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

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CONFRANCISCO EXPANDS TO FIVE DAYS

A Switch in Hotels



In July of 1990, approximately six weeks before the site selection vote at ConFiction in The Hague, the Marriott Hotel notified the SF in '93 committee that Ford Motor Company was prepared, cash in hand, to book the hotel from August 25 through September 4, 1993. Through the sales representative handling the SF in '93 account at that time, the Marriott asked if the committee was prepared to exercise their option of first refusal. Because the vote had not taken place and because nobody on the committee had the kind of money required to gamble and put down the required deposit, we regretfully gave up our option. We were then under the impression that Ford needed only the sleeping rooms and that our function space reservation remained intact. Much, much later we discovered that the sales representative who assured us of this had been in error on this aspect of the situation.

For other, unrelated reasons, this sales representative subsequently left the account and turned it over to a supervisor. The committee's new sales representative promised to do all he could to get sufficient sleeping rooms for our requirements and, in fact, did offer a projected upgrade of room allocations for the time period involving ConFrancisco.

Thus reassured, the SF in '93 committee then proceeded to finish their campaign on the basis of these understandings with the Marriott. The committee was absolutely convinced that not only did we have sleeping rooms -- perhaps not as many as we would have liked to have had, but enough -- but also we had function space galore.

A two-week sales conference is a long time for people to be away from home; around the middle of such a marathon session, people will be tired and expectably will be ducking out, thus releasing the rooms ConFrancisco needed. However, as Ford began sending program specifications in the course of their own contract finalization process, the scope and magnitude of the problem this presented to ConFrancisco became appallingly clear.

Ford is not running a single sales conference. Ford is running a series of sales conferences, each lasting three or four days, and they will have groups of people coming in waves, each group fresh and rested, bright-eyed and eager to attend every meeting and every seminar. Ford has engaged all the Marriott's meeting and function space, plus space at sites all through the hotel area of San Francisco. This is, in other words, a major convention event even in the eyes of San Francisco convention suppliers, who have just about seen it all by now.

The ConFrancisco Hotel Liaison inquired about the possibility of Ford's moving this major event back just a few days. No chance. Other people, in the meantime, had come in and booked space behind Ford and Ford had, literally, no room left for maneuvering. If the full situation had been known right from the first, perhaps something could have been worked out so Ford and ConFrancisco could have co-existed. This avenue of approach was cut off, however, because officially ConFrancisco did not even exist in late July of 1990; thus, reasonably and realistically, Ford had no reason to accommodate an organization that was just a maybe.

Well, what do people do when they want to rent a hall so they can give a party and get the door slammed in their faces?

The ConFrancisco group began scrambling like mad. Back in July of 1990, we had formulated contingency plans just in case the worst happened; these plans had been set aside when it appeared this was not going to be the case. Now that our house of cards was tumbling about our ears, it was back to Plan B.

The Facilities Committee quickly contacted the Parc Fifty Five, one of the nearby hotels they had been planning to use as an overflow hotel, and reserved the whole thing -- rooms and every inch of function space they owned. The committee did the same thing at Le Meridien, the hotel just around the corner from the Marriott. The committee also reserved extra function space and programming rooms at the

Moscone. Plan B became a reality. The Parc Fifty-Five and Le Meridien became Con-Francisco's new main hotels.

When a problem arises -- anything from something as trivial as our picking up the phone just as the caller hangs up to the Con-Francisco committee watching years of planning go right down the drain -- people go through a predictable cycle of emotions. First comes denial -- oh, no, can't be, not us. Then comes anger -- I'll find the nearest neck and wring it. Then, eventually, comes resignation -- it really happened. And we have to deal with it.

Believe us, we've gone through the entire cycle of denial, anger, etc., and even found a few more steps along the way. None of this did a speck of good until we got through it and accepted the problem. Only then, could we start working to solve it.

As far as we know, this is the first time in WorldCon history that a committee has had its main hotel -- the one they campaigned on -- yanked out from under them by degrees and the full and appalling reality not been made clear until four months after the vote. Also, as far as we know, this is the first time in WorldCon history that a committee has taken a deep breath, hunkered down and begun

scratching to overcome an obstacle of such magnitude, and put on a world-class WorldCon in spite of everything.

You have the full story. We haven't held anything back, haven't white-washed anything, haven't lied or misrepresented anything. We were given some overly optimistic -- and, inadvertently, some erroneous -- information back when this was first happening in July of 1990, and we passed it along in good faith. The Marriott isn't any happier about any of this than we are; if Ford knew the problems they have caused us we're sure they would be sympathetic as well.


Can we ask for your help and support in making ConFrancisco into the convention we hoped for, despite what has happened? At this point it rests squarely in your hands -- the people who pre-supported SF in '93, the people who have bought memberships in Con-Francisco, the people who will buy memberships in ConFrancisco in the future -- as to whether we'll wind up working together or whether there will be hostility and blame and finger-pointing over a situation that, literally, nobody could help.

ABOUT THE LOGO

You will be seeing a lot of this logo over the next two and a half years. I would like to tell you a little bit about what it stands for and what it means. Sue Stone, the second chairman of the bid, designed the logo. The design was implemented by Vince Sanders. As stated in our advertising, one of the themes of this convention is to bridge the worlds of fandom, society, the universe and time. This logo is a visual representation of this theme. The Golden Gate Bridge is an internationally recognized symbol of San Francisco. The Mercator projection map was one that was popular in the Barbary Coast era of San Francisco's history. The bridge stretches across the entire land mass of the earth, encompassing all the countries. You may



notice that the center of the bridge intersects with the location of San Francisco. These elements represent our stated goal to bring fans from all over the world together in San Francisco.

San Francisco Science Fiction Conventions, Inc. has an eleven member Board of Directors. The BoD has appointed Terry Biffel to form and chair a committee to organize and operate the 1993 WorldCon. The BoD can remove and replace the Committee Chairman by a 3/4 vote (8 out of 11 directors). The Board of Directors also reviews and approves the Committee's Budget.

Responsibility for operation of the Convention resides entirely with the Committee. The General layout of the Committee is listed below. Any personnel appointed to date is listed also. Please note that nobody has the right to appoint anyone unless they are

The Special Events division includes the Masquerade, Hugo Ceremonies, Dances and other stage events. Although it is still a long time til the convention, planning on these has begun. We do want your input on what you'd like to see, what you'd like to be part of and what you'd rather we not do. Please let me hear from you on any of these areas. We also will need volunteers to help with all of these events and your participation is eagerly solicited.

MASQUERADE

The ConFrancisco masquerade will be held on Saturday night and should be one of the most spectacular events of the convention. We are assembling the most experienced backstage and technical crews we can find and plan on doing everything possible to make this a wonderful show for both the audience and the contestants. We already have Cat Devereaux for

Backstage, Gary Anderson for Operations, Jeff Berry, Janet Moe and the Minnesota Mafia for tech and Gordon Sunders for Catcher Chief. And that's just the beginning.

The masquerade will be run on the division system (Junior Costumer, Novice, Journeyman, Master) with judging for Original costumes and Recreation costumes. There will be both presentation judging and workmanship judging. All entries will be by pre-registration only.

Don't Look Now, But ...

There's a Convention in your Computer!

There's a major convention going on right now. Anyone can attend. You'll meet people who write science fiction and fantasy; professionals in the movie and TV industries; artists and fans; reviewers and publishers. You can see pictures and artwork, pick up copies of articles and reviews, and snoop around for books to complete your collection. You can make new friends and meet old ones. In fact, you can do just about anything you'd do at any other convention.

You can come to this convention as often as you like. All you have to do is fire up your computer and log into the **Science Fiction and Fantasy Forum** on **CompuServe**.

CompuServe Information Service is the largest commercial computer network in the world, with over half a million subscribers. Any computer, word processor, or terminal can connect with **CompuServe**, as long as it can use a modem to connect it to phone lines. **CompuServe** has a network of phone numbers all over the country; over 80% of the phones in the USA can reach **CompuServe** with a no-toll local call.

The **Science Fiction and Fantasy Forum** has three parts. The **Message Board** is divided into sections for each special interest. Sections include Star Trek, Science Fiction Literature, Fantasy Literature, Publishers' Corner, Science Fact, The Con Suite, McCaffrey's Pern (tm), Science Fiction/Fantasy Film, Science Fiction/Fantasy Television, British Media SF, The Weekly Book Chat, The Writing Workshop, Conventions/Fandom, and a SFWA (closed) section. You can read the messages in any section and reply to them; your reply is attached to the original messages to form a thread. If someone posts a message for you, you'll be notified when you enter the Forum. You can post

messages to any of the professionals who use the Forum, or any other member, on any subject.

Browsing the **Libraries** will show you multiple author stories written by Forum members (such as our very own "Sweet Savage Star Trek" – a parody of ST:TNG); High-resolution GIF (Graphic Interchange Format) picture files can be downloaded from several of the Libraries, and software to view these files is free for the downloading. Interesting message threads and conference transcripts are archived here for you to read. Computer programs are also stored in the Libraries.

Finally, you can have real-time conversations with other users in the **Conference Rooms**. When you're in a Conference Room, the lines you type come up on everyone else's screen with your name in front. Conferences devoted to Star Trek and Beauty and the Beast are held every Monday evening; a conference devoted to Anne McCaffrey's Pern universe is held every Saturday evening; and our informal weekly "**The Hot/Tub**" conference is held every Thursday evening. There are other informal conferences held during the week.

CompuServe is a subscription service; it costs you \$1.50 a month plus \$6.50 per hour (in increments of a minute, at 300 bps) of online time to use it. Since most users don't have to pay phone company toll charges to log in, CompuServe rates are cheaper than a long distance call.

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

ON THE IMPORTANT SUBJECTS OF LODGING AND FACILITIES

ConFrancisco is finalizing negotiations with the Parc Fifty Five and Le Meridien hotels, both in the heart of downtown San Francisco. They provide us with room blocks totaling 1,250 guest rooms, 8 restaurants and lounges, full wheelchair access, and 33,000 square feet of function space. Both hotels are offering every consideration in matching the proposal terms the convention had from its original hotel, the San Francisco Marriott.

The Parc Fifty Five (formerly the Remada Renaissance) is one block from Union Square and one block from the Powell Street Cable Cars. As well, it is one block from the major shopping center of the city, featuring Emporium Capwell, Macy's, San Francisco Centre and Nordstrom. This hotel features an extensive lounge area ideal for fannish relaxation, a Business Service Center, a multilingual staff, a health club, and convenience safes in each room.

Nearby is Le Meridien, the hotel for those



who want to room on the doorstep of the convention center. This "French touch" hotel includes such features as multilingual staff, access to health and tennis clubs, four-star French cuisine, as well as nightly turndown service with chocolate.

Besides our main hotels, room blocks are being negotiated with Holiday Inn (Union Square and Financial District) and the San Francisco Hilton. Further blocks will be arranged with additional hotels shortly.

Within easy walking distance of our hotels is the Moscone Convention center, where we have commitments for the space coming available in its expansion program. Meeting Halls D and E will give us over 138,600 and 42,700 square feet respectively... not to mention the North Meeting Rooms, with over 16,000 square feet capable of being divided up into 11 separate rooms. We are also planning the best use for the nearly-completed Esplanade Ballroom, with over 42,000 square feet.

Our site is easily accessible from Highways 80, 101 and 280, with nine parking facilities within two blocks of the Moscone. And, of course, public transit (bus and Bay Area Rapid Transit) is another easy option. All these facilities are in the thick of San Francisco's downtown district. The pride of San Francisco's stores and restaurants and the excitement of the vibrant South of Market district can be found within a few minutes' walk of our hotels or the Moscone, as well as attractions such as Chinatown, Union Square and the Cable Cars.

Supporting members receive all generally-distributed ConFrancisco publications (including the Program Book and any progress reports published after the purchase of the membership), may nominate and vote for the 1993 Hugo Awards, may nominate for the 1994 Hugo Awards, and may (subject to paying an additional voting fee) vote on the 1996 Worldcon site-selection. Supporting members may not attend the convention without converting their membership into an attending membership. If you voted on the 1993 site-selection, you are automatically a supporting member of ConFrancisco.

Attending members receive all of the privileges of Supporting members, plus the right to attend the convention. Supporting members may convert to attending by paying a conversion fee. If you voted on the 1993 site-selection, use the columns labeled Voted: Yes above. 



Thank you everyone who voted for us. Thank you to all our presupporters. Your \$5 donations paid for many of the parties, kept all of our credit cards from collapsing early on and, when all the conventional wisdom told us no one would vote for the bid, that we had no chance, it was the ever-growing mailing list of people willing to hand us money for our dream that gave us the courage to keep the faith.

So often in the rumor trail and the official documents of something this big, the real story and heroes got lost. I'd like to take a moment to make mention of some of the wonderfully crazy people who made ConFrancisco real. This isn't an "OFFICIAL" list, just a personal one from the crazy lady who started this whole mess.

First, thanks to Mr. Ray Feist. At the 1987 Baycon in San Jose, after watching me down three Rum-and-Cokes, Ray dared me to go for it, even offered to loan me the money to kick it off. The next morning I gathered 23 fans in my hotel room for the first meeting of the ConFrancisco bid committee. Don't ever, ever go drinking with Ray Feist. It can be dangerous.

Thanks to the people who put in dozens, in some cases hundreds of hours of slave labor to make this work: Sabre Crowe must have chopped enough vegetables, fruit and brownies to feed all our troops in Operation Desert Shield; Linda Crowe, whose gentle, patient, steady nature, purple everything and willingness to travel with me anywhere and tolerate my snoring, kept us from falling apart more than once; without Gail Sanders' dedication and willingness to make the most ridiculous deadlines for thousands of flyers, party planners and ads this bid would have had no chance at all, and we can never thank her enough; Judy Morman's sharp tongue and ability to say, politely, the nasty things we all felt at times but didn't have the guts to say, was the kind of pressure relief valve we couldn't have functioned without; Sasha and Ben Miller created our party format, made trips to Seattle and even Europe for the bid when no one else could,

Thanks also to the Chicago filkers who made our Sunday party at Boston so spectacular, and the fans in New Orleans who introduced us to the Cajun Cola and real southern hospitality and Keith, and Amy, and Loren, and Tom, and the dozens of you who'd show up, prep for the parties or clean up afterwards and have never even asked for a thank you, much less a committee post. It was often the difference between burnout and rejuvenation. To all of you, my deepest gratitude.

Thanks also to all the husbands, wives, kids and bosses who somehow stuck with us throughout the dementia of bidding a WorldCon. The over-limit charge cards, the absence of storage space (where else do you keep 20,000 styro coffee cups except the middle of the living room floor?), the total neglect of anything and anyone not directly related to the bid could have resulted in divorces even California courts might have found strange. Steve, Vince, Mindy, Lynx, Mike, Ron, Stone and all the rest - Thank you and we love you for it.

There's no way I can ever tell anyone all that Sue Stone meant to me as a friend, of to this committee. In my heart, this convention, and everything good that happens in it, will always be dedicated to her; for in ways impossible to explain, it all came, and will come, from her never-failing love for us, the world of Science Fiction, the community of fandom and from her willingness to give of that love by example, kindness and the kick in the ass I so often needed. She is missed each day of my life, and will be missed by us all each day of ConFrancisco.

Sue and I had made a pledge that each night of ConFrancisco, at sunset, we should drop whatever we were doing no matter what it was, and head up to the Marriott's 39th floor View Lounge. We'd watch the sun go down and the fog roll in, have a well-earned drink and toast to dreams made real. I'll be there. I invite all of you to join me. We'll lift one to dreams made real and to all those who helped make them so, both present and missed. I look forward to seeing you there.


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


