





ON LARRY NIVEN

I heard someone once say that genius is the art of maintaining the heart and vision of a child, while allowing the critical thinking faculties to mature. If that definition holds, then Larry Niven is most certainly a genius.

It's strange: with most really intelligent people, you get a sense that they are just crunching more data than average, or can retain more facts, or even have those facts better organized or interrelated than most folks. Although Larry has these qualities in great degree, he also has something else, something that is rather magical.

It seems to be a kind of rabbit-hole trick, a way of popping from one idea to another, even though there is no apparent linear or sequential connection between them, generating insights that make sense only in retrospect. I have seen him do it often enough to, by now, simply relax and enjoy it.

I've known Larry for more than twenty years. We've written a slew of books together, vacationed together, traveled to England

and Wales, swum with dolphins, and spent endless hours arguing and discussing every conceivable aspect of life. He's the godfather of my darling daughter, who, quite properly, adores him. He has wonderful energy, a stupe-fying wit, and the skills of one of the greatest writers of this century.

Larry Niven is also, very simply, himself. He doesn't try to be someone else. And that, perhaps, is the rarest and highest gift of all. — Steven Barnes

ON MICHAEL WHELAN


I wouldn't presume to write anything complimentary about Michael Whelan's work, let alone Michael Whelan himself.

It embarrasses him.

So I will not state that upon learning he would be doing the cover for Dragon Prince—my very first novel!—I literally went weak in the knees and had to sit down.

Neither will I mention that each time I receive a print from my publisher of the art he's just done for a book of mine, I write him a fan letter.

I won't write about how, when Jennifer Roberson, Kate Elliott, and I received prints of the painting he did for The Golden Key, we decided that if ever we were all three in the same room with him we'd fall onto our knees and abase ourselves and whine piteously, "We're not worthy!" And of course I have absolutely no intention of telling you about the times I've rewritten text to match a detail he's put in the cover art. (He can't believe I'd change my words; I can't




believe my words are worth his pictures. We each think the other is crazy, but we're very civil about it.)

All this sort of discussion distresses him terribly, and he's such a truly nice man that I wouldn't for the world cause him any anguish.

Really. Would these baby blue eyes lie?

Therefore, rather than write any of those things, I'll simply report that he is reasonably competent at what he does, reasonably tolerable as a human being, and that when I take him and his family to the Grand Canyon I probably won't push him off the side into the Colorado River. - Melanie Rawn



ON ROBERT PEACOCK

I first met Robert Peacock long, long ago in a galaxy far, far away. He was building land-speeders in a factory on Totooine by day and dreaming of space at night. I instantly recognized that the Force was strong within him. I persuaded him to go to the swamp planet Leprecon to awaken his potential. He met the great Jedi master Raygish who taught him much. He has become a master of the light-brush and a great teacher himself.

Well, even if it wasn't quite like, it makes a good story. Actually, I first met Robert Peacock about twelve years ago when we were both working on the same project for a

major avionics company in Glendale. He seemed to be really mundane. One day we were talking about what we had done the preceding weekend: I had gone to Coppercon. I told him about all the things that go on at a convention - including the Art Show. Robert admitted that he painted space art. He really enjoyed it, but he had never done anything with it. It's not the sort of thing that goes over big at most art exhibits. I asked to see his work. A week or so later he invited me over to look at some of his paintings. He opened up a closet and pulled out a dozen or so pieces from the back. They were GOOD! As good or better than any amateur art I had seen at Convention Art Shows (and I had been to the Art Shows at most Westercons, Coppercons and Leprecons in the previous ten years.) Far too good to stay stacked in a closet! This man HAD to start exhibiting at Cons!

It didn't take too much persuading. Any artist likes to have his work seen by an appreciative audience. That year Robert exhibited at Leprecon for the first time. He seemed to be a bit amazed at the auction that people would pay lots of good money for his work. I don't think he's ever looked back. Robert's work has appeared at various Westercons and Worldcons. But his first love still seems to be the local cons where he started. His work has graced the art shows at most Phoenix conventions since then.





ART WORKSHOPS AND DEMOS

Come and see how it's done! Our wonderful artists have agreed to share their talent and expertise with budding artists and interested fans at the following art workshops and demos. Pat Connors - Sun. 1pm - WORKSHOP: Calligraphy workshop for 8 You must sign up in advance at Program Ops Maryeileen Flanagan & Kit Townsend - Sat 1pm - WORK-SHOP: Costuming 102: Making a Tunic You will need to provide your own materials and sewing machine and participation is limited to 6. Equipment needed: -> (roughly) between 4 to 6 yards of fabric, and about a third more trim than the amount of fabric (ie, for 4 yards of fabric, get 6 yards of trim). -> Some cord or ribbon for lacing can provide for some simple variations on the basic tunic design, although rat tail should be avoided. — > Your own straight pins & scissors. —> Participants who have sewing machines, extension cords, & tape measures should make every effort to bring them. -> If you already have a pattern of your own that you'd like to use, bring that (and follow the directions for -that- pattern regarding yardage, fabric, etc.). If you don't have a pattern, bring a loose-fitting T-shirt or dress shirt to use as a pattern base.





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

MASQUERADE

Calling all stage hams and other people interested in costuming! Prizes! A full circle black wool cape for Best in Show. (If I weren't masquerade director I'd be trying to win it,) an 8" Gingher Dressmaker's Shears, for the workmanship award, and a sewing repair kit for the Novice Division. All donated by the Southwest Costumers Guild. And (if they arrive in time some) Japanimation Video tapes donated by L25.

How to Sign Up There will be a sign-up sheet and information posted at the convention's volunteers table by registration. Please sign up at or before the Masquerade walk through When/Where There will be contestants' walk-through on Saturday at 11 AM in Room 122. This is the time to bring your completed entry forms, tapes, notes for the MC, documentation, and to clear any presentation questions with the director. Check your pocket program for the exact time and last-minute changes. Contestants will meet in the Green Room (Kachina Room, a meeting room that adjoins the ballroom) before the Masquerade. If you want to have your costume judged for workmanship, please arrive at 6 PM. For all other contestants please arrive at 6:30 PM to check in. At the Kachina Room you can change into your costume (sorry there are no private dressing rooms) and queue up for your presentation. We will have water, dry

munchies, mirrors, tables and volunteer den mothers for your convenience. The Southwest Costumers Guild will provide some emergency repair supplies. You should expect, however, to bring whatever tools and materials you will need for basic setup and maintenance of your costume. Masquerade starts at 7 PM.

Crew and Tech information Assuming that his schedule does not conflict, Cary Riall will be the Master of Ceremonies. If you have attended Phoenix-area masquerades before, you will remember Cary as a gentleman with the wonderful voice who can make almost any thing sound good. We will be using 3 by 5" index cards for the MC's notes you can fill these out at the walkthru. Limit your introduction to 25 words or less. Please spell strange names phonetically (fone-et-ick-al-lee). If the MC cannot read your writing he may improvise something you did not have in mind!

Have your tape queued up and marked "Play this side." The tape should be marked with your name, costume title, and "play this side." Give your tape to the director or sound man at the walk-through on Saturday afternoon. I recommend that you submit a copy of your tape, not the factory original. We'll endeavor to get your tape back to you, but Murphy's Law rules at SF Conventions. Personally I highly recommend a tape to help you time your presentation. You can use it to slow down your walk so the judges and audience can see you or keep track of your time so your presentation does not go tooooooo long. 60 seconds may not seem like it is a long time, but it can seem to last forever. I am hoping to also have a selection of generic music that can be used if you don't have a tape. Lights? Yes, there will be lights but only a hot spot for the stage. The stage will be 24' by 12' with a 6' runway. There are stairs leading up to the stage and off the stage. The entrance will be from Stage right. The doorway onto the stage will be standard size. Classes On your masquerade registration form there are three classes. Junior for children 0-12 years, Adult for everyone over 18 (People 12-18 may choose if they want to compete in the Adult or Junior Class), and a Special Class for adults who have not previously competed and won a major prize in a SF Convention Masquerade, or have not completed in over IO years. If your costume is something you designed yourself; it is an original design. If your costume was taken from a picture, it is a recreation. Please bring a copy of the picture from which a recreation was taken to show the judges. You do not need documentation for a historical costume, though I would suggest bringing a picture if it is a recreation of a historical costume. If you bring documentation, please limit it to five pages, with enough copies for all four of the judges.

THE RULES (ACK)

- 1. Relax and have fun!
- 2. Please limit your presentation to 60 seconds or less. It's longer than you think.
- 3. No fire or flame allowed on-stage. It's a hotel thing.
- 4. Purchased or rented costumes may not be entered for competition, but are welcome as display-only. You can use purchased components, but the overall costume is to be fan-made. If you take a ready made garment and add details or decorations it qualifies as fan-made. If you go out and purchase an entire Darth Vader costume from a costume shop it does not. If you collect a bunch of thrift stores finds and combine them into something wild and wonderful it qualifies. When in doubt ask

the Masquerade Director.

5. The designer, builder, and model of the costume do not have to be the same person. Costumes are a great place for teamwork.

6. No messy substances (wet, dusty, oily, etc.) that might damage the stage or interfere with other contestants. Thou shalt not slime thy neighbor.

7. There will be children present, so this masquerade is rated PG-13. Please, no flagrant nudity or deliberately offensive language and action. If you have an idea that sounds good, but might be over the top, talk to me first I have very liberal ideas of what PG-13 is.

8. No smoking in the green room or ballroom.

9. No flash photography while participants are on-stage. Posed pictures can be arranged off-stage or after the masquerade.

10. Weapons or other sharp, pointy, and loud things must be approved in advance by the masquerade director at the walk-through or earlier.

If the weapon and its presentation have not been cleared, you will be disqualified from competition. This is a safety thing. I like weapons (particularly sharp pointy ones), but I want to see for myself what you are carrying and what you intend to do with it. This safety approval rule also applies to off-stage action, stunts, energetic dances, et cetera.

12. NO ATTACKING THE MC! (It really happened.) You will be disqualified.

13. The masquerade director has full authority to eliminate anyone from the competition on the basis of unrepentant bad taste, danger to the contestants or audience, violation of the above rules, or any other reason deemed sufficient. There will be no appeal. This rule is intended to protect you and the convention (see Rule 12) and will not be invoked frivolously.

14. Relax and have fun!

REGISTRATION

Hi. If you are reading this you most likely have already registered so we won't go through the "how to's". Please remember to keep track of your badge during the convention. If you lose your badge you will need to pay the full current price to replace it.

SECURITY

This year, LepreCon is back in Phoenix, after several years in Casa Grande. Many of the reasons that the convention had to be relocated related to security issues at past events. We need to make sure that no such issues arise this year at LepreCon. To this end, our security team asks you to PLEASE be extremely careful that you do not damage hotel property, or cause problems for the hotel staff. The future of LepreCon in Phoenix depends upon us re-establishing a favorable reputation with the hotel community. Remember that the hotels all talk to each other, and compare notes. There are several upcoming conventions that will be at the Sunspree, both this year and next. In all probability, other conventions in the future will be employing this facility as well. We need to make sure that we don't cause

potential problems for these other events.

The security staff will be present to ensure that any behavior that is not consistent with these goals can be resolved without involvement by the hotel. We will be there to help with friendly suggestions in case anything looks like it might lead to a problem.

Security's purpose is not to act like a police force, or to allow ego-centric people free reign to bother attendees, but to keep the atmosphere consistent with everyone having a good time, both at this convention, and at future events. Remember, we are there to make sure that YOU have a great convention experience.

As always, no real or realistic firearms will be allowed, There will be no concealed weapons of any kind. All bladed weapons must be peace bonded. There will be no bottled beverages allowed on the hotel grounds (plastic cups are OK). All room parties for the weekend need to be registered with the security office no later than 8:00 PM on FRIDAY NIGHT. Alcoholic beverages must be kept under control at all times. If we detect that any alcoholic beverages are being supplied to underage minors (That's UNDER 21 in Arizona), we will shut you down IMMEDIATELY. Nudity is NOT permitted in the pool area. Cameras will NOT be permitted in the Art Show area. We will have a secured storage area in operations where you may leave valuable property, if you are not staying at the hotel.

As always, we will need some volunteers for security. If you are interested, please see our volunteer coordinator.
