Message from J. Michael Straczynski.

I hate this more than I can say.

All my life, the idea of being a guest of honor at a WorldCon has been one of those dreams, like winning a Hugo... something you hope may happen, but probably never will. So this has been probably the high point of my career to date.

The other day, Harlan said "There is a war in heaven over you; you always get the good but the bad comes right with it... 'Yes, you can be GoH at a WorldCon, but no... you can't go."

I just got back from the doctor's, for a follow-up exam. Bottom line: I'm past the worst of it this round, but I'm weak as a kitten, and ripe for a relapse if I put any stress on my system. He felt strongly that if I went to this convention, under the current conditions, that I would have a 90% chance of going from walking pneumonia to full-fledged acute pneumonia, which would almost certainly result in a hospital stay. (I shouldn't even be up and working as it is.)

I tried arguing every way I could, but he was absolutely adamant about it. Kathryn and Harlan have also jumped on me about following the doctor's orders... and I have to do what's right for the show. If I'm incapacitated, the show falls.

I hate this more than words can convey. I was looking forward to this more than any other convention I've ever been involved with. But I can't go.

The only bright side... is that I'll be sending all the videotapes I'd planned on showing with Julie Walker, head of our fan club and previously head of the MST3K fan club. So she'll be there to show all the stuff that I would've shown, so folks who come to see B5 stuff (and some crusade stuff) will see it.

I cannot apologize for this enough; I wish I could say I could make it, but at this point it would seriously endanger my health, and I can't do that.

Restaurant Review: Nates & Leons.

Location, location, location.

If you walk out the front door of the Baltimore Convention center and look around in all directions, there's nary a McDonald's, Burger King, or Carls Jr. in sight.

Not to panic, however. Diagonally across the intersection of Pratt and Howard Streets is Nates & Leons Deli, home to good food in adequate quantities at reasonable prices, served with a smile. *And* they know how to spell "Caesar" and "chili." (Couldn't put their menu to the acid test, tho, since nothing seems to be served "with au jus" *or* without.)

Since I was unable to find a decent breakfast at the Harborplace shops, I was delighted to discover that Nates & Leons serves omelets all day long, and pancakes till noon. I had my omelet with havarti cheese, an option I hadn't seen before. The fresh bagel, toasted a delicate golden brown, was excellent, and the roasted potato cubes were tasty and filling.

Most important to a Wisconsonite like me, they serve real milk in giant glasses. You can also get malts and shakes.

You can spot the place by the array of wrought-iron tables and chairs under the Budweiser umbrellas. I preferred to eat in air-conditioned comfort in the Cal Ripken Jr. shrine room; there's also a mezzanine. And it appeared that the business was about evenly divided between dine-in and take-out.

The dinner menu tilts toward the carnivorous, but you can get a decent meatless meal in the \$6-\$7 range.

I'm trying to persuade them to open a branch in Melbourne.

Fannish Inquisition Report.

Where the various upcoming Worldcons and Worldcon Bids do presentations and Q&A.

Chicon 2000 has signed their third hotel contract. They have 2600 rooms blocked for the peak night. They do not have a sports stadium next door, merely a 9-hole golf course. After August 31, the membership rates go up, and all the discounts go away (except Chicago in 2000 Trading Cards). The Art Show and Dealers Room will not have the same infamous round-about arrangement as last Chicon. Nothing can be done about the giant spiders outside the hotel; they are protected. They have no reason to have special night programming in different hotels.

Aussiecon Three has a new Progress Report and flyer about airfare at their table.

The 2001 race:

KC for Boston in 2K+1 was not invited to participate, nor did they attend.

Boston for Orlando (MagiCon Two) is bidding two hotels (one owner) at Walt Disney World with an attached free convention center; when they lost their facilities they kept bidding, not to be insulting, but because bidding was so much fun, and the locals in Orlando were agreeable; they will not be using a Housing Bureau - one phone call will take care of both hotels; they have the only working Space Port and flamingoes; they are bidding to run the kind of Worldcon they would like to attend.

The Millenium Philcon is bidding the new Convention Center, attached hotel and market, plus nearby hotels; they created many of our traditions, including the Hugos in 1953; while not as experienced (they can't claim three Worldcon chairs in the same city) they have experienced Worldcon division heads in Programming and Facilities, and many experienced committee members at the regional level; they will recruit from outside; they have the full support of the Philadelphia Convention and Visitors Bureau; they have a reliable Housing Bureau (Rosenbluth Travel) which they closely monitor; they have historic sites, in safe, walkable distances; the homeless have been removed.

The 2002 race:

San Francisco: the temperature will range 55-74 °F, 13-23 °C, < .2" or .5 cm average monthly rainfall; construction will be over next spring; they will use South Moscone which they used last time, plus the new adjacent Marriott Ballroom instead of the Esplanade; they have 1200 rooms + 133 suites blocked in the Marriott, plus 500 blocked in the ANA, over 2000 rooms blocked total; the homeless have been removed but they do have street mimes.

Seattle: They have the #3 person in the Bucconeer office, and 6 local chairs of conventions of over 2000 attendees; they will recruit from outside; they have Norwescon's hotel as a base, plus 10 other small hotels, 9 of which will each support of function; they are bidding the Convention Center plus the new extension plus the new suites hotel (300-350 blocked) all adjacent, plus the Sheraton across the street for

sleeping rooms; they have another 1700 sleeping rooms in 6 other hotels and 12 hotels under consideration; they have no homeless.

The 2003 race:

Cancún did not show but their table is now manned.

Toronto is bidding for their first Worldcon in 30 years; they are bidding for the Convention Center plus an attached hotel and the Royal York hotel of famous memory; they have placed non-refundable deposits to hold the facilities; they have 2000 rooms blocked; it is 10 °F cooler in Toronto than Baltimore; they will be honoring the late Robert Bloch again, but they are not saying details now; transport will be easier than Winipeg as Toronto is an international airport; it is a great place for a family vacation and has more attractions; they will be preceded by the Canadian National Expo and followed by the Toronto International Film Festival; the government is cooperating with conventions on the GST (sales tax refundable to visitors) and customs issues; the hotels have been advised of the need to block rooms before and after the convention; they are collecting statistics to pass on to future bidders; the Canadian Dollar is 60-70 percent of the U.S. Dollar, and prices are cheaper in Canadian Dollar than American prices in Robt Sacks & U.S. Dollars.



During the past year, Bucconeer ran a contest for students in elementary, middle, and high school. Awards will be given at each of these levels for the best science fiction short story, artwork, and science essay. The semi-finialists in this contest will be attending Bucconeer all day on Friday with their teachers. The awards will be presented as part of the Golden Duck ceremony in CC337/338, at 4 pm.

WSFS Business Meeting (Thursday)

(The reporter [Robt Sacks] was a participant in the events reported.)

All attending members of Bucconeer automatically are members of The World Science Fiction Society, and entitled to attend and vote at its business meetings.

The first business meeting on Thursday set the agenda for the remaining business meetings which will be held on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday (if needed) at 10 am in Room 343. The schedule for the Saturday business meeting includes the report of the site selection for the 2001 Worldcon, and presentations by upcoming seated Worldcons and NASFiCs.

This year the business meeting gave the presiding officer the power to assign the initial debate times. All motions for adoption or ratification will be debated for 6 minutes, except the No-Zone Rotation amendment which has 30 minutes.

The meeting defeated an amendment to change the designation of Hugo Awards from "Best" to "Most Popular" through an Objection to Consideration. The meeting finished hearing the financial reports from the Mark Protection Committee, LoneStarCon 2, and Aussiecon Three.

The Nitpicking and Flyspecking Committee will continue for the next year. On their report, short titles were added throughout the Constitution, and certain sections renumbered.

Saul Jaffe will reconstitute the Worldcon Runners' Guide Editorial Committee with at least two other members.

Susan Matthews' eligibility for the Campbell Award was extended to next year. (The motion was put "To do the right thing.")

The remaining meetings at this convention will cover:

- Report of the Mark Protection Committee.
- Election of three members to the Mark Protection Committee.

- Report of the Committee on Extending Dramatic Presentation Eligibility to Entire Seasons.
- Financial Reports from Magicon, ConAdian, Intersection, L.A.con III, Bucconeer, and possibly Conucopia, and Chicon 2000.
- Ratification of Amendments to establish the customs and usages of WSFS as a parliamentary authority superior to Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised, and rewriting the provisions relating to the Hugo Awards, the Powers and Duties of Worldcon Committees, the Mark Protection Committee (with the NASFiC representatives allowed to vote), Bid Eligibility, and the Powers of the Business Meeting.
- New Amendments rewriting Site Selection, and replacing the zone system of site selection with an exclusion zone of 500 miles from the site of site selection. An amendment to replace 500 miles with a blank to be filled in is pending. (The last time this was done, at ConFrancisco, no number could be found which carried a majority to fill the blank, and the proposal died.)

The meeting adjourned in Memory of Ross Pavlac. .

Me hearties, BucConeer is gearing up for serious parties. We make this observation when bid party hosts prepare really neat-o badge stickers to commemorate their party. Our Philadelphia 2001 friends greeted us at their gate with embroidered Liberty Bell stickers. Not to be outdone, however, the Z'ha'dum 2260 folks' sticker featured the face of the Shadows' evil agent asking "What do you want?" (Only the perfect party, of course.) San Francisco emblazoned our badges with what has become a standard, "SF ♥ SF." And make sure you get one of Orlando 2001's pink flamingos--fuzzy or shiny, and while you're at it, pick up Toronto 2003's rat wearing a beanie.

So we began in Philadelphia, again admiring what has become one of the most sumptuous buffets in fandom history. Our hostess, Sara Paul, gave us the complete tour of their table. These folks host civilized parties: a bartender and an assortment of teas. Our hostess wore a stunning red gown. We encountered the most potent punch in Toronto 2003's party, a nonalcoholic, mango cherry combination. Toronto also featured Loonies and Toonies, chocolate Canadian coins. Kansas City's "Boston 2K+1" party featured no less than six flavors of barbeque sauce, including Jazzy and Adam's Rib. We liked their slogan "Cowtown Comes to Beantown." Scott liked their local Baltimore brew, a red ale.

We wandered over to the Hilton to see what gay fandom was up to and also to check out the fanzine lounge. Both were pleasant oases of conversation. We encountered

Amendments ratified: All Constitutional Amendments except "Not Just Books". "Master in Our Own House" passed 32-19; the housekeeping amendments passed without debate, unanimously or everybody to one.

Amendment adopted for Ratification at AussicCon Three: An amendment rewriting site selection rules, without debate, everybody to one.


