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OUR GUESTS OF HONOR

OUR PROFESSIONAL GUEST of Honor is Mr. Hal Clement, well known writer. scientist, artist and teacher. His first published story, "Proof", appeared in Astounding Science Fiction at the height of the Golden Age of Science Fiction. Probably his best loved work is contained in a series of novels once featured by ASF: Mission of Gravity, 1953; Close to Critical, 1958; and Star Light, 1971. Mission of Gravity concerns the struggles of some very intriguing aliens and a team of humans (both on a high-gravity planet) who collaborate on an arduous journey to retrieve a vital component from a crashed space probe. Mr. Clement combines his knowledge of hard science with fascination for aliens and alien worlds into thoroughly intriguing scenarios. He has also published many science articles under his full name, Harry Clement Stubbs. NASFiC and NESFA Press are producing a collection of his fiction and fact work as a limited-run souvenir publication for CactusCon members (details elsewhere in this PR). WHAT IS THERE TO A NASFIC?

WE WERE AUTHORIZED by the World Science Fiction Society's 1985 convention, the Worldcon, to conduct a science fiction/fantasy convention called the NASFiC. That stands for North American Science Fiction Convention. Our official name is "CactusCon". A NASFiC is conducted whenever the WorldCon is held outside North America (the 1987 WorldCon will be in Brighton, England).

Some Convention Highlights:

1. Free Bheer in the Con Suite: by buying hotel bheer which is served by a hotel bartender, we avoid current liability insurance problems.

2. A Professional Stage, Lighting System, and Ballroom seating over 3000 for the Masquerade. (The facility even has dressing rooms for participants.)

Convention discount buying power when you arrange for us to buy party supplies for your bid or other groups.

4. Early Setup for Artists and Dealers on Wednesday, September 2, an entire day before those rooms open.

Professional Exhibit space for publishers and other professionals, including a during-con Trade Show.

6. Discounted Suite rates from our two major hotels, including our Party and Headquarters

10. A Special Discount Air Fare at 5% below American's lowest rate arranged by Ladera Travel and CactusCon.

11. No corkage at our Party Hotel, the Hyatt Regency.

12. A 10th Anniversary Star Wars Celebration.

13. A 1987 NASFiC Souvenir book of stories by GOH Hal Clement from NESFA Press available for pre-con ordering (see Membership Application form at back of this PR). Details under SOUVENIR BOOK (see Table of Contents).

We expect 3000-5000 to attend our convention, making it just slightly smaller than a WorldCon. The only major difference between our convention and the WorldCon will be that we won't

CactusCon will be using the facilities of two major convention hotels as well as a giant convention center, the Phoenix Civic Plaza (just two blocks from the furthest of our four hotels, see map elsewhere in this PR). The Plaza will host the Main Program, Films, Video, Art Show, Exhibit Hall, Dealers' Room and the main Saturday night Masquerade as well as many other daytime functions. Nighttime activities will be in the hotels.

This promises to be a truly worldclass convention, hosted by a very experienced group. We welcome all of you to join us in Phoenix over Labor Day Weekend 1987!

THE EASIEST AND cheapest way to register for CactusCon is to send us the Membership Application at the back of this PR along with your check for \$40 (price goes up to \$50 after 5/31/87) to CactusCon, PO Box 27201, Tempe, Arizona 85282.

Pre-registration saves you time and money. All you need do when you get to CactusCon is give your name and have picture ID available and you will be given your pre-prepared badge. No filling out forms and little waiting in line. If you do not have a membership form, just send us your name, address and phone number along with your check, and indicate how you want your badge to read. Registrants will all receive a Confirmation Card in the mail after we process their memberships.

Members will receive all future PRs plus hotel reservation forms.

We plan on having reduced partialconvention rates on sale at the door. Rates will be published at the convention only.

We lost the record of fan names for some people recently when we were transfering computer files. PLEASE NOTE: THE NAME THAT WILL BE ON YOUR BADGE IS ON THE SECOND LINE OF YOURMAILING LABEL. Please let us know before August 1 if any changes need to be made.

Memberships are transferable, but not refundable. Supporting Memberships can be converted to Attending by paying the price difference in effect at the time of the conversion. Registration at the convention will begin on Wednesday, September 2 at 6pm. It will be part of the limited Wednesday night activities being conducted at the Hyatt Regency and the Adams Hilton. The site for Registration then will be the 2nd floor Atrium Lobby of the Hyatt. Thereafter, registration will be conducted during the daytime from the Civic Plaza and at night from the convention office on the 2nd floor of the Hyatt.

All badges (Dealers, Artists, Program Participants, Volunteers, Attending Members, etc.) will be available at the one registration desk. No shopping around to see if your membership(s) are in one of five or so locations.

NASFIC BID INFORMATION Ben Yalow

A NON-NORTH AMERICAN bid has been filed for the 1990 Worldcon making it possible for this convention to be held outside North America that year. If this occurs, the WSFS Constitution calls for a NASFiC to be held in the Western rotation zone of North America (Baja, California; New Mexico; Wyoming; Montana; Saskatchewan and all states and provinces westward), with the election being administered by CactusCon.

As of this date, no new bids may be added to the ballot. If a bid wishes to run as a write-in, it must file the same items as are required to be on the Worldcon or NASFiC ballot: 1. adequate evidence of an agreement with the proposed site's facilities, such as a conditional contract or letter of agreement, and 2. the rules under which the committee will operate. These materials must be filed no later than the

opening of voting, which will take place at CactusCon, if necessary.

There will be no mail ballot, and all members of CactusCon will be eligible to vote on site. The need for the vote will not be determined until the announcement of the winner of the 1990 Worldcon, which will take place at Conspiracy the weekend before CactusCon. The rules for site selection are explained in further detail in Article III of the WSFS Constitution.

HOTEL INFORMATION Sam Stubbs

IN THIS PR we have inserted one of our CactusCon Hotel Reservations forms. It is necessary to fill out one of these forms for EACH RESERVATION BEING MADE. This form is designed to go through the Phoenix Convention Bureau Housing Department per their requirements. If you need more than one form, please let me know through the con PO Box, Attention: Hotel Reservations. Copies of the enclosed form are okay.

We have four hotels, all within easy walking distance from the Civic Plaza Convention Center. The closest, right across the street, is the Hyatt Regency where Con Headquarters is located and where all parties and some evening programming are taking place. Room Rates are: \$59-Single/Double; and \$65-Triple/Quad.

Suites are actually adjoining bedrooms with one bedroom turned into a parlor. They are treated as such in pricing. That is, one or two people in one of the rooms will cost \$59 and three or four people in the other room will cost \$65.

The next closest hotel to the Plaza is the Adams Hilton, just across the street from the Hyatt. This hotel will NOT be used for parties and any loud partying will be treated with little tolerance either by the hotel or the convention. Room Rates are: \$60-Single; \$65-Double; \$70-Triple; \$75-Quad; \$90-Executive Single; \$105-Executive Double; \$175-One Bedroom Suite; \$225-Two Bedroom Suite.

The San Carlos, a charming older hotel recently rennovated, is two blocks west of the Plaza. Room Rates are: \$42-Single/Double/Triple/Quad; no Suites available.

Two blocks north of the Plaza is The Heritage. Room Rates are: \$55-Single/Double/Triple/Quad; no Suites available.

Some highlights about each of the hotels can be found under YOUR ARIZONA SAFARI (see Table of Contents). Patrons of each hotel will


have free parking in their own hotel. Other parking is available around town at various public parking lots for fees ranging from about \$1.50-\$3.00 per day





OUR CACTUSCON ART SHOW will be opening to the general public on Thursday noon, September 3. Friday, Saturday and Sunday we will be open from 10am-6pm. (We will have late hours on Friday for staff and dealers only.) Featured will be about 200 artists from across the United States. We will be located in the south end of Hall B of the Civic Plaza, next to the Dealers' Room in a roomy 100x200-foot area.

AUCTION INFORMATION: Auctions are currently scheduled for Saturday, Sunday and Monday. Each auction will have its own minimum number of bids to

go to auction: Saturday, two; Sunday, three; Monday, four. All auctions will close to bids the prior evening (note: Friday closing will be after the staff and dealers showing). All auction lists will be available at least two hours before scheduled auction time and will be posted in the Art Show office. All buyers must register with the Art Show. Please use the appropriate section of the Membership Application at the back of this PR to do so. Please do not give us your Mastercard or Visa number, but do give it to us when you pick up your bidder card at the show. There will be a 5% surchage on all sales with a 5% discount for cash and checks.

ARTIST INFORMATION: We are about 1/3 sold out on available space, so send in your reservation soon. Fees are \$10 per 4' x 4' panel or 1/2 of a 6' x 2.5' table. There will a 15% commission on all sales. For further information send SASE to Ray or Terry Gish, 4424 S. Stanley Place, Tempe, AZ 85282 (address was incorrectly listed as 4425 in the last PR). We do not anticipate any at-the-door space will be available.

Control sheet, bid sheet and instructions plus information will be sent by July 31 to all registered artists. They are already being sent to currently registered artists. Please let us know if you do NOT receive them by that date. We would like the control sheets returned as soon as possible so we can enter pieces of art in the computer. Corrections can always be made at the con, but the more we have done in advance the better everything will work.

ASFA will run the at-con print shop and have their own forms. We will send them to interested parties on request as

soon as we get them.

One last note on Art Show Security: NO CAMERAS WILL BE ALLOWED; purses, backpacks or bags will not be checked at the desk, but we may be looking into such carry-alls when you leave, so be prepared.

TWO FULL SF/FANTASY "Masquerades" are on the agenda for our 1987 NASFiC/CACTUSCON. Both events will use the same rules, but will take place in different locations. Friday night's event will be in the Hilton Ballroom, seating about 1000. The Saturday night event will be in the Civic Plaza Ballroom. seating about 3900. Historical Costume presentations will take place Friday evening during intermission while judges make decisions about the sf and fantasy costume awards. During the judging break on Saturday night we have planned a special program of entertainment including some unique costumes and some great music.

Hall Costumes are encouraged throughout the con and they will be awarded ribbons by judges lurking almost anywhere ready to surprise you; in hallways, at panels, in the hospitality suite, maybe even in the restroom. Hall Costumes are not eligible for entry into the separately judged evening events, but we will arrange for Hall Costume winners to be photographed and photos posted.


REGISTRATION: You may enter both evenings' Costume Events WITH DIFFERENT COSTUMES. Registration for Saturday night is by mail only, with a closing deadline of August 1. You may

register for Friday night's event up to 10am Friday morning at the convention. Both Friday and Saturday we will have technical run-thrus with plenty of time to practice on the stage you will be using. Please ask for Registration Forms and Rules on the appropriate section of the Membership Application at the back of this PR. Include SASE for a speedier reply. You will receive more information on the Costume Events as well.

PROPOSED COSTUMING PANELS: Big Furry Costumes (how to survive in them); Costume Millinery; Simple Stage Presentations: Large Group Stage Presentations: Hall Costumes: Use of Electronics in Costumes; The Art of Scrounging; How to Judge Costumes; Weapons as Costume Accessories; Plastics in Costumes; Quilting and piecework in Costuming; Photographing and Videotaping Costume Events: How to Watch Belly Dancing; Color Coding or Color Usage: plus Beading and Tatting Workshops where, for a small fee people will receive basic supplies and actually start a small

We have 30 hours of programming for Costumers, including four hours in the Program Video Room, two on Saturday morning and two on Sunday morning. All the Costume programming will take place in one room in the Civic Plaza which seats almost 200. We are also working on a Costumers' Suite or Room for evenings and possibly a Costume Dance for at least one evening.

YOUR ARIZONA SAFARI: Hotels, Hints and Happenings Tom Teurff

WE HAVE LISTED elsewhere in the PR our four CACTUSCON hotels and their respective rates, and now I'll tell you what you'll get for your dollar. Then I'll tell you about some other things you can do while you're vacationing in Arizona.

First in my stack of brochures is the Phoenix Hilton. Site of many previous successful cons, the place has a pool, a Jacuzzi (site of one quite memorable WesterCon soiree), steam room, exercise area, massage on appointment, a variety of excellent restaurants and lounges and more.

Right next door is the Hyatt Regency (our party and headquarters hotel) with a nifty glass elevator and a slew of restaurants and lounges, highlighted by the Compass, a glass-walled restaurant that revolves to show you the entire Phoenix skyline (mundane attire a must, no sf costumes!) They also have a pool and Jacuzzi, and the whole "look" is pretty futuristic. Next is the Heritage Hotel with poolside dining, regular dining, entertainment while dining, etc.! So if you're especially into food, the Heritage gives you plenty of places to enjoy it. They do have a pool to swim off some calories as well as some very nice rooms. Then, If tradition is your cup of tea, you might think about sipping same at the Hotel San Carlos. This historical landmark features 12-foot ceilings in the rooms and looks like the setting for an Agatha Christie murder mystery.

OTHER STUFF TO DO

Synopses of much of the material shown will be available at the convention. Here's to a great NASFiC Japananimation Festival. See you in September!


GAMES & DIVERSIONS Donald H. Harrington

DUELMASTERS IS A computer-refereed game of Ancient Gladiatorial Combat from Reality Simulations, Inc.

Throughout the year it is played by mail with participants from across the USA and Canada. Once each year a face-to-face Tournament determines national Duelmasters Champions. This year at CACTUSCON, the Duelmasters Grand Tournament will encompass 1500 warriors competing in five skill-differentiated Classes, ranging from Beginners through Champions.

We have opened up just 500 slots for Beginners who must pre-register (use membership application at the back of this booklet). Each Beginner can enter himself (free) and four other players at just \$5 each. All entrants must then check in at our registration table (second floor, Hilton) before 6pm Friday night, September 4. You will receive complete rules plus assistance in preparing for the contest. The Tournament will consist of ten rounds of combat, double elimination, and will run throughout

Saturday, Sunday and conclude Monday afternoon. Every three hours or so we will distributing fight results and declaring the next round's matchups. Players should check in at the times posted in front of the playing area to get their own results and to plan strategy for the next round.

Throughout the convention we will be running hourly demonstration bouts in which members who could not preregister are welcome to participate. (Just stop by and ask). Tables will be available throughout the Tournament Area for open gaming between scheduled Tournament rounds as well as for strategy practice for players. Reality Simulations representatives will be on hand at all times to answer any questions. Everyone is welcome to play or just watch the action. We guarantee a great convention event.

PHOTON PHASER GAME Richard Rouse

PHOTON HAS COME to Phoenix and arrangements are being made to bus players to and from the facility for special NASFiC Tournaments at low group rates!

For the uninitiated, PHOTON is a TRON-like electronic shoot-em-up game played in a 12,000-square-foot hightech, movie-set environment, complete with space-age music. Players wear helmets with high-frequency radio transmitters, receivers and stereophonic sound; battery belts; and score-keeping chest pods. The game is conducted with electronic phaser pistols that trigger sensors when they strike their targets. Joining one of two teams of up to 15 players each, participants aim to build their own scores by "disrupting" opposing members and their goal, and by avoiding being hit themselves. A spectator's deck overlooks the arena where you can follow the game's progress on an electronic scoreboard, or you can use coin operated phasers to play your own game without affecting the score of the runners below.

This game is not just for kids only. The facilty we will be using is near Arizona State University where many kidatheart adults are gearing up for in-state tournaments as well as intramurals and yearly championships with other PHOTONS around the country. Younger kids will do the same with their own "size", four-feet, six inches being the only restriction (safety regulation) rather than age.

Even more details will be in the next PR. We look forward to seeing you at PHOTON!


HANDICAPPED ACCESS Carol Johnson
