Howard V. Tayler

Artist Guest of Honor

Author, creator, and artist of "Schlock Mercenary"

I blame my brother-in-law.

You see, he has an uncanny ability to know about all the best web comics when they are only a few days old. Now, I may not always listen what he says. When it comes to web comics, though, I usually pay attention. He knows.

So when, a number of years back, he told me about this comic called *Schlock Mercenary*, I made the decision to check it out. Who wouldn't love a comic about intergalactic mercenaries? Especially when the title character is a walking pile of sh... ah, a "carbosilicate amorph." With a plasma cannon that makes an ominous hum.

I went to the website — www.schlockmercenary.com may be hard to spell, but it is also hard to forget — and read a few of the most recent comics. Then I went back through the archives and started from the beginning. I've been reading it since. After that first time, I've followed the adventures of "Tagon's Toughs" through thick and thin, war and peace, life and death, humor and drama.

Humor and drama? Let me explain.



Howard Tayler — he writes and draws Schlock Mercenary, you see — has a certain talent: he can make something funny, and yet, still deadly serious. It's a rare skill. The only person besides Howard who I've really seen pull it off on a regular basis is Terry Pratchett. It's a fine line to walk, balanced across a chasm between two extremes. So easy, to fall to one side, into farce, or to the other, into melodrama. Howard walks that line each week. He's been doing it for years. Which brings me to another point.


When Howard first started Schlock Mercenary, he was working a full-time job for Novell, a little technology firm you may have heard of before. He was doing this full-time job, making international trips for the company, spend-

ing time with his wife and children, and churning out a new comic each and every day, while maintaining the funny.

Well, the funny and the "blam." "Blam" is key.

In a business — and don't be fooled, web comics are a business, albeit one approached, by most, in a haphazard manner — when many creators seem to struggle to post a new strip three days a week, Howard did it every day. He's still doing it every day. For more than seven years. Sure, he eventually decided the time was come to quit his job at Novell to work on *Schlock* full-time. To me, though, that just makes it all the more amazing. He is making a living entertaining people.

Speaking of which, that is something else I appreciate about Howard and his work: on his website, he notes that if you start from the beginning of the archives, you can



watch his art go from "bad" to "marginally less bad." Which is amusing, but not totally accurate. Howard has spent his time on the comic working to improve his art and writing. Not content to churn out the same thing day after day, he has actively worked to improve the product that he provides to us — to me, to you, to fans all over the world — for free every day. That is not just talent; it is skill, dedication, and a loyalty to his work and his readers that is hard to find.

So, there you have it: Howard Tayler is a family man, a musician, a writer, an artist, a computer geek, a role player, a wargamer, and a businessman. He is plotting to take over the world, and he has his own army.

The Toughs' motto is "travel the galaxy, meet interesting races, and kill them." Howard's, it seems, is "make people happy, and work to do it better every day."

And that is something to appreciate.

Emily & Ernie Hogan

Author Guests of Honor

The thing about Emily and Ernest Hogan is they both look so normal.

With her wide eyes and peaches-and-cream complexion, Emily looks like a Sunday school teacher. Even Ernie looks normal in a lanky, bushy-haired, Latino sort of way. Actually they're both about six sigma west of strange and surfing down the far end of the bell curve. Don't get me wrong, they're really nice people, and lots of fun to talk to. But they're, ah, well, they're just not what they seem.

Take Emily, for example. She's so, well, everyday-looking. Then you read her books. (And please do. They're wonderful.) Reading one of Emily's books is like having fireworks going off in your head or going to eat in an obscure ethnic restaurant featuring a cuisine you've never heard of. It's all delicious and you even recognize some of the ingredients, but they're put together in such odd combinations. (One of my favorites involves a serial killer, ballroom dancing and a race of aliens who live in speeded up time.)



And Ernie. . . Well, Ernie has the heart of a small child.

He keeps it on his key chain and he'll show it to you if you ask him nicely. (Of which, more later.)

Ernie's work is perhaps best illustrated (not described. You can't describe Ernie's work) by the titles of a couple of stories he's especially proud of: "The Frankenstein Penis" and "The Dracula Vagina." My

favorite Ernest Hogan short story is probably "The Rise and Fall of Paco Cohen and the Mariachis of Mars."

People keep trying to describe his work, though. My favorite description is of Ernie as "perhaps the leading current practitioner of Mexican-American magical realism in science fiction." I mean, it's true, but it doesn't really describe what it's like to read one of his stories.

If, as Dostoevsky said, every unhappy family is unhappy in its own way, really, truly, deeply weird people tend to be weird in their own, very different ways.

That's certainly true of Emily and Ernie. They're both weird, but they're each weird on their own, quite different, ways. Ernie's stuff tends to be built around themes like American multi-ethnicity, remakings of popular culture, and religion and its interaction with technology and drugs.

Emily's work is less easy to classify. Both of them like to play with ideas, but Ernie tends to draw his ideas from the world



around him. Emily pulls her ideas out of her own head — which, as far as I can tell, is a damn weird place in its own right.


It is tremendous fun to sit and talk with them. As a writer it's even more fun to sit around and bounce ideas back and forth. Although we have cleared out more than one coffee shop doing that.

Oh yeah, about that heart. Ernie and I collaborated on an Aztec Dinosaur Detective Story Noir titled "Obsidian Harvest" a few years ago. We must have done a pretty good job because the story ran in ANALOG and was later picked up by Gardner Dozois for *The Year's Best Science Fiction 18*. Naturally the story involved cutting people's hearts out. (Don't all Aztec Dinosaur Detective Stories Noir involve cutting people's hearts out?)

Anyway, shortly after the story appeared, I had to go in for emergency open heart surgery. I emerged with five patches on my heart and made a decent recovery. But a while later I noticed Ernie had a new, somewhat fancier, heart on his key chain.

I'm still trying to convince myself that's just a coincidence.




David Ayres

Special FX Makeup Artist Guest of Honor

We first met David Ayres some years back when my husband and I were helping a friend look for someone who could help assist with his make-up for a TNG Klingon costume. We were guided to Dave by a costume shop proprietor in Mesa who had his card and told us this was someone we simply had to talk to. When we contacted him and told him what we were looking for, Dave invited us to come to his then home/workshop. Stepping through the door was like walking into a carnival fun-house, with monsters, aliens, zombies, and all manner of wonderful creations greeting us at every turn. I found it all so cozy that while the boys talked about make-up and prosthetics, I curled up and slept in an available papasan chair. We found in each other kindred spirits with our shared interest in the fantastic and macabre, and have been friends ever since.

Dave's fascination with make-up effects began when he was a small child, through school productions and watching those magical Saturday morning horror films that easily drew many of us away from mere cartoons. It wasn't long before he was creating his own make-up effects to thrill the neighborhood children, bring characters to life in local theater productions, and add his own magic to long-awaited Halloween nights. His passion for the art grew, as did his skill, and eventually led to an audio-tape correspondence with established make-up artist, Dick Smith — known for his work on such films as "Little Big Man," "The Godfather," and "The Exorcist." This helped hone the young artist's skill and guided him to connections in the industry. Dave started his professional career at Don Post Studios in Burbank, California, making masks. He then moved on to work for Burman Studios, and got to add his artistry to many film and television productions, including "Close Encounters of the Third Kind," "Empire of the Ants," and "The In-



credible Hulk (tv series)." In the late '70s Dave made the decision to return home to Arizona to care for his elderly parents. During the years he devoted to his family, he maintained his skills working on small productions and mask-making.

Dave continues to work in make-up effects, creating masks and prosthetics for independent filmmakers, local professionals, and costumers. Halloween continues to be a special time of year for Dave, and he often does work for valley haunted houses. He now contributes to the field he loves by sharing his own knowledge and experience with others who wish to learn the trade. Dave has written a manual on mask-making, and provides workshops



several times a year on Make-up Effects techniques. We've certainly learned a lot through my friendship with Dave over the years. He is a gentle giant, warm and caring, honest and genuine. He possesses an open mind and a heart that managed to never lose that childlike sense of wonder at the world. I encourage folks to come out and say hello to Dave. He'll greet you with a broad smile and, if you take the time, a great conversation about anything from UFOs, to animal rights, to (of course) classic monster movies.

pencil, oil, and acrylic. Instead, she expanded her skills by exploring glass etching, tile making, mosaics, and sculpting.


Her current passion is the pursuit of a Master's degree from the University of Arizona's School of Information and Library Science. Lest anyone mistakenly believe this is a dry and dusty

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
Art Show







He grew up in Mesa, AZ and became a "Monster Kid," loving the classic monster/science-fiction films and TV shows. Halloween became his favorite time of the year. He fell in love with this creative art at an early age and never stopped. He also enjoys teaching workshops.

Six of Em's books were published by ROC/NAL under the Emily Devenport pen name: *Shade, Larissa, Scorpianne, Eggheads, The Kronos Condition,* and *Godheads.* Emily Devenport stories appeared in ASIMOV'S SF MAGAZINE, the *Full Spectrum* anthology, and ABORIGINAL SF, whose readers voted her a Boomerang Award (which turned out to be an actual boomerang).

As Maggy Thomas she wrote Broken Time, which was published by ROC/NAL in the U.S. and by Urania in Italy. Broken Time was nominated for the Philip K, Dick award.

As Lee Hogan she wrote *Belarus* and *Enemies*, which were published by ROC/NAL in the U.S. and OPUS in Israel.

Currently Em is writing Urban Fantasy and YA SF & Fantasy, some titles alone and some with her husband, artist/writer Ernest Hogan, as E. E. Hogan (two Es, no waiting). She works at Borders Books & Music and lives in Glendale with Ernie, Sam the Bad Cat, and Lovey Howl (a dog, not the rich broad from "Gilligan's Island").

Ernest Hogan - Author Guest of Honor

Ernest Hogan is a child of the Atomic Age, and the great-grandson of one of Pancho Villa's curanderos. He was born in East L.A. He has worked as a cartoonist, illustrator, and writer. He is no relation to the Ernest Hogan who coined the word "ragtime," back in the nineteenth century.

His novels, *Cortez On Jupiter, High Aztech*, and *Smoking Mirror Blues*, and short fiction, including "The Frankenstein Penis" (that was made into short film called "Phall-O-Krat" that can be seen online as series of video clips) and most recently "Human Sacrifice for Fun and Profit," in *Voices for the Cure*, an anthology benefiting the American Diabetes Ass'n, have given him the reputation as a international cult author. Though he is not now and never was a card-carrying cyberpunk, people in places like Greece and Brazil insist that he is. He is currently finishing up his mainstream novel, *Walter Quixote: or, Love in the Time of Terrorism*, and some collaborations with his wife Emily.

Use common sense and think before you do something. If an action will get in you in trouble in the real world, it will probably get you in trouble at LepreCon. Remember Arizona does have laws concerning alcohol consumption, use of illegal substances, and public nudity.

Your badge shows that you are a member of convention. Attendees are required to have their badge visible and readable at all times. A badge is required to access all convention programming and function space. Badges may not be shared with or loaned to anyone. The badge remains the property of the convention until the close of the convention and your membership is revocable for cause at any time.

If you are concerned with your safety or the safety of another please contact Convention Security in Con Ops, a Security Team member, or any LepreCon 34 Committee or Staff member. We are here to help you and to ensure that you have a good time.

Please feel free to contact Convention Security at any time if you have any questions about the convention or need any assistance.

Security Policy

Any convention attendee violating any of these policies and procedures will be referred to Convention Security for appropriate action, which can include but is not limited to the following:

- Verbal cautioning
- Badge punching to track verbal warnings; 3 punches = revocation of membership
- · Confiscation / removal of weapons or props
- · Removal from programming / event
- Revocation of membership and removal from the convention and convention venue
- Local law enforcement authorities may also be notified at our discretion.

The Convention and Convention Security are not limited by what is contained in this document and will handle any and all incidents during the convention in a manner deemed appropriate for the circumstances.

Room Party Policies

If you are planning a room party please stop by Con Ops (Rm 419) and fill out a party registration form. Room Parties are not required to be registered but you are encouraged to do so. Registered parties that generate complaints will be handled primarily by Convention Security, and we will act as a buffer between you and hotel security. Non-registered parties that generate complaints will be handled primarily by hotel security and the convention will not act as a buffer, nor will we intervene if the hotel chooses to shut down your party. This does not mean that you can register your party and be excessively rowdy and avoid being

shut down — the convention reserves the right to shut down parties or events, or to withdraw convention recognition and turn the problem over to hotel security should the situation warrant. Please register your party by 5:00 pm of the day of the party.

The Hotel will have guests who are not convention attendees, and they have a reasonable expectation of not being disturbed by loud parties during late night hours. While we have tried to keep room parties away from non-attendee rooms and will make every effort to mediate noise disputes involving registered parties, there will be limits on how much noise you can make.

You must be both a convention member and a registered guest at the Hotel to register your room party. The individual(s) registering the party is/are responsible for the conduct of all persons at the party. They are also responsible for ensuring that Arizona laws are obeyed, including laws regarding consumption and dispensing of alcohol.

Weapons Policy

Horseplay with weapons will NOT be tolerated! No real or realistic firearms are allowed at the convention at any time for any reason. Any violation of this policy will result in revocation of membership and removal from the convention and convention venue. Firearms include but are not limited to the following:

- Handguns
- · Long guns / shotguns
- Tasers / stun guns
- Any prop or device designed or intended to fire a projectile

Bladed weapons such as swords and knives are permitted provided they are kept in a hard sheath and peace-bonded. Convention attendees will need to go to the Con Ops (Rm 419) to get their blade peace-bonded. They will also need to read and sign a copy of the Weapons Policy.

Any attendee carrying a peace-bonded blade will need to carry or wear the blade in such a manner so that other attendees or anyone else present at the convention venue is not at risk to be struck by or otherwise physically encounter the sheathed weapon. Unsheathed or non-peace-bonded bladed weapons are not permitted at any time. Any peace-bonded blade carried in an unsafe manner or any non-peace-bonded or unsheathed blade can be confiscated and the attendee could face further action by Convention Security.

Leprecon Inc. Bylaws

Approved November 13, 2005

1. PRIMARY PURPOSE

Leprecon Inc. is organized primarily to operate an annual science fiction convention in the Phoenix metropolitan area. It may also hold other social functions during the year in connection with and in support of the primary purpose.

2. MEMBERSHIP

2.1. Active and Passive members

2.1.1. Becoming a member

Membership in the organization is conveyed to a person by petition at a quarterly meeting, by obtaining a convention membership or by Board of Directors decree. Membership is open to all persons with an interest in science fiction, fantasy, and/or related topics. The Corporation may refuse to accept memberships for cause.

2.1.2. Term of membership

Membership is considered active until at least one (1) quarterly meeting is not attended. Membership is considered passive until returning to active by attending a quarterly meeting before the next convention. Membership is considered either active or passive unless terminated as indicated below. Proxy letters may be substituted for attendance if necessary.

2.1.3. Termination of membership

Membership may be revoked for disorderly, anti-social, or illegal behavior or other specified cause during or in connection with a convention or other corporate sponsored event. Membership is terminated automatically if the member fails to obtain an attending membership in the annual convention. Membership is terminated involuntarily if a two-thirds (2/3) majority of all active members vote to terminate. Membership is terminated voluntarily if the member sends a signed resignation letter to the Secretary or other designated Board of Directors member. Membership is terminated automatically if the member enters the Art Show with art for sale or enters the Dealers Room with intent to sell merchandise.

2.1.4. Rights of membership

Membership entitles the holder to attend quarterly meetings and vote at such meetings, attend the convention for which a convention membership was obtained, or any other function sponsored by the organization.

2.1.5. Classes of membership

Current classes of membership include Active and Passive. The Corporation may declare other classes of membership as needed.

2.16. Petition for membership

A person may petition for membership at a quarterly meeting by circulating a petition asking to become a member. Active members may sign the petition to indicate that the petitioning person is acceptable as a member. If the petitioning person obtains signatures from at least two-thirds (2/3) of the active members present and submits the petition to the Secretary or designated board member, then the person becomes an active member seven (7) days after the end of that quarterly meeting.

2.17. Convention membership

A person may obtain an attending convention membership by purchasing one through the Treasurer or authorized agent, or by holding a convention position (past or present) that is authorized to receive a complimentary membership.

2.2. Member rights

2.2.1. Active members are eligible to vote for the Board of Directors, to hold positions on the board, to vote for changes in these Bylaws or for any other reason designated by the Board.

2.2.2. There must be at least fifteen (15) active members. Should the number fall below this, the Board of Directors shall appoint new active members as necessary.

2.2.3. Obligations of members

2.2.3.1. Active members must be legally competent in the State of Arizona.

2.2.3.2. Active and passive members must maintain their current mailing address, email address and telephone number with the Secretary.

2.2.3.3. Active members must respond to a ballot.

2.2.3.4. Active members must attend each of the regular quarterly meetings of the Board of Directors or send a written proxy letter.

2.2.3.5. Active and passive members must be an attending member of the annual convention.

3. DIRECTORS

3.1. Composition of the Board of Directors

3.1.1. There shall be five (5) voting Directors.

3.1.2. Three (3) Directors shall be selected by election for three (3) year terms, electing one Director after each Annual Meeting, and taking office at the end of that meeting.

3.1.3. Each person who completes a term as President shall become a Director for a two (2) year term commencing at the end of the Annual Meeting following the completion of the previous convention.

3.1.4. The President (current convention chair) shall be a non-voting member of the Board.

3.1.5. The Vice-President (next convention chair after current) shall be a non-voting member of the Board.

3.1.6. The Assistant Vice-President (following convention chair after next) shall be a non-voting member of the Board.

3.2. Election of Directors

3.2.1. Directors shall be elected by ballot of the active members. Such elections may take place at any scheduled quarterly meeting. Nominations for such elections may be called for at such scheduled meetings. Typically, elections occur at the Annual Meeting usually held in August.

3.2.2. In meetings where nominations and elections are to take place, all active members must be notified one (1) week in advance.

3.2.3. Active members not able to attend meetings where elections are held may vote by notifying the Secretary, the President or the Chairman of the Board in writing of their vote.

3.2.4. If there is a vacancy on the Board, the Board of Directors may appoint a Director to fill the vacancy until a replacement can be elected for the remainder of the regular term of the Director being replaced. This election shall be within three (3) months of the vacancy.

3.3. Termination of Office

The Secretary shall conduct a recall election when requested by petition of the active members. This election shall be conducted by mail ballot and shall begin within one (1) month of the request. A vote of twothirds (2/3) of the active members is required for removal. In the event that the recall election involves the Secretary position, then the Chairman of the Board shall assume the Secretary's duties for the recall election. Termination of office is not a termination of active membership. A separate vote would be required to terminate an active membership.

3.4. Rights of Directors

The Board of Directors manages the operation of the corporation by appointing and removing the Operating Officers and monitoring their performance in office. The Directors shall have exclusive control of any matter which might reasonably be expected to affect more than a single convention.

3.5. Obligations of the Board of Directors

The Directors shall exercise reasonable care in the management of the corporation and shall consider the opinions and concerns of the active and passive members in any decision. Each Director must be legally competent in the State of Arizona, must attend three (3) of the four (4) regular quarterly meetings of the Board of Directors and must meet any other requirements set by the Board for its own operations. Proxy letters may substitute for attendance if necessary.

3.6. Chairman and Vice-Chairman of the Board

The Board of Directors shall elect one of the Directors as a Chairman and one of the Directors as a Vice-Chairman. The Chairman runs the quarterly meetings. The Vice-Chairman runs the meetings in the absence of the Chairman.

4. MEETINGS OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

4.1. Regular meetings of the Board

4.1.1. Quarterly meetings shall be held on the second Saturday of August, November, February and May, these being the second month of each quarter. Active and passive members and members of the Board are responsible for finding out the time and place of the meetings. No notifications are required. Quarterly meetings may be held within 10 days of the above dates if necessary to accommodate the attendance of a majority of the Directors.

4.1.2. Other scheduled meetings may be held at the discretion of the President or the Chairman of the Board as needed. For scheduled meetings other than regular quarterly meetings, all active members, all Directors, and all operating officers shall be provided with the time and place with a minimum of one (1) week notice. This notice shall be distributed as widely as practical before the meeting.

4.1.3. All regular Board meetings shall be open to all interested people.

4.1.4. A quorum is required to make a meeting official. This applies to quarterly, annual, unscheduled or special meetings. A quorum is defined as at least three (3) voting Directors in attendance or by written proxy.

4.2. Unscheduled Board meetings

Unscheduled Board of Directors meetings are those that do not meet the notification requirements for regular meetings. They may be called as desired by the Chairman, as long as a majority of the Directors are present. These meetings may be held informally over the telephone, online or in person so long as a majority of the Directors are contacted and a majority opinion is reached on the question(s) under consideration. Any action taken by an unscheduled meeting must be ratified at the next regular meeting to be valid.

4.3. Annual meeting

Leprecon Inc. shall hold an Annual Meeting each year shortly after the convention. This meeting shall serve as a general report to the convention members on the previous convention and act to set the direction for the next convention. The Annual Meeting shall be one of the regular quarterly meetings. The time and place of the Annual Meeting shall be published in the convention program book.

5. CORPORATE OPERATING OFFICERS

5.1. President

The President is the Chief Operating Officer (COO) of the current convention. S/he supervises the activities of his/her appointed staff. S/he is responsible for the smooth operation of the convention and shall perform whatever duties are necessary to ensure that occurs. The President shall function under the supervision and direction of the Board of Directors and shall make regular reports informally to the Directors and formally and in detail at each quarterly meeting, including the Annual Meeting. The President shall also perform any other duties assigned by state or federal law or by the Board of Directors. The President may not simultaneously hold any other Corporate office.

5.2. Treasurer

The Treasurer is the Chief Financial Officer (CFO) of the corporation. S/he maintains the financial records and accounts of the corporation. S/he is responsible for the proper handling of all corporation assets and shall perform whatever duties are necessary to ensure that occurs. The Treasurer shall function under the supervision and direction of the Board of Directors and shall make regular reports informally to the Directors and formally and in detail at each quarterly meeting, including the Annual Meeting. The Treasurer shall also perform any duties assigned by state or federal law or by the Board of Directors.



5.3. Secretary

The Secretary is responsible for keeping the non-financial records of the corporation. S/he is responsible for maintaining copies of all necessary corporate records and making copies available as necessary. S/he shall perform all duties necessary to ensure proper performance of this function. The Secretary shall function under the supervision and direction of the Board of Directors and shall make regular reports informally to the Directors and formally and in detail at each quarterly meeting, including the Annual Meeting. The Secretary shall also perform any other duties assigned by state or federal law or by the Board of Directors.

5.4. Vice-President

The Vice-President is the COO of the convention following the current convention (next convention). Duties are the same as for President.

5.5. Assistant Vice-President

The Assistant Vice-President is the COO of the convention following the next convention (convention after next). Duties are the same as for President.

6. AMENDMENTS TO THE BYLAWS

6.1. Amendments may be proposed:

6.1.1. By petition;

6.1.2. By resolution of the Board of Directors.

6.2. Amendments may be enacted by:

6.2.1. A two-thirds (2/3) vote of the active members;

6.2.2. A two-thirds (2/3) vote of the Board of Directors.

6.3. Procedures

6.3.1. Amendments must be enacted at a regular meeting. The meeting notice shall announce a vote on a pending bylaws change.

7. DISSOLVING THE CORPORATION

The Corporation shall be dissolved by vote of three-quarters (3/4) of the active members. This vote must be held by mail and must be conducted within one (1) month of a petition requesting it.

8. INTERPRETATION OF THE BYLAWS

The Board of Directors shall have the authority to make binding interpretations of these Bylaws in any case where the Bylaws are ambiguous.

9. PROCEDURES

9.1. Petition to the Board of Directors

9.1.1. The Secretary shall provide a list of the present active members to anyone requesting it. A processing fee may be charged.

9.1.2. Petitions must contain:

9.1.2.1. The request being made;

9.1.2.2. The dated signatures of the required number of active members. All signatures must be dated within one (1) month of the time the petition is submitted. Unless otherwise specified, signatures of a majority of the active members are required;

9.1.2.3. Petitions are submitted to the Secretary who shall promptly take action as required.

9.2. Mail Ballot

9.2.1. The Secretary shall prepare the ballot specifying the issue to be voted on and instructions for voting.

9.2.2. Anyone interested may include a one-page statement to be mailed with the ballot. Sufficient copies must be provided to the Secretary.

9.2.3. The ballot shall be mailed to all active members.

9.2.4. The Secretary shall allow three (3) weeks for responses to be received. The Secretary shall then tabulate the votes and announce the results.

9.2.5. Any active member who does not respond within the required period shall become a passive member.
