Welcome to **The Monotreme**, the daily newsletter of Aussiecon 3. The newsletter will appear twice per day during the convention, with the final issue on Monday morning.

It will contain news of what is happening at the convention, suggestions for making your stay in Melbourne as enjoyable as possible, and reports of the most interesting happenings. Most importantly the afternoon edition will contain information about the open parties that are being held that night. Parties are one of the most important features of a world con and you should not be shy about attending, even if you don't know anyone.

The newsletter will be distributed at around 9:00am and 5:00pm from a number of points around the convention centre.

You are encouraged to contribute to the newsletter. Boxes for

submitting contributions will be situated at the distribution points. Or you can come down to the Monotreme office on Level Three, just behind the information booth and type it up on one of our computers (but not between 7:00am and 8:30am, nor between 2:00pm and 4:00pm!)

The afternoon issue will contain Party Announcements for that night. Here's a bit of a preview of what to expect.

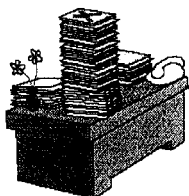

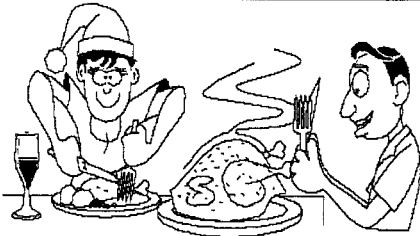
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RESTAURANT RECOMMENDATIONS

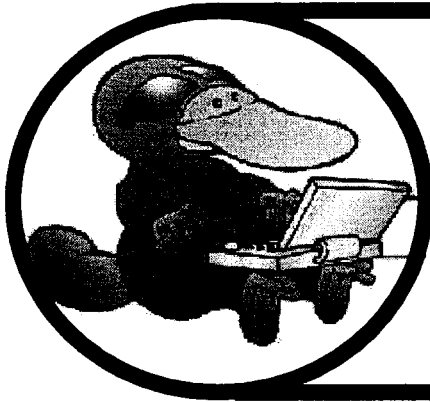
Buttoned out

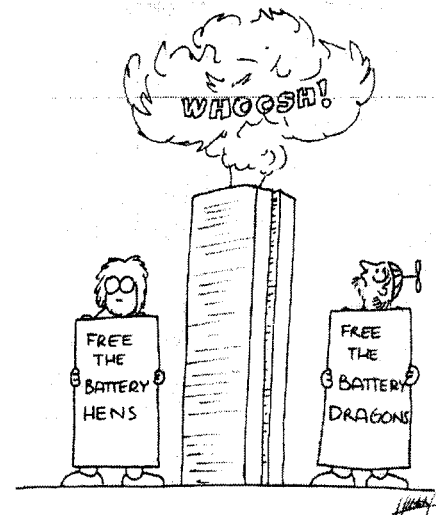

Bay Area in 2002 bid chairman Kevin Standlee apologized for the cancellation this morning, saying: "We regret that the amount of money it took to hold three 6-hour bid parties at NASFiC last weekend was not enough to hold one 3-hour party here last night. We think it would be a disservice to our pre-supporters and (should we win the election) the members of the 2002 Worldcon to spend the additional A\$ 3000 we estimate it would cost to provide the amount of food and drink fans expect to see at a party the size of ours."

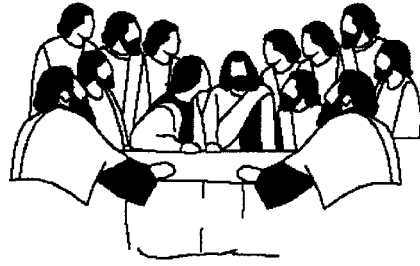

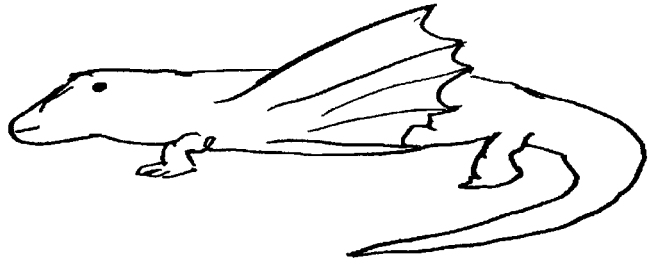


WSFS Business Meetings

In need of nourishment?

Randomly select any group of fans to form a dinner party and you inevitably get a chorus of dietary problems and preferences, ranging from "If I eat shellfish I will turn green and die," to "I don't like meat from animals with four legs or anything starting with the letter p."

Well, such a group descended on the Dragon Boat Restaurant the other night, downstairs in the Centra, and they coped wonderfully. We ordered their standard banquet. By the time they had made all the necessary substitutions to cope with our eating habits and allergies, there was nothing standard about it. But we all had a great time, loads to eat, and nothing was too much trouble for the staff. Thoroughly recommended.

Eat cute dead animals at the Jarrah Room, just past the Holiday Inn up Spencer St. Yabbies, kangaroo, crocodile, emu (and loads of plant matter I never heard of before) all feature on the menu.

Yabbies are a fresh water crustacean, not unlike a small lobster. Milder than prawn and containing negative calories, according to Mr P_ D_. 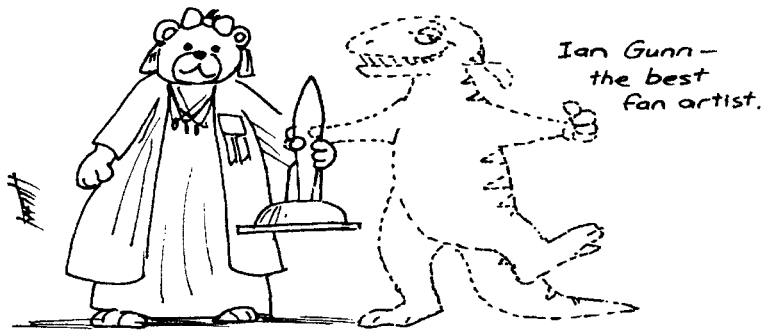
The Hobbit

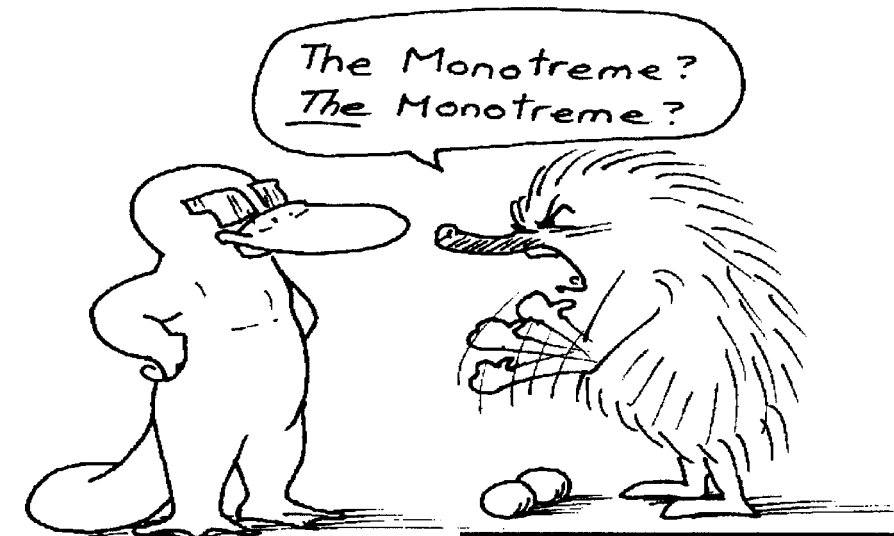

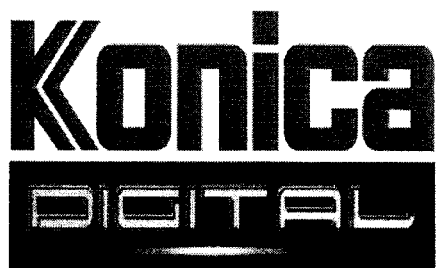
Konica has publishing staff in awe

It's a Wash!

If you're visiting from abroad, you've likely discovered Australia's plan for continued economic prosperity: encouraging you to have your accumulated laundry done by the Centra. I'm guessing that the hotel simply throws away your soiled clothes, uses your money to buy brand-new replacements, and pockets the difference.

Fortunately, an alternative exists: the Emerald Hill Laundromat at 286 Park Street in South Melbourne. It's open from 8:00 AM to 10:00 PM every day. You can get there, do your wash, and return in less than 2 hours—even if you stop to eat at the extra-friendly fish & chips shop on the corner. Actually, you could probably walk there and back in under 2 hours, but that might be a tad inconvenient while hauling a laundry bag. Besides, riding the tram is an opportunity for cultural enrichment. Here's a step-by-step description of how to do it.

Walk out the front door of the Centra and cross the tracks to the southbound tram stop. (Remember that trams, like cars, drive on the left.) Wait no more than 12 minutes for the #12 tram. Go to the big silver machine in the middle of the car and push the buttons for (a) 2 hours, (b) Zone 1, and (c) full fare. Then insert \$2.30 in any combination of coins. The machine will spit out a ticket; hold on to it for use on the return ride.

Just across the bridge Spencer Street turns into Clarendon Street. In less than 5 minutes you will cross Dorcas and Bank Streets. Pull the "stop requested" cord and get out at the next corner (Park Street). Go 2 blocks west (to the right), and there you are. (Should you see the Limerick Arms Inn going by the trolley window, you've overshot; get out at the next stop and walk back.)

After placing the plastic cup under the spout of the detergent machine, insert 20¢. The washing machine takes \$2.40—one \$2 coin and two 20¢ coins—and will be done in about 20 minutes. The dryers give you 10 minutes for each \$1 coin; 20 minutes did it for me.

On the way back, you have to hail the tram (still #12, but northbound) from the streetside stop and then walk across a traffic lane to board it. Traffic is supposed to stop for you, but look (right) anyway. Insert your ticket in any of the green validating boxes. Signal to get off as you're crossing the bridge. Voilà! An experience you can regale your grandchildren with.
