# Hotel and Travel



## General Information

Dear friends,

As promised here you'll find the general information about Hotel & Travel. In order to avoid chaos we have assigned the hotel rooms into two categories: one category for the US fans and one for fans from the rest of the world. As this promises to be a truly international worldcon we have taken all major hotels, split the rooms on a 50 - 50 basis and blocked them accordingly. Should either group need more rooms than currently assigned to them, we can get more rooms.

If you do not wish to be in any of the hotels as listed and prefer a cheaper bed & breakfast hotel - these are also available in great numbers but Convention Travel International (CTI) can not book these rooms in advance. Neither CTI or ConFiction can guarantee that these rooms will live up to expectations of the foreign fans, though most of the rooms will be decent enough. Should you wish to know more about this possibility, we suggest you write directly to the The Hague Tourist Board, known as: V.V.V. - Den Haag, Groot Hertoginnelaan 41, 2517 EC The Hague, The Netherlands.

**Warning:** Please, do not phone or write directly to the hotels listed here. They will tell you that all rooms are booked already! Write instead to Holland Approach or mail the hotel reservation form to Convention Travel International for booking and/or travel arrangements. Hotel rooms subject to availability.

## Our Major Hotels

**STEIGENBERGER KURHAUS \*\*\*\*\*** in Scheveningen. National monument directly at seafront; 249 rooms; Direct access to recreation centre with in and outdoor pool, under the same roof; Casino Scheveningen, Bar and 2 famous restaurants.

**PROMENADE \*\*\*\*\*** at five minutes walking distance from the Congress Centre. Located on edge of wooded park; 101 rooms; 3 restaurants, a bar and terrace; Hairdresser; large parking lot. Rent-a-Car service in front.

**BEL AIR \*\*\*\*\*** at two minutes walking distance from the Congress Centre. 350 rooms, 2 bars and 2 restaurants; Heated indoor swimming pool; Hairdresser and beauty parlor; large parking lot.

**EUROPA HOTEL \*\*\*\*\*** in Scheveningen. 100 meters from the beach; 174 rooms; Bar and restaurant; Heated indoor swimming pool, sauna and fitness room.

**PULLMAN HOTEL CENTRAL \*\*\*\*\*** in the City Centre. Immediate vicinity of Parliament Buildings and down-town shopping centre; 159 rooms; Bar and 3 restaurants; Fitness club with sauna; Parking garage. (For lovers of Japanese cooking: there is a Japanese restaurant at two

minutes from this hotel).

**ATLANTIC \*\*\*\*\*** in Kijkduin. 25 meters from the beach, near shopping centre. 119 rooms, 58 of which 2-room apartments with kitchenette. Bar and 2 restaurants; Indoor swimming pool, fitness centre and sauna. Large parking lot.

**ZEEHAGHE \*\*\*** in Kijkduin. Close to Atlantic Hotel, 70 rooms; 27 of which 2-room apartments with kitchenette; Breakfast room; guests may use facilities of Atlantic Hotel. Parking lot.

**CARLTON BEACH \*\*\*\*\*** in Scheveningen. Direct access to the beach; 184 rooms; Bar, 2 restaurants, terrace, health centre with sauna & swimming pool; Parking garage.

**PARKHOTEL \*\*\*\*\*** in the City Centre. Situated on a picturesque street in the city centre adjoining the Royal Palace's gardens. 114 rooms; Bar; Small parking garage.

**FLORA BEACH \*\*\*\*\*** in Scheveningen. 150 meters from the beach; 88 rooms; Bar, restaurant, fitness room with sauna.

# American Travel & Hotel Arrangements

(for US fans only!)

*KLM Royal Dutch Airlines is the officially appointed carrier for ConFiction and therefore the packages in this brochure are based on the flight schedules that it can offer.*

*Holland Approach and ConFiction do, however, fully realize that not everyone can be accommodated with KLM's schedule/gateways. Additional options have therefore been developed. Please, contact Holland Approach for further information.*

## What is included in the Air/Hotel package?

- \* Round trip airfare on KLM Royal Dutch Airlines to Amsterdam
- \* USA departure immigration/customs taxes and fees
- \* 6 Nights Hotel accommodation, incl. breakfast, service and taxes
- \* Organizers hotel reservation fee
- \* free Holland Approach consultation (within reason) if you wish to make arrangements for additional travel before or after the convention.

## What is included in the Hotel Only package?

- \* 6 Nights Hotel accommodation, incl. breakfast, service and taxes
- \* Organizers hotel reservation fee
- \* Holland Approach administrative fee (including forwarding funds to organizers in Holland).

## Exclusions

- \* All items not specifically listed as being included are not included and are the responsibility of the client.

## Reservations

- \* Reservations must be submitted on the official reservation form. Airline reservations will be subject to later confirmation by the airline. All others should mail in their reservation form to Holland Approach. Reservations will be processed on a first come/first serve basis. *Only attending members are allowed to make room reservations!* (See at page 11 for changing your membership status).
- \* A large block of rooms is available for immediate confirmation. Special requests will be forwarded to Holland for confirmation. Airline reservations are at all times subject to availability and confirmation by the airline. Even after our airline computer confirms your confirmation, airlines reserve the right to change or deny a reservation (usually within 72 hours of booking).

## Prices and Schedules

- \* Airlines reserve the right to change schedules and prices at any time without notice. The hotel prices are set by the ConFiction organizers in Dutch guilders, consequently they are subject to currency fluctuations. The prices listed in these pages are the prices in effect at the time of printing and may not be the final prices you pay for the package.

## How to avoid price changes

- \* If you pay in full within 10 days after receiving either after a phone or a written confirmation and/or price quote, your package will not be changed.

## Deposits and final payment

- \* If you pay in full you will receive your airline tickets and hotel vouchers shortly afterwards.  
**A deposit of US\$ 380.00 per person will:**
  - \* hold your room reservation until 1 May 1990
  - \* guarantee that your regular KLM APEX airfare will not increase, if paid before 12/31/89.**Non-refundable** airfares can not be guaranteed, except by booking and paying in full immediately.  
**A deposit of US\$ 125 per person will:**
  - \* hold your room until May 1, 1990. NOTE: if you only pay a deposit your final price is still subject to change due to possible currency fluctuations for the hotel portion. *All rooms must be paid in full in the US before you receive a voucher!*

## Payment due dates

- \* Deposit and/or full payment is due within 10 days of the day of the written and/or phone confirmation. If not received by then your reservation will be cancelled. Final payment must be in our office not later than 31 May, 1990. If not received by then your hotel room and airline reservation will be cancelled.

## Form of payment

- \* Check or credit card. Please, see the reservation form for further details.

## Refunds/Changes/Cancellations/Restrictions

- \* **Airlines:** All tickets are subject to airline rules. Tickets may require an advance purchase (usually 5, 7 or 21 days), a minimum and a maximum stay allowance. Change or cancellation charges up to US\$ 100. If you change after your departure often no residual value remains. Non-refundable tickets are just that, non refundable.
- \* **Hotel:** You will receive a full refund less US\$ 25 administrative fee (levied by the organizers) and less the charges as explained below if you cancel before 1 August 1990. No refund if you cancel on or after 1 August 1990.
- \* **Holland Approach:** A US\$ 35 p.p. cancellation fee applies if you cancel your package. This is in addition to the charges specified above! A change fee of US\$ 25 p.p. for hotel and/or airline reservations is due for each occurrence PRIOR to making the change.

## Refund payments

- \* Refunds are at all times subject to supplier and no funds will be returned to you unless Holland Approach Inc. has received those funds from the supplier(s). Your travel package represents a special reduced price arrangement. Even though your ticket will show the published airfare, your refund will be prorated based on the total package price. Refunds involving hotels may be subject to cancellation charges described above, bank

charges, telex/fax fees, foreign exchange translation losses and organizer cancellation fee.

#### ConFiction Membership

- At the request of the ConFiction organizers Holland Approach will accept payment for Attending Membership (US\$ 70) and upgrade from Supporting to Attending membership (US\$ 42). Membership prices are going up after 31 December, 1989.

*ConFiction organizers have instructed us that only Attending Members are allowed to make reservations.*

#### Insurance

- In light of the cancellation penalties we strongly recommend you purchase travel insurance, which in many cases will cover the partial or full amount of penalties. Please, read the terms and conditions of the policy before applying. Insurance application forms are available from Holland Approach Inc.

In short: write to Holland Approach who will handle all travel and/or hotel arrangements. Do not write or phone the hotels themselves, for they all will tell you that alle rooms have been booked already! Which is true, in a sense, since they are "booked" by ConFiction! Write to:



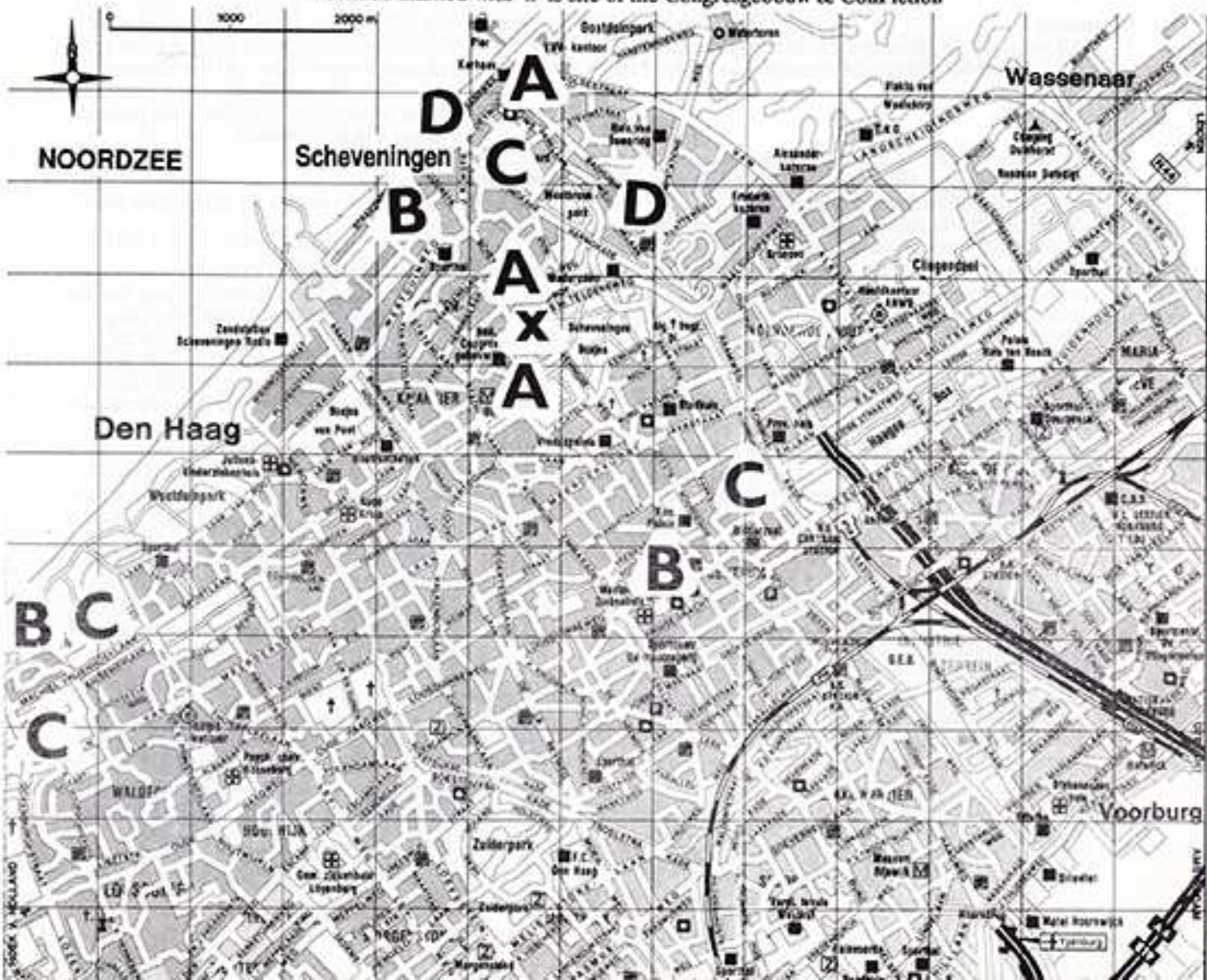

## Hotel arrangements for fans from the rest of the world

We have appointed Convention Travel International B.V. at The Hague to act as intermediate for the booking of hotel accomodation. Through them a large number of rooms have been blocked at favourable rates in hotels of 4 price categories. The hotels are located in the city centre of The Hague, the seaside resort of Scheveningen and the seaside resort of Kijkduin. To reach the Congress Centre from both Scheveningen and the centre of The Hague, there are regular, direct tram services (journey takes 10 to 15 minutes) and a taxi drive is approximately 10 minutes. A regular bus service connects the Kijkduin Hotels with the Congress Centre in about 20 minutes (approx. 15 minutes by taxi).

Deadline for reservations will be June 23, 1990. Reservation requests received after this date will be accepted, but adequate accommodation cannot be guaranteed.

All rooms (except the lowest category D rooms) have private bath and/or shower and toilet. Rates (1989 price level) are per room per night, including breakfast, service charge and taxes. In view of hotel policy, all reservation requests must be accompanied by a deposit of Dfl. 250,- per room, or guaranteed by credit card. Payment of the deposit can be made by bank draft or Eurocheque payable to Convention Travel International B.V., or by direct bank transfer to account no. 47.34.19.815 with the AMRO BANK, The Hague of Convention Travel International B.V., stating

*Reservations can only be made through the hotel reservation form, to be sent to Convention Travel International B.V. as soon as possible. All requests for reservations will be dealt with strictly on a first come, first served basis. No reservations will be accepted over the telephone! No reservation can be made without a deposit or credit card guarantee. Prices subject to change.*

ConFiction 1990 and the name(s) of the participant(s) for whom payment is made. Personal cheques are accepted, but must be issued in the equivalent amount in local currency. For credit card guarantee the appropriate section of the reservation form must be filled out. Upon receipt of the deposit, or form with credit card guarantee, participants will receive a hotel confirmation voucher, showing all reservation details as well as the deposit paid, less bank cost and a Dfl 7,50 reservation fee per room. This voucher must be handed over to the hotel reception when checking in and the deposit amount will then be deducted from the final hotel bill.

Cancellations and/or changes should be made in writing, by telefax or by cable to Convention Travel International B.V. When cancelling a reservation the hotel voucher must be returned. For cancellations received by Convention Travel International B.V.

before August 9, 1990, the voucher value will be refunded less bank cost and a Dfl. 50,- cancellation fee per room. No refunds can be made for cancellations received after August 9, 1990.

For a brief hotel description, see page 4 of this issue.

Price category D hotels: those are a number of small hotels, each with a limited number of rooms, all in the Scheveningen area. Only part of the rooms have private facilities.

## The Mechanics of Bidding & Voting

Voting for the site selection and the Hugos are the two major areas covered by the WSFS Constitution. (Site selection is covered for both the Worldcon and the NASFiC, and the NASFiC voting procedure is almost the same as the Worldcon.) Both the Hugo voting and site selection use the same vote counting procedure. The system used is the so-called "Australian ballot". Technically, this is the wrong term for it (as the Australians frequently point out whenever somebody calls it that). It is actually a form of the transferable preference ballot. This means that the voter states an order of preference, and the vote is counted for the most preferred candidate until that one is eliminated, or a winner reached. When a choice is eliminated, the votes for that choice are transferred to the highest remaining choice.

In practice the system works as follows. Voters cast their ballots for their choices in order of preference (1,2,3,...). If a voter has no choices beyond the first choice, a mark can be made for only that choice, and it will be counted as a 1 with no other choices.

Votes are tallied by the voter's first choice. If a site has a majority of the votes cast for the various sites, then it wins. If not, the votes for the site with the lowest vote count are redistributed to their second choices. If still no majority is obtained, then the new lowest site is redistributed to its voters' highest remaining preferences, and the procedure repeated until a majority is obtained. Two special categories are included on the ballot: "None of the Above" and "No Preference". A vote for "No Preference" is counted as an abstention. Therefore, it is not counted in determining the number of votes needed for a majority. For example, if the voting is A-2, B-1, No Preference-20, then A has a majority of the votes counted. In the elimination process, if a voter has no choices which remain, then the vote will be counted as "No Preference". Finally, "No Preference" cannot be eliminated, so any choices after "No Preference" are meaningless.

A vote for "None of the Above" is an indication that the voter does not feel that any of the candidates would be an acceptable choice. Should it win, the Business Meeting will select the winner. "None of the Above" is treated as a site, and can be eliminated. In practice, it has usually gotten the fewest number of votes (except for write-ins), and will be the first site eliminated. Therefore, the second (and subsequent) choices of the "None of the Above" voter are usually the ones that play a role in determining the winner.

The effects of this form of voting become clear in multisite races. In a two candidate race, someone will get a majority, so it's simple. It is not true that the candidate receiving the greatest number of first place votes wins (as would be true in a plurality system). For example, assume A-9, B-6, C-5 after the first round. Since there is no majority, then there is no winner at this round. (The majority of voters is against A.) Since C has the fewest votes, the C voters' second choices are distributed among A, B, and "No Preference". If all of the C voters have B as their second choice, the second round totals will be A-9, B-11 and B wins.

As you can see, the second choice votes can play a vital role in the selection of a winner. The implications are very clear - keep voting as long as you have preferences.

Lower choices than first can play a decisive role. An interesting example of this in practice took place in the 1984 Hugo race for "Best Fanzine". (The Hugo Award voting uses the same rules, except that places after first are also computed by redistributing the votes of the winners as if they had been eliminated). Although "No Award" had the second greatest number of first place votes, and might therefore be expected to come in second, it was eventually eliminated in each round of balloting, and ended up last. Both the Hugo and the site selection voting use a mail ballot, and site selection uses on-site voting as well. This allows a member who isn't attending to cast a vote. In practice, the Worldcon mail ballot has been substantial (about half of the votes). Because of the presence of the mail ballot, both cons require filing in advance in order to get on the ballot. The Worldcon requires filing by the close of the prior Worldcon. Two documents must be filed with the administering committee. The first document is a letter of intent from the facility which is being proposed. The letter will be converted into a real contract after the winner is determined. The second item is organizational. For a Worldcon or NASFiC, it is the rules under which the committee operates.

It is not up to the administering committee to make any judgements as to the workability of the arrangements made in these documents. If a committee files a contract from a 10-room motel, this will fulfill the requirements for winning, since the voters will recognize that this is not enough space to be taken seriously.

The lead time for site selection varies among the conventions. In general, the larger cons need more lead time, since the larger facilities they require tend to book up earlier than the smaller ones. Also, since there are fewer cities capable of holding the larger cons, then losing any of them because somebody else booked them is a proportionately greater loss. The current rules have the Worldcon and NASFiC picked three years in advance. All of the bylaws also have a method of determining eligible sites. All sites, except those in North America, can bid in any year. Within North America, the eligible sites have been divided into three zones (West, Central, East, in that order), and only the third of the sites in the appropriate zone can bid. Since the rotation means that a North American site would be running in the same zone as the current Worldcon might be held in, then there is a 60 mile exclusion zone around the current site.

The NASFiC voting is a somewhat more complicated process. Since a NASFiC can only occur if a non-Norht American site wins the Worldcon, no mail balloting can take place. Therefore, only on-site voting takes place, and does not begin until after a non-North American Worldcon has been selected. The NASFiC takes place in the North American zone which was eligible to hold the non-North American Worldcon.

This summary of the various formal rules governing the site selection process is only intended to be a guide. To determine the rules in force at any time, consult the appropriate bylaws. Copies can be found in the appropriate program books, and in one of the progress reports.

- 3) Extended dining room hours to meet the needs of attendees.
- 4) Keep bars open 10am to 2am (longest hours allowed by law).
- 5) Eliminate any live music in hotel lobby bars and lounges.
- 6) Increase all chocolate supplies in gift shops, restaurants and room service.
- 7) Add additional staff in all outlets.
- 8) Eliminate strict dress codes in all outlets.
- 9) Open pool and jacuzzi on a 24 hour basis.
- 10) Have an elevator repairman on site during the meeting.
- 11) Have an on-site hotel engineer and executive committee member.
- 12) Provide late made service.
- 13) Provide a graveyard shift for waiters and others that are deemed necessary.
- 14) 24 hour trash pickup in affected areas.
- 15) Special trash collection for hospitality rooms midnight though 4:30 am.
- 16) Morning continental breakfast.
- 17) Afternoon and late evening soup and sandwich bars.
- 18) Increase number of towels to all rooms.
- 19) Provide a designated area for posting advertisements, etc.
- 20) Work with your security to provide total coverage.
- 21) Provide large trash cans with bags for each party.
- 22) Assist with noon reservations where possible.

At the Marriott, we have 1200 rooms and 100 suites blocked to accommodate the main contingent of fans. In addition, we have commitments from several of the nearby hotels for overflow space amounting to an additional 1400 rooms inside of 1/2 a mile, and an additional 2500 rooms within a mile of the main hotel. These range in price from extremely posh to very economical. Getting into the main facilities will be simple. The non-headquarters hotels are willing to provide a courtesy bus running the loop during the convention.

## WSFS and Site Selection Business

### 1993 Worldcon Site Selection

Enclosed with this Progress Report is your Site Selection ballot with instructions. Since Worldcons are chosen three years in advance, this is for the 1993 Worldcon.

Every member of ConFiction has the right to vote for the 1993 committee and site if they pay the voting fee of US\$22 or equivalent (Dfl 47.00 or UK£14.50). This voting fee goes to the winning committee. To make the transfer of funds easier, you should use a separate cheque payable to "The 51st World Science Fiction Convention" and postdate it to 1 August 1990.

Voting for 1993 gets you Supporting Membership in that Worldcon regardless of who wins. Supporting Membership includes all of their generally distributed publications, the right to nominate and vote on the 1993 Hugo Awards, and the right to vote (with payment of an additional fee) on the 1996 Site Selection.

In addition to the Phoenix Arizona, San Francisco California, and Zagreb Yugoslavia candidates appearing on the ballot, valid paperwork has been received from a bid for Hawaii in '93. (Committee: Hawaii in '93, c/o Lex Nakashima, 17333 Midwood Drive, Granada Hills, CA 91344-2455) Since this bid was received after the Noreascon Three closing ceremonies, the rules prohibited printing it on the ballot but you may write it in.

### WSFS Business Meeting

Every member of ConFiction is automatically a member of the World Science Fiction Society and, if attending ConFiction, has the right to attend and vote at the Business Meeting. The WSFS Constitution, the Standing Rules for the Business Meeting, and the Business Passed On to ConFiction from Noreascon Three are all included in this Progress Report.

There will be four scheduled business sessions at ConFiction, each from 9:30 to 11:30AM. During the Convention rooms will be allocated to these meetings. Friday morning will be the Preliminary Business Meeting, Saturday morning will be a Main Business Meeting session, and Sunday morning will be the Site Selection session as well as a Main Business Meeting. Changes to the WSFS Constitution, its fundamental governing document, can only be made at a Main Business Meeting. The Monday morning session will be held only if necessary due to an overflow of business from the earlier sessions.

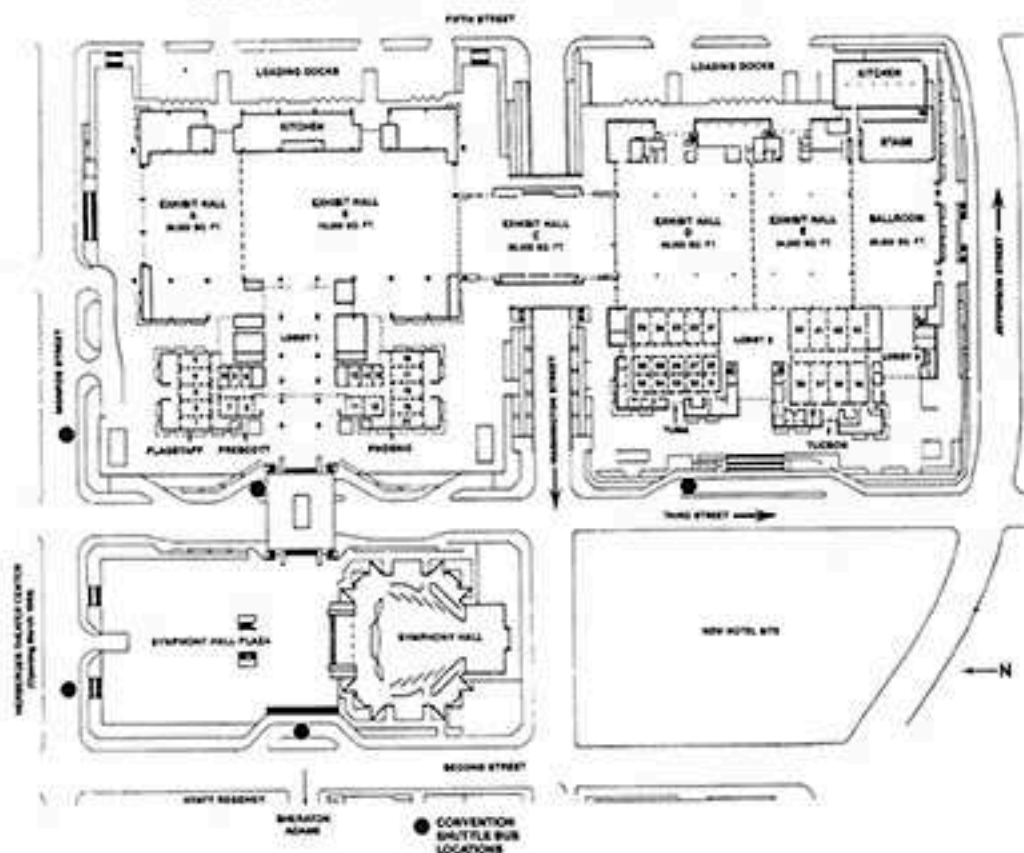

# 1990 Hugo Nomination Ballot—Instructions

## PLEASE READ THE FOLLOWING INSTRUCTIONS CAREFULLY BEFORE NOMINATING.

The accompanying ballot is the nomination ballot for the 1990 Science Fiction Achievement Awards (Hugos), for the best science fiction or fantasy works of 1989. To nominate, you must be a member of either ConFiction or Noreason Three (the 1989 Worldcon). Only those Noreason Three members who explicitly request ballots will receive them. Only ConFiction members will be asked to vote on the final ballot. Please be sure to include the required information so that we can verify your membership. (Your membership number isn't required, but will make things a little easier for us; your name and address are required.) If you aren't a member yet, just fill out the required information and check the membership fee with your ballot. All nominations should be sent to Richard Katz; PO Box 760; Framingham, MA 01701; USA; and should be postmarked no later than March 10, 1990 to be counted. (But we'll be counting the ballots about a week after that, so we recommend mailing earlier if you have any doubts about the speed of the mails; and if you're overseas, please use air mail.)

We're distributing these ballots early enough that most of you should get them a couple of months before the deadline. While we'd prefer that you not wait till the very last minute, we do hope that you'll take your time before voting. (At least we recommend that you wait until the year is over before trying to choose its best work.) Don't nominate the first thing that comes to mind, but try to read as widely as possible. If you have a serious question about the interpretation of the rules, write to us and we'll try to answer it. (But don't ask us to count the words in a story for you; you can get a pretty good estimate by counting a typical page and multiplying.)

You may make up to five nominations in each category; but if you wish to make fewer nominations, or none at all in a given category, feel free to do so. (In fact, we recommend that you not nominate in any category you aren't familiar with.) The order of your nominations doesn't matter. Please don't waste a nomination on "No Award," which under the rules will automatically appear on the final ballot in each category. We've included space for "none" under the fiction categories; you don't have to fill these out, but you can do so if you think your nomination is one we might not recognize. (It's a good idea to look them up anyway, to make sure you've got the title right.) PLEASE PRINT OR TYPE.

The final Hugo ballot will contain the five nominees (more in the case of ties) that receive the most nominations in each category. It will be distributed to ConFiction members only, in a special mailing around April 20, 1990. The voting deadline will be July 14, 1990. As always, the winners will be announced at the Hugo Awards Ceremony at the Worldcon.

The rules governing the Hugos can be found in the World Science Fiction Society Constitution, printed in Progress Report #4. This nomination ballot may be included as well. The explanations below are an expansion and clarification of those rules.

### General Rules

Note that in spite of the official title (Science Fiction Achievement Awards), all the Hugos are for works of *either science fiction or fantasy*, however you may choose to define those two genres. The ConFiction committee has delegated to Richard Katz the authority to judge all questions of eligibility, but he intends to give the voters the benefit of the doubt; in other words, anything that gets enough votes will be on the final ballot, unless it is clearly and unambiguously ineligible under the rules. If something is nominated in more than one category (a common occurrence), he will also decide what category to put it in. All nominees will be notified of their nominations, and will have the opportunity to decline before the final ballot is printed.

### Year of Eligibility:

All the Hugos are for works that appeared for the first time in the calendar year 1989. (The Campbell Award, which is not a Hugo, is for authors first published in 1988 or 1989.) For a dated periodical, eligibility is determined only by the cover date; that is, a "January 1989" magazine is eligible this year even if it really appeared in October 1988. For anything else, however, eligibility is governed by the "publication date." This is an arbitrary date designated by the publisher to define "the time when the concentrated selling effort begins," and is commonly several weeks after a book has been shipped to bookstores and placed on sale. Thus books that were on sale in December, or even November, 1988 may have had 1989 publication dates and still be eligible for this year's Hugos; please keep this in mind when considering your nominations. The publication date is often, but not always, listed on a book's copyright page; the copyright date itself is not conclusive, but you can use it to identify the year if you have no other evidence. (Note that published lists of the year's "best books" or the like can not always be relied on in determining Hugo eligibility, since some sources list books by date of receipt rather than publication date.)

Serialized series are eligible this year if the final installment appeared in 1989. The same rule applies to serialized dramas, e.g., a miniseries or multi-part episode the last part of which was broadcast in 1989. But while a serial (a single story appearing in two or more parts) is eligible, a serial (a collection of more or less related stories appearing under the same overall title or with the same characters, but each complete in itself) is not eligible as a whole. (For example, *Star Trek* was never eligible as such, but a lot of individual episodes were Hugo nominees.)

### Category Definitions:

**BEST NOVEL:** A science fiction or fantasy story of 40,000 words or more, appearing for the first time during the calendar year 1989. (See above for rules governing date of "appearance" and serialization.) A novel originally published in a language other than English is eligible if either the original publication or the first English translation appeared in 1989.

**BEST NOVELLETTE:** Same as Best Novel, except that the length must be between 17,500 and 40,000 words.

**BEST SHORT STORY:** Same as Best Novel, except that the length must be between 7500 and 17,500 words.

**BEST NON-FICTION BOOK:** Any non-fictional work relating to science fiction, fantasy, or fandom, first published in book form during 1989, both "non-fictional" and "relating to SF," etc. (have traditionally been interpreted loosely; past nominees have included works of history, biography, bibliography, criticism, art books (including graphic novels and other heavily illustrated fiction), periodicals, professional "reference books," books about science (both real and pseudo), and a bound volume. Worldcon committees usually have an interesting time deciding eligibility in this category; as noted above, we expect to be liberal about it, but there are limits...)

**BEST DRAMATIC PRESENTATION:** Any production, in any medium, of dramatized science fiction or fantasy, which was publicly presented for the first time in its present dramatic form during 1989. (See above for the rules on series and "dramatic units.")

**BEST PROFESSIONAL EDITOR:** The editor of any professional publication devoted primarily to science fiction or fantasy during 1989. A "professional publication" is defined as one with an average price run of at least 10,000 copies per issue. Those eligible include magazine editors, editors of anthologies, and book editors at publishing houses.

**BEST PROFESSIONAL ARTIST:** An illustrator whose work appeared in a professional publication (see above) of science fiction or fantasy during 1989. (Note that the award is supposed to be for art published during the year, not a career award.)

**BEST SEMI-PROZINE and BEST FANZINE:** Both categories are for generally available non-professional publications (press run under 10,000) devoted to science fiction, fantasy, or (for fanzines) related subjects, which have published 4 or more issues, at least one of which appeared during 1989. In addition, a semiprozine is a publication which during 1989 met at least two of the following criteria: (1) had an average press run of at least 1000 copies per issue; (2) paid its contributors and/or staff in other than free copies; (3) provided at least half the income of any one person; (4) had at least 15% of its total space occupied by advertising; or (5) announced itself to be a semiprozine. Publications meeting fewer than two of these criteria are fanzines.

**BEST FAN WRITER:** Any person whose writing appeared in semiprozines or fanzines during 1989.

**BEST FAN ARTIST:** Any artist or cartoonist whose work appeared in semiprozines or fanzines or through other public display (e.g., convention art shows) during 1989. Note that no artist is allowed to appear on the final Hugo ballot in both Professional Artist and Fan Artist categories in the same year.

**BEST NON-ENGLISH LANGUAGE NOVEL:** A science fiction or fantasy story of 40,000 words or more appearing for the first time in any language other than English during the calendar year 1989. Translations from an English language work are not eligible. (See above for rules governing date of "appearance" and serialization.) (Each Worldcon is entitled to add a special Hugo category to the ballot. The ConFiction committee has chosen to exercise this option in creating the Best Non-English-Language Short Story category.)

**JOHN W. CAMPBELL AWARD FOR BEST NEW WRITER (via a Hugo):** sponsored by Davis Publications; Any writer whose first professionally published science fiction or fantasy story appeared during the calendar year 1988 or 1989. (Date of appearance is defined in the same manner as for the Hugos. "Professionally published," as above, refers to a press run of at least 10,000.)

### Committee Ineligibility:

The Committee having delegated all authority under Section 22 of Article II, only Richard Katz is ineligible for a 1990 Hugo Nomination.

# CONSTITUTION

## of the World Science Fiction Society, September 1989

### Article I — Name, Objectives, Membership, and Organization

**Section 1:** The name of this organization shall be the World Science Fiction Society, hereinafter referred to as WSFS or the Society.

**Section 2:** WSFS is an unincorporated literary society whose functions are:

- To choose the recipients of the annual Science Fiction Achievement Awards (the Hugo Awards).
- To choose the locations and Committees for the annual World Science Fiction Conventions (hereinafter referred to as Worldcons).
- To attend those Worldcons.
- To choose the locations and Committees for the occasional North American Science Fiction Conventions (hereinafter referred to as NASFCONs), and
- To perform such other activities as may be necessary or incidental to the above purposes.

**Section 3:** No part of the Society's net earnings shall be paid to its members, officers, or other private persons except in furtherance of the Society's purposes. The Society shall not attempt to influence legislation or any political campaign for public office. Should the Society dissolve, its assets shall be distributed by the current Worldcon Committee or the appropriate court having jurisdiction, exclusively for charitable purposes. In this section, references to the Society include the Mark Registration and Protection Committee and all other agencies of the Society but not conventional holding or operating committees.

**Section 4:** The Membership of WSFS shall consist of all people who have paid membership dues to the Committee of the current Worldcon. Within ninety (90) days after a Worldcon, the administering Committee shall, except where prohibited by local law, forward its best information as to the names and postal addresses of all of its Worldcon members to the Committee of the next Worldcon.

**Section 5:** Members of WSFS who cast a site-selection ballot with the required fee shall be supporting members of the selected Worldcon. The rights of supporting members of a Worldcon include the right to receive all of its generally distributed publications. Voters have the right to convert to attending membership in the selected Worldcon within ninety (90) days of its selection, for an additional fee set by its Committee. This fee must not exceed the minimum voting fee and not exceed the difference between the voting fee and the fee for new attending members. The rights of attending members of a Worldcon include the rights of supporting members plus the right of general attendance at said Worldcon and at the WSFS Business Meeting held therein. Other memberships and fees shall be at the discretion of the Worldcon Committee, except that they shall make provision for persons to become supporting members for no more than 125% of the site-selection fee, or such higher amount as has been approved by the Business Meeting, until a cutoff date no earlier than ninety (90) days before their Worldcon.

*PROVIDED*, that the requirement to provide supporting memberships for a limited fee shall affect only Worldcons after 1991.

**Section 6:** Authority and responsibility for all matters concerning the Worldcon, except those reserved herein to WSFS, shall rest with the Worldcon Committee, which shall act in its own name and not in that of WSFS.

**Section 7:** Every Worldcon Committee shall include the following notice in each of its publications:

"World Science Fiction Society", "WSFS", "World Science Fiction Convention", "Worldcon", "NASFCON", "Science Fiction Achievement Award", and "Hugo Award" are service marks of the World Science Fiction Society, an unincorporated literary society.

**Section 8:** Each Worldcon Committee should dispose of surplus funds remaining after accounts are settled for the current Worldcon for the benefit of WSFS as a whole. Each Worldcon Committee shall submit an annual financial report, including a statement of income and expenses, to each WSFS Business Meeting after the Committee's selection through the first or second Business Meeting after its Worldcon, at its option, to which it will also submit a cumulative final financial report.

### Article II — Science Fiction Achievement Awards (the Hugo Awards)

**Section 1:** Selection of the Science Fiction Achievement Awards, known as the Hugo Awards, shall be made as follows in the subsequent Sections of this Article.

**Section 2:** *Best Novel:* A science fiction or fantasy story of forty thousand (40,000) words or more appearing for the first time during the previous calendar year. A work originally appearing in a language other than English shall also be eligible in the year in which it is first issued in English translation. A story, once it has appeared in English, may thus be eligible only once. Publication date, or cover date in the case of a dated periodical, takes precedence over copyright date. A serial takes its appearance to be the date of the last installment. Individual stories appearing as a series are eligible only as individual stories and are not eligible taken together under the title of the series. An author may withdraw a version of a work from consideration if the author feels that the version is not representative of what said author wrote. The Worldcon Committee may relocate a story into a more appropriate category if it feels that it is necessary, provided that the story is within five thousand (5,000) words of the new category limits.

**Section 3:** *Best Novella:* The rules shall be the same as those for Best Novel, with length between seventeen thousand five hundred (17,500) and forty thousand (40,000) words.

**Section 4:** *Best Novels:* The rules shall be the same as those for Best Novel, with length between seven thousand five hundred (7,500) and seventeen thousand five hundred (17,500) words.

**Section 5:** *Best Short Story:* The rules shall be the same as those for Best Novel, with length less than seven thousand five hundred (7,500) words.

**Section 6:** *Best Non-Fiction Book:* Any non-fictional work whose subject is the field of science fiction or fantasy or fandom appearing for the first time in book form during the previous calendar year.

**Section 7:** *Best Dramatic Presentation:* Any production in any medium of dramatized science fiction or fantasy which has been publicly presented for the first time in its present dramatic form during the previous calendar year. In the case of individual programs presented as a series, each program is individually eligible, but the series as a whole is not eligible; however, a sequence of installments constituting a single dramatic unit may be considered as a single program (eligible in the year of the final installment).

**Section 8:** *Best Professional Editor:* The editor of any professional publication devoted primarily to science fiction or fantasy during the previous calendar year. A professional publication is one which had an average persons run of at least ten thousand (10,000) copies per issue.

**Section 9:** *Best Professional Artist:* An illustrator whose work has appeared in a professional publication in the field of science fiction or fantasy during the previous calendar year.

**Section 10:** *Best Semiprozine:* Any generally available non-professional publication devoted to science fiction or fantasy which has published four (4) or more issues, at least one (1) of which appeared in the previous calendar year, and which in the previous calendar year met at least two (2) of the following criteria: (1) had an average persons run of at least one thousand (1,000) copies per issue, (2) paid its contributors and/or staff in other than copies of the publication, (3) provided at least half the income of any one person, (4) had at least fifteen percent (15%) of its total space occupied by advertising, or (5) announced itself to be a semiprozine.

**Section 11: Best Fanzine:** Any generally available non-professional publication devoted to science fiction, fantasy, or related subjects which has published four (4) or more issues, at least one (1) of which appeared in the previous calendar year, and which does not qualify as a serialazine.

**Section 12: Best Fan Writer:** Any person whose writing has appeared in serializations or fanzines.

**Section 13: Best Fan Artist:** An artist or cartoonist whose work has appeared through publication in serializations or fanzines or through other public display during the previous calendar year. Any person whose name appears on the final Hugo Awards ballot for a given year under the Professional Artist category shall not be eligible in the Fan Artist category for that year.

**Section 14: Extended Eligibility:** In the event that a potential Hugo Award nominee receives extremely limited distribution in the year of its first publication or presentation, its eligibility may be extended for an additional year by a three-fourths (3/4) vote of the intervening Business Meeting of WSFS.

**Section 15: Additional Category:** Not more than one special category may be created by the current Worldcon Committee with nomination and voting to be the same as for the permanent categories. The Worldcon Committee is not required to create any such category; such actions by a Worldcon Committee should be under exceptional circumstances only, and the special category created by one Worldcon Committee shall not be binding on following Committees. Awards created under this Section shall be considered to be Science Fiction Achievement Awards, or Hugo Awards.

**Section 16: Name and Design:** The Hugo Award shall continue to be standardized on the rocket ship design of Jack McKeith and Ben Jacob. Each Worldcon Committee may select its own choice of base design. The name (Hugo Award) and the design shall not be extended to any other award.

**Section 17: No Award:** At the discretion of an individual Worldcon Committee, if the lack of nominations or final votes in a specific category shows a marked lack of interest in that category on the part of the voters, the Award in that category shall be cancelled for that year. In addition, the entry "No Award" shall be mandatory in each category of Hugo Award on the final ballot. In any event, No Award shall be given whenever the total number of valid ballots cast for a specific category is less than twenty-five percent (25%) of the total number of final Award ballots (excluding those cast for No Award) received.

**Section 18: Nominations:** Selection of nominees for the final Award voting shall be done by a poll conducted by the Worldcon Committee, in which each member of either the administering or the immediately preceding Worldcon shall be allowed to make five (5) equally weighted nominations in every category. Nominations shall be solicited for, and the final Award ballot shall list, only the Hugo Awards and the John W. Campbell Memorial Award for Best New Writer. Assignment to the proper category of nominees nominated in more than one category, and eligibility of nominees, shall be determined by the Worldcon Committee. No nominee shall appear on the final Award ballot if it received fewer nominations than the lesser of either five percent (5%) of the number of nomination ballots cast in that category, or the number of nominations received by the third-place nominee in that category.

**Section 19: Notification and Acceptance:** Worldcon Committees shall use reasonable efforts to notify the nominees, or in the case of deceased or incapacitated persons, their heirs, assigns, or legal guardians, in each category prior to the release of such information. Each nominee shall be asked at that time to either accept or decline the nomination.

**Section 20: Voting:** Final Award voting shall be by mail, with ballots sent only to WSFS members. Final Award ballots shall include name, signature, address, and membership-number spaces to be filled in by the voter. Final Award ballots shall standardize nominees given in each category to not more than five (5) (six (6) in the case of no vote) plus "No Award." The Committee shall, on or with the final ballot, designate, for each nominee in the printed fiction categories, one or more books, anthologies, or magazines in which the nominee appeared (including the book publisher or magazine issue date(s)). Voters shall indicate the order of their preference for the nominees in each category.

**Section 21: Tallying:** Counting of all votes shall be the responsibility of the Worldcon Committee, which is responsible for all matters concerning the Awards. In each category, votes shall first be tallied by the voter's first choices. If no majority is then obtained, the nominee who places last in the initial tallying shall be eliminated and the ballot listing it as first choice shall be redistributed on the basis of those ballots' second choices. This process shall be repeated until a majority-vote winner is obtained. The complete numerical vote totals, including all preliminary tallies for first, second, ... places, shall be made public by the Worldcon Committee within ninety (90) days after the Worldcon.

**Section 22: Exclusion:** No member of the current Worldcon Committee nor any publications closely connected with a member of the Committee shall be eligible for an Award. However, should the Committee delegate all authority under this Article to a Subcommittee whose decisions are irrevocable by the Worldcon Committee, then this exclusion shall apply to members of the Subcommittee only.

### Article III — Future Worldcon Selection

**Section 1:** WSFS shall choose the location and Committee of the Worldcon to be held three (3) years from the date of the current Worldcon. Voting shall be by mail or ballot cast at the current Worldcon with run-off ballot as described in Article II, Section 21, and shall be limited to WSFS members who have paid at least twenty U.S. dollars (\$20.00) or equivalent towards membership in the Worldcon whose site is being selected. The current Worldcon Committee shall administer the mail balloting, collect the advance membership fees, and turn over those funds to the winning Committee before the end of the current Worldcon. The minimum voting fee can be modified for a particular year by unanimous agreement of the current Worldcon Committee and all bidding committees who have filed before the deadline. The site-selection voting totals shall be announced at the Business Meeting and published in the first or second Progress Report of the winning Committee, with the by-mail and in-convention votes distinguished.

**Section 2:** Site-selection ballots shall include name, signature, address, and membership-number spaces to be filled in by the voter. Each site-selection ballot shall list the options "None of the above" and "No preference" and provide for write-in votes, after the ballots and with equal prominence. The minimum fee in feet shall be listed on all site-selection ballots.

**Section 3:** The name and address information shall be separated from the ballots and the ballots counted only at the Worldcon with two (2) witnesses from each bidding committee allowed to observe. Each bidding committee may make a record of the name and address of every voter. A ballot voted with first or only choice for "No preference" shall be ignored for site selection. A ballot voted with lower than first choice for "No preference" shall be ignored if all higher choices on the ballot have been eliminated in preferential tallying. "None of the above" shall be treated as a bid for tallying. If it wins, the duty of site selection shall devolve on the Business Meeting of the current Worldcon. If the Business Meeting is unable to decide by the end of the Worldcon, the Committee for the following Worldcon shall make the selection without undue delay. When a site and Committee are chosen by a Business Meeting or Worldcon Committee, they are not restricted by region or other qualifications and the choice of an out-of-rotation site shall not affect the regional rotation for subsequent years. If no bids qualify to be on the ballot, the selection shall proceed as though "None of the above" had won.

**Section 4:** Bids from prospective Committees shall be allowed on the ballot by the current Worldcon Committee only upon presentation of adequate evidence of an agreement with the proposed sites' facilities, such as a conditional contract or a letter of agreement. To be eligible for site selection, a bidding committee must state the rules under which the Worldcon Committee will operate, including a specification of the term of office of their chief executive officer or officers and the conditions and procedures for the selection and replacement of such officer or officers. Written copies of these rules must be made available by the bidding committee to any member of WSFS on request. The aforementioned rules and agreements, along with an announcement of intent to bid, must be filed with the Committee that will administer the voting no later than the close of the previous Worldcon for a Worldcon bid, and as set by the administering convention but no earlier than the close of the corresponding Worldcon voting for a prospective NASFiC bid.

- Section 5:** To ensure equitable distribution of sites, North America is divided into three (3) regions as follows: *Western:* Baja California, New Mexico, Colorado, Wyoming, Montana, Saskatchewan, and all states and provinces westward including Hawaii, Alaska, the Yukon, and the Northwest Territories; *Central:* Central America, the islands of the Caribbean, Mexico (except as above), and all states and provinces between the Western and Eastern regions; and *Eastern:* Florida, Georgia, South Carolina, North Carolina, Virginia, West Virginia, Pennsylvania, New York, Quebec, and all states and provinces eastward including the District of Columbia, St. Pierre et Miquelon, Bermuda, and the Bahamas. Worldcon sites shall rotate in the order Western, Central, Eastern region. A site shall be ineligible if it is within sixty (60) miles of the site at which selection occurs.
- Section 6:** A Worldcon site outside of North America may be selected by a majority vote at any Worldcon. In the event of such outside Worldcon being selected, there shall be a NASFiC in the region whose turn it would have normally been, to be held in the same year as the overseas Worldcon, with rotation skipping that region the following year. Selection of the NASFiC shall be by the identical procedure to the Worldcon selection except as provided below or elsewhere in this Constitution: (1) voting shall be by written ballot administered by the then-current Worldcon, if there is no NASFiC following the Worldcon that year, or by the NASFiC, if there is one following the Worldcon, with ballots cast at the administering convention and with only members of the administering convention allowed to vote; (2) bids are restricted to sites in the appropriate zone; and (3) the proposed NASFiC voting fee can be set by unanimous agreement of the prospective candidates that file with the administering Committee.

**Section 7:** Each Worldcon Committee shall provide a reasonable opportunity for *bons fide* bidding committees for the Worldcon to be selected one year hence to make presentations.

**Section 8:** With sites being selected three (3) years in advance, there are at least three selected current or future Worldcon Committees at all times. If one of these should be unable to perform its duties, the other selected current or future Worldcon Committee whose site is closest to the site of the one unable to perform its duties shall determine what action to take, by consulting the Business Meeting or by mail poll of WSFS if there is sufficient time, or by decision of the Committee if there is not sufficient time.

#### Article IV — Constitution and Powers of the Business Meeting

**Section 1:** Any proposal to amend the Constitution of WSFS shall require for passage a majority of all the votes cast on the question at the Business Meeting of WSFS at which it is first debated, and also ratification by a simple majority vote of those members present and voting at a Business Meeting of WSFS held at the Worldcon immediately following that at which the amendment was first approved. Failure to ratify in the manner described shall void the proposed amendment.

**Section 2:** Any change to the Constitution of WSFS shall take effect at the end of the Worldcon at which such change is ratified, except that no change imposing additional costs or financial obligations upon Worldcon Committees shall be binding upon any Committee already selected at the time when it takes effect.

**Section 3:** The conduct of the affairs of WSFS shall be determined by this Constitution together with all ratified amendments hereto and such Standing Rules as the Business Meeting shall adopt for its own governance.

**Section 4:** Business Meetings of WSFS shall be held at advertised times at each Worldcon. The current Worldcon Committee shall provide the Presiding Officer and Staff for each Meeting. Meetings shall be conducted in accordance with *Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised*, the Standing Rules, and such other rules as may be published by the Committee in advance. The quorum for the Business Meeting shall be twelve members of the Society physically present.

**Section 5:** Each future selected Worldcon Committee shall designate an official representative to the Business Meeting to answer questions about their Worldcon.

**Section 6:** There shall be a Mark Registration and Protection Committee of WSFS. The Mark Registration and Protection Committee shall consist of one (1) member appointed to serve at the pleasure of each future selected Worldcon Committee and each of the two (2) immediately preceding Worldcon Committees, one (1) non-voting member appointed to serve at the pleasure of each future selected NASFiC Committee and for each Committee of a NASFiC held in the previous two years, and nine (9) members elected three (3) each year to staggered three-year terms by the Business Meeting. Of the nine elected members, no more than three may be residing at the time of election, in any single North American region, as defined in Article III, Section 5. Newly elected members take their seats, and the terms of office ends for elected and appointed members whose terms expire that year, at the end of the Business Meeting. If vacancies occur in elected memberships in the committee, the remainder of the position's term may be filled by the Business Meeting, and until then temporarily filled by the Committee. There will be a meeting of the Mark Registration and Protection Committee at each Worldcon, at a time and place announced at the Business Meeting. The Mark Registration and Protection Committee shall determine and elect its own officers.

**Section 7:** The Mark Registration and Protection Committee shall be responsible for registration and protection of the marks used by or under the authority of WSFS.

**Section 8:** The Mark Registration and Protection Committee shall submit to the Business Meeting at each Worldcon a report of its activities since the previous Worldcon, including a statement of income and expense.

**Section 9:** Except as otherwise provided in this Constitution, any committee or other position created by a Business Meeting shall lapse at the end of the next following Business Meeting that does not vote to continue it.

**Section 10:** The Constitution of WSFS, together with an explanation of proposed changes approved but not yet ratified, and the Standing Rules shall be printed by the current Worldcon Committee, distributed with the Hugo nomination ballots, and distributed to all WSFS members in attendance at the Worldcon upon registration.

## Standing Rules for the Governance of the World Science Fiction Society Business Meeting

**Rule 1:** Business of the Annual Meeting of the World Science Fiction Society shall be transacted in one or more sessions called Preliminary Business Meetings and one or more Main Business Meetings. The first session shall be designated as a Preliminary Business Meeting. At least eighteen (18) hours shall elapse between the final Preliminary Business Meeting and the one or more Main Business Meetings. One Business Meeting session shall also be designated the Site-Selection Meeting where site-selection business shall be the special order of business.

**Rule 2:** The Preliminary Business Meetings may not pass, reject, or ratify amendments to the Constitution, but the motions to "object to consideration", to "table", to "divide the question", to "postpone" to a later part of the Preliminary Business Meetings, and to "refer" to a committee to report later in the same Annual Business Meeting are in order when allowed by *Roberts' Rules*. The Preliminary Business Meetings may also suspend any of the rules of debate included in these Standing Rules. Motions may be amended or consolidated at these Meetings with the consent of the original maker. Absence from these Meetings of the original maker shall constitute consent to amendment and to such interpretations of the intent of the motion as the Presiding Officer or the Parliamentarian may in good faith attempt.

**Rule 3:** (a) Nominations from the floor for election to the Mark Registration and Protection Committee shall be allowed at each Preliminary Business Meeting. To be listed on the ballot, a nominee must, before the end of the last Preliminary Business Meeting, submit to the Presiding Officer, in writing, their consent and place of residence.

(b) Elections to the Mark Registration and Protection Committee shall be a special order of business at a Main Business Meeting. Voting shall be by written preferential ballot with write-ins allowed. Write-in candidates who do not submit their written consent and place of residence before the ballots are collected shall be ignored. The ballot shall list, with each nominee, their place of residence and shall omit all nominees who can not be elected due to the zonal residence restrictions in the Constitution. In interpreting said zonal residence restrictions, members of the Committee shall represent their zone of residence at the time of their election for their entire 3-year term. I.e., the phrase "at the time of election" in the Constitution means "at the time at which they were elected."

(c) The first vote filled will be filled by equal preferential ballot procedures. That person's votes, as well as votes for any other nominee who has now become ineligible (because a zone's quota is filled), will be eliminated, and the procedures will be restarted from the beginning. This continues until all places are filled.

**Rule 4:** The deadline for the submission of non-privileged new business shall be two hours after the official opening of the Workday or eighteen hours before the first Preliminary Business Meeting, whichever is later. The Presiding Officer may accept otherwise qualified motions submitted after the deadline, but all such motions shall be placed at the end of the agenda. The Presiding Officer will reject as out of order any proposal or motion which is obviously illegal or hopelessly incoherent in a grammatical sense.

**Rule 5:** Six (6) identical, legible copies of all proposals for non-privileged new business shall be submitted to the Presiding Officer before the deadline given in Rule 4 above. All proposals or motions of more than seventy-five (75) words shall be accompanied by at least one hundred (100) additional identical, legible copies for distribution to and intelligent discussion by the Meeting attendees unless they have actually been distributed to the attendees at the Workday by the Workday Committee. All proposals or motions shall be legibly signed by the maker and at least one second.

**Rule 6:** Any main motion presented to a Business Meeting shall contain a short title.

**Rule 7:** Debate on all motions of less than fifty (50) words shall be limited to six (6) minutes. Debate on all other motions shall be limited to twenty (20) minutes; if a question is divided, these time criteria and time limits shall be applied to each section. Time shall be allowed equally to both sides of a question. Time spent on points of order or other neutral matters arising from a motion shall be charged one half to each side. The Preliminary Business Meeting may alter these limits for a particular motion by a majority vote.

**Rule 8:** Debate on all amendments to main motions shall be limited to five (5) minutes, to be divided as above.

**Rule 9:** Unless it is an amendment by substitution, an amendment to a main motion may be changed only under those provisions allowing modification through the consent of the maker of the amendment, i.e., second-order amendments are not allowed except in the case of a substitute as the first-order amendment.

**Rule 10:** A person speaking to a motion may not immediately offer a motion to close debate or to refer to a committee. Motions to close debate will not be accepted until at least one speaker from each side of the question has been heard, nor will they be accepted within one minute of the expiration of the time allowed for debate on that motion. The motion to table shall require a two-thirds vote for adoption.

**Rule 11:** In keeping with the intent of the limitations on debate time, the motion to postpone indefinitely shall not be allowed.

**Rule 12:** A request for a division of the house (an exact count of the votes) will be honored only when requested by at least ten percent (10%) of those present in the house.

**Rule 13:** Motions, other than Constitutional amendments awaiting ratification, may be carried forward from one year to the next only by being postponed definitely or by being referred to a committee.

**Rule 14:** These Standing Rules, and any others adopted by a Preliminary Business Meeting, may be suspended for an individual item of business by a two-thirds majority vote.

**Rule 15:** The sole purpose of a request for a "point of information" is to ask the Presiding Officer or the Parliamentarian for his opinion of the effect of a motion or for his guidance as to the correct procedure to follow. Attempts to circumvent the rules of debate under the guise of "points of information" or "points of order" will be dealt with as "dilatory motions" as specified in *Roberts' Rules of Order, Newly Revised*.

**Rule 16:** Citations to Articles, Sections, or specific sentences of the Society Constitution or Standing Rules are for the sake of easy reference only. They do not form a part of the substantive area of a motion. Correct enumeration of Articles, Sections, and Rules and correct insertions and deletions will be provided by the Secretary of the Business Meeting when the Constitution and Standing Rules are certified to the next Workday. Therefore, motions from the floor to renumber or correct citations will not be in order. Unless otherwise ordered by the Business Meeting, the Secretary will adjust any other Section of the Constitution and Standing Rules equally affected by an amendment to the Constitution, and will adjust any other section of the Standing Rules equally affected by an amendment to the Standing Rules. Resolutions and rulings of continuing effect may be repealed or amended at subsequent Business Meetings by majority vote without notice, and shall be automatically repealed or amended by applicable amendments to the Constitution or Standing Rules and by conflicting resolutions and rulings subsequently adopted or made. Any correction of fact to the Minutes or to the Constitution or Standing Rules as published should be brought to the attention of the Secretary and to that of the next available Business Meeting as soon as they are discovered.

**Rule 17:** At all sessions of the Business Meeting, the hall will be divided into smoking and non-smoking sections by the Presiding Officer of the Meeting.

**Rule 18:** The motion to adjourn the Main Meeting will be in order after the amendments to the Constitution proposed at the last Workday Business Meeting for ratification at the current Business Meeting have been acted upon.

**Rule 19:** At the Site-Selection Meeting fifteen (15) minutes shall be allotted to each of the future selected Workdays. During the first five (5) minutes, their representative may make such presentations as they may wish. The remaining time shall be available for questions to be asked about the representative's Workdays. Questions may be submitted in writing at any previous session of the Business Meeting and if so submitted shall have priority (if the submitter is present at Question Time and still wishes to ask the question) except that under no circumstances may a person ask a second question as long as any person wishes to ask a first question. Questions are limited to fifteen (15) seconds and answers to two (2) minutes. Any of these time limits may be adjusted for any presentation or question by majority vote. If time permits at the Site-Selection Meeting, bidders for the convention one year beyond the date of the Workday being voted upon will be allotted five (5) minutes each to make such presentations as they may wish.

**Rule 20:** These Standing Rules shall continue in effect until altered, suspended, or rescinded by the action of any Business Meeting. Amendment, suspension, or rescission of these Standing Rules may be done in the form of a motion from the floor of any Business Meeting made by any member of the Business Meeting, and such action will become effective immediately after the end of the Business Meeting at which it was passed.

## Business Passed On to ConFiction

Items 1 through 4 below have been given first passage, and will become part of the Constitution if ratified at ConFiction.

**Item 1: Short Title: NASFIC Shipping**

MOVED, to amend the WSFS Constitution by adding the following at the end of Article III, Section 6:  
“(4) If ‘None of the Above’ wins on the first ballot, then no NASFIC shall be held and all voting fees shall be refunded.”

*Under the present provisions, if “None of the Above” beats all the candidates for NASFIC, then the Business Meeting gets to choose the NASFIC site and committee. If this amendment is ratified, there would, instead, be no NASFIC.*

**Item 2: Short Title: Additional Financial Reports**

MOVED, to amend the WSFS Constitution by replacing the last sentence of Article I, Section 8, with the following:

“Each Workday Committee shall submit an annual financial report, including a statement of income and expenses, to each WSFS Business Meeting after the Committee’s selection. Each Workday Committee shall submit a report on its cumulative surpluses at the next Business Meeting after its Workday. In the event of a surplus, subsequent annual financial reports regarding the disbursement of said Workday surplus shall be filed at each year’s Business Meeting by the Workday committee, or any alternative organizational entity established to oversee and disburse that surplus, until the surplus is totally expended or an amount equal to the original surplus has been disbursed.

*This would require reports from a Workday committee and it has disposed of an amount of money equal to its surplus coming out of its convention.*

**Item 3: Short Title: Membership Cut-Off for Hugo Nominating**

MOVED, to amend Article II, Section 18, first sentence, of the WSFS Constitution by inserting after the words “each member of the administering or the immediately preceding Workdays” the words “as of December 31st of the previous calendar year”.

*This motion provides a definite cut-off date for eligibility to nominate for the Hugo. It will make administering the Hugo awards easier and give members notice of how early they need to be sure they are nominated. In addition, given the usual timing of nomination ballot distribution, it would make casual nomination by those sending in a supporting membership fee with their nomination ballot impossible. They would have to already be a member of the administering or previous Workday when they nominate.*

**Item 4: Short Title: Membership Fees**

MOVED to amend Article I, Section 5, of the WSFS Constitution by striking the words “This fee must not exceed the minimum voting fee” at the beginning of sentence number 4 and inserting in place thereof “This fee must not exceed 2 (two) times the voting fee”.

*This motion changes the ratio between the usual initial convention fee and the site selection voting fee. It will tend to increase the initial attending fee, reduce the current surpluses in attendance fees, and reduce the upward pressure on the voting fee.*

**Item 5: Report of the WSFS Mark Registration and Protection Committee**
