





Registration

But why am I telling you about registration now? You've already registered, or you wouldn't be reading this. It's like this: Membership rates are going up for WindyCon 33, so our hard-working registration staff is prepared to take your 2006 pre-registration at the 2005 rate of \$35 on **Sunday only**. It's a one-shot opportunity to save some bucks, so drop by and sign up!

Working equally hard is our Con Suite staff, who would like to remind you of the hours of operation:

Friday: Saturday: Noon to 4 AM 10 AM to 4 AM

Sunday:

10 AM to 3 PM

Dead Dog:

Sunday night until Midnight

Banging on the door to get in early, whining to get let in, or attempting to sneak in may well result in a temporal distortion field that causes all of the clocks in the Con Suite to mysteriously run very slowly and delay the opening of the doors. (Personally, I think that they're *already* moving at close to light speed keeping things up, so maybe it's just the Lorentz-Fitzgerald contraction at work.)

The current minimal rules are as follows:

WindyCon badges must be shown at the door. Giving money to the door guards will make the guards happy, but still won't get you into the Con Suite without a badge.

We reserve the right to make up additional rules as required to combat the ingenious behavior of some fans. "No, there was no rule against stupid behavior X. But there is now..."

Organized Science Fiction Fandom has been around for over 65 years now and as with any group we have our own lingo, acronyms, etc., that "mundanes" don't understand. Throughout the con area, there will be signs educating you to some bit of info you might not be aware of. Enjoy!

Weapons Policy

Understand that many of my best friends own sharp pointy things, big honking lasers, guns, and other instruments of personal and/or mass destruction. Accordingly, our weapons policy consists of the following simple common-sense

- Use common sense.
- No real or realistic looking firearms.
- Lasers are restricted to Class 2 and below.
- Blades and other edged weapons, sharpened or not, must remained sheathed and secured while worn or carried.
- Keep all projectile throwing toys out of the public hotel space.

WindyCon reserves the right to prohibit any weapon, real or not, at its sole discretion.

Volunteers

WindyCon is run entirely by volunteer staffers. Even if you haven't been around for the long run up to the convention, there are still a lot of things that you can do to help out at the con if you've got some spare time. Check in at our Gopher Hole in the Con Suite and we'll find something that will put that spare time to good use. 



Harry Turtledove

John J. Audubon's Guide to Spotting Harry Turtledoves by Steven Silver

Name: Harry Turtledove

Scientific Name: H. Streptopelia turtur

Natural Habitat: Los Angeles, California

Migration: Harry Turtledove has been known to migrate throughout the United States and the world in order to meet his myriad fans. In addition, the tracks of the Turtledove can be found in the science fiction/fantasy and literature sections of many bookstores. More rarely of late, but once a fertile breeding ground, his works have often been found in the pages of *Asimov's*, *Analog*, *F&SF*, and other magazines.

Plumage: His plumage is perhaps best described as salt and pepper in color and follows the patterns described in the seminal Videssos series in regards the coif of Vaspurakaner priests.

Height: Quite a bit of it. From 1994 to 1998, he was the tallest Hugo Award winner. He remains the second tallest.

Population: Harry Turtledove is surrounded by his wife, Laura Frankos, and his three daughters, Alison, Rachel and Rebecca.

Behavior: Writing, mostly. Occasionally, he eats. There are rumors that he finds time for sleep, but his prodigious publishing schedule would seem to argue against it. He's been spotted in the early morning at cons reading and talking.

Song: Generally soft spoken. Listen closely, because he has a lot of intelligent things to say. He has been known to sprinkle jokes and puns in his speech.

Description: Harry Turtledove is an extremely prolific author. To give an example, in 2005 alone, he has published five novels, three anthologies, and seven short stories. That doesn't even include his works which were reprinted in 2005. Not only is he prolific, but he is versatile. This year's work includes the World War II alternate history *End of the Beginning*, the futuristic *Homeward Bound*, the humorous fantasy *Every Inch a King*, and the more epic fantasy *The Bridge of the Separator*.

I first met Harry at a Windycon, in 1995 when he was the ISFiC Guest of Honor. Prior to that, however, I had exchanged letters with Harry. On the Saturday night of the con, Harry, some friends, and I made plans to go out to dinner. As we approached the back doors of the hotel, Harry blanched whiter than the snow and suggested that we eat in the hotel restaurant. As he explained, he might be a native Los Angeleno, but even he knew snow was supposed to fall down, not sideways.

Harry's first novels were *Wereblood* and *Werenight*, published by Belmont-Tower. At the time, his editor suggested that he take a more Nordic sounding nom de plume. He settled on Eric G. Iverson, a name which would remain with him until 1985, when he cast aside the name, partially at the insistence of his new editor, Lester del Rey, and embraced his own name for his professional work.

While the story "Castle of the Sparrowhawk" may have been his first fiction published under his real name, He had published a translation of *The Chronicle of Theophanes* with his own byline in 1982. In fact, that was his first work I ever read. It wasn't until several years later that I realized he was the same author who wrote fantasy and science fiction.

The reason he published a translation of Theophanes, a Byzantine chronicler, was that, spurred on by L. Sprague de Camp's *Lest Darkness Fall*, he had begun to study Byzantine history. He went on to earn a Ph.D. in Byzantine history, only learning after he had accomplished that achievement that Byzantine history was not the lucrative field it was so often made out to be.

However, as they say, the Byzantinists get all the chicks. That turned out to be more truthful than the lies about wealth. While teaching Byzantine history, Harry had the good fortune to meet Laura Frankos. She

saw enough in him to hang around, and the result is a lengthy marriage and three wonderful daughters, Rebecca, Rachel, and Alison (in reverse order, because otherwise Rebecca is always listed last).

Whether writing alternate history, fantasy, or science fiction, Harry makes the time he spent studying pay off. Many of his short stories and novels are based, sometimes loosely, sometime more directly, on things he has uncovered in his reading. Many of his readers try to find analogies in his writing (there are also numerous historical puns for the kliophilic reader).

Almost single-handedly, Harry has advanced the field of Alternate History. Even before his first alternate history novel, *Guns of the South*, was published in 1992, he had a reputation garnered from his short stories, many of which formed the alternate history fix-ups *Agent of Byzantium* and *A Different Flesh*. He is the only author to have won the Sidewise Award for Best Long Form Alternate History twice, once for *How Few Remain* and again for *Ruled Britannia*.

If Alternate History doesn't appeal to you, Harry still has you covered (after all, he wouldn't want to disappoint a reader). He has written several straight historical novels under the pseudonym H.N. Turteltaub. His science fiction includes *A World of Difference*, about simultaneous Soviet and American landings on an inhabited planet, and *Earthgrip*, in which a space-faring trader/literature professor uses her knowledge of Middle English science fiction (authors like Heinlein and Conan Doyle) to solve interspecies mysteries. If fantasy is your cup of tea, his stories of Gerin the Fox or Videssos will offer all the magic and sword play you could want.

While knowing the history beneath his writing adds additional dimensions to them, it certainly isn't necessary. With luck, some of that history will interest his readers enough to discover what is true and what he made up, just as he did with de Camp's *Lest Darkness Falls* many years ago.



Bill Holbrook

Bill Holbrook grew up in the Space Age atmosphere of Huntsville, Alabama in the 1960s. Upon graduating from Auburn University in 1980 he was hired by *The Atlanta Constitution* as an editorial staff artist. After several attempts at syndication, his office strip, *On the Fastrack*, was picked up by King Features and debuted in 150 papers on March 19, 1984.


Eleven days before that he'd met Teri Peitso on a blind date. They were married on Pearl Harbor Day, 1985, and now have two daughters. They also gave birth to a second strip about kids called *Safe Havens*.

In September 1995, Bill began a new strip called *Kevin & Kell* and sold it exclusively to online clients, which collectively get over 3 million page

views a month. It has been featured in nine book collections from Plan Nine Publishing, the latest being *Straight Outta Computers*. He was named Cartoonist of the Year at the 1998 Pogofest, an annual gathering in Waycross honoring the great Walt Kelly and *Pogo. Kevin & Kell* was given the Ursa Major Award in 2003 for Best Anthropomorphic Comic Strip.

In 2004, Kevin & Kell entered the newspaper domain by appearing daily in The Atlanta Journal-Constitution.

Plan Nine Publishing also has eight collections of Bill's *On the Fastrack* and another eight collections of *Safe Havens* currently in print. Like *Kevin & Kell*, they're great fun to read. You can find them at www.plan9publishing.com.



Gil Gerard

Gil Gerard has starred in numerous successful made for TV movies as well as feature films. However, his fans prefer to remember him as "Buck Rogers" from the Universal motion picture and NBC series, *Buch Rogers in the 25th Century*.

A native of Little Rock, Arkansas, Gil headed to New York in the summer of 1969 where he found a job as a taxi driver and began training with Phillip Burton at the American Musical and Dramatic Academy. It wasn't long before Gil found himself working in the "Business", however, as one of his fares told him he should audition for *Love Story* which was filming in New York at that time.

Following *Love Story*, Gil began auditioning for and getting commercials for various national accounts. All in all, Gil ended up starring in over 400 television commercials during the 8 years he was in New York. Gil also joined the cast of the Emmy Award winning *The Doctors*. He played returned prisoner of war Dr. Alan Stewart for 3 ½ years.


During this time, Gil formed an independent production company with two partners and produced a low-budget feature film entitled *Hooch* and a Broadway musical, *The Amen Corner*, based on James Baldwin's award-winning play of the same name.

Gil was called to Hollywood to screen test for several new projects that were being considered. After landing a guest starring role on *Little House on the Prairie*, Michael Landon offered him the lead in a new series he was producing and writing. The series wasn't picked up by NBC but Gil was offered the title role in a feature and series deal involving Universal Pictures and NBC entitled *Buck Rogers in the 25th Century*. The film was a huge commercial success, grossing over 11 million dollars in its opening weekend (this is in 1979).

Gil followed the success of *Buck Rogers* with several highly rated movies of the week, including *Help Wanted: Male, Not Just Another Affair* with Victoria Principal, For Love or Money, Hear No Evil, and Storming Home.

Interspersed with these movies of the week were several series that included *Sidekicks* for ABC in which Gil portrayed Detective Rizzo. A series for CBS entitled *E.A.R.T.H. Force* followed in which Gil played the leader of an environmental task force charged with patrolling the world fighting environmental crime. In a series for NBC and Aaron Spelling, Gil was seen on *Nightingales*. Two years on the Fox TV series *Code 3* followed.

Gil enjoys tennis, golf, scuba diving, trap and skeet shooting and horseback riding. He is also a licensed pilot and a published poet, having seen his work included in an anthology of American poets.



Erin Gray

Erin Gray is an actress, producer, teacher, speaker, writer, wife and mother, and not necessarily in that order. Her life is about balance, creativity, and healing. Erin redefined our public image of the beauty with brains, when *Buck Rogers in the 25th Century* became a hit series, her sleek sophisticated "Colonel Wilma" became a role model, and Erin Gray became a household word.


For five years on NBC TV, she was the American public's image of the ideal woman. Her "Kate" in *Silver Spoons* managed to have it all – marriage, family, and business career.

For over two decades Erin has performed in over a dozen feature films, including such films as Six Pack with Kenny Rogers, The Myth That Wouldn't Die, and Friday the 13th: Jason Goes to Hell. Her acting debut began with the 4 hour critically acclaimed mini series Evening In Byzantium starring Glenn Ford, and she has continued to show her diversification in scores of TV movies including such films as Addicted to His Love, Born Beautiful, Official Denial, Code of Vengeance, Honor Thy Father and Mother: The Menendez Trial, and Breaking Home Ties with Jason Robards. Perhaps you've seen her co-starring in some of TV's top episodic series such as Magnum PI, LA LAW, Baywatch, and Hunter to name just a few. In 2000 Erin guest-starred in a recurring role as Congressperson Karen Archer in NBC's highly

acclaimed drama *Profiler* as well as portraying the coldhearted Nicole Devlin in ABC's *Port Charles*.

In the last three years Erin has starred in 11 independent feature films: The Last Producer with Burt Reynolds, Delicate Instruments with Corbin Bernsen, ManFast, Special Weapons and Tactics, Social Misfits, Touched by a Killer, Woman's Story, Serial Intentions, Clover Bend with Robert Urich, the just released Caught In The Headlights with Stacy Keach, and Siren which was just completed and is expected to premiere at the Sundance Film Festival in 2006. In 2002 Erin was honored with the Entertainer Award at the San Diego Film Festival.

Today Gray maintains a solid acting career, and a strong family life while possessing a highly developed sense of public service. Erin travels around the country giving motivational speeches, is the spokesperson for the NCADV, sits on the Board of Directors for Haven House, a battered woman's shelter, and Kids with a Cause, and is the recipient of nine community service awards. She runs a company called Heroes for Hire booking celebrities at special events, for speaking engagements, and conventions. And last year she published her first book co-written with her best friend Mara Purl entitled, *Act Right: A Manual for the On Camera Actor.* The Eastern philosophy she embraces righted many wrongs in her life, and she shares this calming healing energy with her friends and tai-chi students.



Jim Rittenhouse

Introduce yourself to Jim. He's interesting to talk to.

For nearly thirty years, Jim has been an active fan in convention running, fanzines and apas, and has founded and run all of the above – such as the relaxacon CONGENIAL, apas on Alternate History and sex, Worldcons bids – the list is long and grows longer all the time, including his on-line journals and web sites.

Jim's love of science fiction and fantasy combines with equal loves of history, geography and the world around him to ask "what if" about the past and analyze the present. He has become prominent in alternate history circles, serving as a judge for the Sidewise awards.

- finds weird politics even more amusing in that "I'd better laugh or I'd have to mount an armed insurrection" sort of way. Jim is well-versed in the fine art of Looking Up The Details while the rest of us spew gas from various orifices on politics and what's happened around us.
- who wound up with an amazing wife and partner in Susan and a spectacular daughter in Meredith.
 Family means a lot to Jim, including his fannish family.
- who just keeps getting more and more interesting as the years pile up. Take some time this weekend to chat with him about food, fandom, politics, family, or almost any other topic. You'll be glad you did. And he listens good, too.



Nate and Louie Bucklin

Nate Bucklin, a native of Baltimore, Maryland, now resides in Minneapolis, Minnesota. He says of himself, "I tend to believe I've lived an interesting life." And interesting it is.

A child prodigy and a foreign service brat at the age of 9, Nate began performing in Rosario, Argentina, playing his own Spanish language originals at talent shows, variety shows and during folk concert intermissions.

At age 13, back in the United States, he began writing songs in English. Nate has played lead guitar, bass, keyboards and drums for many bands. At 16, he joined his first rock and roll band, and ultimately supported himself as a musician for about 14 years logging about 1400 nights on stage. 'Circus 13', in which he played lead guitar and keyboards shared a bill with Kenny Rogers and the First Edition - who praised them highly - in 1969. The Reflection, with Bette Palmer, for whom Nate played jazz bass, were the house band at Minneapolis's Radisson South hotel for most of 1972. The Love Express' single "And You Will See" got airplay in Minneapolis and Winnipeg.

Nate claims influences from Dylan, Harry Chapin and Melanie. As a matter of fact, he tells us, "In the late 60's I was considered a Dylan imitator - an admitted and fairly blatant one at that!". The Latin influence is showing up again now that he's returned to playing on nylon strings (the same guitar he used back in Rosario, Argentina). Currently, Nate and Louie's main interests as a duo include the Everly Brothers, the Beatles, and an Australian band called Crowded House. Their two-part harmony arrangements are reminiscent of the Everly Brothers and Lennon-McCartney.

Known primarily as a lyricist and lead guitarist, Nate retains a commitment to detailed, poetic and emotionally convincing lyrics. His lengthy career includes taking the first five places in a jingle-writing contest for Certs breath mints, honorable mentions in other songwriting competitions, teaching guitar for Anoka-Ramsey Community College, arranging

strings, horns and backup vocals for Minneapolis recording studios, and half a dozen TV appearances. Five of his short stories have been professionally published


Louie (Spooner) Bucklin was born near Minneapolis, Minnesota and, for as far back as she can remember, she loved music. Her father, Robert Francis, was a self-taught musician and composer. Traditional instruments he played included guitar, piano and harmonica, as well as the less-traditional saw and occasional pocket comb.

It's no wonder Louie was 'noodling' on the piano before she could talk, starting lessons when she was 5. By age 6 she tapped into her natural ability to create harmonies. Louie loves to sing and has a rich, warm and vibrant contralto voice. She recalls her mother's shocked comment, the first time she heard her daughter perform on stage; "I never knew you could sing!". Louie chuckles at the memory and confides, "I always had trouble sleeping, so I'd sing to relax myself. Mom would yell up the stairs, "Louie - turn off that radio". She never realized 'that radio' was me."

Louie continued to embrace music. She sang with the church choir and took up percussion, playing drums in the school band. At 16 she picked up an acoustic guitar for the first time, and played until she noticed her fingers bleeding.

Unfortunately after only a 4-year love affair with the instrument, Louie ended it. She had developed an orthopedic problem in her hand and gave up playing the acoustic guitar, as it had become too painful.


Louie's musical influences were all over the spectrum. She was exposed to gospel, honky-tonk and ragtime at a very early age. Between 5 and 10 Louie was 'obsessed' with Spike Jones. Not long thereafter, folk music grabbed her attention. Artists that influenced her included: Joan Baez, Chad Mitchell Trio, and Simon and Garfunkel. Like many young people, her avid focus on folk was later usurped by rock and roll, The Beatles in '63, Byrds in '64 and Kinks in '64.

WindyCon has a prize in Mark. You'll find him at his panels, or his filk concert, or even teaching a swing workshop. If you ask yourself what can I talk to him about the answer is easy: anything you want. Mark has many diverse interests and talents. You can talk about books, SCA, comic books, web-comics, filking, music in general, swing dance, scuba diving, martial arts, computers, computer gaming, poisons, Warner Brothers cartoons, especially those with Marvin the Martian and that is just the tip of the topics.

We met Mark on a Wednesday, in John (Bear) and Joanne (Froggie) Hall's living room. It was book club night, it was fall but darn I can't remember how many years ago, other than many. {Rene: Mark and I both know the answer to this one but are wisely keeping our mouths shut} John had told us about a guy he met, a member of SCA, a filker and fan, a Science Fiction book reader, a grad student at the University of Rochester in toxicology and a really great guy. Thus began a wonderful friendship both in and out of fandom.

Mark left Rochester in 1998 for Vermont and a post doctoral position with the letters Ph.D after his name, ready to take on the world. {One step ahead of the lynch mob. I thought they did away with pitchfork and torch carrying mobs}. But Mark missed fandom, the ability to attend cons and visit friends on a regular basis, so he began job hunting. Luck was with him and us when he found a job at Syracuse Research Corporation in upstate New York, allowing him to rejoin the Wednesday night book club and make local and Midwest cons again.

In 2002, the DI (Dorsai Irregulars) accepted a contract for security at Anthrocon, a furry convention in Philadelphia, PA. To fill the contract we had to shanghai several non-DI friends to help out, including Mark. Come to find out he had been reading furry comic strips such as *Kevin & Kell* forever. We worked Mark hard that con and he was in the thick of things. Somehow Mark ended up on the shifts that had the most problems [He claims it was a coincidence, but I have my doubts] that year and handled himself admirably.


Mark worked so well with the DI that over the next several years he was tagged to help fulfill contracts. As a result of this work the DI did the only thing we could, we inducted him at Conclave 2004. {Actually, he almost got away from us, but we tracked him down.}

A native of Ohio [We don't hold this against him], Mark has been around fandom since 1991 and has performed filk concerts at several conventions. I remember one several years ago in Pittsburgh, PA at Confluence, when he picked on our youngest daughter. According to Mark, she being a minor couldn't stay for a particular song needing parental permission. What he didn't point out was that she was present at the bar where and when we first heard this song. As he pointed out to the audience I know her parents and she's already heard the song. . [The song was about Old McDonald's Deformed Farm. You ask Mark how he knows so much about it!]

When Mark asked if we would write this bio I was trying to think how could we embarrass him. He dared me to say this, so here goes: he slept with my then 16-year-old daughter and also slept with the other one when she was 16. Remarkably, he is still living to tell about it. {In truth, I trust Mark around my kids. I watch him closer with the barnyard animals.}

In 2002 Mark received the professional certification of Diplomate of the American Board of Toxicology (D.A.B.T.). As an environmental toxicologist, he's the one who tells the CDC and EPA if a site has too much contamination. He's not concerned with the how to fix it, just fix it now. /This is what he tells a person. In truth his job is classified, and if he told what he really did, he'd have to use you for experimentation.}

WindyCon marks the first time in Mark's fannish history that he is a Science Guest of Honor. [He was sober when the others asked him.] After you hear him speak, joke, sing and dance his way through the con I think you'll all agree that Windy-Con chose wisely. I'm sure the committee will agree that they got all they paid for and more. [Whether they'll be happy about it is another matter altogether.] I hope all of you take the time to meet this year's Science Guest of Honor, Mark (Alphabet Soup) Osier, Ph.D., D.A.B.T., D.I.

Prime Toast: Appreciating Esther Friesner by Lee Martindale

The GoH spot known as "ToastMaster" or "ToastMistress" is an important one. A lackluster TM can set a pall on a convention not unlike wet wool. A good TM, on the other hand, can make a good convention great and a great convention the stuff of legend. And so it is that I put fingertips to keyboard to praise the Windy-Con ConComm for its brilliance in inviting Esther M. Friesner to serve as this year's ToastMistress.

Esther brings so much to the table that there's need for another table, a sideboard, and a few extra chairs. First, there's the significant body of work she's created – thirty-one novels, more than a hundred short stories, and the seven anthologies she's edited, including five in her very popular "Chicks In Chainmail" series from Baen. The most recent of these, *Turn The Other Chick*, debuted in hardcover last year, and was recently published in paperback. Then there's what's in the pipeline for 2006: several new short stories, the YA novel *Temping Fate* (no, that's not a typo) from Penguin/Puffin, and two "Helen of Troy" novels due out from Random House, *Crown Of Sparta* and *Sword Of Troy*.

And let's not forget that she's been a Hugo finalist, three-time Nebula finalist, winner of back-to-back Best Short Story Nebulas, recipient of NESFA's Skylark Award and a host of other honors.

But it takes much more than a worthy list of publishing credits to be a good ToastMistress; it takes a willingness to get in there and contribute first-hand to the festivities, even when it means drawing the really tough assignments. Esther is a real trouper in that department. At various conventions, I've seen her take the stage escorted by dapper, tuxedo-clad gentlemen, buff Chippendalian dancers, fully-costumed Imperial Stormtroopers, sword-sporting Musketeers, and various combinations thereof. On one memorable occasion, she was carried in – in recumbent splendor – on the shoulders of multiple hunky harem boys.

That's our Esther, going above and beyond no matter how tough the duty. Did I mention she's a trouper?

Over the course of this convention, you may hear Esther addressed as "Your Majesty", "Ma Reine". "Yer Maj", and other designations befitting royalty. There will be many opportunities during the course of this convention to experience the force of nature that is Esther Friesner. I encourage you to do so, and to learn what those of us who know and love her have known for a long time. Esther Friesner is one amazing lady, and as ToastMistress, she rocks in surround-sound.

Tom Smith


