

SOUPÇON P.R.3.

Another Con, another Progress Report. This year they seem to have come through the door faster than the junk mail.

Well, at least you won't get any more from Soupçon - this is absolutely and positively the last, the ultimate, the final PR. So you might as well have a quick look through to see if it contains anything of interest, such as how to find the Hotel de France when you arrive on Jersey, or says you have volunteered for something you have never heard of.

Soupçon will take place over the weekend of Friday 25 October to Sunday 27 October, 1991, and will be held in the Hotel de France, St Saviour's Road, St Helier, Jersey.

Travel.

Hopefully you have now booked your flight or ferry ticket to Jersey. What, you haven't? Well there's only one thing to do -go out immediately and do so!

Seriously, by the time you get this you have probably missed the cheapest flights, but you might get lucky. One we can recommend, if there are still seats, is the Dan Air flight. This is not on the computers - the travel agent will have to phone Dan Air and ask!

Remember that cancellation and medical insurance can be worth considering, as Jersey is not in the National Health Service (hospitals are free, but doctor's visits aren't).

On the other hand, you do not have to worry about passports (unless taking a side trip to France), or getting foreign currency, as English (and Scottish) money is eagerly accepted; just be careful of the colours of Jersey notes, eg £10 is brown.

Again, if find you have to cancel and can't get a useful refund on your ticket (as can be the case on the cheapest offers), contact us to see if we can put you in touch with someone trying to get a late ticket. And vice versa of course.

If you intend to hire a car, speak to your travel agent, as you may be able to get a package deal. If they can't help, we normally use Falles Car Hire, on 0534 - 46373. A small car is perfectly satisfactory on Jersey, and rates are quite low.

If you are bringing your own car, arrive with an empty tank, as petrol is very cheap!

Finding the Hotel.

Go to Jersey.

If you arrive at the Airport;

You will see from the enclosed map that you are at the wrong end of the island. If you have hired a car in advance, find the hire firms desk or pick-up point, and collect your car; then use the rather better map that will come with the car to drive to the hotel. (Alternatively you may be able to hire a car on arrival, though this has never been tried).

If you are not hiring a car, there is a bus service, but it does not have a high reputation for frequency and reliability; taking a taxi is much quicker and easier, and will probably cost about £7.50. Carry this PR prominently, and you may find someone to share your taxi.

If you arrive at the Harbour;

Instructions are basically the same, though it is possible to walk to the hotel, which will take about & hour, and the taxi fare obviously will be a lot cheaper.

If you are flying from Heathrow and have a bit of time to kill, we have had good recommendations for the Haagen-daaz(?) ice cream parlour in Terminal 1. "Seriously decadent" was the phrase used.

Customs.

Since Jersey does not have VAT or Import Duty, you must be able to prove that anything you have taken to Jersey and are now bringing back was originally exported from the mainland - or you could potentially be charged VAT and Import Duty on it.

This is not a problem for items usually carried by tourists, such as cameras, but if you are taking anything more unusual, such as your PC, it could be different (we have never had a problem, but that is not proof for the future).

If you do not have receipts you can take with you, we would advise you to try to get Customs to certify it before leaving the mainland; for this you need to prepare in advance a note of the equipment, in some detail and particularly including serial numbers, and ask customs to stamp and sign it to say they have seen it in the UK.

Banquet.

Almost everyone who has booked a room has also booked a banquet ticket, so the banquet on Saturday night will definitely be one of the main features of Soupçon.

We have not yet, as we proposed in PR2, managed to visit Jersey in order to "test run" the banquet, but may still be able to fit this in during September.

Just to remind you, the price for the Banquet will be;

£20 in advance - refundable with a fortnight's notice.

£22 at door on arrival.

£25 on Saturday (if available).

In case anyone is worrying, dress will be optional (as long as you wear <u>something</u>), but if you like to be posh, feel free to go ahead.

The Programme.

Flouting all precedent and tradition, we put lots of details of the programme in our last PR. This challenge to the fates was taken up, and we have now almost completely re-arranged our schedules.

It will still be held in the Golden Lounge (the Fan Room at Contrivance), and the Con Bar will be the Minstrel Bar, just across the corridor. Registration will probably also be in the bar, to stop the workers claiming that they are being left out of the socialising. If you can't find it, look for a committee member, who will tell you where to go.

We are going ahead with plans to create a different atmosphere to the programme, and this means that instead of the audience being seated in neat rows we will lay out tables to create more of a café-bar informal style.

In PR2 we said that the programme will start around 6.00pm on the Friday, and finish around 7.00pm on the Sunday. This latter is now going to be extended through the evening, as the majority of people are still going to be around.

Friday night goes back to "ordinary" programming, with a panel for children's TV nostalgia buffs called "Noggin the Nog vs the Mutant Ninja Turtles".

On Saturday and Sunday we will start at 2.00pm with a "comment" slot for 30 minutes. This is a soapbox type of item, an opportunity to be a bit controversial. We have got some "volunteers" who have a subject on which they would like to speak, and debate with the audience (either at the time or in the bar afterwards), so we hope you will go along and listen to them.

To go with the informal room layout, we will be devoting a session on **Saturday afternoon** to holding discussion circles round a couple of the tables. The actual number of these circles is variable, so if you have a subject on which you would like to moderate a discussion, we would be pleased to hear from you.

Subjects for the discussion circles should be related in some way to SF, fandom, publishing etc.

Naturally the Banquet remains on **Saturday** night, but now instead of a party on Friday night we will be having pre-dinner drinks with Jersey Tourism. A gap will be allowed beforehand to "dress for dinner" - not compulsory, but I know there are some who like to dress up in DJ or whatever.

What else will be on the programme? Well, we have already mentioned the talk by Kevin Stuckey on Friday evening, and there will also be a scheduled filk session at 11.00pm on Friday (which is not to say that filk will be banned on Saturday and Sunday evenings).

On Saturday the main item will be the banquet (details elsewhere) followed by Ian Watson's speech as our Guest of Honour. This will still be followed by the Challenge Quiz - so be ready (in pairs) to take on the temporary champions.

On Sunday there will be a couple of panels, one discussing the SF that the participants are currently reading; the panellists for this were selected at random from the membership, but generated a potentially interesting group. The other panel will be more fannish, discussing why a variety of people actually attend conventions.

We will close with something bearing little resemblance to the traditional business meeting, and then we will hand over to Helicon, the next con in Jersey over Easter 1993 (free commercial), and collapse gratefully into the bar.

The collapse will, however, be of short duration, as "close", in true con tradition, does not mean "end". To round off the Convention we are planning to hold a party, with a "French" (or more accurately Franglais) flavour (who mentioned garlic?). Bring striped sweaters, berets, and bad Maurice Chevalier accents.
