Introduction

This sheet contains important information about the convention, so please read it. Note that the programme reprinted within is more up-to-date than that printed in the Programme Book. If you have any problems during the weekend and need to contact the convention staff, either go to the Registration Desk if it is open, or the Ops Room, or find a committee member (committee members will be wearing yellow membership badges and a harrassed look).

Badges

You must wear your convention badge (which is in your membership pack) at all times when you are in the convention area. If you do not wear your badge while in the convention area, the convention security staff may challenge you and will ask you to leave if you cannot prove that you are an attending member of *Reconnaissance*.

Keys

The Hotel are providing two keys for twin and double rooms. Since the extra keys do not have key rings, would all members please leave their keys at reception when leaving the Hotel.

Sticky

Signs and posters may only be affixed using blu-tac on non-fabric surfaces; sticky pads and tape are right out.

No Smoking

Please observe no-smoking notices where they have been put up around the convention and abide by them.

Dealers Room

The Dealers Room (Marquis Suite) will be open as follows:

Please do not take drinks into the Dealers Room – leave them on the table at the door of the room (dealers, of course, have special dispensation).

Auction

The convention auction will take place at 10:30 on Sunday morning. Anyone who has items for the auction MUST leave them at the Ops Room (the Caerphilly Room) on Friday or Saturday; goods brought directly to the auction will NOT be sold. All goods should be clearly marked indicating the owner, the minimum bid and where the money collected (minus the convention's 10% commission) should go.

Registration

General information about the convention (including replacement copies of this sheet) can be obtained from the Registration Desk in the hotel foyer. The Registration Desk will be open as follows:

Day Membership

Day membership is valid from 8:00 in the morning on the day joined, for 24 hours. When a day membership expires it must be renewed either at the Registration Desk or, if that is closed, at the Ops Room (the Caerphilly Room).

Checking-Out

Convention members who are resident in the convention hotel should clear their rooms and check-out at hotel registration by midday on the day they are due to leave. Note that billing is by room and not per person, therefore people sharing a twin room MUST arrange to check-out at the same time so that the room bill can be divided.

Bar

The Convention Bar is in the Duchess Suite (see map overleaf). It will be open from 17:00 on Friday and from 11:00 on Saturday and Sunday. The bar will close not earlier than 2:00 in the morning, later if you all drink enough to keep it open, however non-residents may not order drinks after 1:00 in the morning. Baps will be served from behind the bar throughout the day priced at £1.50 each.

Meals





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Build A Flyer Rules

1. The flyer must carry an unfolded sheet of card bearing the *Reconnaissance* logo.

2. The time allowed for design and construction of the flyer is one and a half hours.

3. The flyer must travel a horizontal distance of 30 feet.

4. Bonus points will be awarded for the flyer's air of compet-9ence, style, grace and artistry (if any).

- 5. The flyer must be airborne.
- 6. At least one helium-filled balloon must be used.
- 7. The flyer must not be thrown.

8. Once the flyer is released, no-one may touch it or enter the space between the sending position and the 30 foot distance limit.

9. All flyers must be named.

The competition will take place in the Alternative Programme at 15:00 on Saturday – further teams are still welcome.
