Orient Yourself


The fastest way to go from the hotels to the Convention Center (KCCC) is to walk at street level. The sidewalks are wide and are all in good shape. It's due to be sunny but not terribly hot most of the week, and it may rain a little Friday and Saturday. There is a little construction near the 13th St. door of the KCCC, but if you are in a mobie or wheelchair, go a little past the 13th St. door and you'll find a more accessible door. The 2300 Lobby is where Volunteers will be before the con gets going and where Registration will be throughout the con. It is one short block from the 13th St. entrance. We are using sections D & E of Bartle Hall, 3rd floor, for Exhibits and Fan Fair.

Those Subterranean Tunnels

Longer Walks in the Dim

Yes, if you go into the parking garage system, you'll find a walkway that will take you to most of the hotels around Barney Allis Plaza, as well as to the Kansas City Convention Center. But...it's a longer, muggier walk than walking at street level to the Convention Center or to one of the other hotels. If you want to try the walkways, there are plenty of useful signs along the way, until you get to the KCCC:



Fan Lounge and Fandom Rocks!



To understand the activities of the times, look at newszines of the past. FANAC has scanned and uploaded over 2,000 newszines so far, going back to the 1930s are available now at fanac.org/fanzines.

FANAC will be showing these zines in the Fan Fair area. Come by and dip into our fannish history. View an issue or 10. We will even give you a souvenir print from an issue for a time important to you, whether it's 25 or 50 years ago, when you got into fandom, or even your birthday. We have over a hundred different titles from the US, UK, Australia, Germany, Sweden, and elsewhere, with many complete or long runs. There are issues of Fantasy/Science Fiction Times (400+ issues), Fantasy News, Karass (complete), SFinctor (complete), Fanac (complete), Luna, Fanew Sletter (Australian, 80), and Axe (complete)

The San José Galactic Light Tower is an animated interactive light sculpture created by Kevin Roche for the San Jose in 2018 Worldcon bid. It's a 1/10 scale replica of the historic San José Electric light tower, which stood in downtown San Jose from 1881-1915 making it the first electrified downtown west of the Rockies.





Business Meeting Info & Directions


The Preliminary Business Meeting set debate time on all but a few motions. Additional Finalists, which would have allowed Hugo administrators to add up to two finalists to the Hugo ballot, was postponed indefinitely, killing it for this year. The other item to be defeated was an amendment to the item limiting the Hugo nomination pool to members of the current and immediately past Worldcons (removing members of the immediately succeeding Worldcon from nomination). The proposed amendment, which failed, was to limit nominations to members only of this year's Worldcon.

A proposed amendment to strike the re-eligibility clause in the Best Series proposal was sent to committee to report back tomorrow due to questions about how it affected initial eligibility. Lastly, the proposal to change the rules regarding Retro Hugos was divided into three separate clauses, to be debated at a future session of the Meeting.

The Meeting also took the report of the WSFS Mark Protection Committee and accepted nominations for that committee. EPH, EPH+ and 4&6 amendments were moved to Sunday's WSFS Business Meeting.

The WSFS Business Meeting room, 2104AB is on the north side of 13th St., unlike the rest of our rooms in the KCCC which are on the south side of 13th St. (the road that runs under the KCCC, one block south of the Marriott). Enter the KCCC by the door on the Marriott side of 13th St. Walk to the hallway in front of you, where you will see display cases on your right. The meeting room, 2104AB, is on your left at street level.

1976 MidAmeriCon Memories

I remember meeting Alfie Bester at David Hartwell's party. He drew a sketch in the autograph pages of my program book & signed it. A lovely energetic man.

I remember standing in a hall outside some party while Frank Herbert described to me the best way to build bookshelves. He told Damon Knight I was beautiful.

I remember being introduced to Robert Silverberg & being unable to do anything other than gibber pitifully.



I remember the desk clerk at the hotel

being totally flummoxed when I tried to check in a couple days after my (first) husband had arrived. Because a female friend was sharing our room & they had already checked in as Mr & Mrs Charles Jackson. Poor man didn't know where to look or what to do. It was obvious he expected an explosion & got even more confused when I just laughed.

I remember the liquor store clerk, his store a war-zone around him, saying in tones of wonder, "You people drink more than Republicans." (The Republican National Convention had preceded us in the facilities.

The waitresses at the Pioneer Grill were all about 80 years old & surly on a good day. And their feet hurt. And, at 2 a.m. watching the ladies of the evening strike out. [[Ed. note: I saw the same thing at 3 a.m.!]]

We used three hotels, only two of which are still there, the Raddison Muehlebach [[Ed note: Now part of the Marriott]], the Dixon Inn, and the Phillips. The 4th corner of that intersection was a liquor store.

Damon Knight was making drinks at Dave Hartwell's party.

The Wichita group had a party at which we served a drink I have had no where else. They were called Blue Devils and closely resembled Windex in color. I think Everclear was involved. That drink prompted Howard Waldrop to ask God to have mercy on my soul.

- The 5% Solution: to remove the requirement to have at least 5% of the nominations to appear on the Final Hugo Ballot
- Multiple Nominations: to clarify that no work can appear in more than one category on the final Hugo ballot
- Electronic Signatures

The following items received first passage:

- Best Series (with an amendment to reword the re-eligibility clause and the addition of a sunset clause to require re-ratification in 2021)
- December is Good Enough: a proposal to move the cut-off date for members to be eligible to nominate for the Hugos from January 31 to December 31
- Defining North America: a motion to define North America in the WSFS Constitution, will all require ratification next year in Helsinki

There are still more items are awaiting first passage. They will be debated either tomorrow or Sunday, as time allows. The first item of business tomorrow will be Site Selection results and then the reports of two committees to which items (Nominee Diversity and a method to delay ratification of constitutional amendments) were referred today.



This MPC will meet at the conclusion of the WSFS Business Meeting on Sunday in the same room (2104 AB). Any MidAmeriCon II member may attend.

Saturday WSFS Business Meeting

The first item at the Business Meeting today was the presentation of the Site Selection results. After presentations from Worldcon 76 in San Jose and NorthAmeriCon '17, the meeting moved on to reports from committees created yesterday. The first report ended with a resolution to advise future WSFS Business Meetings on a procedure to delay ratification on a constitutional amendment. The second report amended the Nominee Diversity proposal, which was then ratified.


Other items of business debated:

- Two Years are Good Enough Passed—Would limit the Hugo nominating pool to members of the previous and current Worldcons.
- Young Adult Award Passed—Would create aYA Campbell-like award.
- Retrospective Improvements—This was broken into three clauses, two of which passed. Allowing Retro Category Hugos for categories in which No Award won failed.
- Universal Suffrage—Passed—Would bar Worldcons from selling memberships that allow full con attendance without voting rights.
- Non-transferability of Voting Rights—Failed—Would have made supporting memberships non-transferable.
- Three Stage Voting (3SV)—Referred to a committee to report back tomorrow on a proposed amendment.

All of the above that passed will be sent on to Worldcon 75 for ratification. This leaves 3SV, EPH, 4&6, and EPH+ left to debate at Sunday's Business Meeting.

Low-resolution video recordings of the WSFS Business Meeting are uploaded to the <u>YouTube Worldcon Events channel</u> as fast as possible. The Thursday meeting consists of sixteen segments, each approximately 10 minutes long. The ability to get the low res video online quickly is thanks to grants from DetCon 1 (2014 NASFiC) and SFSFC Inc (San Jose in 2018 Worldcon Bid).

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Membership Revocation

At the beginning of a panel on The State of Short Fiction on Friday, Dave Truesdale read a prepared statement that contained inflammatory comments that were considered inciteful by a number of people at the panel. After consulting with the Incident Report Team, the Division Heads revoked Dave's membership. They issued the following statement: "Dave Truesdale's membership was revoked because he violated MidAmeriCon II's Code of Conduct. Specifically, he caused 'significant interference with event operations and caused excessive discomfort to others"

The Fan Funds are entirely supported by the generosity and goodwill of fandom itself, raising money for the delegate's travel expenses through voting fees, auctions at various cons, outright donations, and the fundraising efforts of current and past delegates, candidates, and administrators. Many of fandom's best known members have served first as delegates, then later as administrators, of the Fan Funds. It truly is a life-changing experience, and one that exemplifies the best of fannish hospitality and friendship. 

Tiptree Auction Results

Tiptree Auctioneer, Sumana Harihareswara, entertained the audience of about 50 folks Friday afternoon, and raised \$1,500 for the James Tiptree Award. The auction featured several rare and hotly contested items, including:

A signed first edition of *Kindred*, by Octavia Butler, received the highest bids and sold for \$500, Space Babe Hoodie sweatshirt, *Weird Tales #2*, Winter 1985, *Cooking Out of This World*, edited by Anne McCaffrey, containing recipes from dozens of famous science fiction writers from the 1980s, *Mythologies*, a suite of six miniatures for string quartet, by Chelsea Quinn Yarbro, photocopy of *Exploring the Solar System*, Children's Book by Fabric, a set of the 2015 Tiptree winners: a signed first edition of Lizard Radio, by Pat Schmatz and a signed copy of the April-May 2015 *Isaac Asimov's Science Fiction Magazine* containing "The New Mother," by Eugene Fischer, *Her Smoke Rose Up From Supper* cookbook and Space Babe tatoos were sold as direct sale items.

The Tiptree Award encourages the exploration & expansion of gender, and is presented annually to a work of science fiction or fantasy. The Tiptree celebrates its 25th anniversary this year.
