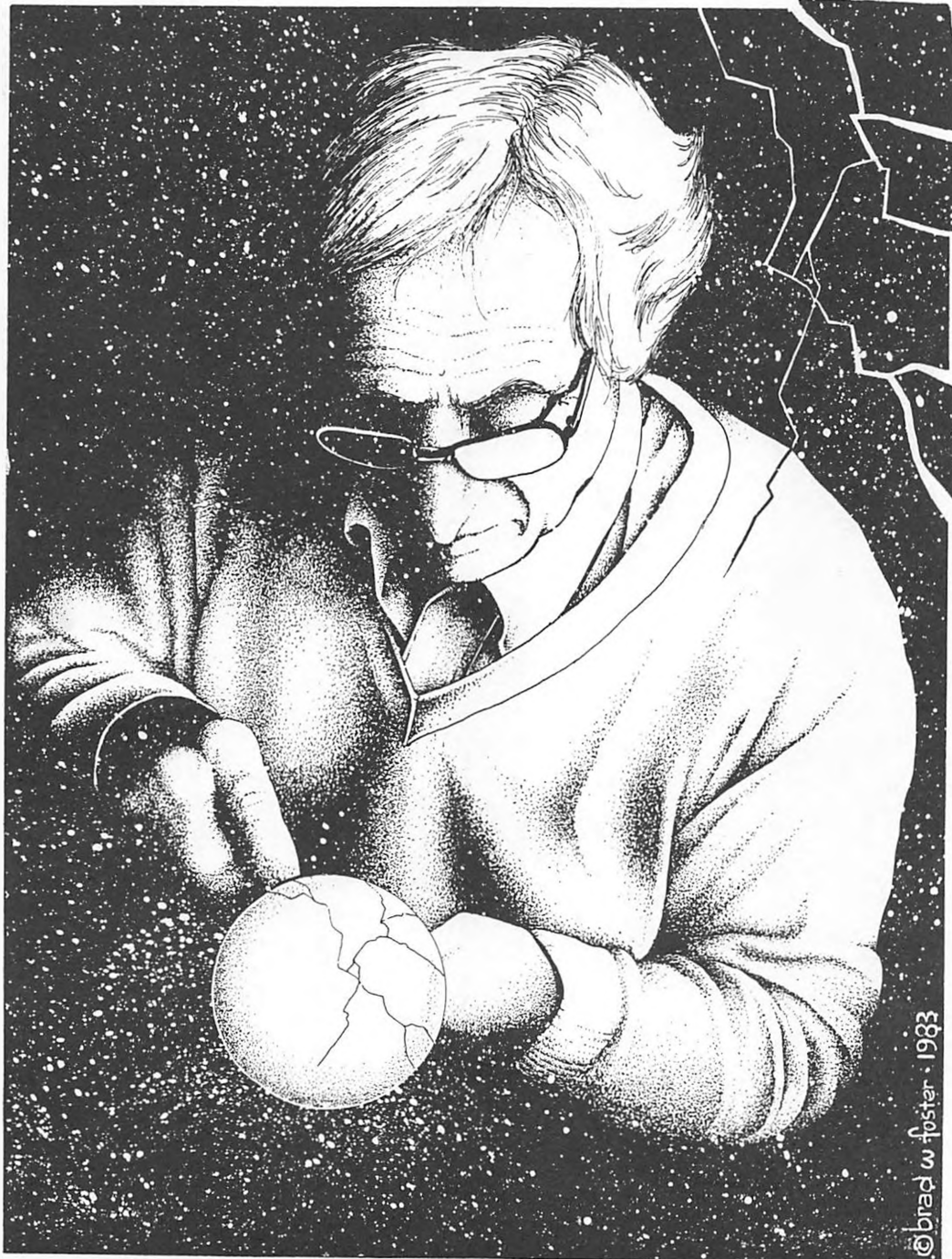

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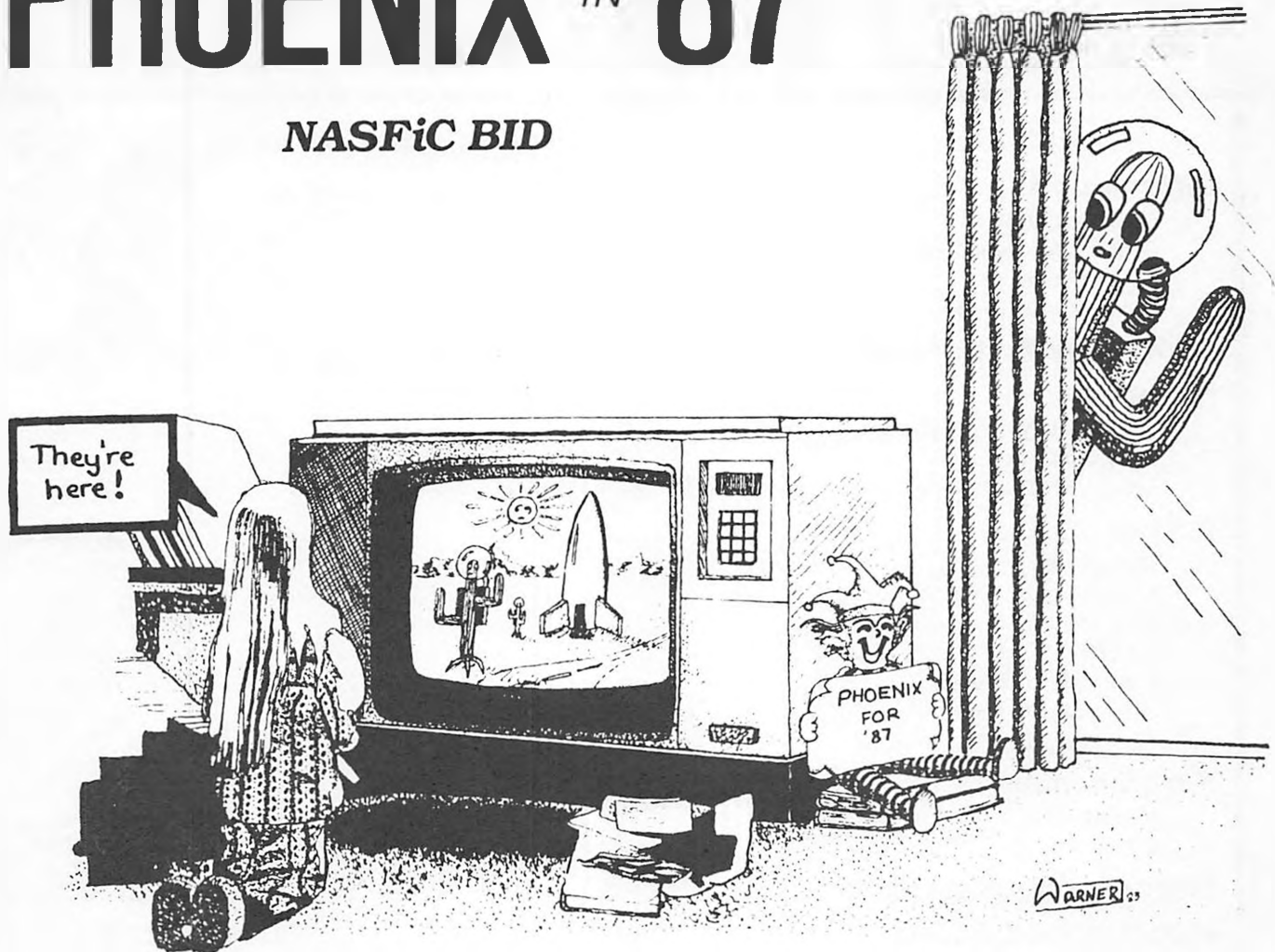

# RAY

## THE EARLY YEARS (1920-1948)

Ray Douglas (in honor of the original swashbuckler, Douglas Fairbanks) Bradbury was born on August 22, 1920. His childhood began on the Illinois prairie and its reflections can be seen in many of his stories. This part of his life was typical of many fans, and even today sounds familiar. Horror movies, like *Phantom of the Opera*, impressed him. He avidly collected Buck Rogers comic strips, graduated to Edgar Rice Burroughs fandom and then discovered the pulp magazines. By age eleven he had written his first story (on a roll of butcher paper).



There was a depression in those days which hit the Midwest particularly hard, and so in 1934, the Bradburys moved to Los Angeles in search of economic opportunity. Ray started junior high and set about exploring Los Angeles. Within a year, he had been kicked out of Paramount Studios (for climbing over the wall) and was submitting stories to major magazines. In those days, many of the popular magazines carried fiction. The magazines did not buy them, but Ray kept submitting anyway.

The next year young Mr. Bradbury did see his first publication credit — a poem entitled "In Memory to Will Rogers". That was also the year that he took a short story and a poetry class in high school and became active in the drama club.

By 1937, Ray had become a 'trufan'. In that year he bought his first typewriter (for \$10.00) and it was the year that he joined the Los Angeles Science Fiction League and began contributing to the club fanzine.

At that point, he was earning a living of \$10.00 a week selling newspapers on a street corner. He managed to make his way to the first WorldCon, held in New York City in 1939, partially financing the trip by acting as an agent for his boyhood friend, the artist, Hannes Bok.

Living in Los Angeles, however, turned out to be a bonus for Ray because he had access to more writers than the average fan does today. By 1941, he was getting help from Robert Heinlein, Julie Swartz, Leigh Brackett and Henry Hasse. His first short story, "Pendulum", was published in *Super Science Stories* and he received his first professional writer's check for the grand sum of \$27.50. He did not stop selling newspapers until 1942 when he was earning a scant, but steady, living from his writing. The first classic Bradbury story, "The Wind", was published the next year and he had set his style.

Recognition began with the publication of

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his story "The Big Black and White Game" (1945) in BEST AMERICAN SHORT STORIES. "The Million Year Picnic", the first story of what was to become THE MARTIAN CHRONICLES, followed the next year.

In making the transition from fan to pro, Ray had two other advantages then which the contemporary fan does not have: enormous numbers of radio drama shows and magazines with fiction. He used them as stepping stones and his name started to appear everywhere. His work was in *Dime Mystery*, *Mademoiselle*, *Detective Tales*, *American Mercury*, *Harper's*, *New Yorker*, as well as the science fiction pulps and the *Weird Tales* of beloved memory. His works were adapted to radio and he made BEST ONE-ACT PLAYS OF 1947-1948. He was even selected for the O. Henry awards in 1948.

Ray could sell almost anything he wrote. Yet, in spite of all these sales and accolades, he was not happy with much of his writing; he scooped up one million words of unpublished manuscripts and burned them.

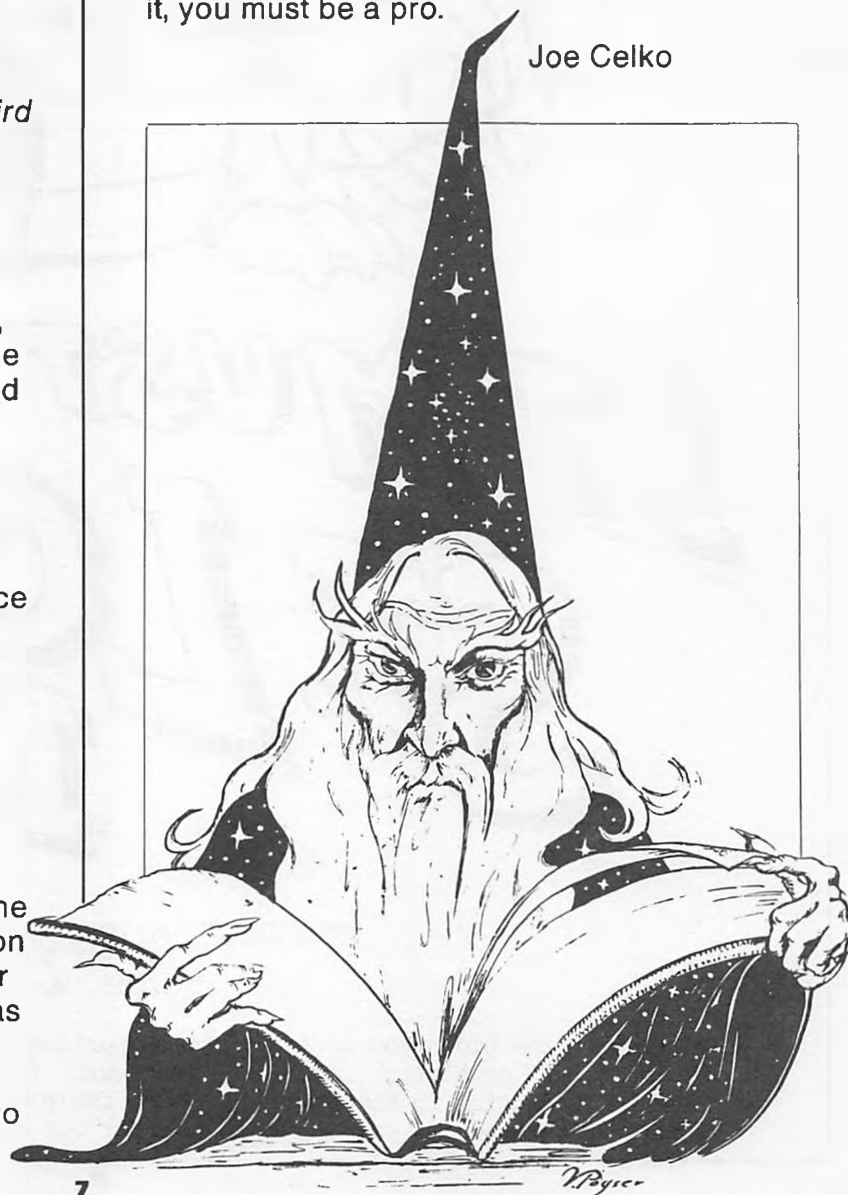
However, two things did meet with his approval in 1947. August Derleth's Arkham house, originally famed for publishing H.P. Lovecraft, published Ray's first book, DARK CARNIVAL. An event of even more importance to Mr. Bradbury, occurred while hunting in a bookstore for a copy of Albert Jay Nock's MEMOIRS OF A SUPERFLUOUS MAN, he also found Marguerite (Maggie) McClure, who soon consented to be Mrs. Bradbury.

The sheer volume of his work is amazing, but when you consider the quality of it, it is truly impressive. It bothers some people that Bradbury could win literary awards on the one hand and produce radio plays and pulp fiction on the other. I don't believe that Ray has ever considered the medium or the money to be as important as the work itself. He wrote a little chapbook on advice to writers, in which he advised against trying to achieve either of two false goals: "writing to please the literary

circles" or "writing to please the marketplace". Instead, he cautioned "write to please yourself because the other two have no substance".

It is hard to define periods in a person's life. People do not conveniently spin a cocoon to mark the change from fan to pro. But I will say that Bradbury-as-fan ended in 1948. At that time, he and his wife, Maggie, were living on \$250.00 a month and Ray was earning half of that with his writing. If you can earn a living at it, you must be a pro.

Terry Carr is a name we can all place, whether from his fiction, his anthologies, or his fannish writings. And Terry has not forgotten his fannish roots — he is still “keeping his hand in” on the fanzine front.

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# BOB SHAW

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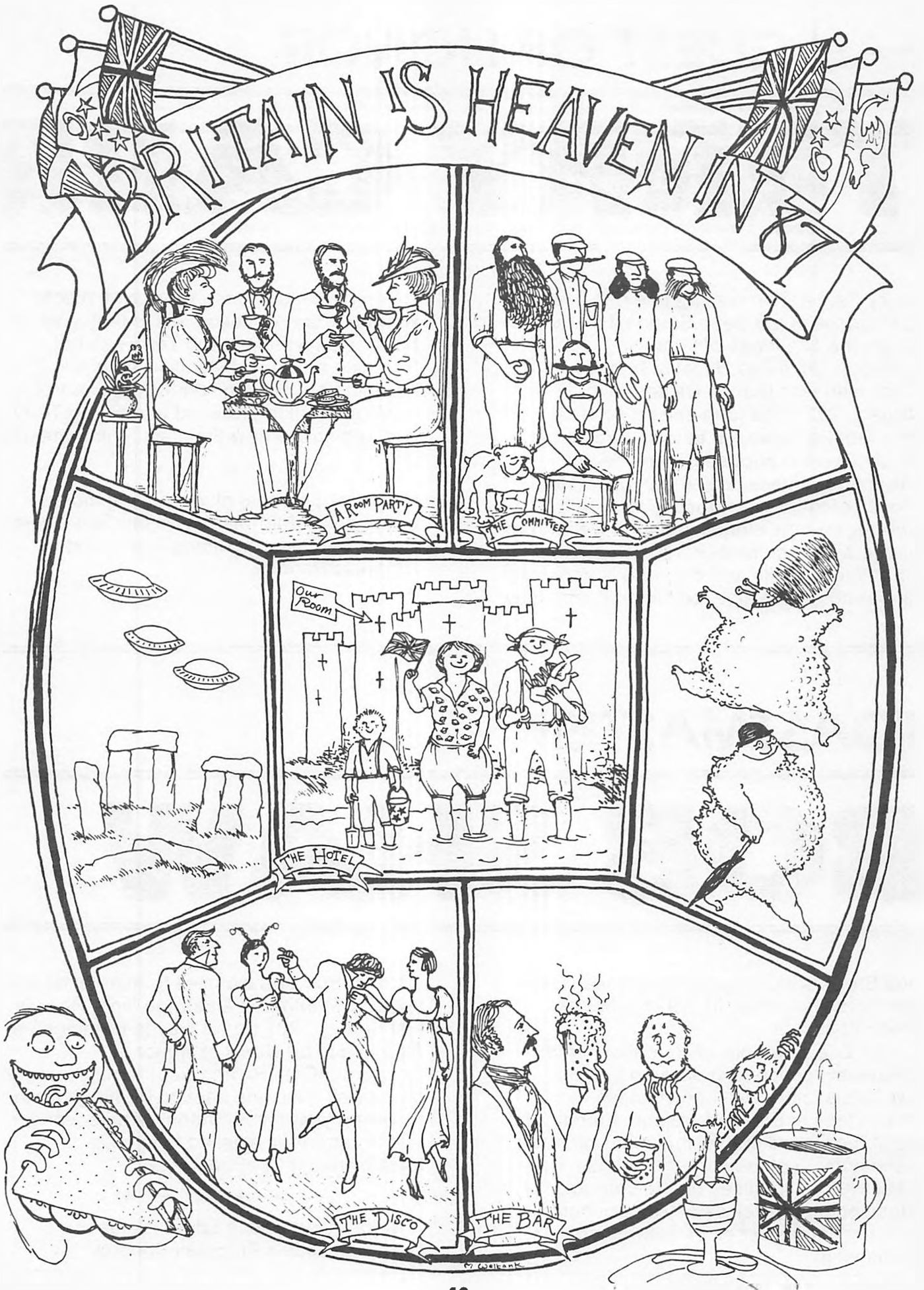
Bob Shaw is a professional science fiction writer, born December 31, 1931, who also started out as a fan.

Tuck's Encyclopedia of Science Fiction and Fantasy mentions in passing that Bob Shaw “is also very well known in fan circles.” To those fans in England, Ireland, Europe and parts of the United States, that must seem the understatement of the century. Bob is a fan's fan. His various treatises on the character of fandom include the classic “The Enchanted Duplicator” and a series of lectures on Fansmanship.

When Bob Shaw comes to Atlanta, he will not be a stranger in a strange land. He was first here in 1981 on his way to Birmingham, Alabama to be Guest of Honor at DeepSouthCon. He and Southern fandom got on so well, he came back to Birmingham the following year for BoShcon I. It's no wonder that Southern fans asked him to be toastmaster at ConFederation.

We are bidding for the 1988 World Science Fiction Convention. We aim to bring the Worldcon back to Cincinnati after 31 years.

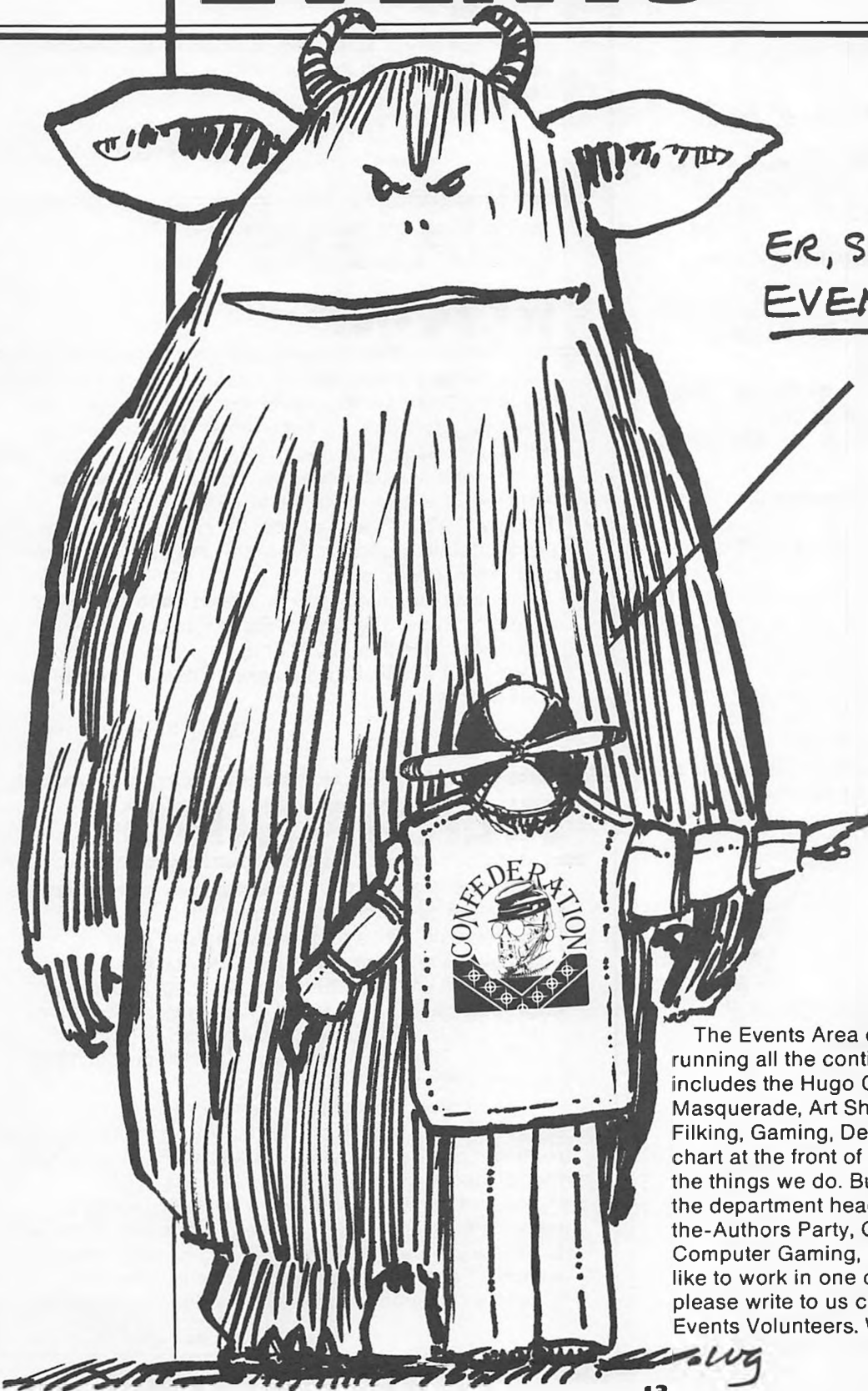

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# MASQUERADE

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WELCOME TO THE WORLD OF MASQUERADING!

We are working toward the best Worldcon masquerade ever. The facilities we will be using will seat 3500 people, and video transmission may be available for the overflow audience. Masquerade participants must preregister by mail before July 31, 1986. There is a limit of 100 entries, not including entries to the kiddie masquerade which is open to fans under the age of 13. Reasons for a preregistration cut-off date are these:

1. We need to know how many people we are dealing with.
2. We need to know what their special requirements are so we have time to prepare for them.
3. It gives us time to recruit the right number of trained gophers.
4. Preprinted hand-out programs will include the names of contestants, costumes, designers, craftspeople, etc. (This will save the M.C. time and allow the masquerade to move smoothly and quickly.)

This masquerade will be run with the masqueraders foremost in mind — we want this to be a good experience for YOU! To help us help you, please follow these guidelines:

1. Preregister only if you are serious about participating.
2. Fill out forms **completely** — PLEASE TYPE OR PRINT LEGIBLY.
3. Finish your costumes early — give yourself time to live in them. (Can you breath, eat, sit, go to the bathroom?) Remember: 100 entries means you will be in costume for at least 6 hours!!
4. If you can't get your costume on stage with yourself and four gophers, it is a prop — not a costume — and please don't bring it.
5. YOUR PRESENTATION IS LIMITED TO 1 minute, starting when **any** part of your presentation begins.



6. Special requirements: There is no mike on stage, but tapes can be played. The best people in fandom will tackle problems of lighting and sound projection.
7. Material to be read by the M.C. must be clearly printed or, better yet, typed. Marty Gear does not make mistakes.
8. READ the instruction sheets and helpful hints that will be sent to you when you preregister. The more you know, the easier it will be for you and for us.

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# ART SHOW

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Like all art show chaircreatures, we naturally intend Atlanta's art show to be the biggest, the best, the gaudiest and the most well run. Naturally, we're already behind in that effort.

What the following is, largely, is a loud cry for h-e-l-p. Although we have many of our own ideas, we need more ideas, information and opinions. We want them now, not, as usually happens, six weeks after the art show. We want to know everything you think every art show in the world has done right, and everything you think they've done wrong. We want to know your thoughts when, as you looked at an art show in which everything was going wrong around you and you thought, "If I were running this thing ..." We would also like copies of the forms and regulations from any art show with which you have been associated. We're in the process of getting in touch with others who have run major art shows, but we're bound to miss whomever it is you're certain we should have consulted — so let us know. If you're an artist with extra forms from a show, send them along with comments.

We're particularly interested in hearing from artists. We'd like check-in, check-out and payment to be as fast and painless as possible, and any suggestions you give us now will save you time in '86. For instance, we plan to utilize bar-coding to track each individual piece of art from check-in, display and sale via computer. Also, let us know if you would like to exhibit, and we will log in artists on a first-come, first-served basis. If you're just interested in exhibiting, send your name, address and telephone number. Exhibitors, those interested in exhibiting, and other interested persons will receive copies of regulations and updates on our plans as they develop.

We are also particularly interested in putting together a not-for-sale show which would be a retrospective show on the past 60 years of science fiction illustration. This would feature major pieces of SF illustration. With so many new illustrators in the field, we think it important to give fans a sense of perspective, which means a sense of who Frank R. Paul and Virgil Finley were. For this show, we'll need the cooperation of collectors and artists. Those of you who know us as collectors, minor as our collection may be, know we will put every effort into the safety and security of these pieces.

We are also, of course, going to need a large collection of willing and intelligent warm bodies. Please let us know what you've done before and how you did it and how it could have been done better. If you have no experience working with art shows, just being interested in art is enough of a qualification. Actually, just being alive is enough. We'll be sending "Staff Updates" to all you hundreds of volunteers on a regular basis.

We need volunteers in the following areas:

- Registration/check-in
- Print Sales
- Security
- Set-up/take-down

- Auctioneers
- Runners
- Art Auction Sales Clerks

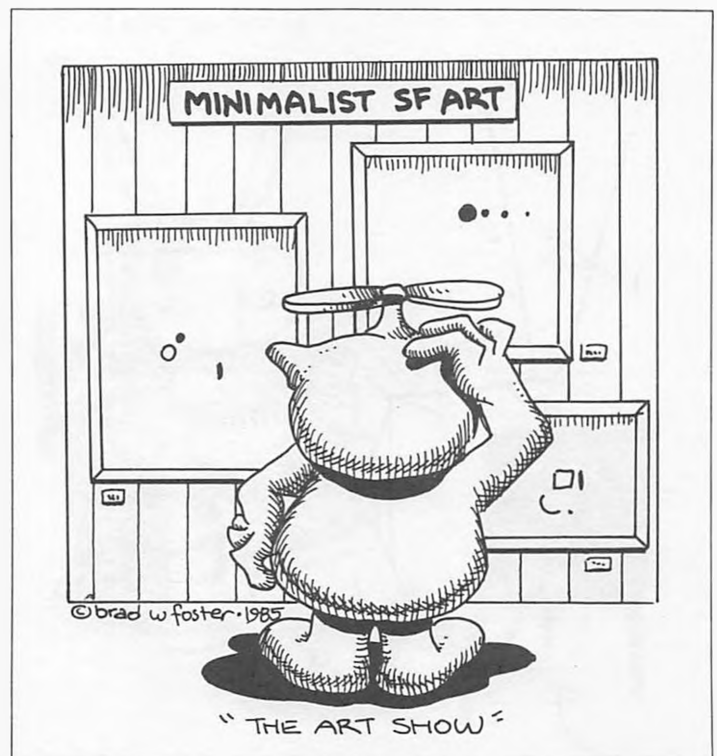

In addition to providing space, tables and chairs for Open Gaming, we are planning to schedule role-playing and board-game tournaments, demonstration games and programming of interest to gamers, in co-ordination with the Programming Area, with an emphasis on SF and Fantasy-oriented games.

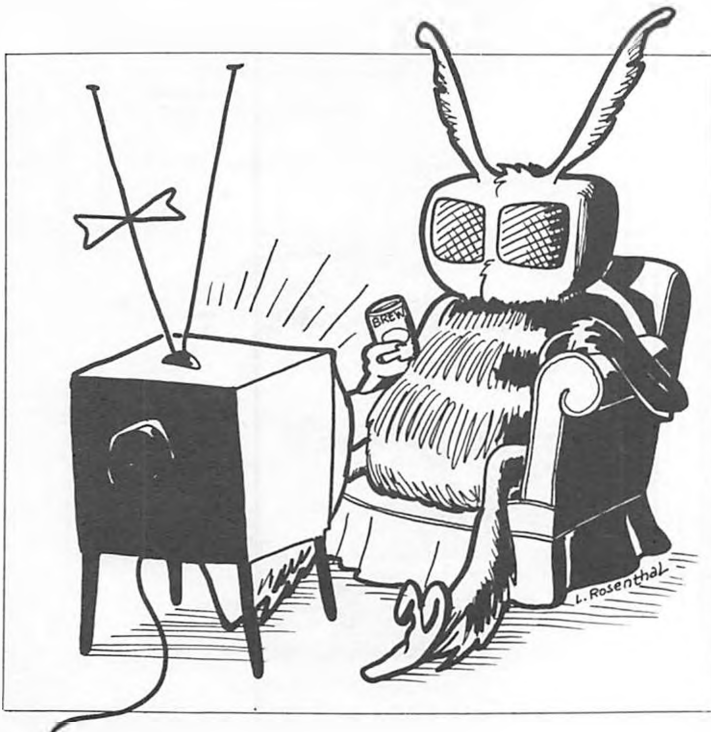
If possible, in conjunction with the Computer Gaming Department, we may try to incorporate Play-By-Mail gaming as well. The Role Playing Gamers Association has already agreed to provide us with several tournaments which we can run at ConFederation, and one of the designers of the Star Trek Role Playing Game will be on hand to talk with interested parties and possibly run some sample scenarios.

Like every other department, we can use a few dependable people who are capable of sitting in a given location for several hours at a time, but in addition we are looking for experienced DMs to run either their own games or help run modules that the convention can supply them — any interested parties should contact me ASAP. We welcome input from all on what they would (or wouldn't) like to see at the convention, and are looking for guidance on which set of rules to use in the inevitable Hearts Tournaments: should the Jack of Diamonds enter into the game? Nobody seems to know for sure ...

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## MEDIA AND BROADCASTING

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This is primarily in the nature of a preparatory exercise: a list of what I definitely intend to tape, what I'd like to tape, and an appeal for comment on what fandom as a whole thinks ought to be (or not be) preserved on video tape from the '86 WorldCon.

The Must Tape Items, of course, are the Hugo Awards, the Masquerade, and both Guest of Honor speeches. I hope to get necessary clearance and make copies of these tapes available after the Con.

The Like To Tape Items include any panel discussions, readings, or other program items involving the Guests of Honor, much (or all) of any Academic Track Programming.

I am actively soliciting suggestions, as noted above, on what we ought to be taping, and what we ought to be not taping.

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## HOUSE MANAGEMENT

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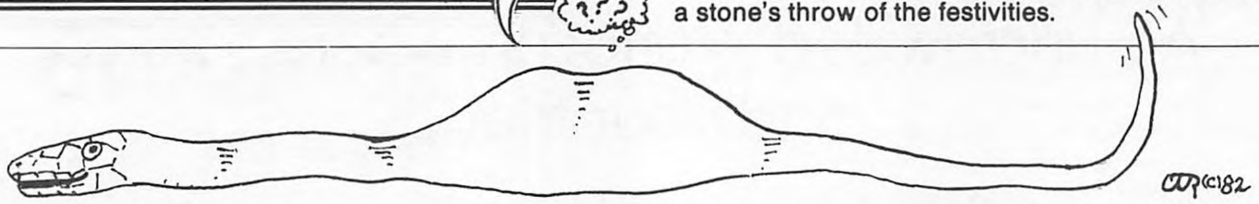

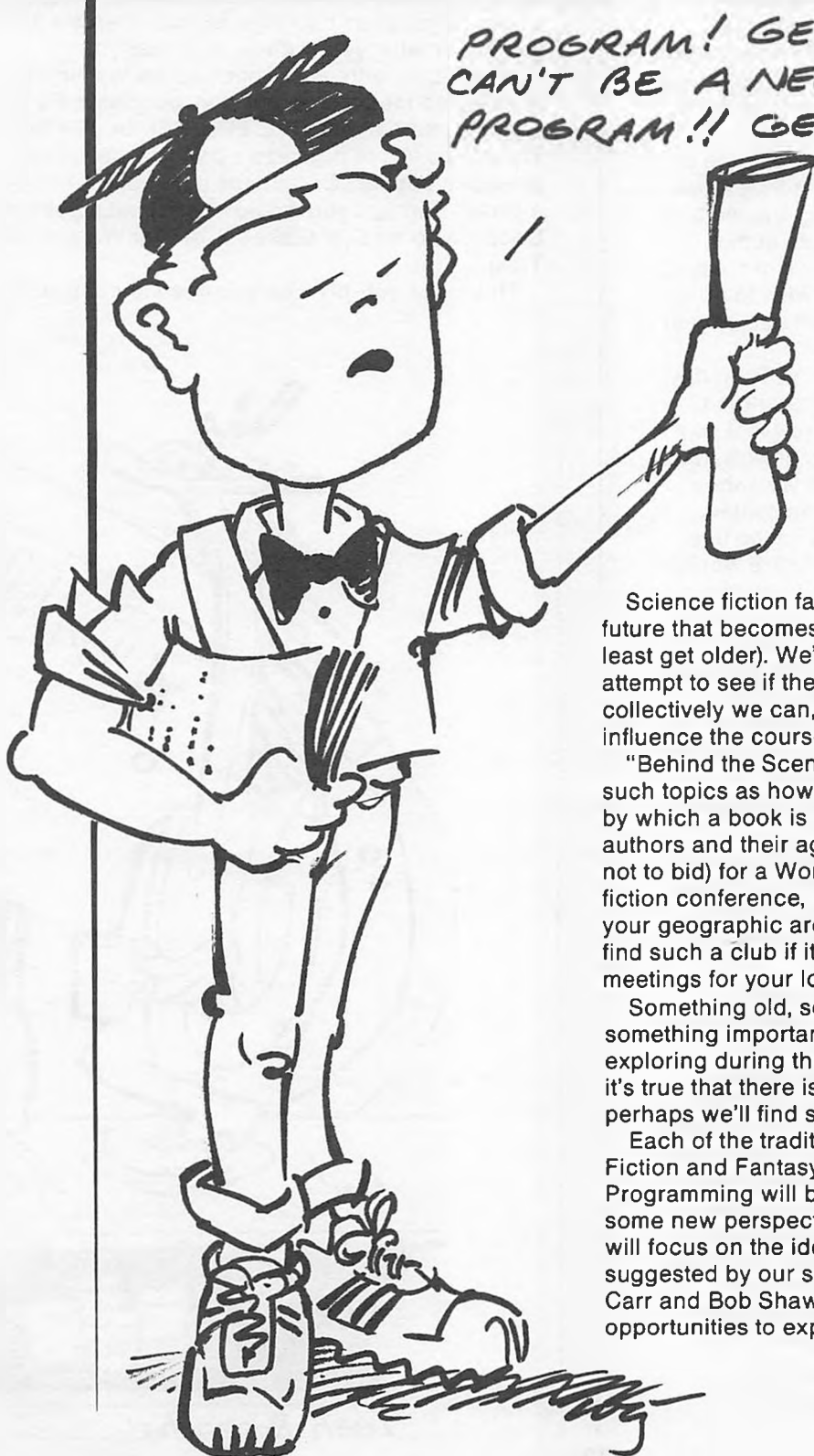

A portion of the programming will focus on the ideas and worlds which have been suggested by our special guests Ray Bradbury, Terry Carr and Bob Shaw who have given us ample opportunities to explore visions of some universes.

Behind the Scenes will provide programming for folks particularly interested in masquerades and costume development.

The convention will present programming for and about science fiction and fantasy art and artists. Night Owl, i.e., late night, programming will attempt to encompass new and still popular programming ideas as well as the now traditional horror panel.

Kids Activities are planned for Atlanta. Want to help develop some plans for yourself and other young fans? Write to us and let us know that you'd like to help. Grups (short for grown-ups) are always invited to attend these activities (on a space available basis) and their ideas and suggestions are most appreciated—but most of all, these activities are initiated by kids, planned by kids and run by kids for themselves and other fans of all ages.

Professional Showcase will include a wide range of activities chosen by the individual author, editor, artist, etc. The audience may be regaled by song, treated to a slide show of art work done by their favorite author, listen to a reading or enter the fantasy world of the pro. We're planning to ask folks whether they wish to do a reading or would prefer to share a different part of their life.

If a Writer's Workshop on Wednesday and Thursday (or on Thursday and Friday) immediately before the convention would be enticing enough to **you** that you would spend your time and money on this activity, let us know and we will try to arrange such a workshop. Only ten to twenty people could be accommodated. Your ideas on the best workshop format and the best size for the group would be appreciated. There would be a separate fee associated with such a workshop so that it will be self-supporting.

We hope that you'll write to us and let us know your ideas for these and other program items. Suggestions of program topics (with suggested participants is wonderful!) or individuals you'd like us to ask to be program participants are solicited. If you'd like to be on a program item, please let us know that also. Suggestions should be received by the committee by June 15th, 1985.

During the five day convention we hope you'll add to your storehouse of knowledge, laugh with us, share a moment or three of terror, modify your thinking on a subject you thought you already thoroughly knew and renew your sense of wonder.

At every convention, there are really several conventions, perhaps even as many conventions as there are individuals attending the con. If you're interested in entering (briefly or not so briefly) the fascinating world of helping to make things happen during the Worldcon, please write to Peggy Rae Pavlat, c/o ConFederation. Specify whether you'd like to help before the convention, both before and during the con or only at the con (or even after the con!) and how many hours you're willing to help. If it's not difficult to do, please let us know what kinds of things you like to do and whether you've had any previous related experience (none is necessary!). 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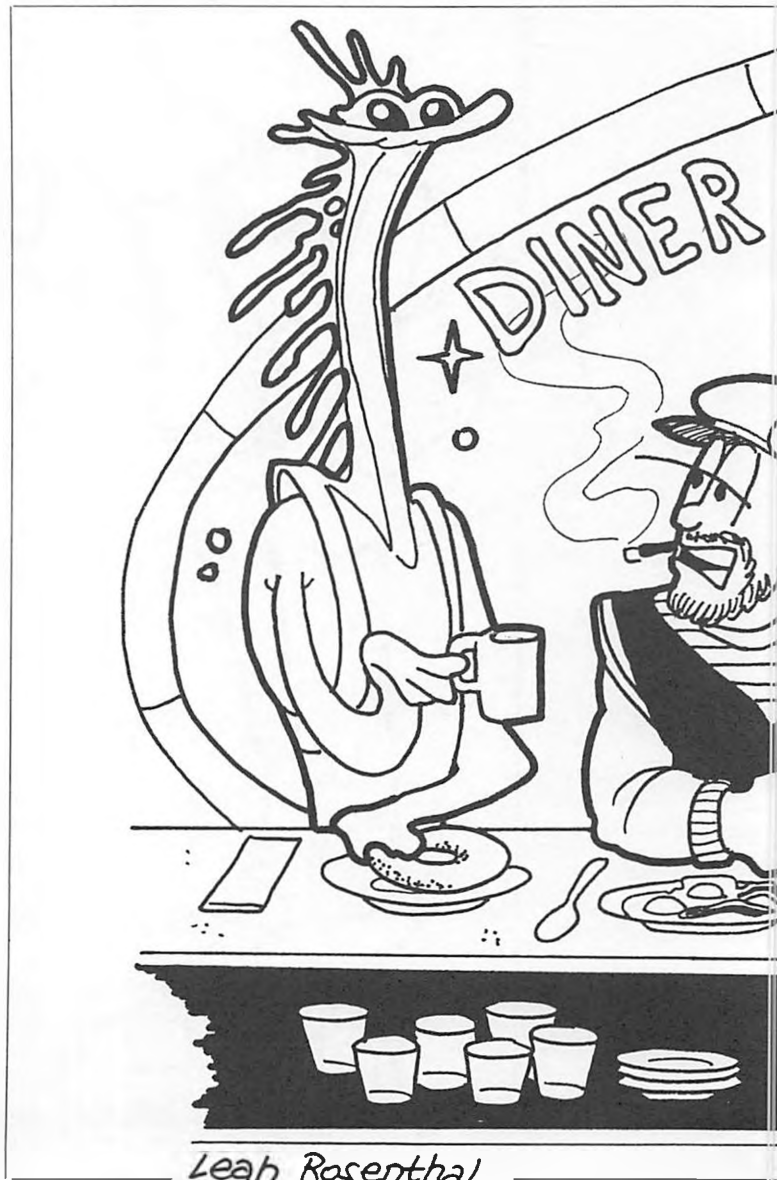
# SPECIAL INTERESTS

Some things will be provided as a matter of course; others on a "you asked for it, you got it" basis. Going on several years' experience "in the field", and after serving through two Worldcons, I have (gods willing) come up with a system that will please most, if not all.

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## PROVIDED, AT MY REQUEST ...

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- Special seating at all major functions (Opening and Closing Ceremonies, Guests of Honor speeches, the Hugos, the Masquerade).
- American Sign Language interpreters at all above-named functions. Where needed, lighting WILL be supplied.
- Wheelchairs and canes: To un-complicate and insure equipment returns, we will request a deposit (personal check or cash with a business card with your home address on it), to be returned to you when the equipment is returned to us.
- A sure-fire method of identifying you and your helper (no more than 1 helper, unless you're a parent with spouse and under-teenaged kids). This will serve to protect you and yours from over-zealous gophers; the ID will NOT be a black armband with a yellow star. Trust me.
- A Handicapped-Access Booth manned with cheerful people who will help you when you need help. And if it's not open, some way of finding help quickly (if not IMMEDIATELY).

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## PROVIDED, AT YOUR REQUEST ...

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- Braille and Oversized Print Progress Reports, Program Book, and Pocket Program. We'll have a FEW for at-the-door joiners, but we can't afford to print up 50 if we only need 15; and I'd hate to print up only 50 if we need 100.



- American Sign Language Interpreters for major (to you) events.
- Registration at the Handicap-Access Booth, which will be a LOT less crowded than the rest of Registration.
- Handicap-Access Rooms at your Hotel (we'll even deliver a wheelchair to your room, hotel and gophers permitting).
- Extra-wide seats for those who need them.
- Food for your companion animal (for a slight fee).

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## HOW YOU CAN HELP

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To get any of the services listed as "available at your request", write to me, Samantha b Jeude, care of the Convention. Your letters will get to me faster if you put ATTN: HANDICAP ACCESS on the lower left-hand corner of your envelope.

I'll need volunteers — dedicated Ameslan signers to work where needed, cheerful people to man the Access Booth, gophers to run for me and my "hands". Volunteers please write to me, and tell me how, when, and where.

Last, but not least, TELL me what you think I've forgotten. I'm willing to use any reasonable suggestion to improve the quality of the convention for you —stress on the word "reasonable". To quote my Gran-Daddy, "Bein' carried around on a silver platter would improve the quality of my life, but I doubt as most folks'd find that reasonable."

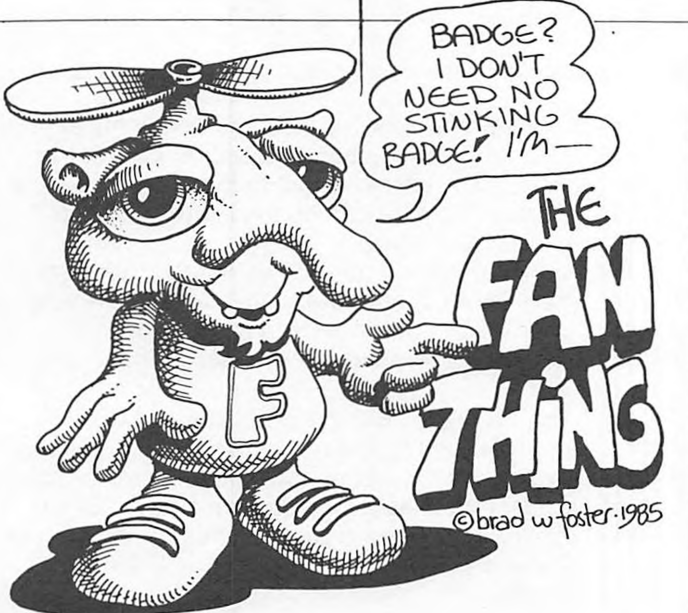
