyone will find something of interest. We've been fortunate in having a hotel management that has put themselves out to assist in organising the type of convention we want and we're sure that everything will run smoothly at the Con itself. I, as chairman, have been lucky to have a hard-working committee to do all the work that I've been too lazy to do... Arline for typing all the letters and making the coffee... Pauline for looking after the registrations and the cash... Robert for looking after all the important small items that tend to get overlooked - badges, etc.... Ray for designing and making the NOVA Award, designing the Con Badge and looking after all the 'arty' items... Laurence for doing the donkey-work on the Programme Booklet as well as running around collecting things when I was unable to do it... and to all of them for their suggestions, discussions & decisions on all aspects of the Con. Thank you.

We've now done the bulk of our work - it's now up to you to get in there and enjoy yourselves and make NOVACON 5 a success.

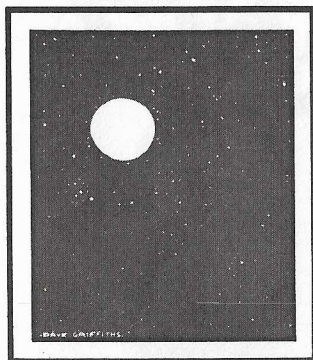

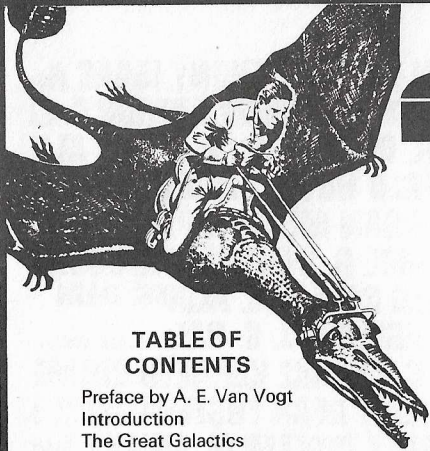

SFANCON 7.

This is the seventh Belgian National Convention and will be held during July 1976 in Liege, Belgium. As usual, reduced rate rooms will be available and the programme will be trilingual in English, French & Flemish. For the third year running a party of British fans will attend the event, many of whom will expand the weekend into a week or two's holiday.

EUROCON III

Held in alternate years, this third European SF Convention will take place in Poznan, Poland, for several days during August 1976. Looking a little further ahead, the 1977 World Science Fiction Convention is to be held in Orlando, Florida, U.S.A. during the month of August. Guest - of - Honor will be Jack Williamson. It is hoped to organise a charter flight and holiday given enough support - which means that arrangements have to be made well in advance.

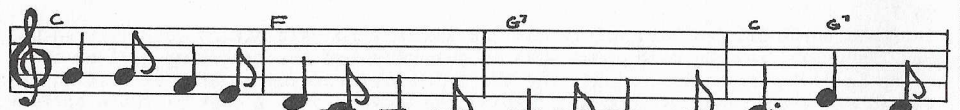

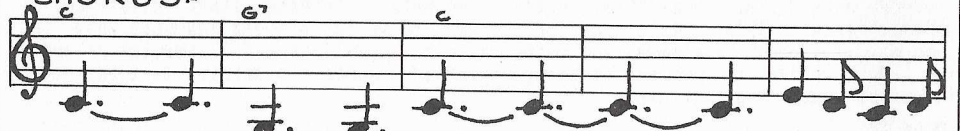

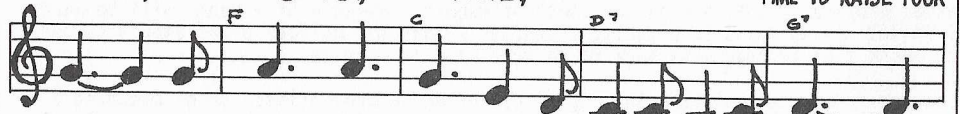

Or stay right in the Con hotel with good old British booze.

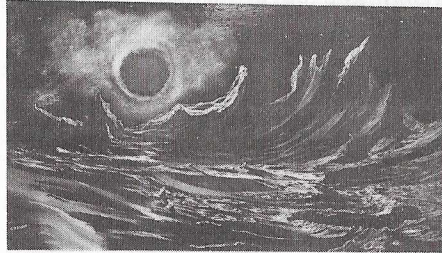
