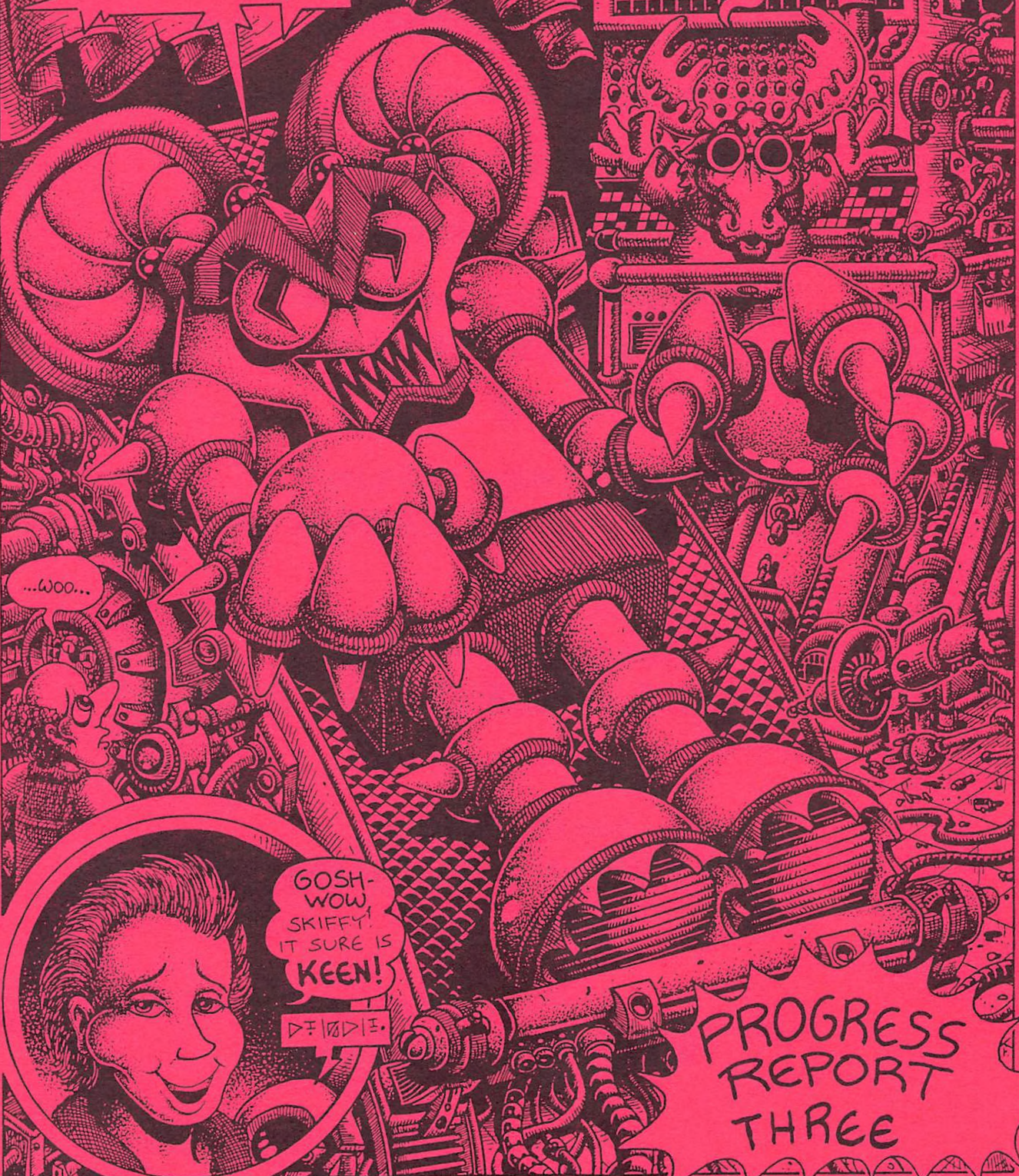

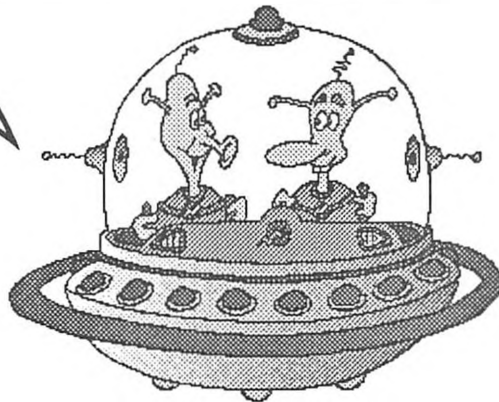

CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE

Why Settle for a Front Row Seat?

Next year we're going to hold one of the biggest World Science Fiction Conventions in history (who knows, maybe the biggest) and we need your help. In this issue, John Lorentz, our Volunteers coordinator, asks you to join us behind the scenes at L.A.con III.

You see, the Worldcon is different from some other large science fiction conventions. Everyone is a volunteer. We're all giving our time. Why? Because we discovered that working the con is actually the most interesting way to attend it.

This won't come as a surprise if you're the kind of person who's interested in knowing how a good movie is made. The fascination doesn't disappear with the last of the popcorn, but persists in dozens of questions. How did they set up the stunts? What company made the masks? Who wrote the score? Where did they film on location (and, didn't Galactic Headquarters look a little like the Santa Clarita water treatment plant?)

You get the same insight working the con, and you meet a lot of people. The first job I ever had at a Worldcon was editing Noreascon 2's daily newzine (Boston, 1980). I had an entry to everywhere and an introduction to everyone because of the work I was doing. And that was just my *first* job. Another year I helped with the program, talking to writers about their schedules. I volunteered for the same job in the Netherlands, working in "Programme Oops" (ConFiction, 1990), which lived up to its nickname only when a winner asked why her Hugo was coming apart!

In May, I saw an updated committee list with almost 100 people, many from out of town. We're glad to have their help. But we need *three times that many* for a successful Worldcon. There's a lot of interesting work to do before the con, and an incredible amount to do during the con.

Why settle for a seat in the audience when you can be in the cast!

Tradition

A year from now it will be our turn to host a con which has been held in seven different decades. We know many of its historical traditions, but do we know all of them? Let's not find out the hard way! If your group is a recurring part of the Worldcon — you give an award at the con, you host an event, you contribute in some way to the official program — now's the time to contact

L.A.con III if you aren't already in touch with the committee.

A couple of traditions we're already seeing to... We're happy to report that the Association of Science Fiction and Fantasy Artists (ASFA) will give its annual Chesley Awards in a ceremony at L.A.con III. I consider the Chesley Awards presentation a bonus for Worldcon attendees.

On the fannish side, we plan to host the Trans-Atlantic Fan Fund and Down-Under Fan Fund delegates for the core nights of the convention. (These two funds enable a representative to visit overseas fandom. TAFF exchanges between Europe and North America; DUFF exchanges between Australia/New Zealand and North America. For example, DUFF sent Chicago's Leah Zeldes and Dick Smith to Australia a couple of years ago, and sent Australian Alan Stewart to ConAdian in 1994.)

When Noreascon 3 was still in the bidding stages, Tony Lewis promised listeners at "the Fannish Inquisition" that Boston would make none of the mistakes other committees have made: "We will make all brand-new mistakes," he joked. It's a line I often remember. If we could do perfectly everything experience already has taught us should be done at a Worldcon, what an incredible feat that would be!

PROGRAMMING

Tempus fugits and we've begun more active work on the various aspects of the program for L.A.con III. An able team of fans is coming together to build the best program we possibly can, making use of programming talents both from Southern California and from around the country (perhaps by the next PR we'll have added help from around the world). We've got a committee of people in charge of general program development with other people specializing in fannish programs, gaming, filking, autographs, etc. While we'll be doing some things you've never seen before in the way of convention programming, we'll also have items people have come to expect: panels, *kaffeeklatsches*, autograph sessions, readings, and the like. But we hope to do them in ways and with people that will make everything fresh and interesting, even to the old convention hands who think (with good reason) that they've seen it all before.

One thing we especially want to do is tap the "outside world" for program participants not usually seen at conventions. These will be people with knowledge and something to say about a particular topic, be it science, craft, philosophy, art, writing, or whatever, but who may not be a part of the science fiction community.

We're always on the look out for good ideas. If you have any ideas for types of programs or for specific program items, please write to us at the convention postal or e-mail address. Don't be afraid to make suggestions. If there's something you haven't seen at a Worldcon and don't know why it hasn't been on the program before, it may be because no one's thought of it or we don't know how to make it work. Give us the benefit of your knowledge and ideas. We don't promise to use them all but we'd really like to hear them.

Hospital Station

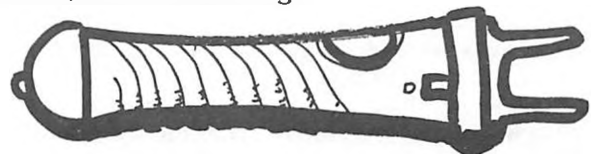
As described elsewhere in our Progress Reports, with James White as one of our Guests of Honor, how could we *not* have Sector General as a theme for the convention's Concourse area? And as the passage above describes, a recurring problem on board the station was where to sit when eating. After all, the species who populate different worlds are shaped differently, eat different foods, use different utensils and tableware, and generally have different customs about dining.

To illustrate this, L.A.con III is sponsoring a competition for individuals or groups to choose an alien species from Sector General or other popular science fiction books or films (eg: Klingons or Kzin) and set a table for them to dine at.

Tables should include place settings for four, including all appropriate plates, bowls, glassware, utensils, and table decorations (including table cloth or other covering). Entrants will have only a bare table to work from. Entrants should also provide a card that can be displayed at the end of their table naming the alien race, the source for that race (book or movie title, author, etc.), and describing the table items displayed. All entrants must register in advance with the Convention, naming the alien species for whom they are setting a table.

Settings will be on display in the Sector General section of the Concourse for the duration of the convention. Judging will be based on creativity, suitability, and correctness. Judges will include winners of the 1994 L.A. County Fair Table Setting Competition (Noel Wolfman, 1st place; Craig Miller & Genny Dazzo, 2nd place; and Fuzzy Pink Niven, 4th place).

Complete rules will be published in our next Progress Report or are available by writing to the L.A.con III address, Attn: Table Settings.



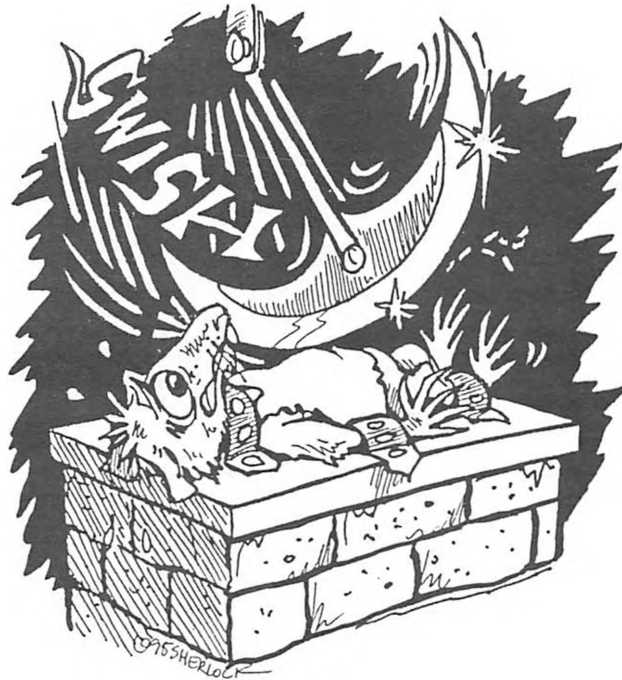


Multiple submissions are accepted; however, the entry fee covers one manuscript only. Because of possible limitations in scheduling, we can only guarantee that one submission per member will be workshopped. We ask that each manuscript be accompanied by a separate check in case it needs to be returned. Second and additional submissions will be scheduled on a space available basis. If submitting more than one entry, please specify the priority in which you want your manuscripts workshopped. Collaborative teams are treated as a single entity, except that each member of the team receives his/her own copies of their section's manuscripts.

Manuscripts may be either novels or short stories. For the first time, sections for screenplays and comics will be organized if sufficient interest is shown by the entrants.

Workshop requirements are:

1. Stories must be either science fiction, fantasy, gothic/horror, or have a fantastic element of some kind.
2. All submissions must be received at the Writers Workshop address no later than July 10, 1996.
3. Manuscript submissions can have up to 7,500 words (approximately 30 pages). Manuscripts should conform to professional submission standards.
4. Pieces longer than the maximum length must include a synopsis of the entire piece with a writing sample (the beginning of the piece is preferred). The synopsis counts as part of the 7,500 words.
5. Manuscripts must be accompanied by:
 - A. Your L.A.con III membership number or payment for a full attending membership, and
 - B. a check or money order in U.S. funds for \$25.00 (U.S. members), \$30.00 (Canadian members), or \$35.00 (overseas members).



Writers Workshop

The L.A.con III Writers Workshop begins accepting submissions in September 1995. This workshop is a mutual help group function for either experienced or beginning writers, based on the principle that good critiquing skills make good writing skills. It provides members the opportunity to have their manuscripts evaluated by selling authors who enjoy helping others grow as artists.

This is not a competition. Participants work in a quiet, secluded room to elaborate on story structure, logistics, and style of the entrants' submissions. Due to the critical nature of this workshop, it is not recommended for anyone under eighteen.

There is a nominal fee for entering that covers photocopying and postage costs. All manuscripts must be submitted in advance as there will be no on-the-spot reading for critiques. You will also need to be prepared to attend your assigned section, which may be scheduled any day of the convention. Each section lasts three hours.

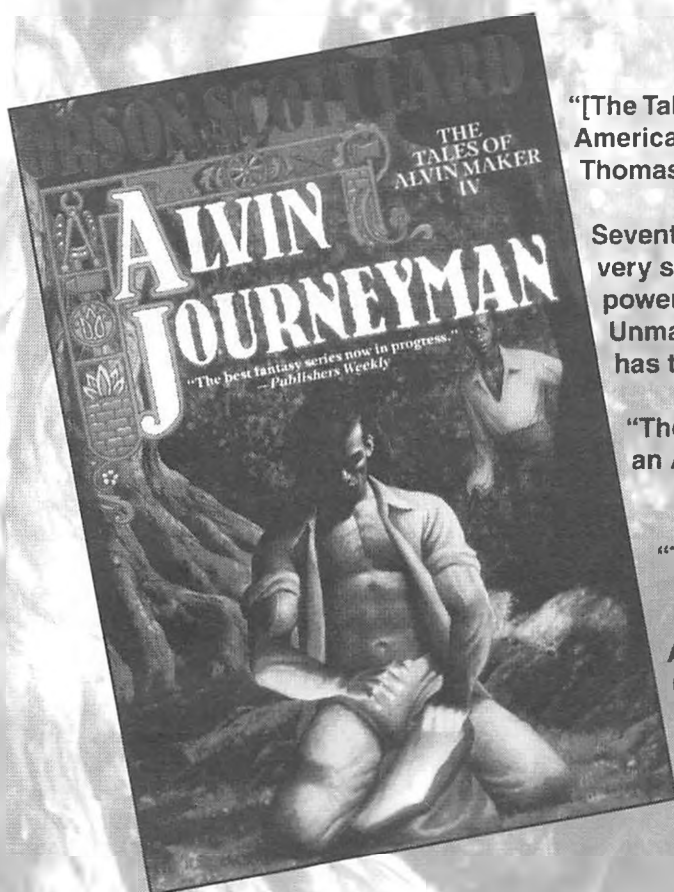

FACILITIES

Bobbi Armbruster and Ben Yalow have completed negotiations with the Anaheim Hilton and Towers to be L.A.con III's headquarters hotel, and also for the Anaheim Marriott's rooms and function space to be at our disposal.

Our other facility is the Anaheim Convention Center where we held the largest Worldcon ever, in 1984. We plan to use one or more of the exhibit halls plus program rooms and the arena. Our version of the Concourse will begin just beyond the Convention Center's North Lobby (the one nearest the Hilton).

It's just a two-minute walk to the Anaheim Hilton from the Convention Center. L.A.con II attendees will remember that the Hilton's fifth floor suites open onto a common outdoor area, creating a communal, midsummer night party atmosphere. The Anaheim Marriott flanks the Hilton and was successfully used as the site of the 1989 Westercon. Both the Hilton and the Marriott have full ballroom and meeting facilities, offering a lot of flexibility for programming, special interest meetings, dances, and late-night events.

Dealers' Room

Over 100 dealers have reserved space in the L.A.con III Dealers' Room with merchandise ranging from new, used and rare books, specialty press publishers, hand-crafted jewelry, original T-shirts and buttons, original and reproduced artwork, film tapes and records, and much, much more.

There is still space available for more dealers. We will have a mixture of 8' by 30" tables and 10' by 10' booths in the room, the exact number of each will not be determined until we have received approval of our floor plan from the Anaheim Fire Department. The price for booths has just been established and we are canvassing our registered dealers to see if they would prefer booths or tables. Since we do not know the split between tables and booths remaining in the room, dealers requesting space should indicate whether they will accept booth or table space as an alternative to their original choice. All dealers and helpers must have full attending memberships in L.A.con III.

All tables are located in islands and include two chairs and two coverings. We will not have any wall tables. Electricity will be available for approximately \$58.00 for 500 watts of power. The cost for each of the first two tables requested is \$125.00 and then \$175.00 each for up to two additional tables.

All booths include two draped 6' tables (24" wide) with a second top covering, a professional one-line name sign, two chairs, one wastebasket and 500 watts of electricity. Due to the prime location which has been assigned to booths, prices have been set at \$300.00 each for the first and second booths, \$425.00 each for the third and fourth booths and \$550.00 for the fifth and sixth booths.

Either booths or tables may be reserved with a deposit of \$50.00 each. Final payment will be due on January 1, 1996. Art Show

The Art Show will be located in the California Pavillion of the Anaheim Hilton. With approximately 320 panels of flat art and 30 tables of 3-D work, we expect this to be the largest display of Science Fiction and Fantasy art since Magicon in 1992. We will, in addition, have a print shop and special exhibits.

The California Pavillion has more than 28,000 square feet of space — more than enough to exhibit pieces entered in the main Art Show, a display copy of each different print in the Print Shop, all of the art exhibits AND house the Art Auction and Sales areas.

The Art Show, including the Print Shop, will be open on Thursday (probably 6 PM - 9 PM), Friday and Saturday (10 AM - 10 PM) and Sunday (10 AM - 2 PM). All art must be hung by Friday morning and will remain on display (except for pieces temporarily removed for voice auction and for prints in the Print Shop which sell out) until the show closes on Sunday afternoon.

We plan to award ribbons for exemplary work. The Best Artist awards will be given by vote of the attendees. Most of the other awards will be given by a panel of judges. There may also be some special awards given by the Convention Chairman, the Art Show staff, etc.

In the main Art show, most pieces will be sold by written bid. Only those pieces with the maximum number of written bids will be sold by voice auction. The Print Shop will sell copies of prints at a fixed price for immediate pick-up.

Before bidding, you must fill out a bidder registration card and obtain a bidder registration number. To register you must present some form of identification and, if under the age of 18 years of age, must have someone with you who is of legal age to guarantee your bids.

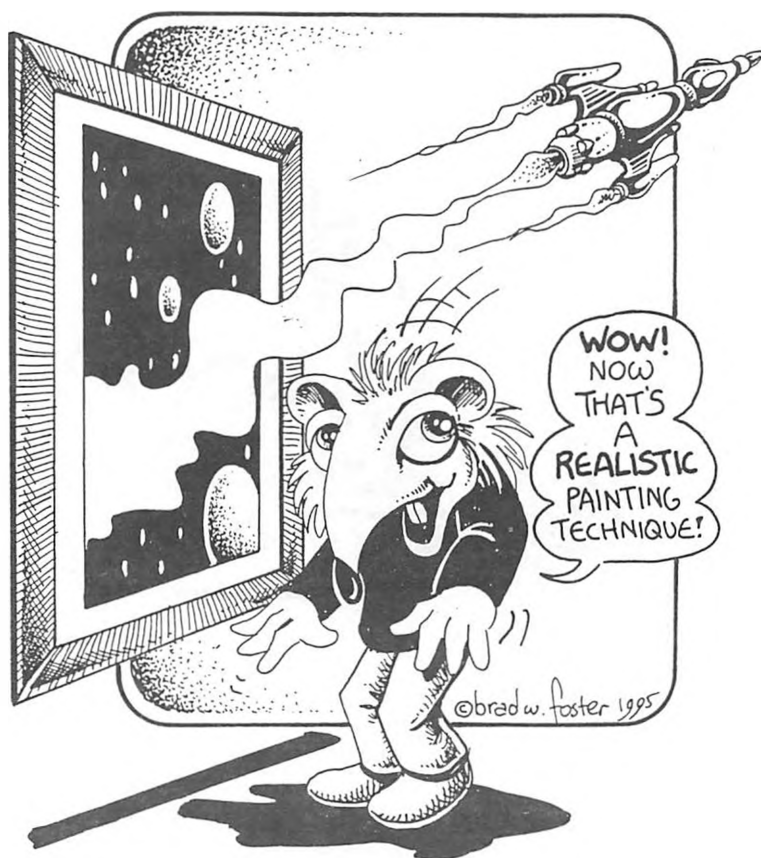
Written bidding on all pieces will be allowed until the Art Show closes on Sunday afternoon. There will be no "quick sale" prices during written bidding hours. Pieces that receive no written bids will be available for sale at a fixed price (set by the artist) after the written bidding closes (unless prohibited by the artist). The main Art Show Auction will take place late Sunday afternoon (tentatively scheduled for 4 PM) with a second auction if needed on Monday morning.

Art Show Sales will be open from 5 PM - 8 PM on Sunday evening and from 10 AM to 2 PM on Monday. You may pay for your purchases by cash, traveler's checks (American dollars only), Mastercard, Visa or personal check. There will, however, be a check limit

of \$500 and we will require two forms of ID (one of which must be a valid picture ID) before accepting your check. All credit card purchases will be verified. (We can be flexible — inquire in advance if you have questions). Please remember that you must pay California sales tax in addition to the amount of your purchase.

The official Artist's mailing will be sent out in January 1996. We will be acknowledging receipt of your entry with a postcard showing your space reservation (and any wait-listed space). We will be using as the basis for our initial mailing the databases from the last few Worldcon and Boskone Art Shows as well as those addresses that have been sent in. Automated Information

Do you have access to email? (If you don't, skip these articles.) If you do, you can get lots of L.A.con III information via our Email Infobot. Anything that the convention announces to the public will be available by email or via our web pages (see next article). In practice, this means just about anything I hear from the rest of the concom, as I'm no good at keeping secrets. You can even check on your membership status. Here's how it all works.

Everything that the concom makes public, or talks about when I'm within earshot, will be available here. This includes Progress Reports, membership data, and visitor information for Southern California. I don't have room here to tell you everything it has, so try it out and tell me what you think.

you'll automatically get a reply back, with the basic information on how to join L.A.con III and how to get more information from the Infobot.

The message should consist of one or both of these two lines:

If you send a message that says:

QUERY Firstname Lastname

SUBSCRIBE LACON3-NEWS

SUBSCRIBE LACON3-WWW

you'll get back a message telling you whether Firstname Lastname is a member. (This works best if you substitute your own name for Firstname Lastname, of course.)

and we'll send you a message every time something changes on our Internet services. (The first one is for everything except our World Wide Web pages, while the second one is just for changes to our Web Pages.) This will include each time a new Progress Report is put on-line, and each time the on-line membership database is updated.

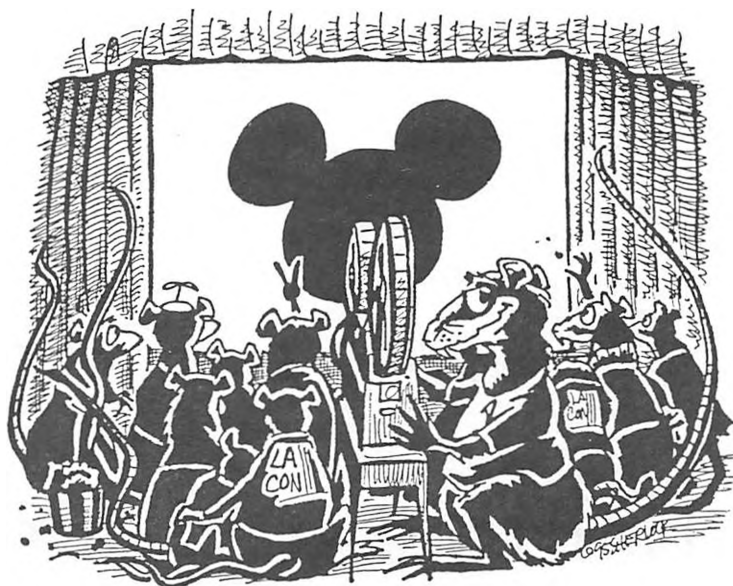
And if you send a message that says:

SEND INDEX

you'll get back the file "index" which lists all of the other files available using the "SEND Filename" command.

Nifty, isn't it? It's been very popular. Hundreds of fans have already used the service, to check on their memberships, their friends' memberships, to get progress reports or Dealers Room information, and so forth. One or two have even asked for the complete members list... it's rather large (121K at last report), which is why the "QUERY" command was installed.

I'll do my best to help you out, which may mean sending you files from the Infobot, forwarding your message to another department, or even doing some research on my own and getting back to you later.

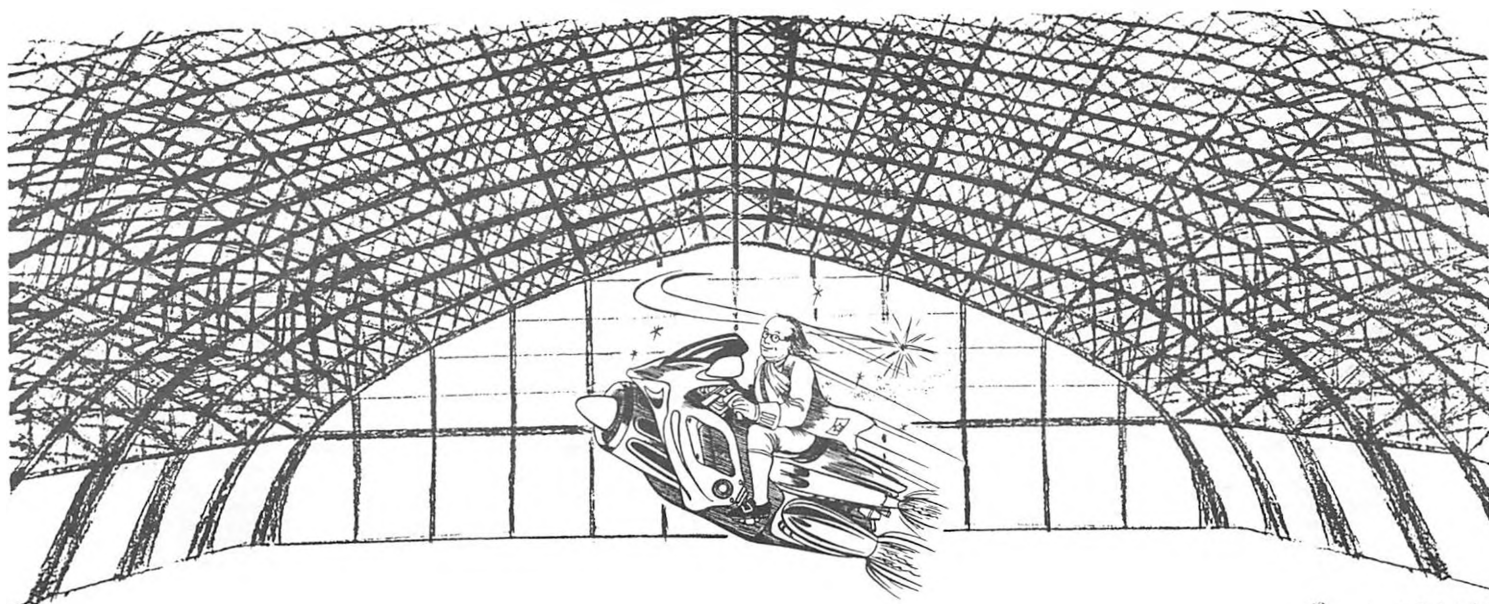

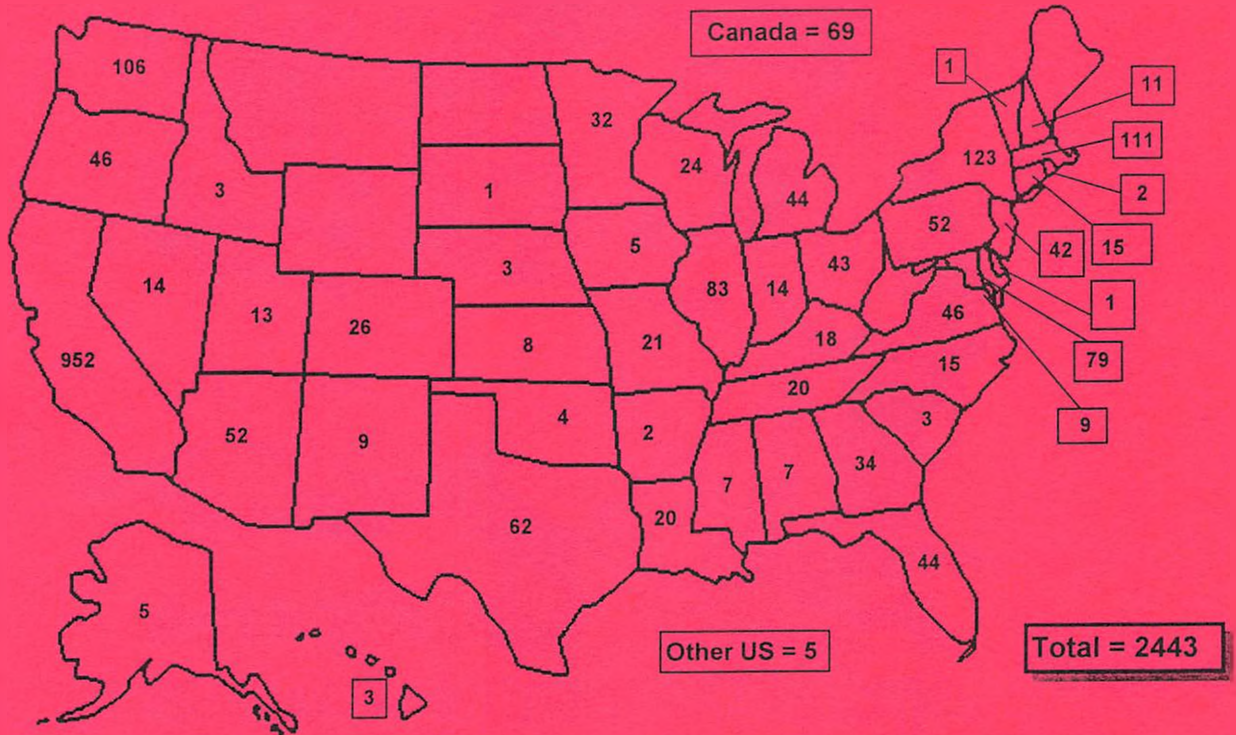
